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## Thanks . . . Bob

by Charlie McGonagle It was a story which seemed to have a beginning in October of this past year when Kevin Kelly approached the Charlestown Boys \& Girls Club Alumni Committee with the idea of honoring Bob Munstedt at the group's annual reunion.
In fact, the story began as far back as 1940, when Bob first came to the club. The real story spanned some fifty-five years and directly touched the lives of some three thousand boys from this community who were part of the Bunker Hillbillies, the Junior Wranglers or the Ranch House Seven. It was a story which indirectly touched the lives of countless of thousands of others who followed the exploits of Bob and his performers.
From the moment he first entered the club back before this country's participation in World War II, Bob's affection for the youth of this community bordered on ad diction. There was something about the kids in the Charlestown neighborhood that he could never fully explain, yet he somehow always clearly understood. His wonder ful wife, Helen, recogniz ing this affection in her husband so early on, un selfishly and magnanimously agreed to share Bob with the Charles town Boys Club for as many years as he may like. The relationship las ted for thirty-eight years 1940-1978.

Bob has been thanked before. He has been thanked by former Hill billies and he has been thanked by people from the community, but on

Saturday, Jan. 21, he was thanked by a club and a membership who had the privilege of embracing him for so many years.
On that night, he was thanked from the hearts of the men who performed for him during the forties, the fifties, the sixties, and the seventies. And on that Saturday night, he was thanked from the heart by others who may not have performed, but did know him or of him.
It was a wonderful night. It was a night when all pretentiousness was left at home with the tuxedos and black ties. The men who came to the Charlestown Boys Club Reunion that night to hon or Bob Munstedt came to say thank you in their own way. They came with their hearts.

On stage was the famous Bunker Hillbilly "Racket Squad," guitars, banjos, a tub drum, a keyooard and several kazoos. Behind those instruments of Hillbilly music stood former Hillbillies Kevin Kelly, Steve Coyne, Jimmy Connolly, Paul Lydon, Eddie Blaikie, Tim Walsh, Jimmy Sullivan, Eddie Kyle, Tommy Getherall, Jimmy Honohan, George Godding, Barry Baker and Eddie Casey who represented each of the decades Bob spent at the club. In the audience there were many more. Bill Burke Les Gauthier and Bill Lynch, among others, were from the Hillbillies of the 1940s. Mickey Murphy was one of the those who was recognized from the fifties, and the list (continued on page 9)

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## TAX-CUTTING MOVES FOR 1994

Even though 1994 is history, there's still time to cut your 1994 taxes. Here are some of the best strategies.

- Contribute to an Individual Retirement Ac count (IRA). IRA contributions come in two vari eties: tax-deductible and non-deductible. An IRA contribution is deductible if you didn't participate in another retirement plan during 1994 or, if you did, you met certain income requirements. But even a non-deductible IRA can make sense. That's because IRA earnings grow tax-deferred, which can help cut your taxes in the future. You must make either type of IRA contribution by April 17, 1995.
- Review your tax documents. Banks, brokerage firms and employers sometimes make mistakes, and they may have reported too much income on your 1099 and W-2 forms. You should also check Form 1098, which reports your mort-gage-interest payments.
- Review your activities during 1994. Unusual or non-routine events sometimes create tax deductions. For example, you may be entitled to a tax break if you moved, searched for a new job, refinanced a mortgage, suffered a casualty loss or incurred large medical expenses during 1994
- Consider a multiple support agreement. You may be able to claim a parent or other relative as a dependent in 1994, even if you provided less than $50 \%$ of that person's support. The key is whether you provided at least $10 \%$ of support, and total support by all people exceeded $50 \%$. Certain other rules apply, so get details if you're helping to support a relative.
- Get organized. Good financial records usually result in a more complete and accurate tax return. If you didn't keep up with your paperwork during 1994, it's not too late to start.

$\star$ New Winter Storm Strategies "Snow arrived on Saturday, and the city of Boston was ready," says Mayor Thomas M. Menino. "New policies are in place city personnel have been briefed, and equipment and supplies are set to go to battle another cold, New England winter."

Menino says, "It's a team approach. We've identified problems we had last year, and through many city agencies working together, we've been able to take steps to solve those problems, and make sure Boston streets are safe for everyone this winter."

The following initiatives are being instituted by the Menino administration: A Housing Enforcement Awareness Team (HEAT) has been established.

