## Bunker Hill Day Parade To Welcome Home Persian Gulf Veterans

The highlight of the celebration of the 216th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday afternoon, June 16 through the streets of Charlestown.
This year the celebration is dedicated to the troops who served in the Persian Gulf in Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm and in particular the 31 servicemen and one service woman who call Charles town home. At press time, 13 of the 32 are home or are slated to be home for the celebration.
This parade is sponsored by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, under the auspices of the city of Boston. A Welcome Home Committee has been working hand-in-hand with

Giving the command "Forward March," starting the parade up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m., will be Chief Marshal Patricia Quinn Farris, Past Commander of Bunker Hill Post 26, The American Legion.
Farris is a lifelong resident of Charlestown. She was born on Putnam Street and attended St. Mary's, Clarence R. Edwards and Charlestown High schools. She joined the U.S. Navy and served with the WAVES during World War II
The Chief Marshal is presently serving as the Graves Registration Officer of Bunker Hill Post. She is also a member of the Honor

As part of the festivities, the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, in cooperation with the Boston National Historical Park and the USS Constitution, will sponsor a laser show, open to the public, on Pier One next to Constitution in the Charlestown Navy


Yard.

USS Kittiwake Visits Charlestown For Bunker Hill Day

The submarine rescue ship USS Kittiwake (ASR 13) will visit Charlestown June 15 through 17. Members of the crew are scheduled to participate in this year's Bunker Hill Day celebration. The ship will be berthed adjacent to the USS Constitution at the Boston National Historical Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Kittiwake will be open for public visiting from $10 \mathrm{a} \cdot \mathrm{m}$. to $4 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on June 15 and 16.
The 253 -foot long Kittiwake, commissioned in 1945, is the U.S. Navy's largest platform for heliumoxygen deep sea diving. The Chanticleer class ship carries a crew of 115 ; seven officers and 108 enlisted persons. Cmdr. James S. Trotter is the commanding officer of Kittiwake which is homeported in Norfolk, Va .
Chanticleer class ships perform submarine rescue operations using the McCann rescue chamber and support deep sea diving operations down to 300 feet They are equipped with powerful pumps, heavy air compressors, and under-

water communications equipment. Some former U.S. Navy submarine rescue ships serve in the navies of Brazil and Turkey.

USS Constitution is open for public visiting every day from 9:30 a.m. to 3:50 p.m. There is no charge for admission.

- CANA Project - Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project coordinator Ed Barr announced at a June 10 meeting that the next phase of the project, connecting the Tobin Bridge into the construction of the tunnel system, will begin on Monday, June 24. "At that time," he stated, "Lowney Way will revert back to a single lane of traffic heading toward Hayes Square (north). Buses will be rerouted around the construction site," Barr said, "with complete bus schedules to be announced next week."
Barr also stated that the installation of a sound barrier on the east side of New Rutherford Avenue was presented to residents in that area to diminish the noise created by traffic at that section of the project. He said that residents living in that neighborhood will consider the issue and inform him of their views on such a barrier at a later date.

It was also announced that Sciaba Construction Co., contractor for the Tobin Bridge connection project, has leased the Boston Housing Authority lot in Hayes Square to set up a trailer for use as a loading site. Barr stated that Sciaba has installed a chain link fence around the lot to secure the area.

- Polk Street - An early Monday morning fire at 25 Polk St. caused an estimated $\$ 30,000$ in damage to a first floor apartment in the Boston Housing Authority's Bunker Hill Housing Development. According to Boston Fire Department public relations spokesman, Lt. Richard Powers, a resident of the unit, Mary Lou Tracey, was rescued through a first floor window by police officers who first noticed the blaze. She was taken to Massachusetts General Hospital where she was treated for smoke inhalation.
He reported that the fire started in a rear bedroom but the cause of the 4:04 a.m. blaze has not been determined. The Arson Squad has the incident under investigation, Powers stated.
- Medford Street Shootout - Residents living near the former Revere Sugar Refinery on Medford Street complained of hearing loud blasting sounds eminating from the site this past week. Dozens of calls were received at the Patriot office and by Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, inquiring as to the origin of the strange sounds, believed to be demolition operations at the Massport-owned property.

According to Massport Senior Public Affairs Manager Lana Razdan, the sounds coming from the refinery were that of mock explosives, "not the real thing," she said. Razdan explained that prior to the Persian Gulf war, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) requested the use of the site for a training program. "Permission was granted," she stated, "and FBI agents and members of the Massachusetts State Police started training for hostage situations. According to Razdan, with the outbreak of the war the FBI agents were assigned elsewhere to cover potential trouble spots. "Now that the war is over, the training course has resumed," she stated.
Razdan said that Massport was not made aware of the details of the training program and the use of explosive-type sounding devices. She apologized on behalf of Massport for any inconvenience to residents and stated that these practices "would be stopped immediately."

