Viking Ships Scheduled To Arrive At The Charlestown Navy Yard

In commemoration of the millennium of Leif Eiriksson's voyages to North America 1000 years ago, Terje Korsnes, honorary Consul of Norway in Boston, has announced that three replica Viking ships will sail into Boston Harbor on Wednesday, Sept. 11 at approximately 2:30 p.m.

The ships, Gaia, Oseberg and Saga Siglar, will dock adjacent to the USS Constitution on Pier 1 in the Charlestown Navy Yard and be available for viewing at 4 p.m. on Sept. 11. Charlestown Ambulance Funding Secured

Ambulance service will continue in Charlestown as Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Tom Birmingham have been successful in their efforts to secure funding for emergency response coverage locally. Charlestown's state legislators were able to get the ambulance and other public safety items included in a recently adopted package for the Commonwealth's transportation

"Naturally, both Sen. Birmingham and I are thrilled that this vital public safety measure will remain funded for Charlestown. Because it is as important to our community today as it was when it was first unveiled, I am pleased the necessary funds have been

secured to allow the ambulance to continue protecting the residents of Charlestown," said Voke.

Through the efforts of Voke, an ambulance was stationed first at the Community College parking lot and then permanently at its present Sullivan Square site. When it was unveiled before a host of community officials in September of 1988, Voke pledged to work with city and state officials to make sure the ambulance remained in place during the duration of the Central Artery/North Area roadway reconstruction project. Since that time, he has fulfilled his pledge by continuing to secure funding for its operation.

"By having an ambulance

stationed in Charlestown, the extra minutes saved in response time can truly mean the difference between life and death. Because of this, I am happy to have been able to join forces with Voke on such a noble cause, and will continue to work with him to ensure that public safety remains a top priority throughout the CANA project," stated Birmingham.

Both Voke and Birmingham noted that other mitigation efforts would also receive state support. Those efforts include funding for an intra-Navy Yard bus, the Charlestown Water Shuttle, police details and extra commuter and rapid transit

The Charlestown Boys & Girls Club summer camp program concluded recently, and by all reports was a tremendous success.





Boston Teachers Showcase Math

by Ann Grady

Teachers on a hot summer's day sharing new and exciting strategies for teaching math?? Could this be the sight at the Hennigan School in July? More than 125 Boston elementary and middle school teachers were joined by principals, Boston parochial school teachers and other guests as they estimated the number of raisins in a box, used geometry to make quilt

squares and discovered all the math hidden in a daily newspaper.

Twenty-five teachers involved in the Elementary and Middle School Math and Technology Project (EM-MAT), funded by the National Science Foundation to improve mathematics instruction in the Boston Public Schools, conducted a full day of workshops for their colleagues. Teachers from 62 different

Boston schools volunteered their time to attend the EM-MAT Showcase. They attended workshops where they used computers and physics principles to operate the Lego toys which they constructed, collected and analyzed data about zoo animals and discovered the mathematics of dinosaurs. Participants reported a new enthusiasm for math themselves and an eagerness to share their ideas with their students in the fall.

Many Charlestown, East Boston and North End teachers and schools were represented at the Showcase. Donna Rosenberg from the Kennedy School, Maria D'Itria from the Harvard-Kent School and Diane Gould from the Eliot School presented workshops. In addition teachers from the Edwards, Adams, Bradley and Otis schools attended.

In several workshops which focused on Family Math, teachers brainstormed interesting techniques for introducing parents to mathematics instruction designed to prepare their children for the technological challenges of the 21st century. Many Boston schools plan to offer Family Math nights for parents this fall to show families some of the new emphases in math and to give parents ideas for helping their children at home. 

Costello Runs For City Council At Large

Financial Help Available To Low-Income Medicare Recipients

Through no fault of their own, thousands of Massachusetts low-income elderly have not yet availed themselves of up to \$30 a month in state assistance in paying their Medicare costs under a program known as the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary program.

Enacted by Congress, the program authorizes state departments of public welfare to share the cost of certain Medicare expenses with the beneficiaries.

To be eligible for the program, an applicant must be eligible for Medicare Part A benefits, either as a person 65 or over or as someone receiving Social Security Disability benefits for the past two years. Applicants must also:

- · have assets no greater than \$4,000 as an individual or \$6,000 if a couple;
- · have income no greater than 100 percent of poverty guidelines (\$6,620 for in-

dividual, \$8,880 for family of two):

· meet basic Medicaid eligibility requirements and complete a Medicaid application.

The program covers all services covered by Medicare. It will pay the portion of the Medicare payment which is not covered by Medicare, such as the hospital deductible and copayment amounts, and the outpatient deductible and copayment amounts.

If Medicare covers services not covered by Medicaid, such as chiropractic or certain kinds of podiatric care, the QMB Program will cover any deductible and copayment amounts.

Elders may apply for the benefit at their local Department of Public Welfare office. Charlestown elders should call the East Boston Welfare Office at 567-6140 and ask for Robert Santa Maria.



The ships' arrival will be met by a flotilla led by the Spirit of Massachusetts and escorted by the U.S. Coast Guard.

The Gaia, the largest of

the ships, is 77 feet from stem to stern with a mast of 46 feet and a beam of 18 feet. It is an exact replica of the largest Viking ship found in Norway which was built in 850 AD for ocean voyages. She left Bergen, Norway, on May 17 stop-

ping in the Orkneys, Shetlands, Foroes and proceeded to Iceland, Greenland, Labrador, Newfoundland and Nova Scotia.

Oseberg is based on a royal yacht of the same name built in 800 AD, and Saga Siglar is a replica of a trading vessel known as a

"knarr."
