Massport Tobin Bridge Paint Project Begins

The Massport Tobin Bridge Painting Project is scheduled to start on Monday, Sept. 16. The contractor, Erie Interstate, is in the process of setting up and testing outriggers, placing cables, positioning the containment enclosure in the work area and steam cleaning the steel surface. The area
of the bridge to be painted spans from Tremont Street (B11) to just past Walford Way (B25) on the upper deck, east side front the top of the lower level handrails up.

This project has been designed to be as environmentally sound as possible. Because Massport has specified that no sandblasting is allowed, the flaking lead paint will be removed with handheld power tools (continued on page 7)

## 'Life In The City' Lecture Series Begins September 22

Charlestown's "Life in the City" lecture series is returning on Sunday, Sept. 22. The opening lecture will be with Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Thomas Birmingham.
Rep. Richard Voke first entered the House of Representatives as Charlestown's voice in 1978. Throughout his career, he has served on committees for Criminal Justice, Health Care and Ways and Means, with his latest service to the commonwealth as House Majority Leader. Known to all of us as Richie for years, he has spearheaded work on children's issues, on services for the elderly and disabled, and on health insurance for the children of the unemployed and working poor. His "Healthy Start Program" has helped lower infant mortality rates by $36 \%$ while his drive for a minimum wage increase
recently resulted in successful legislative action. Charlestown will miss Richie when he retires. He has been a persistent and creditable voice for us and his attention has made it possible for us to achieve many successes.
Sen. Thomas Birming ham is President of the Mass. Senate and, as we all know, represents our very own district which includes parts of Middlesex and Essex counties. In his first term he was Senate Chair of the Joint Committee on Education where he sponsored legislation which integrated the five campuses of the University of Mass. In addition, he began the process of developing a program of comprehensive reform of primary and secondary education in the commonwealth. In his second term he became Chair of the Senate Ways and Means Committee where he provided leader-
ship for the passage of the Education Reform Act and saw to guaranteeing $\$ 800$ million for its implementation.

During his tenure at Ways and Means, he presided over the process which resulted in three consecutive balanced budgets. Those budgets have included close to $\$ 100$ million for MWRA rate payer relief, and directed additional support for public safety, human services and education reform.

Midway through his third term, he was elected President of the Massachusetts Senate where his priorities continue to be education, job maintenance and creation, and economic growth which will improve the lot of working and middle class residents of the commonwealth.
Birmingham, is a graduate of both Harvard University and Harvard Law School, a Rhodes Scholar,
and a former labor lawyer. He and his wife Selma are the parents of two daughters, Megan and Erica.

Once again, "Life in the City" will offer a light brunch from 12:30 to 1 p.m., with the lecture, questions and answers running from 1 to $2: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. All are invited to attend the lecture on Sunday, Sept. 22.

## Massport Tobin Bridge Paint Project Begins

(continued from page 1) with vacuum attachments. The attachments will vacuum up the paint chips as they are scraped from the steel. The work will be performed in a $100 \%$ enclosed containment system that keeps dust and particles from escaping into the atmosphere. Workers inside the containment will be properly protected with respirators and protective clothing.

The paint that will be used is an aluminized epoxy mastic green paint and will be either sprayed or rolled onto the structure, all within the containment system. At the end of each work day all lead paint debris collected from the vacuum power tools will be loaded directly into 55 -gallon drums and stored in a secured area on Massport property in accordance with EPA regulations, away from the community.
At the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Meeting on Aug. 19, several issues were raised. Massport has made an effort to respond and take action on those issues. Written materials were requested regarding the Tobin Bridge Paint Project, which have been forwarded to Neighborhood Council Chairman Peter Looney. Below is an overview of the progress that has been made on the other issues:

