CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

It seems that every year is a year of change for North West Cancer Research (NWCR) as the charity continues to adapt to its environment and put in place plans for the future. In the year since our last Annual Report there have been significant changes to the organisation from the Board downwards which are intended to prepare us to grow, develop our brand and do more in the fight against cancer.

In early 2017, the Charity undertook a governance review which considered how the organisation could best oversee its management and take decisions. The first part of this was the slimming down of the Board of Trustees in order to streamline decision making. Doing so meant saying goodbye to many friends who have served faithfully as Trustees and who have been key supporters in our journey to date. To support the Board we have put in place a new Committee structure which will provide new rigor in our decision making and will enable small groups of Trustees to consider important decisions in greater detail.

Our scientific decision making – considering which research work to fund – is well led by the Chairs of our Research Strategy Group and our Scientific Advisory Group. Both support the Board in understanding the value of the research work we fund and provide confidence that our resources are being used wisely.

Looking forwards, we will continue to invest in quality research aimed at understanding the causes of and cures for cancer as well as looking at new areas such as inequalities in cancer prevalence and providing funding for young researchers at the start of their careers. An important element in what we fund is the infrastructure and key posts within Universities and so I am delighted that, during the year, we have continued to fund the University of Liverpool Cancer Research Centre along with announcing new packages of funding for key posts at the Lancaster University and Bangor University.

During the year, the Charity appointed a new Chief Executive Officer, Alastair Richards who joined the organisation in February 2017. He has assisted the Board with its governance review along with putting in place a new strategy with a plan for growth and development.

The staff of the Charity have had a challenging year and I thank them for their dedication, hard work and success.

As with many charities, we continue to be reliant upon our donors and those who kindly leave us legacies. NWCR also has the pleasure of having in place Branch Committees who provide excellent support and continue to develop their presence in towns across our area. There has also been excellent support by Patrons, Ambassadors and many volunteers.

I look forward to the coming year with optimism and believe we are well placed to face the future challenges.

CEO'S STATEMENT

Welcome to the Annual Review for 2016/17.

It's been a year of tremendous change for North West Cancer Research but one in which the Charity has made resolute progress to advance our vision of achieving a cancer free future.

Looking at our accounts for the year, we have invested £4.1m into research – that's more than ever before - which is a clear statement that we are determined in our efforts.

Within the £4.1m of research grants which the Charity has committed to are some investments which we're making to ensure that the research infrastructure in our area is strong and capable for the future. At Bangor, we're working with the University and the local Betsy Cadwaladr Health Board to

provide a clinical chair of cancer research. They will be supported by a lab manager, a lecturer and PhD students in a NWCR-funded package which will strengthen the research community in North Wales. At Lancaster, we're supporting the University to recruit a new lecturer and fellow in cancer research with funding provided for five years.

This kind of investment is different to the projects which we have funded for many years but it is helping to ensure that we have a growing number of world-class scientists performing ground-breaking research. Our success in this was shown in the sheer number of excellent project applications which we received during the year.

Any review of the last year should note the changes in both the Board of Trustees and the staff team. In April, our governance review created a new and slimmed down Board with eleven trustees. This meant that many supporters stepped down from the Board and I want to take this chance to sincerely thank them for their long-term support and commitment to us. They remain close to the Charity and have become life members. The new Board will drive forward progress and ensure that the Charity goes from strength to strength.

Amongst the staff we have said goodbye to some who have given long-service and I thank them for their contribution. The year has been one of consideration with a great deal of thought going into what we will fund, how we position ourselves and how we get ready for the future. During 2016/17, the Board agreed a new strategy along with a new structure with an investment in staff, systems and resources. We have welcomed in a new senior team who are already providing direction and, as we start the new year, the charity has for the first time a Marketing and Communications Strategy and a Fundraising Strategy in place. As a supporter I am sure that you will soon start to see the difference these documents will make.

Finally, let me finish by thanking you, our supporters, for your unwavering and dedicated support. During my first year it has been a real pleasure to meet so many of you and to see your commitment to the battle against cancer in our area. It has been a real privilege to meet so many people who share a common purpose and who are willing to give up their time and money to make things happen.

