

Trolleys, Not Tourists, Cause Residents To Fight Back



The constant clanging of bells and clamor of historic rhetoric bellowing over loud speakers has driven residents of otherwise peaceful neighborhoods to stand their ground as in a new battle of Bunker Hill. The English are no longer the enemy. In 1991, the opponents are — trolleys!

One right after the other, from early morning until sunset seven days a week, residents living between the Charlestown Navy Yard and Bunker Hill Monument are inundated with trolleys carrying tourists from one historic site to another. These old-fashioned vehicles have created such a roar of controversy from residents seeking relief from this bombardment, that the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Basic Services Committee brought the Boston Police Department

Hackney Division and the city's Transportation Department into the community to listen to complaints and take action on the issue,

Residents made it clear that tourists entering their neighborhood were not the issue. This, they stated, was something they considered a part of their life living in the shadow of both the Bunker Hill Monument and the mast of USS Constitution. The means of trans-



street traffic and an invasion of their privacy was heard by one resident after another. Public safety issues were also raised when it was made clear to Mark Cohen, administrative assistant of the Hackney Division, that fire engines were not able to travel on the neighborhood streets used by the trolleys. "There is no place to pull in to get out of their way. They won't move or even wait to let a car get by them," stated one resident of Lexington Street, who also complained that the trolley drivers were discourteous and at times insulting.

One woman explained a common practice of one trolley driver who starts at the bottom of Lexington Street at Bunker Hill Street by giving his own interpretation of the famous battle. "He'll let out a cry over the loud speaker 'Charge,' and by the time the trolley reaches Monument Square. the entire capacity of tourists on board would be yelling and screaming as if charging the hill to fight the enemy," she stated.

Committee Chairman Peter Looney informed the complainants that he would schedule another meeting in January with a broader section of the community also suffering from the effects of the trolley invasion. Cohen advised them to document the incidents, including license plates and trolley numbers, and bring the information back to the meeting for enforcement of the regulations set down by the (continued on page 13)





Late on a Wednesday afternoon, the tennis courts at Charlestown High School stand deserted in a whipping wind. The season's first nor'easter has blown up, with gusts of 40 miles per hour and more. A stinging rain blows in sideways.

The CHarlestown Against Drugs (CHAD) Tennis Club is supposed to practice this afternoon with professional coach Daniel Cayarga of the Winchester Tennis Center. It's 3:30, time to start, and nobody's here.


But then CHAD mainstay Jeff Andrea shows up, walking in the mist with his racket slung over his shoulder. Ming Ngan drives into the lot with David Burns riding shotgun, and David and Jeff start horsing around. Dannie Dollosa, Vinnie Tamburello, Santos Figueroa — that looks like everybody. Ming and Jeff actually try to warm up, smacking a tennis ball back and forth across a court there is no net — in the howling wind.

ching his shoulders against the chill, his hands buried in the pockets of his sweatshirt.

"Ooh, man!" he says. "Tom said it was windy, but he didn't say it was raining." He meant CHAD coach Tom Desmond. "We talked on the phone this morning."

Maybe we can do some drills inside," an observer suggests.

"Maybe we can have a chalk talk about doubles strategy."

"Okay. Let's wait and see who else shows up."

Ming and Jeff continue pounding the ball in the wind, getting a little hysterical with the futility of it all. The other boys gather around Cayarga in obvious admiration.

Cayarga, 24, a dark-haired, handsome, strapping six-footer from Venezuela, played NCAA Division 1 tennis on a full scholarship for Southern Mississippi University. He graduated in 1990. "I never could have afforded college without that scholarship," he says. As a teen-ager, he was a member of the Venezuelan National Tennis Team. He works now at the Winchester Tennis Center where CHAD coach Tom Desmond met him.

"I was looking for a match with Winchester," Desmond says. "I spoke with Daniel and he expressed an interest in our program. And he offered to come down and work with the kids. Of course, I asked him to do just that. The chemistry between Daniel and the kids is very good. It's a very positive thing.

"He's from a big city," Desmond continues. "He's an inner-city kid. He's not from the posh, country club setting. He's basically from the same background that our guys are from, so he can relate to them very well. And his talent in tennis is obvious. It's a perfect match, as far as I'm concerned." The boys ply Cayarga with questions. Does he know Andres Gomez, the 1990 French Open champ? "Yes, I hit with him one time. He's from my home-

town." "So you know him?"

"Oh, no. We're from Caracas. That's a big city. Five million people."

"So what was the score when you played him? Sixlove?"

"No, we didn't play, we just hit with each other for a while."

The boys, who are very competitive, don't quite understand not keeping score. They're into beating people.

It looks like nobody else is going to show up, so the chilled group moves inside the high school, past the swimming pool, to the gym. There they displace a couple of boys shooting hoops and start pounding tennis balls against the wall. Cayarga spends time with each boy, showing them the benefits of different grips, demonstrating the proper position for a slice backhand. Then he steps back and watches again.

"Man, they all use the same grips, don't they?" he observes with a grin. "Way over to the Western side." (continued on page 13)



"It's amazing," Desmond muses. "If the guys paid this much attention to their alegbra teachers, they'd get straight As. But if you get their interest, they'll pay attention. They really pay attention to Daniel."

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

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
