Keyes Elected To At-Large Seat On CNC -Vacancies Now In Precincts 4 And 6

The Charlestown Neighborhood Council held its monthly meeting on May 2 at the K. of C. Hall. The meeting opened with Chairman Peter Looney reading two letters of resignation from council members. The first was from Precinct 6 representative Nancy Keyes who has moved from that precinct, and the second was from Precinct 4 representative Pat Mc-Clellan whose work prevents his attendance at meetings.

Keyes opted to run for the at-large seat recently vacated by Gregg Nolan. She was elected and will serve the remainder of his term until the fall of 1996. Looney declared the precinct 4 and 6 seats vacant and requested that persons 18 or over who live in either of these precincts to send a letter of interest to him at P.O. Box 397, Charlestown, MA 02129 prior to the June 6 meeting.

Bill Galvin reported on an April 24 meeting relative to City Square bus stops. The committee and residents were in agreement on the proposed change of the stop for Charlestownbound 92 and 93 buses from Chelsea Street to the end of the North Washington Street Bridge. Opposition has been expressed on a proposal to move the bus stop away from the Harvard Mall. Galvin said he would call another meeting with representatives of the MBTA present, and Jim Conway promised to place flyers in the neighborhood doorways to notify the abutters of the meeting as soon as the date is set.

Ken Stone reported on the Billboard Committee meeting that unanimously opposed the erection of an illuminated sign on a monopole on the elevation adjacent to the 99 Restaurant. The Board of Appeal (BOA) will hear this petition on Tuesday, May 9 at 9:30 a.m. The CNC voted to approved the recommendation of the committee, and a letter will be sent to the BOA asking denial of the petition, with a copy of the letter also sent to the director of the Boston Redevelopment Authority.

Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, told the CNC that Don Kehoe, chief traffic investigator for the Boston Transportation Department (BTD) related to her that the traffic signs prohibiting parking 20 feet from the corner of short Monument Avenue and 20 feet from the corner of Pleasant Street (in front of Monument Properties) will be installed shortly to allow drivers crossing Warren Street better visibility. This is the first cooperative between the CNC, area residents and the BTD to secure measures that will allow for a safer street. Information on suggested crosswalk changes will be forthcoming from the BTD.






Local Couple Attend Golden Anniversary Party





Taxpayers will be allowed to claim deductions for charitable contributions of \$250 or more on their 1994 tax returns if they have obtained written acknowledgements by Oct. 16, 1995, or have made a "good faith effort" to obtain acknowledgement by that date (i.e. sending the charitable organization a letter requesting the acknowledgement).

The written acknowledgement from the charity must contain the amount of cash, or a description of property contributed and a description and estimate of the value of goods or services provided by the charity (if any) in return for the contribution.



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(continued from page 1) ees over a 60-day period ending in July. The Charlestown plant additionally employs 397 in juice and extended-shelf-life cream production, distribution, transportation and adminis-

While the restructuring of the milk business is underway, Hood also is evaluating the best future use of the Charlestown plant. Currently, no time frame for the completion of this evaluation has been determined, since the interests of potential buyers of H.P. Hood must be taken into account.

According to Keller, this restructuring was developed to return profitability to Hood's fluid milk business and re-establish its cost-competitive status in

the fluid milk business. The price-competitive challenges inherent in the fluid milk business are not unique to Hood; throughout the Northeast, all processors have been adversely affected by diminishing profit margins and excess capacity. Hood's three other businesses, the Hood Ice Cream Division, Hood Cultured Products and the Hood Manufactured Products Group, the latter which produces extendedshelf-life dairy products, are all profitable.

"The bottom line is, to be competitive in the fluid milk business, the company must operate at industryleading levels of cost-effectiveness and at capacity," Keller says. "After a thoughtful and comprehensive analysis of the compa-

ny's fluid milk operations and after reviewing various options, we concluded that the key to Hood's long-term competitiveness in the fluid milk business is in consolidating milk production from Charlestown to our highly effective plants in Agawam and Portland. In this way, Hood gains valuable operational efficiencies in the fluid milk business. "While this consolida-

tion will achieve significant cost savings in the fluid milk portion of our business, we deeply regret that it comes at the expense of members of our valued and dedicated workforce," Keller adds. "To support our employees transition from Hood, we will be providing them with a comprehensive separation package and outplacement services."

With the transfer of production from one facility to another being relatively straightforward, Hood's production distribution, and service to the marketplace will not be interrupted. "During the transition and following, Hood will continue to serve Greater Boston and all New England with our full line of fluid milk and other dairy, juice and ice cream products," Keller added.

Parent company Agway Inc., based in Syracuse, N.Y., is pursuing new ownership for Hood following Agway's decision to divest of its major food processing holdings. There are preliminary discussions taking place with potential buyers; confidentiality agreements prevent disclosing names.