I know that with your help and support NWCR will continue to carry out ground breaking research into cancer.

NORTH WEST CANCER RESEARCH

North West Cancer Research has two Scientific Groups who, between them, oversee the direction of research funding, along with the approval of specific projects. The two provide advice to the Board of Trustees and support them in making decisions in complex areas.

THE TWO GROUPS ARE:

Research Strategy Group

The Research Strategy Group (RSG) comprises senior scientists from around the region who are responsible for setting the Annual Research Strategy. The Strategy enables researchers to understand what the Charity's priorities are for funding and what information they will need to provide in a funding application.

The RSG also considers funding for posts within academic institutions and this has been a significant area of work during 2016/17.

The funding for the University of Liverpool Cancer Research Centre was first approved in 2014 and was due to expire during 2017. The RSG worked closely with both the Board of Trustees and the University to ensure that the funding was renewed through to 2022 with the centre providing robust evidence that the regional impact of the work funded would grow and that strong controls would be in place to ensure that high-standards would be maintained. We are delighted that this has been approved and that the Cancer Research Centre's future has been secured for a further five years.

REPORT OF THE SCIENTIFIC COMMITTEES

Five-year funding has also been provided to Lancaster University for a lecturer and Fellow in cancer research, along with two PhD students. This will strengthen their cancer research work and should lead to the development of further projects from Lancaster. Finally, the RSG worked with Bangor University to move forward the appointment of a clinical chair of cancer research who will work across both the University and the local hospital to improve both research and patient outcomes.

The group looks forward to the continuing development of the Charity in 2017/18 and to improving our links with the academic institutions in the area.

Scientific Advisory Group

The Scientific Advisory Group (SAG) assesses research grant applications from cancer researchers in the North West and Wales region, with the aim of ensuring that funded work is of a world-class standard. This is achieved through a process of external peer review of grant applications, followed by rigorous internal peer review by the SAG.

The SAG comprises of senior cancer researchers from across the region along with leading cancer researchers from elsewhere in the UK. The group encompasses both basic science and clinical expertise and all members give their time freely to the charity. I would like to thank them for their commitment and support over the past year in carefully and expertly evaluating grant applications.

The Group met twice during the year and approved a number of project grants based upon scientific merit and overall international excellence. At the January meeting, the Group reviewed 11 applications and approved two. Pleasingly, the July 2017 meeting was particularly notable due to the large number and quality of the applications. In total, 22 applications were received and five were rated as being of the very highest quality and therefore received funding.

In addition, there were a further three applications from Liverpool based researchers which were very close to this level and were felt to be of merit. The Charity approached the University of Liverpool about these three applications and they kindly agreed to fund them through endowment funds passed to the University by NWCR in the past. This meant that skilled researchers were retained in the North-West but also that potentially life-saving research was able to continue.

In all it has been a notable year for the SAG. The seven projects funded by NWCR combine to give a massive £1.3m boost to research. In addition, the funding

of three projects by the University of Liverpool unlocks a further £559,000 of funding. Within the projects, were a number targeted at fundamental research along with projects which look at specific forms of cancer such as melanoma and neuroblastoma.

Our membership of the Association of Medical Research Charities provides external recognition of the quality of our peer review processes and places us in the top tier of medical research charities in the UK. A position we are proud to hold.

How we allocate our funding

Researchers within our area of operation are invited to apply for project grants twice a year. All applications are then subject to robust peer review by external reviewers. Our SAG will then assess the applications before we decide which projects to fund.

At the end of each discussion, each application will be scored between one and six. A minimum score of five is required for the application to be funded. Some applications that have potential but don't reach a score of five, may be invited to resubmit their application.

All grants are subject to satisfactory review at the end of the first financial year and must submit a final report along with an assessment of their impact.

A WIDOW'S WALK FOR LIFE IN MEMORY OF HUSBAND WHO DIED FROM PROSTATE CANCER

A widow from Liverpool has made a promise to walk two miles or more every day to raise money for lifesaving cancer research, after she lost her husband to prostate cancer last year.

