


Chief Marshal Martin O'Brien Jr. Leads The 1989 Bunker Hill Day Parade

Aquarium Proposal To Go To Neighborhood Council

John Prescott, executive director of the New England Aquarium, requested a public meeting with the Charlestown Neighborhood Council in a letter to council members late Wednesday afternoon.

Council chairman Dennis McLaughlin has announced that the meeting will take place Tuesday, June 27 at 7 p.m. at Charlestown High School, 240 Medford St. Prescott will have a Char-

lestown Community Report that summarizes and addresses the past community outreach process. The report will be presented formally to the council at the meeting. Copies of the report will be available for the public on Friday afternoon, June 23 at: Charlestown Branch Library, 179 Main St.; BRA Navy Yard Office, First Avenue, Building 34, second floor; Job Start Office, One Thompson Square; and the Sullivan Square Fire Station.

The public is advised that a council vote could be taken on whether to support aquarium planners to proceed on to the formal planning stages of a new aquarium in the Navy Yard's Dry Dock 2.

Unconfirmed reports are that, following a positive council vote, the proposal will be presented at the BRA's biweekly board meeting on June 29.

But this was not O'Neil's first rescue attempt. In 1986, while riding an MBTA bus, she performed CPR on a man sitting in the front of the bus who had a heart attack. He was brought back to life with her aid.

Although O'Neil may have the makings of a good paramedic, she is pursuing a career in adolescent clinical psychology at St. Michael's College in Vermont. "I'm interested in working with adolescent problems, everything from abuse to social," O'Neil said of her main reason for pursuing this field of study.

According to O'Neil, any field of study should re-

If This Were A Romance, The Aquarium Has Asked Us To Dance Dear Gloria.

I have followed with interest the aquarium's proposed move to the Navy Yard, and as a proponent to the Tudor Wharf project for the Rapids Furniture Warehouse site, have an interest in encouraging responsible development on the Charlestown waterfront. I have a reasonably good idea of the impacts projects of this size generate, and an appreciation for the investment required to plan and permit a project of this scope. There will be multiple opportunities for the community and public agencies to participate in the planning and review process. The program and designs will change, opportunities will be discovered, problems will be debated and resolved, and in the end there will be a project superior to whatever can be presented today.

The overwhelming preponderance of benefits to the community versus minor potential negative impacts suggests that those in opposition to the aquarium have some motive other than negotiating the aquarium for the best possible deal for the town. If this were a romance, the aquarium has just asked us to dance; to me, she's an attractive gal and I've got nothing to lose and everything to gain by accepting the invitation. What a missed opportunity it would be to not get to know her better!

So I've got to think that those opposing the aquarium are practicing plain old BRA-bashing along with a newly fashioned "not-in-my-backyard," no-growth argument. As we're talking about the aquarium here and not a proposed prison or sewage plant, make that "nothing-in-my-backyard."

I do understand BRA-bashing; a time-honored pastime most citizens have participated in at one time or another. They may not execute perfect master plans, and public agencies can be a little heavy-handed and slow afoot, but in this case let's not confuse the message with the messenger.

What's more troubling is the abuse of process perpetrated by those who believe Charlestown should be artificially preserved in some sort of time capsule. How can people expect the aquarium to now have all the answers to all the problems? It's a process folks, a long process that does work. There'll be problems, most likely solvable problems. There'll be impacts, and they will be minimized. But this aquarium wants to come to Charlestown and be part of the community. It's a great community and a great public institution. It would be a terrible shame to not welcome the aquarium wholeheartedly now, and sit down together and make it work. Sincerely, David R. Keller

> I Don't Think Dry Dock 2 Is The Answer

Dear Editor:

Like many residents of the Navy Yard, and as a contributor to the aquarium, I was initially receptive to the idea of the aquarium's move. However, I have become disenchanted with the idea as more of the plans have been exposed. I object to the move to existing Dry Dock 2 on several counts:

1. The dry dock is an historical site and is part of a public park. The dry dock and the park represent one of the few well-maintained urban open spaces in Charlestown. The placement of the aquarium in this location would end the access of the public to the dry dock and would impact the park and the fountain with a population they were not designed to accept.