- In order to quickly resolve "no heat" complaints from city apartment dwellers, the Housing Enforcement Awareness Team, or "HEAT," has been established through the Inspectional Services Department to make sure tenants have safe and sanitary living conditions throughout the year. HEAT will work with property owners, managers, tenants and neighborhood groups to resolve and prevent problems and "send the message that people, no matter who they are or where they live, have a right to safe and decent housing." New winter brochure developed.
- The city has compiled and mailed over 250,000 brochures on storm preparedness and procedures to city residents, and the information is also available at community centers and public libraries Called "Weathering the Storm," the brochure contains emergency phone numbers and winter parking regulations.
Emphasis on safety for school children.
- Plowing areas around schools, especially elementary schools, will be a top priority
- Seventy-five school bus stops in the city's neighborhoods have been targeted for clearance by DPW crews.
- Snow piles will be removed so children can't climb on them and risk falling.
- School closings or delays will be announced on local radio and television stations starting at 5 a.m. on snow days.

## equipment have been added

- Starting this winter, Public Works Department crews will be scheduled for late night and overnight shifts, in addition to their regular day shifts, so snow plows can be called at a moment's notice. "There's no way we can be surprised by a sudden storm," says Menino. "Snow fighting equipment will be ready to go $24-$ hours a day."
- This winter the Menino administration has contracted with more operators of smaller snowplows called "Bobcats," so narrow streets and alleys in the Back Bay the North End and other congested neigh-
borhoods can be plowed more easily. New road salt storage


## warehouse constructed.

- DPW is fully-stocked with road chemicals to spread on icy streets. There was a salt shortage in the Northeast last year, but this year the city has contracted with a supplier that will meet the city's needs for the entire winter of 1994-95.
- The city has constructed a new salt storage facility costing $\$ 350,000$ on Gibson Street in Dorchester to protect road chemicals from the weather. The facility is about as large as half a football field, and can store thousands of tons of road salt and sand.

## being held more accountable

- For the first time, the city's hundreds of privately contracted snowplows will display a brightly-colored sticker on the passenger side of the vehicle, so the vehicle and it's operator can be easily identified as working for the city. This will ensure that private contractors are doing business on city time.


## New snow pile location.

- There is a new area for city crews to dump snow that has been removed from intersections. Through an agreement with Boston Edison, snow will be piled in an area off D Street in South Boston. This agreement was reached by the Menino administration at no cost to the city,

The mayor says, "Last year's record snowfall taught us a lesson, that even in a city like Boston, where we are used to
harsh winters, comprehensive, city-wide planning is essential to keep our streets clear, and to ensure that our citizens get through the winter as safely as possible. I want to thank the people of Boston ahead of time for their willingness to do their part. Because we are all working together, Boston is ready for the winter."

## Announce Landmark Boston/Massport Seaport Development Plan

In a first-time partnership between the city of Boston and the Massachusetts Port Authority, Lt. Gov. A. Paul Cellucci, Mayor Thomas M. Menino and Massport Executive Director and CEO Stephen P. Tocco launched a joint city-state planning effort to explore the economic development potential of the waterfront. The initiative is the first economic development project initiated jointly by Massport and the city.

The Seaport Economic Development Plan will determine the strategic steps needed to spur job creation and economic growth along the waterfront in Charlestown, East Boston and South Boston. The plan will focus on maritime and industrial job creation, commercial development, capital investment, tourism and transportation access.

With the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and Massport providing $\$ 350,000$ each to fund the planning effort, officials from each organization will develop the plan under the direction of Menino, Tocco and BRA Director Marisa Lago.
"The Port of Boston has been an economic engine for three centu-
ries, and this partnership will put some real wind behind the sails of commercial activity along the Boston waterfront," said Cellucci, who chairs the Governor's Seaport Advisory Council. "There is some terrific waterfront property that is currently underutilized, and we want to encourage more investment, development and job creation."

Menino regards the alliance as an important step in developing a comprehensive economic development strategy for creating new jobs on the Boston waterfront.
"For too long, Boston's waterfront has been neglected," Menino said. "This partnership is a first step in taking full advantage of all that it has to offer. The Seaport Economic Development Plan will help us determine job creation opportunities in industries such as tourism and seafood processing. There's a lot of potential on the waterfront, and we're going to tap into it."

Tocco also is pleased that the city and Masspoft are joining forces to develop a plan for the seaport.
"Massport is proud of the work we have already done with the waterfront and we look forward to continued revitalization
of our properties," Tocco said. "I am confident that with the combined strengths of the BRA and Massport, we will take the necessary steps to bring the seaport into the next century".

Meetings will be held with neighborhood groups throughout the process, and officials hope to complete the major components of the plan by September 1995

Massport owns more than 400 acres of property in the Port of Boston, including the Black Falcon Cruise Terminal, Boston Fish Pier, Conley Terminal and Moran Ter-
minal in Charlestown Working together, this joint BRA/Massport group will develop detailed strategies for both short- and long-term seaport development.

