Two Squares To Be Dedicated To Fallen Heroes Of World War II


#### Abstract

On Sunday morning, April 25 , family and friends will gather to remember two native sons of Charlestown who lost their lives in the service of their country almost a half century ago. Both squares will memorialize World War II United States Army members who made the supreme sacrifice in the European Theatre of operations. Squares will be dedicated in their honor at services beginning at 10 a.m. in Sullivan Square, adjacent to the Teamsters Medical Building at 16 Sever St.

The first Hero Square to cent to 16 Sever St., and will honor Private Thomas J. Flynn, USA, who grew up on Beacham Street at Sullivan Square, and later lived at 26 and then 41 Sever St. Private Flynn was killed in action on Nov. 19 , 1944 while engaged in combat against German resistance near Aachen, the first German town to be taken solely by American forces. He served with the 104th Infantry Division, Ist Army, known as the "Fighting lst Timber Wolves." The gathering will then proceed to the dedication of the second square to the martial music of the Colo-

nial Band of Lawrence. The second Hero Square to be dedicated, will be erected at the corner of Au burn Terrace and Auburn Street, and will honor Private First Class John Joseph Maheigan, USA, who grew up on Auburn Street and whose mother lives across the street from the site at 42 Auburn St. PFC Maheigan was critically wounded in combat action against enemy German forces in the Ardennes, "The Battle of the Bulge," on Jan. 5, 1945 and died in a military hospital three days later. He served with the 345th Infantry, 87th Army Division. All are welcome to attend the dedication of these two squares, which is being sponsored by Bunker Hill Post No. 26, The American Legion, under the auspices

## Whelan Receives Commendation



MASSACHUSETTS STATE POLICE Detective Edward L. Whelan received a commendation at a ceremony held on March 28 at State Police Headquarters, Framingham. In making the presentation, Col. Charles Henderson stated, "This award is in recognition of Trooper Whelan's outstanding police action involving a six-month wire tap which resulted in indictments of four individuals in trafficking cocaine. " Henderson also stated that "further investigation by Whelan resulted in the arrest of three individuals and the owner of a lounge in Dorchester. As a result of his investigation, the attorney general moved to seize an auto business, home, waterfront property, three automobiles and forfeiture proceedings against the Dorchester lounge, valued in excess of $\$ 300,000$." Whelan, who has been a member of the State Police force since December 1968, is currently assigned to the attorney general's office in Boston. He and his wife, the former Carol Connolly, are former Charlestown residents. They reside in Hingham with their wo daughters Kathleen and Carolyne. * Reminder Of Lowney Way Closure . . . In order to complete construction of the Tobin Bridge connection to the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) tunnels in Charlestown's City Square, Lowney Way is closed from $7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. to 9 p.m. now through Friday, April 30. There will be no closure during weekend periods.
The Chelsea Street on-ramp is closed and will remain closed until 5 p.m. on Friday, April 23. During this time period, access to the Tobin Bridge will be from the Water Street on-ramp.
Lowney Way is being closed so that the CANA construction crew can erect concrete beams to the Tobin Bridge approach to the new tunnels. In order to ensure pedestrian safery and to direct traffic, police officers are on detail. The officers are stationed at Bunker Hill and Vine streets, at the Water Street on-ramp, at the Water Street on-ramp merge with the Tobin Bridge and with the construction crew. Access for emergency vehicles will be maintained at all times.
At most times, upon direction of the police officer, vehicles exiting from Ferrin, Tremont, Prospect, Mount Vernon and Chestnut streets will be able to take a left to Bunker Hill Street or a right to Adams Street. When this access is not feasible, the police officers will guide vehicles o Monument Square.
During the street closing, bus service on "T" Route 93 inbound to Boston is being rerouted to Chelsea Street. Busses bear left onto Vine Street, turn right onto Chelsea Street to Constitution Road, turn right onto Warren Street and left onto Chelsea Street. Bus stops are on Vine Street near Bunker Hill Street and on Chelsea Street near Warren Street. People using the Adams Street bus stop or Park Street bus stop can use either the Warren Street stop ("T" Route 92) or the Chelsea Street stop ("T" Routes 93 and III).