Laura Garnell, from Aigburth, has covered more than 400 miles in just six months to support NWCR. The 65-year-old retired property landlord, decided to take on the challenge after her beloved husband George Garnell died of prostate cancer on 2 November 2016.

After her husband's death Laura turned to her love of walking as a form of therapy. When she read about North West Cancer Research in a local newspaper, she knew then that she wanted to do something to help prevent others from going through what George did.

Laura said: "I've been doing this for almost six months now, only missing a few days when I've been ill. On days when the weather has been bad I've got my walks in on the treadmill. I walk all over. Mostly around Sefton Park as it's a beautiful spot near where I live and I often walk to the shops in town and back again.

"Everyone has been so supportive. My brother and sister and even my four-year-old nephew have joined me on a few of the walks. My granddaughter Abbie has walked to town and back with me on her school holidays and on the way back we light a candle in the cathedral for grandad George.

"While I've never asked for money directly, lots of people have been extremely generous and made donations to the charity.

"What I am doing is just a small challenge compared to what George and others living with cancer have gone through, but if the money I raise can help even just one person, then it will be a success."

HARLECH COMMITTEE


Despite being a small rural community, the Harlech Committee has managed to raise over £5,000.

RESEARCH CENTRE®
UNIVERSITY OF LIVERPOOL

Since forming a partnership in March 2014 to establish the Cancer Research Centre, both NWCR and the University of Liverpool (UoL) continue to celebrate its success.

In the last 12 months, the Cancer Research Centre has grown in size and strength with three new PhD students, five successful Research Development Fund (RDF) project applications totalling £49,015 allocated and a record 12 RDF travel awards being awarded.


During this period, cancer researchers in Liverpool published 220 papers,

approximately half of which were focussed on the mechanisms of cancer development and the identification of new therapeutic targets and treatment strategies. The remaining half were clinically related publications describing optimal strategies for cancer patient care, patient responses to new drugs and surveys helping to understand the experience of patients with cancer.

The weekly NWCR seminar series has been very well-attended and these are live streamed to sites at Leahurst, Lancaster, Bangor and Chester Universities.









The Cancer Research Centre exhibited at another successful NCRI Cancer Conference in Liverpool - highlighting its innovative world-class research into detecting, treating and preventing a range of cancer types and improving the quality of life and palliative care of cancer patients.

The Centre has been involved in a number of outreach activities as we look to engage different communities. In April, the Centre held a very successful NWCR Centre@UoL Annual Scientific Symposium at the Victoria Gallery & Museum. Attending this were twelve sixth form students as special guests thanks to funding from the University's Widening Participation Wellcome Trust grant.

The students from Calderstones School, North Liverpool Academy, Notre Dame Catholic College and Archbishop Blanch School, heard from a programme of top speakers, all leaders in their fields of cancer research from the Universities of Bangor, Dundee, Glasgow, Liverpool, Lancaster, and Southampton. They also took part in a 'behind the scenes' look at the world-class research labs at the University of Liverpool, as well as the university's sports facilities, linking the science with healthy lifestyles.

The growing Youth
Academy provides high

In July, the NWCR Centre@ UoL participated in the Faculty of Health Life Sciences 'Meet the Scientists' event at the World Museum Liverpool. In total over 800 people attended the outreach event and it was very well received. The children also had the chance to take part in live demonstrations and workshops. The activity, 'Cracking Cases! - examining skin cells and tissues under a microscope as a disease detective' was followed by 'a day in the life' of a Histopathologist looking at and diagnosing skin cancer.

The work station demonstrated how a melanoma is diagnosed,



removed and treated and included examples of photos, permanent fixed sections and the chance to look down the microscope. The event raised muchneeded awareness about staying safe in the sun.