Razdan added that Massport fully supports the FBI's training program as a beneficial need in today's society, but regrets the neighborhood disturbance at the Medford Street site.

## The Polish American String Band To Appear In Concert At Bunker Hill Monument On Saturday, June 15

A foot-tapping, handclapping good time is in store for residents on Saturday, June 15 at 4:30 p.m. (please note time), as the Polish American String Band from Philadelphia presents a concert on Monument Square in front of the Bunker Hill Museum.

This concert, sponsored by the Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee is part of the celebration marking the 216th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill and welcoming home our troops from the Persian Gulf. It will feature the colorful costumes and awardwinning music of the famous Polish American String Band - the band that has won first place more times than any of the other 25 bands that have competed in Philadelphia's New Year's Philadelphia's New Year's
Day Parade over the past 50 years.
A mummer is defined as "one who goes merrymaking in disguise during festivals." Mummery can be traced back to medieval Europe when men and women would lead festal rites during the Christmas holiday season. History records that when the pioneer Swedes came to this country, they settled in an area known as Tinicum, bringing with them many customs of the
old country. Important among them was the ageold habit of visiting friends the day after Christmas through the first day of the new year. They would travel in bands of men through South Philadelphia engaging in a series of festivities. This informal celebration continued until Jan. 1, 1901 when the first organized parade was established, and hence, tradition was set.
The band, whose theme this year is "Well Done," will be cookin' up a storm in a spectacular high energy, power-packed routine that will satisfy your musical appetite, courtesy of the "Great Chefs of P.A.
Members of the band will be attired in various colorful outfits, some as chefs and others as salads. The chef suit is made in bengaline fabric with gold and silver cleo sequins, trimmed with gold glaze and rainbow colors. The salad suit is made with forest green velvet, nylon and acetate, decorated with multicolored sequin appliques, acetate plumes and a traditional mummers cape.

Since its founding, the Polish American String Band has been thrilling audiences of all ages with consistently fine music, beautiful costumes and outstanding presentations. Organized in 1933, the band became an immediate favorite throughout the Philadelphia area.
Rivalry among the string bands is strong. Each band must develop a theme and evolve it throughout the year. Costumes, music and drilling supplement the

theme. Bands spend many thousands of dollars on costumes, and each new year every unit must present completely new costumes and presentation to be eligible for competitive prizes in the New Year's Day Parade. Performing throughout the United States has spread the name of the Polish American String Band and inroduced Mummery to the country. Perhaps the most thrilling performance for the band came in 1979 when they performed for His Holiness, Pope John Paul II. The band has also made several appearances on national television. In July


1990, the band visited Poland on a two-week concert tour that endeared them to many.

Although the membership is no longer exclusively Polish, the band still promotes the slavic heritage of its founders. Band members include policemen, firemen, college/high school students, accountants, ban kers, laborers and bus drivers, to name a few, who share a love of music and performing that keeps them busy with parades, concerts and holiday celebrations, adding their special touch to the Philadelphia Mummers

## tradition.

The appearance by the Polish American Band in concert with its polka medleys and famous strut will certainly be a lively and colorful event welcoming home the troops from the Persian Gulf.

In addition to Saturday afternoon's concert, the Polish American String Band will strut through the streets of Charlestown during the Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday, June 16.

tions will assemble outside the church and form a procession. The participants will march to the Bunker Hill Monument Grounds to the music of the Colonial Band of Lawrence for the Patriotic Exercises, commencing at 11 a.m.
The Monument Orator on this, the 216th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill, will be Major Joseph T. Gallagher, USMC, a Charlestown native who recently returned from the Persian Gulf having served in Operations Desert Shield and Storm.
Gallagher, 39, was born on Tufts Street in Charlestown. He attended the William Prescott Elementary School and graduated from Boston English High School. He was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps in 1976 following his graduation from Springfield College where he had earned AllAmerican honors in springboard diving. He was awarded a bachelor of science degree in physical education.
Upon completing basic school at Quantico, Va. in March 1977, he was designated a Motor Transport Officer and joined the 2nd


Marine Division at Camp Lejeune, N.C. where he served successive duties leading up to Executive Officer of Truck Company, Headquarters Battalion. He was promoted to first lieutenant in July 1978 and deployed to the Mediterranean Sea. In January 1981 he reported to Okinawa, Japan for duty as a section leader and subsequently as operations officer. He was protions officer. He was pro-