2. The indications are that the aquarium will receive the development rights to this public park for the sum of \$1. I cannot accept the idea that any entity can access the public treasury in this manner. To my knowledge, the aquarium paid a similar fee for the land under its present site. I have not heard that the aquarium is willing to swap properties. The park is not a blighted area. It is a vibrant feature, used by children and adults. I can see no public benefit in selling it for a dollar.

3. The amount of vehicular and pedestrian traffic that will be introduced into Charlestown will add an additional environmental burden on a part of Boston that is still trying to recover from years of neglect by the city.

4. The aquarium management has indicated that it has studied other areas of the Navy Yard and locations outside Charlestown. While this may be true, it seems strange that a prime park area won out over other dry docks within the Navy Yard as well as such areas as the Little Mystic area of Charlestown or parts of East Boston or Chelsea.

5. The proposed structure will violate all the design and zoning precepts the Charlestown office of the BRA has mandated for other developers of BRA land within the Navy Yard. One must ask why there is a double standard. Other not-for-profit organizations building in the Yard were able to comply with all BRA requirements.

6. The final question is of course, who benefits from this project? Well, I don't know who benefits (beyond the New England Aquarium Corp.), but I do know who loses. It is the residents of Charlestown; the same residents who were promised a piece of the development pie in the form of construction jobs when the Yard was first developed; the same residents who can't afford housing in the Yard, let alone the \$8 admission fee to the aquarium; the residents that are having an entire section of their town being turned into a highway interchange so that some commuter from New Hampshire or Marblehead can get to his office downtown 10 minutes faster.

If the aquarium needs to move that's fine, but have it move to an area that can support the traffic, both vehicular and pedestrian. I don't think Dry Dock 2 is the answer.

I Remember The Old City Square

Dear Gloria,

Attending the groundbreaking ceremonies in City Square recently brought back memories of City Square from my "younger" days. I'd like to share them with you and my fellow "Townies."

I remember the late '30s when young women would meet their beaus and go to the Winter Garden Ballroom in City Square. The annual dance of the "Scotties" was quite an event when we'd dance to the music of Billy Reeves and his swinging band. The Scotties were a crowd of young men from all over town with names such as Brady, Sheehan, Burns, Curtin, Maguire, Lynch, Hickey, Crowley, Morey, Walsh, Anadore, Sutton, Whelan, O'Brien, Barry, Powers, Winnett, Donahue, Carver, Sullivan, Kelly, Harrington, Chisholm, Brennan, Helmond, Farley, Fleming, Furlong, Fitzpatrick and Carr.

Charlestown was so different at that time. On Monday and Saturday nights everyone walked to City Square for a night of dancing. If it was today, we would also have to walk - no place to park.

Other popular clubs of the time were Marion A.A., the Cameo Club and the John "Barney" Carver Associates. Many of the same young men belonged to one of these groups.

At this time Thomas Flaherty was our congressman, Owen Gallagher was running for district attorney, John Down ran for sheriff, John Doherty was our representative, John Connolly was clerk of the state Superior Court, Robert E. Lee was running for senator and David (Davey) Powers was running for Ward 2's representative to the House!

I can remember Chelsea Street in these heydays, with Gordon Drug, Charlie's Restaurant, Shorty's Pool Room, Mina's Lunch, the Patricia Joan Beauty Shop, the law offices of Thomas F. Fitzpatrick, City Square Florist Shop and many, many more. Oh, to think back on all the good times!

All the good people who made up our town then, and each, in their own way, were the leaders of our small community. I look back and think of them with respect.

There are just a few of us left, but we remember, and we are happy that we were a part of those days.

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


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Central Artery North Area Project