Notably, the Centre was awarded a further millionpound funding boost in October 2017 thanks to a successful application to North West Cancer Research. The investment includes provisions to fund pioneering research which will benefit cancer patients in Liverpool and across the North West, as well as supporting the next generation of researchers. This additional funding through to 2021 will enable the NWCR Centre@UoL to double its efforts in working with the people of Liverpool-Merseyside,

the Liverpool City Council, the Hospital Trusts and Liverpool Health Partners to help address the serious health challenge that Cancer represents in this region. The Centre has also been actively involved in patient and public outreach, and aims to engage more closely in future with Industry. We are continuing to work with the people of Merseyside, Liverpool City Council, the Hospital Trusts and Liverpool Health Partners to help address the serious health challenge that cancer represents in this region.




BANGOR NWCR INSTITUTE ANNUAL REPORT 2018

We have had a busy year! We have finally made some progress in recruiting a clinical chair, senior clinical lecturer, a postdoctoral lab manager and 2 PhD students. This major joint investment from NWCR (£1.3 million) and Betsi Cadwaladr University Health Board (BCUHB; £500,000) will allow clinicians to work together with basic scientists in our laboratories and will be a gamechanger for our Institute. We had a good response to our expression of interest advert and have selected three promising candidates who will visit us shortly for further discussions.

Several group leaders, in collaboration with the Welsh Computer Aided Drug Design (CADD) Platform in Cardiff, have made their first steps in drug discovery. This involves the three dimensional

modelling of a protein implicated in carcinogenesis and testing millions of molecules for their potential to inhibit the activity of this protein. This is all done on a computer (in silico). This allows us to create a list of the most promising compounds, which we subsequently test in our laboratory for their effects on (cancer) cells. This work is funded by various successful applications to the Life Sciences Research Network Wales and KESS2/Tenovus. Apart from these grants, one of our researchers, Dr Rita Cha has successfully obtained another NWCR project grant to study the response to DNA and protein damage. Several group



leaders published articles in the peer reviewed scientific journals Molecular Cancer, Cancer Research (Jane and Ramsay) and myself in Genes.

Bangor University continues to invest in medical and cancer research and the School of Medical Sciences will shortly advertise for two lecturer positions, one in the area of cell biology, the other in bio-informatics.

NWCR is currently recruiting a local (North Wales), Welsh speaking community fundraiser, who will be based in Bangor and work closely together with the Bangor scientists to promote the work of NWCR and engage with the North Wales committees and the public.

Our open day in March, as part of the Bangor Science Festival's Hidden Worlds exhibition, was again very successful. We had more than 1,000 visitors this year! Thanks to the committee members for helping out again this year. We are looking forward to the next open day on the 10th of March 2018.

UPDATE FROM LANCASTER UNIVERSITY

This has been an eventful year for North West Cancer Research and Lancaster University, with the Charity providing more funding for cancer research at Lancaster than ever before and some exciting developments that have come about as a consequence of the Charity's long-standing support of our work.

Early in the year, NWCR announced that it would be providing Lancaster with £400,000 of funding to allow us to recruit two new cancer researchers, a research fellow and a lecturer, to establish their research groups at Lancaster. Dr Morgan Gadd, the NWCR Fellow, will be working on developing new drugs that selectively kill cancer cells by turning their own waste disposal systems against them. Dr Andrew Fielding, the new NWCR Lecturer, joins us from Liverpool and will be continuing his ground-breaking work that aims to exploit an unusual feature of how cancer cells divide

up their genetic material, in order to develop new ways of treating the disease.

We're very excited to have Morgan and Andrew joining the cancer research team at Lancaster. NWCR has contributed five years of funding, including support for two PhD studentships, to get them both up and running as independent researchers. This kind of support is really important for young scientists as it gives them the opportunity to work on their own projects and as they develop, make links with other researchers and move into new areas.

NWCR has also helped to develop the cancer scientists of the future by providing another round of summer studentships for promising young undergraduates to work in our cancer laboratories over the summer vacation. Three undergraduates from Lancaster and Bangor Universities spent eight weeks working on cuttingedge cancer research projects under the supervision of our cancer

scientists. Previous recipients of the summer studentships, drawn from our brightest and best undergraduates, have been inspired to go on to study cancer at postgraduate level – a testament to the success of this initiative. We are grateful to the Charity for their continuing support of these studentships.

