



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

The area where meters will be placed are: First Avenue, between Sixth and 13th Streets on the left hand side, and between Dry Dock Two and Eighth Street on the right hand side; Sixth Street; Seventh Avenue; and Eighth Street, between First and Third Avenues. Arthur Reilly of the BRA stated that meters have been requested by the businesses located in that area to allow them access to parking spaces for their customers.

Jones also presented a proposed Residential Permit Parking Program for the residents to consider. At the present time, there are approximately 600 residents in the Navy Yard with only 100 parking spaces available to them. The areas that would be open to permit parking are on the right hand side of First Avenue, between Eighth and 13th Streets and on Eighth Street. Permit parking would be allowed at the meters after 6:00 p.m. and up until 8:00 a.m. Jones stated that in order for a Residential Permit Parking Program to come into the Yard, 51 percent of the residents must sign a petition requesting it. After the petitions are returned to the Transportation Depart-

USS Constitution Will Fire Salute To Memorial Day

The USS Constitution, the United States Navy's oldest commissioned ship, will fire a 21-gun-salute to Memorial Day in honor of all veterans of the American Armed Forces who have died serving their country in time of war.

The first gun will fire at noon on May 25 and will be followed with additional shots at one minute intervals.

The 21-gun-salute is a time honored ceremony that is performed by designated saluting batteries on Memorial Day or Independence Day or to honor the President of the United States or the heads of foreign states.

The USS Constitution is located at Pier One in the


ment, the process would take six to eight weeks before it would become effective.

Residents strongly voiced their concerns that metered parking would eventually be extended to other areas thus eliminating even more available parking spaces for them. Arthur Reilly assured them that this would not happen but restated the need for meters in the business area. Jones stated that "meters would not be placed around residential buildings, only in the commercial area.'

One resident stated, "100 percent of the residents are against meters placed anywhere" in the Navy Yard.

Many voices were raised at the same time making it impossible for Jones and Reilly to answer questions from the floor. When it quieted down, angry residents demanded that the BRA first address the problem of parking in the Navy Yard before any future development takes place. One man stated that the BRA is "making more and more dwellings with less and less parking" available for future tenants. Jones stated that "Residential Permit Parking will alleviate out of state cars and double and sometimes




available to meet their needs. Reilly stated that this garage is privately owned but agreed that it would be beneficial to both the owner and the residents if it was open 24 hours a day.

By the end of the meeting, all in attendance agreed to the petition process for Residential Permit Parking, Jones stated that this program "can help but can't be a cure-all," and "this plan would remain in effect until a better plan comes along.



BRA Supports Retention Of "Neck-Downs" On Main Street

Dear Mr. Tierney:

We have received numerous requests from the Charlestown Merchants Association and the community to reconsider the Main Street reconstruction project in Charlestown. The project, federal aid No. IX-95-1-(009), to reconstruct Main Street from Sullivan Square to City Square is currently underway by John Mahoney Construction Company, Inc.

The small stretch from Wood to Sullivan Streets was reconstructed with "neck-downs" on the north side nearly 12 years ago. As currently planned, the project would eliminate the "neck-downs" and narrow the street width by relocating the curb line approximately six feet. We have examined this change and believe it would be beneficial to the project to leave these improvements in place. The Charlestown Neighborhood Council has also reviewed this proposed change in the plan and has informed the BRA that they also support the request by the Merchants Association. Therefore, we request the Department of Public Works issue a change order to the project calling for the retention of the existing curb in these five short blocks and repave the street to the existing curb line. This change should result in a credit for the project.

If additional reveiws are required with other agencies to implement this change, please contact Paul Reavis, Assistant Director for Engineering and Design Services.







Community Updated On Central Artery North Area Project

Residents were provided an update on the Central Artery North Area roadway reconstruction project by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (MDPW). The Tuesday night meeting was the first since the initial phase of the project got underway on May 7 with the closing of the Charlestown exit from the Central Artery and the northbound ramp connecting Route I-93 with the Tobin Bridge.

Glen Sadulsky, Project Manager from Howard Needles, Tammen and Bergendoff, provided an overview of the project which will reconnect the Tobin Bridge to I-93 through a series of tunnels beneath City Square and viaduct connectors. The project will reconfigure the Route I and I-93 interchange, addressing public safety concerns and eliminating the reverse curve in that area.

Sadulsky stated that this project involves seven separate contracts. He said that the pre-load contract was almost completed and the contract for the temporary detour structure was now underway, with a completion date of some 18 months. He said that he sees the tunnel construction starting early next year and taking four years to complete.

While the tunnels are under construction, the viaduct construction will be-

gin, stated Sadulsky. He also noted that the utility companies — gas, electric and telephone, are doing their own construction in the area, outside the purview of the MDPW.