* City Square Park Meeting . . . The Department of Environmental Management (DEM) and the park designer, The Halvorson Company, have almost completed the schematic design phase for City Square Park. * Traffic Signal On Main Street . . . The new commissioner of the Boston Transportation Department, Rina Cutler, has informed the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services that a traffic signal to be located at Main and Eden streets is included in this year's capital budget, and will be installed during this summer's construction season.
Cutler stated: "I share the safety concerns of the the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and the residents, and I will move aggressively to get this signal installed."
* Algae Bloom In Water . . . The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority has once again advised residents that a possible algae bloom has occurred within the MWRA reservoir system. The MWRA's routine sampling program has found high algae concentrations in some areas of its reservoirs. If sampling continues to show high concentrations, the MWRA will take the proper measures to treat the reservoir.
High concentrations of algae could result in taste and odor problems. Despite the odor, the MWRA states that the water is safe to use for washing, cooking and drinking. Boiling and refrigerating the water may help to eliminate the odor. Adding a slice of lemon may remove the bitter taste.

* Street Reconstruction Update . . . Mario Susi \& Son crews continued working on Common and Park streets finishing the roof drain installations and installing the light bases. Susi has also excavated the sidewalks and set most of the new curb. This year the plan is to connect the roof drains to the down spouts as the construction proceeds. thereby avoiding some of the problems encountered last year. We have been informed that the CANA Project is scheduled to close part of Lowney Way near the end of this week. During the Lowney Way shutdown, Susi plans to strip the pavement and redo Common and Park streets.
The work is also proceeding on Lawrence and Seminary streets. The drainage is done, the light bases have been installed, the curb has been set and a good portion of the new sidewalk poured. The tree locations are also set. The pavement has been stripped and all that remains, other than gas light services and paving, is the watermain installa-
tion in Seminary Street. This watermain work could start late this week or early next, week.
Leaflets have been distributed on Prospect Street and Susi plans to start the drainage work by the time this reaches print. The pre-construction video was done last week and the watermain replacement installation should begin in earnest next week.
The Mead Street Stairs contract is underway again as well. The railing subcontractor for the Middlesex Corp. was on-site this past week installing the new posts for the stair railing. Measurements were also taken to cut the railing lengths. Most of the rail should be installed by the end of this week. Middlesex themselves are expected back next week to complete the street work on their contract.

Soon a sister of mine recognized the impact I was having on the young men of Charlestown, and she asked if she could move inco my former High Street home to provide the same opportunities to the young women of the community. Of course, I was more than happy to see her show such initiative. Often we shared ideas and materials. Ours was a common goal, and we worked very hard to cater to those who came to us. We became even more accessible to each other when we had a tunnel constructed beneath the streets to connect us.

My home on Green Street was quite large. I set aside an area for reading, another for games, and still several others where I of-

fered to teach vocationa skills to my visitors. As a token gesture, I charged each of them twenty-five cents per year to learn photography, typing, ham radio and woodworking. I also offered to teach them to play musical instruments and to sing.

In my basement I had a swimming pool, and I took great pride in knowing that all of my regular visitors learned to swim. Some learned so well, in fact, that they were able to parlay their talents into a college education.

Soon I was able to offer summer camping proggrams and frequent trips to points of interest. For many years I actually had a mayor and a council. I held many contests over the years, including the annual Easter Egg Hunt, Turkey
for my visitors. With my years, I began to become a viable alternative to the temptations of the street. I know that I have helped many find a straight and narrow path for themselves.

After working somewhat as separate entities over the many years, my sister and I decided that it was time we joined forces.
Programs were created to accommodate both boys and girls, and although this integration of the sexes was met with some initial resistance, success quickly dispelled all negative notions.

Yes, today I am old, and often my wrinkles show, but inside I burn with energy. I have given myself to this community for one hundred years. Many of you have come to rely on me, and for many different reasons. Many of you have come to like me, some may even love me. That is often a difficult word to use when it comes to expressing one's feelings for me. I hear your father's thanks. I hear your thanks.