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## Ribbon Cutting Ceremony Marks Official Opening Of Senior Housing At Building 104 In The Charlestown Navy Yard


#### Abstract

Building 104 on First Avenue was officially opened recently just one year after a groundbreaking ceremony marked the start of the newest development in the Charlestown Navy Yard. During the past year, there has been a transformation of Building 104 from a dilapidated shipbuilding facility dating from about 1901 , to a stunning housing complex of 46 units. Each of the units is unique, depending on where in the building it is located, and each has amenities that lend themselves to safe and comfortable housing for the elderly. The entryway of each apartment is decorated by hand using a variety of bricks, each with its own unique style and color.


There is a community laundry room and a community room with an adjoining courtyard. The building is monitored by an entry access security system.

Twenty-three of the units are under the Section 8 program and these all have been rented. There are still some of the 23 Tax Credit units available. In order to be eligible, the prospective elderly tenant must have an income of between $\$ 16,300$ and $\$ 24,600$. The rent is $\$ 542$ a month including utilities with the tenant paying only cable and telephone.
The sponsor for the development has been the Bricklayers \& Carpenters Non-Profit Development and the developer has been the Building 104 Limited Partnership, Hammer \&

Trowel Development as general partner and three limited partners including Houghton Mifflin Co., Boston Safe Deposit \& Trust Co. and NCC Delta Co./NYNEX Credit Co The architect for the devel opment was the award-win ning William Rawn Associates.

The total development cost was approximately $\$ 8$ million with the Commonwealth of Mass. supplying an allocation of Low Income Housing Tax Credits and the city of Boston providing CBDG financing linkage and below-market acquisition to make the development possible. The general contractor was Beacon Construction and the renovation had a December 1994 completion date.

## Youville Hospital \& Rehabilitation Center's Centennial

On Feb. 14, 1895, three Sisters of Charity of Montreal "Grey Nuns" opened the doors of a partially completed, mostly unfumished, 24 -bed cottage in Cambridge to anyone needing care. In 1995, Youville Hospital \& Rehabilitation Center, a pioneer in elder care and rehabilitation medicine, celebrates 100 years of community service.

Since its modest beginning, the hospital's primary technological tools have been faith and caring. "God has a way of comforting those who depend on Him no matter what happens," said Grey Nuns founder St. Marguerite d'Youville more than two centuries ago.

When the Cambridge cottage's beds quickly filled, Sister Mary Ann Fernand gave hers to a penniless man with tuberculosis. In 1921, as an influenza epidemic gripped Boston, the Grey Nuns at Youville, though overburdened with patients of their own, went into homes where the sick had no help. Provincial Superior Mother Piche eventually fell ill herself.

Driven by such dedication to meet the needs of people in its community, Youville grew in size and distinction.

By the beginning of World War II, the hospital had 260 beds. By its end, Youville was among leading Mass. hospitals introducing the concept of rehabilitation medicine. In
the 50 s and 60 s , the hospital grew to prominence in the field. By 1970, Youville's rehabilitation program was one of the largest in New England. In 1972, Youville became the first institution in Mass. to be accredited fully by the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities.

During the 80s, Youville completed two new wings. In 1992, the hospital named Melvyn Hecht M.D., one of the country's first board-certified physicians in geriatrics, as its medical director, chief medical officer and head of its new outpatient Geriatric Center. That year, the hospital also initiated programs focused on evaluation of orthopedic and neurological problems and acute disease in the disabled.
Last year, Youville became the first medical facility in Mass. to begin using Easy Street Environments(®) an innovative rehabilitation therapy that presents patients with duplicate settings and situations of everyday life.

During the next decade, Youville will respond even more vigorously to the needs of the elderly, the fastest growing, often underserved segment of the population. The first baby boomer turns 60 in 2006, and by 2010, 13 percent of the population will be over 65 , with nearly 12 million Americans over 80 . To complement its Geriatric Center and rehabilitation

programs, Youville opened an 80 -bed nursing home on its campus in 1994.

Another pressing need is affordable health care. Youville already is a cost effective facility because rehabilitation of the physically impaired relies more on technique and a caring hand than expensive hightech machines and procedures. Its nursing home is an even more cost effective health care setting, and in 1996, continuing its response to changing population demographics and the changing health care scene, Youville will complete an assisted living facility. The goal, as with all the hospital's programs, is to help people achieve active, independent lives,

Today, Youville stands as the house faith and caring built. These virtues
support the bricks and mortar and underlie its elder care and rehabilitation programs. They are the hospital's reason for being. From the patient's point of view, they offer a solicitous presence, a whispered word of encouragement, a guide through modern health care's circuity, and help for a family coping with a loved one's illness. In short, Youville continues to fulfill the mission its founder espoused.
Her fondest desire was to make known God's compassionate love by helping the underserved. She also exhorted her sisters to be aware of the needs of those around them and creative in responding to those needs. Youville Hospital \& Rehabilitation Center testifies to the fulfillment of that desire and charge.