Sadulsky also announced that the bids for the contract to demolish the Armed Services YMCA building in City Square were opened on Tuesday and the agency hopes to award that contract in three to four weeks.

He noted that MDPW would be opening a site office next to Bunker Hill Community College very shortly. David Flanagan, Community Liaison for MDPW stated that it will be easier for the staff to address complaints and concerns when they are operating from the immediate area of the construction project.

One of the conditions in the awarding of funds for the project by the Federal Highway Administration is that the design plans include parking for 16 buses to be utilized by the National Park Service (NPS) for visitors to the Historical Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard. According to John Debo of the NPS, this

provision was included to compensate the NPS for land areas taken for previous road work.

Gus Driessen of the Berger Lochner Consulting and Engineering Team, presented five schemes to the gathering utilizing the land designated as Parcel 1, which is bounded by Chelsea and the new Warren Street extension and Constitution Road.

The variations in the five schemes located the parking facility from the northwesterly side to the center to the City Square side of the parcel. Drawbacks to several of the proposed plans included one entrance/exit on Constitution Road, making the turn around of a bus difficult and in some instances impossible. Thus buses may be forced to back out of the parking area.

Driessen said there is no one plan, in fact, aspects of all five designs could be combined and then one selected that would meet with the approval of the residents.

Asked as to what purpose the parcel would serve after the completion of the road work, Sadulsky stated that

this was always slated to be a development parcel. He said that the MDPW will leave the area as park space until a developer is awarded the parcel. He did note that the parking facility would have to be incorporated with the development at that future date.

One resident asked whether the inclusion of the parking facility on this site (which will also contain a tunnel ventilation building) would decrease the value of the parcel to a developer. She also expressed concern that with the parking facility there, it might be extended, making the whole area black topped. Sadulsky said that the MDPW will be talking with the city and the community as to how the parcels will be developed. Dan Jaffee noted that at

previous meetings, discussion centered around the parking area being located on the northern side of the parcel, nearest to the NPS property, thus leaving the

area toward City Square open for development.

Annette Tecce asked if the MDPW had taken into consideration the retention of the two historic streets (Gray and Joiner) that presently cross that parcel. She felt that the current streetscape should be maintained, even as walkways.

Dan Jaffee suggested that the streets as they now stand, divide the parcel into thirds and that the area between Gray Street and the NPS be designated for parking. He also suggested another access be created opposite the bus turn around for the National Park. Jaffee also noted that previous discussions had included talk of a single level garage on that site with building on top. He stated that "if you are talking about a five story garage, you are wrong.

Ken Stone suggested the the MDPW, NPS and the North Area Task Force sit down to discuss the parking site. Frank Sholock, Deputy Director of MDPW's I-90/I-93 project agreed to work in such a forum to seek alternatives. He said that a developer for that parcel might find other parking for the buses and develop the whole parcel. He also said that underground parking was a possibility and that, in fact, there were many options and it is "still wide open."

Marilyn Darling asked what the deadline was on this decision, to which Sholock responded that the final tunnel designs, which would include this parking provision, were due by October 1st.

NPS's John Debo stated that they were sensitive to design issues and would like to collaborate on a design that all could live with in the future. He said that it makes sense to keep the parking nearest the NPS and that they want to pursue the design issue to get (continued on page 8)



an optimal design configuration for the 72 automobiles or 16 buses. He did note that this location is desirable only if there are no options.

Debo stated that it is conceivable that Building 199 or structures yet unbuilt in the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) portion of the Navy Yard might accommodate the NPS visitors, with assistance from the MDPW on shuttle service. He said the NPS will continue to work on this possibility. He noted if the BRA option doesn't work out, "its back to Parcel I."

Asked about parking under the Tobin Bridge on Massport property, Debo stated that NPS has pursued this for six years and the NPS felt that they couldn't meet the Massport conditions concerning liability, access for maintenance of the overhead structure, and safety. He said that the NPS has "stepped back" from this site and doesn't consider it a viable alternative.

Glen Sadulsky stated that a Memorandum of Understanding is being drafted by the MDPW and that it will be available for review by the city and the community, which will be represented by members of the North Area Task Force. Sholock stated that when the representatives from the city and the community are identified, the group will start with the draft document and have a series of meetings to "hammer out the details."

Bill Lamb announced that the next working meeting of the North Area Task Force will be held on Thursday, May 28th at 7:30 p.m. Ken Stone added that they have been meeting in private homes for lack of meeting space. He said that they hope to secure meeting space shortly so their meetings could be open to everyone. It was suggested that persons interested in the Task Force meeting, contact Elaine McCarthy at 242-3618. ****


The report noted that eight of the calls were in high traffic times and that the response time was maintained. The average response was reported to be 5.5 minutes.