We were also pleased to welcome Lottie Swinyard to the University, where she will be working towards a PhD under Dr Nikki Copeland's supervision. Lottie has received a PhD studentship through the NWCR Doctoral Training Programme and is working on a project that brings together researchers from both Lancaster and Liverpool to understand how a molecule called Ap4A affects the process by which cancer cells divide to produce new cells.

Another way that NWCR supports research at Lancaster is by providing funding for specific cancer projects. We are grateful to the charity for its continuing support in this respect, with two of our researchers having been awarded project grants following last April's funding call. This funding collectively totalled £450,000 and will support Dr Leonie Unterholzner's project 'How does p53 link DNA damage signalling to innate immunity?' and Dr Richard Mort's project 'Development

of a translational preclinical model for UV exposure and early melanomagenesis'. This has allowed each of them to recruit a scientist to come and work in their laboratories and will also provide funding for the various specialist pieces of equipment and chemicals that they will need to do the work.

Outside of the lab, representatives from NWCR joined us to help out at the University's Community Day in May, which saw budding young scientists make cell cookies and DNA bracelets as well as extracting DNA from strawberries. A fun day was had by all, with the event also helping to raise awareness in the local community of the vital work that the Charity funds.

Finally, it was entirely fitting that North West Cancer Research were the very first organisation to be inducted into our Chancellor's College of Benefactors at last summer's graduation ceremonies. We were very pleased to welcome NWCR Chairman, Nigel Lanceley to the University to receive the award, which recognises the truly transformational nature of the Charity's support for our work over the past two decades. I would like to take this opportunity to once again thank all the various staff and volunteers who work so tirelessly to raise funds to allow us to do the work that we do.

LIVERPOOL CANCER INEQUALITIES RESEARCH NETWORK (LCIRN)

The Liverpool Cancer Inequalities Research Network (LCIRN) aims to explore and understand why people from poorer backgrounds are more likely to develop some (but not all) cancers and are more likely to have worse outcomes once they have been diagnosed with cancer.

At the heart of LCIRN is a partnership between the NWCR-UoL Cancer Research Centre (CRC), the Department of Public Health and Policy (DPH&P) at the University of Liverpool (UoL), Liverpool

Health Partners (LHP) and the Public Health Institute at Liverpool John Moore's University (JMU). NWCR-UoL CRC funds the post of LCIRN Co-ordinator until the end of 2018.

LCIRN has continued to make progress over the last twelve months. We have created an LCIRN website within the CRC's website, an LCIRN mailing list and a seminar series. The report of the 2016 LCIRN Symposium is on the LCIRN website along with blogs, funding opportunities and the LCIRN Seminars. We have established the LCIRN Public Involvement Group, which will also form the core of the Patient Public Involvement and Engagement Group for the CRC.

LCIRN is a regular contributor to the Local Awareness and Early Diagnosis Initiative, chaired by Liverpool City Council, and which brings together people concerned with preventing cancer from across the city's statutory and charitable sectors.

We have continued to raise awareness of LCIRN through presentations at conferences and in seminar series. For example, we presented at an Age UK conference in May 2017, an opportunity that came to us through NWCR and at a seminar series hosted by the University of Salford. We also had a poster presentation at the recent NCRI conference.

In partnership with CLAHRC NWC, we are evaluating an intervention to reduce inequalities in bowel cancer screening. LCIRN has also been working in collaboration with the Liverpool Vs Cancer project, which is asking the people of Liverpool about their understanding of cancer and their attitudes towards cancer screening and treatment.


Looking ahead, we continue to support the development of research projects and research programmes. engage@liverpool is funding an LCIRN workshop into the links between homelessness and cancer. The Head and Neck Patient Research Forum has funded an LCIRN workshop to identify research priorities for inequalities in head and neck cancers. We have been working with LHP, who have formed a research group to look at inequalities in cancer screening. We are also part of a research team that is investigating reasons for emergency admissions amongst cancer patients.

Dr Hendy Maheswaran has joined us as LCIRN Director. Hendy will be leading the drive for project funding and will be concentrating on securing infrastructure funding for LCIRN beyond the end of 2018. We continue to work closely with NWCR and are grateful for their continuing support.