- Work Hours - Paint work will occur Monday through Friday, weather permitting, during the normal construction hours of $7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and 3 p.m., that includes set up and clean up. NO weekend or night work is scheduled.
- Car Covers - Massport has made a commitment to provide car covers for residents living within 100 feet of the bridge painting work area. If you are interested in obtaining a car cover for your vehicle, call 973-5691 and it will be arranged.
- Lane Closures - There will be lane closures throughout the project on both the upper and lower decks. At all times, two lanes of traffic will be open for travelers southbound, as well as northbound. During rush hour, Monday through Friday, 6:30 a.m. to $9: 30$ a.m., there will be NO lane closures on the upper deck.
- Air Quality Monitor - Based on meteorological and technical criteria, the air quality monitor has been placed in the residential community. It is currently recording samples to establish baseline ambient air levels before bridge work begins. During the paint project, air quality will be monitored every work day for four weeks, then a variable schedule will be set depending on the intensity of bridge work.
- 24-Hour Contacts - Massport Community Liaison Dorothy Connolly Steele is available to answer community concerns and questions by calling 973-5691 Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. In the event of an emergency after hours, call Logan Operations at 561-1919 to page Steele. The Tobin Bridge Director Mary Jane O'Meara is also available to answer questions and concerns regarding the bridge and the paint project. Call 242-7979 to reach O'Meara 24 -hours.

In addition, general community concerns regarding daily Tobin Bridge operations, such as noise levels and speeding, were brought up at the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Meeting. Massport is making every effort to address those issues. In addition to updates at Neighborhood Council meetings, Massport will issue press releases and disseminate informational flyers to inform the community about the progress of those community issues and concerns.

KEEP YOUR EYE ON THE DOG, NOT THE TAIL
Some tax-cutting strategies make good financial sense. Other tax strategies are simply bad ideas, often because tax considerations are allowed to override basic economics.

Here's one example of the tax tail wagging the economic dog. Let's say that you run an unincorporated consulting business. You want some additional tax write-off, so you decide to buy $\$ 10,000$ of office furniture that you don't really need. If you're in the $28 \%$ bracket and you deduct the entire cost, this purchase will trim your tax bill by $\$ 2,800(28 \%$ of $\$ 10,000)$. But even after the tax break, you'll still be out-of-pocket $\$ 7,200$ ( $\$ 10,000$ less than $\$ 2,800$ ) - and stuck with furniture that you don't need.

There are other situations in which people oft en focus on tax considerations and ignore the bigger financial picture. For example:

- Someone increases the size of a home mort gage, solely to get a larger interest deduction.
- A homeowner hesitates to pay off a mortgage, just to keep the interest write-off.
- Someone turns down extra income, because it might push them into a higher tax bracket.
- An investor holds an appreciated asset indefinitely, solely to avoid paying the capital gains tax.

As a general rule, the best tax strategies are those that generate a deduction and leave you in control of your money. This is what happens, for example, with IRA, Keogh and 401 (k) plans. Strategies that result in tax deferral can also be desirable, since you get to pay your tax bill years from now in cheaper, inflated dollars.

## 'When The Boys Came Marching Home'

"Honey, I'm coming home!" That sentiment was echoed by every battle-weary GI in 1945. The World War was over. Victory was ours. Homecomings were jubilant. Polls showed that most Americans expected the post-war years to be the best of their lives. However, the Boston to which Gis returned was only momentarily to remain like the old hometown they remembered.
The Bostonian Society captures this brief but pivotal moment in the city's history in the exhibition, "When the Boys Came Marching Home," opening Sept. 18 in the Old State House Museum.
The exhibit examines the unprecedented technological and societal changes affecting Boston in the decade immediately following WW II. The joys and the tensions of the era, from the excitement precipitating the return of the GIs to the inauguration of Eisenhower in 1953, are revisited
through almost 200 photographs, 50 original documents and period advertisements, and 100 artifacts gamered from repositories and families around greater Boston.

The transition from war to a peacetime economy is told through the eyes of Boston's GIs and their families, communities and workplaces to which they returned.
Highlighted are the tremendous opportunities provided thousands of Boston GIs for job training, higher education and home ownership - opportunities that dramaticlly changed the physical, economic and political face of the city. Artifacts include discharge papers of Gls from across the city, first "civvies," a GI mortgage and family snapshots.

