Charlestown To Commemorate The 218th Anniversary Of The Battle Of Bunker Hill

The highlight of the celebration of the 218th anniversary of the Battle of Bunker Hill will be the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade on Sunday afternoon, June 13 through the streets of Charlestown.

This year the celebration also marks the 150th anniversary of the dedication of the Bunker Hill Monu-

This parade is sponsored by the Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee, under the auspices of the ci-

ty of Boston.

Giving the command "Forward March," starting the parade up Bunker Hill Street from Hayes Square at 12:30 p.m., will be Chief Marshal Col. James P. O'Donnell, USMC.

Colonel James P. O'Donnell was born in Charlestown on May 24, 1947. A graduate of Stonehill College, he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in November 1970.

After graduation from The Basic School in May 1971, he was assigned to Se-

cond Battalion, Second Marines, Second Marine Division where he served as Rifle Platoon Commander, Rifle Company Commander, H & S Company Commander and Battalion Adjutant. In January 1974, he was assigned as the Executive Officer, Marine Detachment USS Oriskany (CVA-34).

In April 1975, he was transferred to the Officer Selection Team, Hartford, Conn., where he served as Assistant OSO and Officer in Charge. During this period he was promoted to Captain. In 1978 he served as a platoon commander at Officer Candidate School, Quantico, Va. He was subsequently reassigned as a

student at Amphibious Warfare School. Upon graduation in 1979, he returned to Second Battalion, Second Marines, Second Marine Division where he served as Weapons Company Commander and Battalion S-3 Officer.

In June 1981, he was promoted to Major and assumed command of Marine Barracks, Naval Air Station, Brunswick, Maine.



USS Constitution Museum Unveils \$4 Million Capital Campaign

The USS Constitution Museum announced a \$4 million capital campaign at its 20th Constitution Ball. The campaign will fund an expansion which will enable the museum to display more of its collection and increase the number and quality of its educational offerings. To date, \$2.3 million has already been committed toward the campaign goal.

Renovation of the museum's current facility and expansion into two adjacent buildings will add 16,300 square feet of indoor and outdoor space to the museum's existing 16, 800 square feet, a 97 percent increase in space.

"The USS Constitution Museum has fostered the renewed interest of people of all ages in Boston's maritime history and in the history of the Federal Period," said museum president John Rowe. "This campaign provides an opportunity for public and private organizations to encourage this interest by supporting the continuation and expansion of the museum's programs."

The museum expansion is a joint project of the USS Constitution Museum and the National Park Service, which administers the surrounding Charlestown Navy Yard as part of the Boston National Historical Park. The National Park Service has provided \$2.6 million to design the project and to fund and oversee the building rehabilitation work. The capital campaign will fund all interior finishes in the new buildings, as well as exhibits, audio-visual programs, educational programs and operation of the new facilities. Groundbreaking for the first phase of the museum's expansion is expected this summer.

"We have enjoyed an enormously successful relationship with the museum over the past few years," said superintendent of the Boston National Historical Park John Burchill. "This is an excellent example of the good that can come from a partnership between public and private organiza-

The expansion project will be completed by February 1996. From July through December workers will renovate an existing building adjacent to the museum into a new 200-seat theater. The theater will be used for lectures, films, presentations and classes. During phase one, a connector will be built between the museum, the new theater and Building 28, which will be renovated and added to the museum in the second phase of the project.


"Since it opened its doors in 1976, the USS Constitution Museum has become the shore station for 'Old Ironsides'," said museum executive director Ellen Kraft. "The museum has added to the wealth of educational opportunities available here in the Navy Yard. This expansion will provide even more resources for new programs and services that will build on the achievements of the past 18 years."

The expansion is an integral part of the board of trustee's five year plan which calls for the museum to become the gateway to the USS Constitution.

The USS Constitution Museum is an interpretive complement to "Old Ironsides," the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. In addition to two floors of exhibits, the museum also houses a museum store, a research library and a 100-seat theater where a 10-minute video tour of USS Constitution is shown daily at no charge. There is a modest admission for museum visitors. Children under 17 are admitted free on weekends.





A Brief History Of Flags Associated With The Bunker Hill Monument

At the official dedication of the Bunker Hill Monument on June 17, 1843, 150 years ago, flags hung from the four upper windows of the obelisk. A Fisher and Currier engraving of this dedication shows four flagpoles projecting about 15 feet from the observation room windows. The engraver portrayed four starsand-stripes flags, each with a circular field of 13 stars and 13 stripes, the flags measuring approximately 10 by 16 feet. This arrangement appears to have continued on festive days until

at least 1851, when it was depicted in a woodcut in the publication, Gleason's Pictorial Drawing Room Companion. No physical remains can be found on the Monument to document this arrangement.

The next available account of flags flown from the Monument can be found in George Washington Warren's 1877 history of the Bunker Hill Monument Association. "In 1861, a mast 70 feet long, surmounted by a gilt ball, had been prepared and bolted to the upper courses of the Monument,

so that a flag of the largest size might clear its apex." Raised as a special tribute to the Union cause (war had iust broken out a few months before), the unfurling of this large flag by the Governor of Massaachusetts was followed by patriotic songs and speeches. "It was a spectacle worthy of Bunker Hill and of her heaven-born mission - sublime and stirring enough to have fixed in loyalty any swerving Southern heart, could it only have been brought within its inspiring reach." This particular flag

was displayed for the last time on Nov. 25, 1866, "the day set apart by the Proclamation of President Johnson as a day of National Thanksgiving for the cessation of the Rebellion." Soon after, the 70-foot mast was also removed. Today, the remains of the spar support include four one-inch iron bolts in the north window sill.

