MGH*Charlestown HealthCare Center Turns Thirty

Taking care of the health care needs of six children is no easy task - from bumps and scrapes to physicals and immunizations - Margaret Smith had her hands full. But there was one place Smith trusted to take care of her family - her second family - the MGH* Charlestown HealthCare

Smith has been going to MGH*Charlestown for years - not only for health care, but Smith also worked at the center for 22

"I loved my job there and taking care of the people that I knew in town," says Smith. "But most importantly, the health center staff, who was like a family, has always been there

MGH*Charlestown has been taking care of families like the Smiths for 30 years and will be celebrating its anniversary next week, Sept. 13-18.

The health center was exactly what Charlestown needed in 1968, when only two physicians were available in the town and many residents had few choices for their medical care. The health center opened in September as the Bunker Hill Health Center and was affiliated with the Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH). At the time, the health center offered a unique concept in combining municipal, school and public health into a program affiliated with a university teaching hospital.

ces converged to encourage the MGH to look beyond. its walls," says Roger Sweet, MD, former medical director of MGH* Charlestown. "Our goal was to create a model of health care which would be cost efficient and form a new delivery system to address issues that were important to Charlestown."

In order to continue meeting the needs of its community, MGH*Charlestown established a community advisory board in 1986 to learn more from community representatives about the public health and medical needs of Charles-

According to Peggy Carolan, administrative director of MGH*Charlestown, the health center's original mission has remained throughout the changes of the past 30 years. "It has evolved into a full-service health center, offering a board range of services



(continued on page 3) from obstetrics to primary care to geriatric care, and has created community service programs such as Camp Bunker Hill, a therapeutic summer day camp for children who have trouble functioning in traditional school settings," says Carolan.

"Along with those changes, our original mission has remained to improve the health of our community by understanding its needs, providing accessible preventative services, advocating for our patients, educating other health care professionals in a community-based setting and bringing available resources from the MGH and Partners HealthCare System to our patients."

Patient-centered care is something that Smith is familiar with - not only through her work at the health center, but four generations of her family have used the health center's services for their medical needs.

"Before the health center opened, you had to go to the emergency room at the hospital if you really had a problem," says Smith. "Being able to have all of your medical needs taken care of under one roof was tremendous."

Smith started working at the health center in 1969 as a nursing assistant, helping the physicians with patient care. "I loved working with the patients since I knew most of them from the community," she says. Smith took a secretarial job

after five years of providing direct patient care, because of a back injury. But she still kept her fingers on the pulse of the health center.

"It was great to see the health center go from having only two physicians and two nurses to having three floors of different kinds of specialty care from OB/GYN and dermatology to physical therapy services," says Smith. "I was fortunate to watch firsthand how the center grew. We went from seeing three patients a day to seeing more than 1,000 in a week. It was truly gratifying to work there.'

Now retired, Smith misses the center's patients and staff. To occupy the void, she has become a health care "advocate," talking to neighbors and relatives about their own health care and the importance of seeing a physician regularly. And where does she refer them to go? The

Everyone worked so hard to wash, plant, water, prune and, especially, have fun as they made the school a better place.



LoPresti has also participated in many civic activities, including membership on the Medford Municipal Review Committee, Director of the West End House Boys and Girls Club, fund raising for the Somerville Boys and Girls Club, member of the Elks and the Heart Fund Drive.

He is a member of the Service Employees International Union, Local 254, AFL/CIO.

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NEW CHILD TAX CREDIT MEANS SAVINGS NOW

Families may save tax dollars this year with changes contained in the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997. One such family-friendly provision is the child tax credit. This year, taxpayers who have qualifying children under age 17 may be entitled to a credit of \$400 per child. This increases to \$500 per child in 1999 and later years. To receive this credit, two main rules concerning the definition of "qualifying child" and taxpayer income limits must be met.

· Qualifying child. This must be a child, grandchild, stepchild or eligible foster child for whom you can claim a dependency exemption and who is under 17 at the end of the year for which you are claiming the credit. The child must also be a U.S. citizen, national, or legal resident.

 Income limitations. Higher-income taxpayers face a phaseout of the credit amount when their income reaches specific limits. For example, on a 1998 joint tax return, the \$400 credit is gradually reduced when family income exceeds \$110,000; for singles, the credit starts phasing out when income exceeds \$75,000.

· To benefit now. There is no need to wait until the filing of your 1998 individual income tax return next year to take advantage of the tax credit. The tax savings resulting from the credit can put more money in your pocket now by reducing your income tax withholding. The IRS has included the tax credit allowance in the worksheet for the 1998 Form W-4 (Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate). Consider filing a new form if adjustments are appropriate.