Controversy Arises Following Neighborhood Council - BRA Meeting

The question as to whether all meetings of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council should be open to the public arose following the Monday night meeting of the Council's Development/Housing Committee with the staff of the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) in the site office in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Council President John Tobin said that he has gotten the sense from a few people on the Council and from people in the community that they think everything in the Navy Yard is a "done deal" and the Charlestown Neighborhood Council is making decisions without telling the community and "we're doing something very secretive."

"That's not the case," stated Tobin, "and I want to make that very clear."

Tobin explained that the Council is at the very beginning of a process that will take several months. He said, "All we are doing is trying to get organized and formulate some kind of a process on how we are going to work."

He went on to say that Monday night's Development and Housing Committee meeting, under the chairmanship of Tom Cunha, was the first in what will be a series of committee meetings on the Navy Yard. Tobin said that during the next two weeks, the Public Safety Committee, chaired by Dennis Mc-Laughlin, and the Human/ Basic Services Committee, chaired by Moe Gillen, will meet. The three committees will then continue to meet every three weeks.

Tobin stated that these preliminary committee meetings will provide an opportunity for Council members to talk to the BRA staff, figure out what some of the issues are, and decide on what committee they wish to serve. He said that he didn't feel that the deci-

sion by Council members as to what committee they would like to serve on, how often they would meet, and finding out who the BRA staff members they would be dealing with, was part of the public process. He also stated that he wouldn't expect each Council member to serve on all three committees and it was up to the individual to decide in what area they could best serve.

Tobin said that these preliminary committee meetings are "working meetings," allowing Council members to ask questions, get a grasp on what the BRA wants the Council to do and how they see the Council having input into the decision-making process. He said that he foresees the second round of meetings "involving the public and the press so that, at that point, people will know what is going on."

Tobin stressed that "we (the Council) are not making decisions, not taking votes."

In discussions with BRA Director Stephen Coyle, Tobin stated that he felt Coyle wanted the Council and the community involved in the planning.

Jim English of the BRA, told the Council at Monday night's meeting that the BRA would like to complete the Navy Yard master plan by September or October. Tobin said each committee would be meeting, asking a lot of questions, getting answers from the BRA, coming up with some proposals and, once they do that, urging the BRA to incorporate the proposals in-

to the master plan. He said, "I don't know if that's optimistic, but I think it can be done."

Tobin continued, "My sense is that some people would like to have every single meeting with 500 people saying density, traffic and parking are problems. That isn't achieving results. We know these are problems - that's a given. We have to talk about solutions in terms of where people ask intelligent questions, get intelligent answers, think about it and run it by the community." He added that he hopes that each committee will be consistent to some degree "so the public can rely on what we are doing."

According to Tobin, it is up to the individual committee as to when they will open their meetings to the public. He said they wanted to get the new members of the Council involved in the committees, noting that the members want to also handle issues other than the Navy Yard.

As to the Navy Yard plan. Tobin stated that he did not believe that the master plan was "concrete." He said that "it was clear at the meeting that their numbers are totally in flux and if they go out to the community at the beginning of the process with all these numbers. I think it is just going to cause more confusion and inflame people." He continued, "I am taking the BRA at face value and I think the community can make some decisions. You (the BRA) tell us the design concept with numbers and

expertise and we'll tell you what you what we think is appropriate. I don't think we should take their numbers at face value. We should make the BRA come back with the changes and if not, they should justify why the changes can't be made."

Asked about the acceptance of community input by the BRA, Tobin said, "If we get to the end and have worked for four or five months and they say 'we're not going to accept anything you say,' then that is a reflection on them — all we will have done is tried." But Tobin feels that the BRA will accept the community input. He pointed to the C-2 Parcel (at Main and Baldwin Streets and Rutherford Avenue) as a "community victory," and said that he feels Coyle and the Mayor "want to give this community more victories" and "I am convinced they want involvement more than show and if I'm proven wrong, I'm proven wrong." Asked about the involve-

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

Powers Seeks Legislation For Department Of Safety And Traffic

Charlestown Attorney Michael Powers is seeking to file legislation that would create a State Department of Safety and Traffic which would be under the charge of an officer known as the Traffic Commissioner.

According to Powers. this bill, presently at Senate Counsel for drafting, will be filed as emergency legislation by Senator Fran Doris, later this week.

Powers, was the attorney in a class action suit filed last month against the Massachusetts Department of Public Works on behalf of ten local residents seeking to halt the start of the Central Artery North Area road reconstruction project until an emergency access plan was devised.