## The CANA Project And The Community

Dear Gloria:
Since moving from Charlestown in December of 1990 my trips through the City Square area have been limited to perhaps once or twice a week. As such I am constantly amazed at the changes which have occurred in the square over the past 28 months, and even more so since the start of the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project in May of 1987. Of course those who have been closely associated with the project since its inception, such as the members of the North Area Task Force and The Charlestown Patriot know that preparatory work such as utility relocation and the preloading contract actually took place prior to 1987 . In any event, its hard to believe that just six short years ago City Square was shadowed by a maze of hulking overhead green ramps, the YMCA building stood diagonally across from the Life Focus Center and there were no tunnels lying up to 80 feet or so beneath the surface of Chelsea Street.
As the former Mass. Department of Public Works CANA Community Liaison (1987-1990) I would like to offer the following information which your readers may have forgotten about or may not be aware of.
First of all it should be noted that the residents of Charles town were actively involved in all aspects of the planning, design and construction of the project from the moment of the initial planning meeting which took place in Charlestown in 1977. In fact, in 1982 the Federal Department of Transportation advised the MDPW that the tunnel (CANA) project would not be eligible for federal funding because the City Square overpasses were not part of the interstate highway system. Charlestown, however, refused to take no for an answer. Led by the North Area Task Force (NATF), a Charlestown community group, residents collected over 5,000 signatures in support of the project and urging ful restoration of federal funding. Not long after that, funding was included as part of the 1982 Surface Transportation Act.
The above history aside, the CANA project was designed first and foremost to improve public safety and the flow of traffic in the Northern Area of the Central Artery, one of the most accident-intensive locations in the state highway system. This will be accomplished by lengthening the $650-$ oot merge and weave area where I-93, Route 1, Storrow Drive and Central Artery cross above the Charles River to a distance of 2,000 feet. Additionally, the S-Curve approach to the Tobin Bridge, the site of countless accidents (such as the one in 1973 which disabled the bridge for three months) will be eliminated. From a public safety standpoint, CANA is a necessary project and certainly well-worth the effort involved in constructing it. However, improved public safety and traffic flow are just two of the many benefits which the public will enjoy post CANA
CANA will also greatly improve the quality of life for the often forgotten constituency - the residents of Charlestown. Since the 1620s when Governor Winthrop built the Great House in City Square and established a ferry service to carry travelers to the downtown core, commuters have passed through Charlestown, dramatically affecting the neighborhood.
When CANA is completed, commuter traffic will be removed from the local street system and placed underground within two tunnels 850 and 1,500 feet in length respectivey. The result will be that commuters will gain a safer and more efficient highway system while the Charlestown community loses commuter traffic. Finally, the offensive green overhead ramps which once shadowed City Square will be

demolished, the community will be reunited with its waterfront and close to 10 acres of land will be made available for a park and mixed developement.
For all intents and purposes, construction of the CANA project began on May 7, 1987. Prior to and during construction, an extensive community outreach program was waged to ensure that the public was well aware of what was going on in City Square and to help minimize the impact of construction on both commuters and Charlestown.
As the community liaison, I was charged with the responsibility of bringing word of the project to all the cities and towns along Route 1 and $\mathrm{I}-93$ to the New Hampshire border whose commuters might be impacted when traveling through the project area. To this day I can still recall the looks of disbelief on the faces of those attending the many public presentations which I made when I informed the attendees that the Tobin Bridge inbound would be reduced to one lane during the project. Fortunately, our outreach efforts were augmented by extensive and terrific media coverage by the Patriot and so many other outlets who covered the day-to-day construction activities.
In addition to the public relations process, a number of mitigation measures were implemented including increased capacity on the Orange, Blue, Red and Green MBTA lines, North Shore Bus and Commuter Rail Service was beefed-up and vanpools and park and ride lots were created. Also a successful water shuttle was created and ambulance service, police presence and tow trucks were added to aid the flow of traffic and ensure public safety.
Considering the fact that the CANA project involved the construction of two tunnels at depths of up to 80 feet in the midst of an extremely congested urban area, I believe tha the project has been a resounding success and that disruption to both commuter and resident alike minimal.