Returning to the United States in January 1982, he was assigned as Operations Officer, Wing Transportation Squadron-27 at Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Corps Air Station, Cherry

of the 1st Marine Expeditionary Brigade.
Major Gallagher is married to the former Patricia Jones of Oxford, N.C. and they have two sons, Eric and Brian. He is the son of Theresa Gallagher, and has two brothers, Robert and James J., who is a senior chief in the U.S. Navy, and one sister Dorothy Pacheco. At the conclusion of the formal ceremonies, a wreath will be placed at the base of the statue of Col . William Prescott on the Monument Grounds.

Bunker Hill Day Parade To Be Presented On Cable Television

Carol Zanstuck's High Street neighbors know her as a teacher in the Chelsea school system. Around the studios at Boston Neighborhood Network TV, Carol is known as an assistant coordinator of BNN-TV's Jamaica Plain Center, a capable access producer and an instructor in portable camera workshops for aspiring access producers.
On Sunday, June 16 Zanstuck takes on the role of cable access producer of Charlestown's Bunker Hill Day Parade, a monumental task for a volunteer. The parade will be cablecast on Channels 3 and 8 on Sunday, June 16 from 8 to 10 p.m. and will give Townies and all cable TV viewers in 100,000 homes in the city of Boston an opportunity to once again view the gala parade to welcome home Charlestown men and women who served in Operations Desert Shield and Storm.

This is just one of the neighborhood parades and festivals produced annually on BNN-TV and Zanstuck is but one of dozens of access producers who undertake these events throughout the city. Zanstuck has had experience in cablecasting major events. Among her credits are Boston's First Night, the largest event in the city on New Year's Eve,

and Bound for Glory, the Woody Guthrie tribute. She's also been involved in Ireland on the Move. The Charlestown Rose Contest, Charlestown Rose Contest,
Wednesday Evenings on the Wednesday Evenings on the
Plaza, and many other local events. But the Bunker Hill Day parade will be a challenge for her.
At 9 a.m. on the day of the parade, Zanstuck will guide the mobile BNN-TV van into place on Winthrop van into place on Winthrop
Street at the Training Field. She and her crew will then work non-stop for the next six hours or so. This traveling studio on wheels con-
tains all the equipment necessary to produce an event as involved as the Bunker Hill Day Parade. The van holds four cameras, an audio board, technical equipment and the crew of 10 assistants. When the van arrives, Zanstuck's long day has just begun.
Weeks of exhaustive preparation have already been in the works. Background information on the parade participants and interesting historical facts on Charleslown have been researched by the hosts for the cablecast, Bruce and Norita Lee.

These Mystic Street residents have been bringing coverage of the parade to the cable audiences for the past eight years. Bruce Lee has been anchoring newscasts on WEEI radio for more than 20 years. Norita, a communications consultant, is a native of Charlestown. She and her two sisters grew up on Parker Street. Norita is also a Neighborhood Correspondent on BNN-TV's Boston Neighborhood Network News, covering the news, the people, the politics and issues that impact Charlestown. Bruce is a news anchor and interviewer on WEEI radio.
The Lees will be on hand to bring the color and commentary on the parade to the audience and to interview people familiar to all residents. Guests have been booked, briefed and background on the parade entrants has been gathered and documented. They'll be interviewing special guests that day, but none more special than the honorary chief marshals, the men and women from Charlestown who served in Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm.
Zanstuck will be assisted on the shoot by Tom Clifford, no stranger to Charlestown. Clifford produces the weekly Ireland on the

Move program and has taped many Charlestown events for viewing on Channels 3 and 8. Also joining the crew is Herb Price, the BNN-TV program scheduter. Both Clifford and Price are veterans of the Bunker Hill Day Parade, having worked on the cablecasts since 1984. With their help and with other crew members, Zanstuck goes to work to make it all happen.
After hours of preparation, Zanstuck will take a deep breath, turn to her assistants, smile and let them know the parade is ap-
proaching the site and their work has just begun. And when the parade begins to unfold on TV screens around the city, no one will know of the frantic preparations that took place Everyone involved in the cablecast will be calm and ready to bring the best of the parade to the audiences. One of the scenes audiences will see is the giant yellow ribbon around the Bunker Hill Monument, a symbol of the love and pride all of Charlestown feels for those returning from the Gulf.