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

Some of the programs cited were "Just The Facts Day," Teen Day, the CHAD Tennis Team, "The Other End" newspaper written by teens for teens and its "Parades Are For Kids" on Bunker Hill Day. Charlestown teens accepting the award to a standing ovation were Matt Ezekiel, Mary Ellen Wood, Monique Matarazzo, Joe Tallent, Rosetta Cannizzaro, Tim Warren, Danny Awbrey and Joe Brennan.

This year's Public Service Award went to Jay Ash, legislative aid to Rep. Richard A. Voke and the presentation was made by Marty O'Brien and Tom Cunha. Ash was praised for his "unwavering commitment to issues affecting Charlestown." He was cited for his lovalty and dedication to the concerns of Charlestown residents and his active involvement in youth programs, the problems of the elderly or just "making government a friendly and available resource." In his response, Ash stated that "no man is alone," and he said he "shar-

ed the award with his mentor Rep. Richard Voke and his family, particularly his wife Susan."

The New Resident Award was presented to a duo -Patricia Simpson and Erin Farley. Colleen Meyers and Mel Stillman made the presentation. They were cited for their dedication particularly to the "Celebrate Our Children" project at the Warren-Prescott School. They have worked with the 99 Restaurant to award children dinner certificates for work well done and are fund raising for a playground at the Warren-Prescott School. In accepting the award, Farley said that when they started two years ago, they didn't know how far they could go, and now they know "the sky's the limit!" They thanked the community for its support.

Ruthellen Chardavoyne and Kay Whelan were the presenters for the Elderly Award which also went to a duo - Zelma Lacey and Sister Ann Rita Sullivan, O.P. It was noted that the CHarlestown Healthy Aging Program (CHAP) was conceived and developed by these two women some seven years ago, with help from the Kennedy Center, to educate and organize seniors and advocate on issues that affect the quality of life of Charlestown elderly. Both women, who are over 70, are presently working for a site to locate a nursing home in Charlestown.

Nicole DeRoeve was the recipient of this year's Youth Award which was presented by Jim Mansfield and Looney. She was cited for her character, the qualities she possesses and her leadership ability. She was one of a few teens that met with President Bill Clinton on his recent visit to Boston, speaking very highly of her community. She represents Charlestown on the Mayor's Youth Council, she is a member of the Healthy Charlestown Coalition and devotes a great deal of her time to the youth of the town. She assisted in the founding of the Junior CYO and teaches confirmation classes at St. Catherine's. She has given to the younger children as well as to her peers. With the audience rising to their feet for a standing ovation, DeRoeve came to the podium to recieve her award.

This year's Dennis Mc-Laughlin Unsung Hero Award went to Francis "Bud" Coleman and was presented by Kay Whelan, Bill Galvin and Moe Gillen. Coleman, the proud father of six, is a retired Superintendent-In-Chief of the Boston Police Department. He is the founding president of the Charlestown Lions Club;

winner of the Melvin Jones Fellow Award by Lions Club International for excellence in the organization; board member of Townie Santa Committee, Charlestown Youth Sports Fund and the Bunker Hill Health Center Cardiac Advisory Board; former member of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council; and active in district and zone programs of the Lions Club. Each recipient was presented with a paperweight containing a miniature of the Bunker Hill Monument which was designed by Tom Gorsuch. They also received citations from the House of Representatives presented by Rep. Richard Voke and citations from the Boston City Council from City Councillor Diane J. Modica.

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LIFE INSURANCE AND TAXES

Life insurance is one of the most common financial products, and you probably own at least one policy. But do you know how tax laws affect life insurance? Here are some key issues.

As a general rule, life insurance premiums aren't tax deductible, and life insurance proceeds aren't subject to income tax. However, businesses generally can deduct premiums for group-term life insurance, and each employee may receive up to \$50,000 of group-term coverage tax-free.

Dividends on life insurance policies generally aren't subject to tax, since dividends represent a partial refund of your premium.


If you die owning an insurance policy on your life, the proceeds from the policy will be included in your estate and may be subject to estate tax. You can keep life insurance proceeds out of your estate by giving your insurance policies to an irrevocable insurance trust while you're still alive. You also can cut estate taxes by giving your insurance policies to children of other heirs. The transfer of a life insurance policy raises many complex tax issues, so consult us and your attorney before taking any action.

Whole life and universal life insurance policies combine life insurance coverage with a savings or investment account, which is also known as a "cash value" account. As long as money accumulates in this account, it isn't subject to tax. But be careful if you cancel a cash value policy that you've owned for a while, since some of the proceeds may be subject to income tax. You're less likely to trigger income tax if you borrow your cash value rather than withdraw it. But see us first, since borrowing also involves some tricky tax rules.