He stated this week that the purpose of this legislation is to put into effect a position that can ensure public safety for the residents during the Central Artery North Area and the Third Harbor Tunnel/Central Artery projects.

Under the terms of the bill, the position of Traffic Commissioner would be appointed by the governor. commencing on September 1, 1987 and expiring on August 31, 1995.

The Traffic Commissioner would have the responsibility to develop planning for the safety of the public during these two major roadway construction projects and would create an Emergency Deployment and Traffic plan for that period of time that would include one central radio network to coordinate the plan.

Powers stated that the Traffic Commissioner would supersede any public safety authorities located within the area of the projects including, but not limited to, police, fire and ambulatory agencies. Such departments within the communities of Boston, Cambridge, Everett, Chelsea, Medford, Somerville and Malden, as well as the State

and Metropolitan District police are cited by Powers as being included in this legislation.

Powers has stated that the Commonwealth does not have an adequate plan for the deployment of emergency services. He said that the legislation is needed to create a central public safety entity that will coordinate the deployment plan throughout the areas that will be affected. Under the present system, stated Powers, there is no central authority who can cut across jurisdictional and turf lines and there is no communication network that centrally coordinates a traffic or emergency deployment plan.

He further stated that the traffic positions are presently filled on a detail assignment basis and he defines a detail as "a voluntary overtime assignment" which poses problems in maintaining the level of police presence at these traffic positions.

Powers stated that by mandating fixed positions through the legislative budget process, there would be a guarantee that these positions would be filled on a daily basis and would also

be cost effective. He stated that the approximate cost to a municipality for a full time police officer is his or her base salary plus 33 percent for benefits, while the present cost to fill the detail assignment is almost double the officer's base salarv.

He stated that a precedent was established for such a hiring practice during the Southwest Corridor Proiect.


Powers stated that with the enactment of this legislation, "everyone will be a winner." He continued, noting that access would be maintained to carry on business and commerce, taxpayers would benefit from the reduction in police costs, and in the event of a serious emergency, the citizenry would have a workable deployment plan that would guarantee access of emergency vehicles to and from the scene in a rapid manner.

Powers said that once this bill is filed, a committee hearing will be scheduled to receive testimony. He stated that he will continue to inform the community on the progress of this legislation.



Mitigation Plans Outlined For North Area Artery Construction

At a public meeting held May 12 at Charlestown High School, Boston Transportation Commissioner Richard Dimino. along with officials from the state Department of Public Works (DPW), announced an extensive emergency response plan for the Central Artery North Area construction period.

At the meeting, attended by approximately 60 Charlestown residents, concerns were voiced about the access of emergency vehicles during the construction period.

Commissioner Dimino said, "The City's primary concern is to address the access issues surrounding this project. We have been working closely with the state to develop day-to-day mitigation measures as well as a rapid emergency response plan to ensure that public safety is maintained and that traffic flows smoothly throughout Charlestown.

Details of the Emergency Access plan, which is currently in effect, include a total of 43 Boston and MetroPolice on hand daily from 6:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. to direct traffic and prevent gridlock. In addition. four Everett patrolmen are permanently assigned to posts along Broadway to ensure smooth flow of traffic into and out of Charlestown from the Route 1 detour route. Tow trucks, working under the direction of the Boston Police Department and the MDC, will be deployed at various locations through-

out the community. portant element of the Emergency Access Plan is the City's designation of the center lane of the North Washington Street Bridge and the off-peak lane of the Gilmore Bridge as Emergency Lanes available to police, fire and ambulance vehicles in case of an accident or fire. Police will be immediately available to clear these lanes in case of emergency. Additional public safety apparatus will be permanently located at sites within the community.

District City Councillor Robert E. Travaglini said, "I support the emergency response plan developed by the City's Transportation Department and the State DPW. In addition to increasing public safety, it sets a precedent for the direct involvement of the residents of the Charlestown community throughout the Central Artery North Area project.

Currently, the City is working with the consulting firm of Vanasse/Hangen on a transportation plan to develop a long-term parking strategy for Charlestown residents and a new

traffic circulation plan that will minimize the disruption caused by construction activities.

"In addition to these mitigation measures, the state has committed, at a cost of \$775,000, to the reconstruction of both the overpass and the underpass at Sullivan Square. This reconstruction project will greatly improve congestion in the area and will serve to minimize the number of cars seeking alternate routes through residential streets in Charlestown," said Commissioner Dimino.

Construction on this project is expected to begin sometime in June and continue for approximately four months, and is expected to be completed prior to the beginning of the second phase of the CANA Project. Upon completion, the underpass, which is presently closed to traffic, will alleviate a considerable amount of traffic now using local streets. The overpass will be open at all times during the construction period.