This generation of young men and women returned to their old neighborhoods with new ideas. Ethnic differences and old party politics seemed less relevant to the
generation of Americans who had saved Europe. During the post-war decade, Bostonians indulged aging Mayor James Michael Curley's "Last Hurrah" while at the same time looking ahead to the promise offered by the new generation of hero-politicians epitomized by John F. Kennedy.
By 1945, the austerity of the war years was suddenly out of fashion and consumer goods were in demand. New technology developed or improved for the war was quickly translated into peacetime production. Included in the exhibition are Pyrex bakeware, a 1946 television set, Melmac dishes and the new Dior-look fashions. Bostonians were particularly adept at harnessing the technologies coming out of the war, such as radar, microwaves, synthetics and the awesome power of the atom. Consumer breakthroughs on the horizon in

1946 included polio vaccines, television, Polaroid's instant camera, Raytheon's experimental Radarrange (the first microwave oven) and MIT's Whirlwind I computer.

Beyond the "homefront" years but not quite yet the "fifties," the postwar decade had a special quality all its own. The Old State House Museum showcases this period of hope and promise in the exhibition "When the Boys Came Marching Home," which runs through August 1997.
The museum is open daily from 9:30 a.m. to $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and is located at the comer of State and Washington streets in downtown Boston. Admission is $\$ 3$ for adults, $\$ 2$ for older adults, $\$ 1$ for children ages 6 to 18 , and free for Bostonian Society members, Mass. schoolchildren, and Boston older adults.

## New Social Security Beneficiaries Will Be Paid By Direct Deposit

New applicants for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) will have their monthly benefit payment deposited directly into their bank account, according to Arlene Lopes, manager of the Boston Social Security Office.
"Beginning Aug. 1, 1996, people who apply for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) will have the convenience of direct deposit," Lopes stated. That policy will also apply to people who receive any federal benefit payment, federal wage salary or retirement payment, or vendor expense reimbursement payment."
"So when you come to
apply for benefits, be sure to have your bank information with you documents that show your financial institution and your account, such as a personal check, savings passbook, or an account statement," Lopes said.

Lopes said people already on the Social Security and SSI rolls who get checks will continue to be paid by check, unless they opt to change to direct deposit. Also, new beneficiaries who don't have a bank account will be paid by check.

With direct deposit your money is available the same day you have received a check. The difference is your money is sent directly to your bank. Lopes cited the

who now receive checks changed to direct deposit, the savings to the taxpayers would be $\$ 9.6$ million a month. The government saves 40 c each time someone uses direct deposit instead of a check. It costs 42 c to process and mail each check compared to $2 ¢$ for direct deposit.

Lopes noted that, under the law Social Security and SSI beneficiaries who receive a check by mail will be required to switch to direct deposit by January 1999. Those who don't have a bank account at that time will have available to them special debit accounts at designated banks and will be paid by direct deposit,

Your Aug. 21 letter to the General Manager concerning the notice and location of the public hearing in Charlestown was referred to me for a response.
With respect to the issue of notice of the hearing, I would like to point out that the MBTA is not required to publish notice of the hearing in any newspapers. Nonetheless, the MBTA, in an effort to notify its customers of the hearings, strove to place the ad in every community newspaper in affected areas, as well as in the Boston Globe and Boston Herald.
You also took issue with the location of the hearing, the Community College Auditorium in Charlestown. As a point of reference, the hearings are to be held in affected "areas." As the RFP is structured along the lines of MBTA garages, the MBTA examined the areas served by the Charlestown garage, including Malden, Medford and Cambridge, when determining where to hold the hearing. The Charlestown site was chosen for a number of reasons. First, the facility was large and air conditioned; second, the facility was handicapped accessible; third, it was 100 feet away from the Community College Orange Line T stop;

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## McCabe Receives Enthusiastic Support From Elected Officials

Several hundred residents from Charlestown and Chelsea gathered in Thompson Square last Saturday, carrying signs and voicing support for Charlestown resident William "Bill" McCabe and his candidacy for state Representative. This Second Suffolk District seat, which has been held by Rep. Richard A. Voke for the past 18 years, will be decided by the voters of Charlestown and Chelsea on Primary Day, Tuesday, Sept. 17.

Peter Looney acted as moderator at the rally and first introduced Boston City Councillor Albert "Dapper" O'Neil. O'Neil, who identified himself as the "elder councillor atlarge" told the gathering that he was "in Charlestown for one purpose - and that was to endorse the candidacy of Bill McCabe as the next representative."