One hundred and eightyeight days after leaving its home port of Yokosuka, USS Bunker Hill (CG 52) returned to Japan from Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm on April 8 Bunker Hill is a TicondeBunker Hill is a Ticonde-roga-class Guided Missile
Cruiser, and the first U.S. Cruiser, and the first U.S.
Navy ship to be equipped Navy ship to be equipped with the revolutionary Vertical Launch System (VLS). Bunker Hill was commissioned Sept. 20, 1986 in Charlestown, within sight of the monument that commemorates her namesake battle. It was a battle that sparked a revolutionary spirit in the American rebels and brought our fight for independence to the world's attention.
The first Bunker Hill (CV 17), an Essex-class aircraft carrier, was built in Quincy and earned 11 Battle Stars for World War II service in the Pacific. The carrier earned the nickname "Holiday Express" because it conducted its major strikes against the enemy on holidays. In doing so, the ship also earned one of the most impressive battle records of World War II. The cruiser USS Bunker Hill served as the anti-air warfare command ship in the Persian Gulf, carrying on the proud legacy of the
patriots who fought at Charlestown on June 17, 1775. As the 18th century historic battle was about to begin, the American leader ordered his bold strategy, "Don't fire until you see the "Don't fire until you see the
whites of their eyes!" For whites of their eyes!" For
the ship that will carry the U.S. Navy into the 21 st century, the motto is bolder, but no less appropriate, "We fire long before seeing the whites of their eyes!" From early November through the first five weeks of combat operations, Bunker Hill was resp. ble for air defense over the Gulf, directing 23 ships and more than 200 fighter jets from six nations. Starting on D-Day, as upwards of 2,000 planes flew air strikes in Iraq on a daily basis, Bunker Hill was called upon to track them going in and coming back out.
Controlling such a vast amount of airspace was made possible by the AN/ SPY-IA phased array radar, which replaces a conventional rotating radar with four electronically scanning panels. This allows the ship to see in all directions simultaneously, while at the same time fire and track more missiles, with greater accuracy, than any other system afloat.

an historic role in the realm of strike warfare, participating in the first wartime multi-ship multiple cruise missile launch. With the pinpoint accuracy of Tomahawk cruise missiles, she conducted numerous strikes against enemy targets against enemy targets
ashore, following in the ashore, following in the
footsteps of her WWII predecessor.
"Bunker Hill will make
a great contribution whether she fires in anger or not, and for this we are truly grateful," said Walter Skallerup, general counsel of the Navy, at the ship's christening ceremony in 1985. Just five years later she was indeed called upon to fire
During the deployment, the ship and crew steamed nearly 22,000 miles, burn-
ed 3.7 million gallons of fuel, consumed almost 3 million meals, and tracked more than 100,000 aircraft. USS Bunker Hill is 567 feet long, displaces 9.600 tons, and carries a crew of nearly 400 officers and enlisted men. The ship is powered by four LM2500 gas turbine engines (marine versions of DC-10 jet engines), which can provide speeds in excess of 30 knots. In addition to the 122 missiles carried in VLS, Bunker Hill's firepower includes two five-inch guns, eight Harpoon anti-ship missiles, six torpedo tubes, and the two Phalanx CloseIn Weapon System (CIWS) anti-missile guns. The ship is commanded by Capt. Thomas F. Marfiak, a 1966 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy.
The greatest contribution to Bunker Hill's success came from the crew. Without the efforts of bright and motivated sailors, even the best technology on the sea is worthless. And like those Revolutionary War patriots who fought and fell on a hill overlooking Boston, the men of the USS Bunker Hill grew stronger in the face of adversity.
They hail from all parts of the United States, signing on to serve their coun-
try and see the world. Massachusetts is one of the states whose sons serve on the cruiser Bunker Hill. Lieutenant David Gwilliam and Petty Officer 3rd Class Matthew Cardoza are two of those who proudly serve. One is an officer, and one an enlisted man, but each plays a vital role in the Combat Systems Department of this complex vessel. Each is also - not surprisingly - a die-hard Red Sox fan.
Gwilliam is the Weapons Control Officer, responsible for the operation of Bunker Hill's vast array of weapon systems, which include mainframe computers, radars, guns, torpedo tubes, and missile launchers. Born in Hartford, Conn., he spent most of his youth in the Boston area.

Bunker Hill is now back in Yokosuka, Japan, after its exciting deployment. Gwilliam and Cardoza must now face a somewhat more peaceful, though no less vital, challenge. During a brief but extensive overhaul, Bunker Hill must be made ready for sea again. The ship is a formidable weapon, designed to go in harm's way, but it is the crew that truly brings Bunker Hill to life.