The following year, according to Warren's history, 'a liberty pole was erected on the square one hundred and forty feet high. On the cross-bar was lettered the

motto, 'Liberty & Union: 1775, 17th of June, 1867.' 'A flag was raised on Bunker Hill Day, a tradition which continued sporadically until the removal of the liberty pole in 1874.

Afterwards, two flags were hung from poles extending from the east and west windows. This arrangement continued until the early part of this century and can be seen in old postcards. The wroughtiron brackets are still mounted on the Monument and these will be used to support the new poles installed in commemoration of the Monument's sesquicentennial, June 17, 1993. To celebrate this anniversary two flags will be hung, measuring 10 by 16 feet, in the style of those flown at the Monument's inauguration

The new flag poles have been donated by the Charlestown Preservation Society to the National Park Service. They were manufactured by spar maker Dexter P. Cooper IV of Hartland, Vt. Commemorative bronze ornaments evoking the Revolutionary War cannon in the observatory room and bearing the legend "Gift of the Charlestown Preservation Society, June 17, 1993," cover the butt ends of the poles.

On this day, the police officers of this district have been requested by the Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee and CHarlestown Against Drugs to strictly enforce the No Prinking Ordinance.

There will be no drinking allowed on the streets of Charlestown. Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony Marks Opening Of Sullivan Square Garden To Persons With Disabilities

The gardens at Sullivan Square, a part of the Charlestown Community Gardens, took another step forward in its continuing progress recently when it became the first garden in the state to be handicapped accessible. On a sunny May morning, Laurette Murdoch, one of the original members of the Charlestown Community Gardens, cut the green ribbon officially opening

the garden that now has access for the physically disabled. Among those present were a delegation of wheelchair-bound clients and staff from the Life Focus Center.

Speakers included Kevin Burke, president of the gardens; Jack Millerick, executive director of the Life Focus Center; Brian Wallace from the city's Business and Cultural Affairs office who presented a citation from Mayor Raymond Flynn; and John Campbell.

Campbell stated: "We are here today to celebrate the accessibility of this wonderful place — our community garden. For the past few years, I have spent a considerable amount of time enjoying the beauty and fresh air of the garden and the friendships of the gardeners.

"Before the garden was made wheelchair accessible, I encountered some obstacles and difficulties making my way into and around the garden. Here on Main Street, these two steps were a barrier to my entering the garden. The Bunker Hill Street entrance had a very short, 90-degree angle ramp that was patched together with cobblestones and pieces of cement - it was unsafe to say the least. The old walkways consisted of a thick layer of gravel that sometimes caused my wheels to lose traction, become stuck and twice wear out the motor of my chair.

"When these difficulties were brought to the attention of members of the board of directors, they moved in an expedient manner to resolve the problems. Now there is an accessible entrance on both Main and Bunker Hill streets. The walkways are more conducive to wheels since being covered in stonedust.

"I can remember in years past when mothers pushed their carriages and strollers along Main Street and would look in from the sidewalk with admiration. Because of the access, they are now able to enter and enjoy the splendor of the garden. Now that the garden is accessible for all, we can say, 'This is truly a community garden.'

Campbell, at the conclusion of his remarks, thanked Kevin Burke, John Dunbar and Jim Hall as key people who worked in close coordination to make this handicapped accessible project a reality.



On the Forty Flights project, the Middlesex Corporation continues to hammer away at the punchlist in hopes of completing the work and closing out the project by the end of the month.







Voke Supports Health Care For Uninsured Kids

State Rep. Richard Voke, the Majority Leader of the House of Representatives, led an enthusiastic effort to amend the state budget in order to provide thousands of uninsured children of the working poor or those who have run out of unemployment benefits with basic health care coverage. According to Voke, his program will cover children between the ages of 6 and 12. The commonwealth currently offers programs

for youngsters up to 6 years

of age.

"Times are especially difficult for the working poor and those who have lost jobs and have run out of unemployment benefits. The amendment that I sponsored will assist families who are struggling to survive by insuring that their children receive the necessary health coverage to allow them access to vital primary and preventative health care services," said

Among the services pro-

vided by the Voke initiative are physicals, immunization, screening and testing, visits to participating providers when a child is ill, hospital emergency care, outpatient services for mental health, certain types of surgery and prescription drugs.

All children receiving these services will be required to participate in a mandatory smoking prevention program to educate them about the serious health hazards of smoking. Health care services will be provided in managed care settings, community health centers, school-based clinics and physician's offices.

"By making health care available to families who cannot afford it, the commonwealth is in a win-win situation. It's a win for the youngsters who receive preventative health care and it's a win for the taxpayer who oftentimes pays for more serious health procedures because poor families cannot afford preventative

measures. I was proud to receive overwhelming support for my pro-children plan," concluded Voke.

In her commencement address, Matlin signed, "I consider myself fortunate to have found out while I was a young girl that even though I was deaf, I could still do the most important thing — dream." Through her interpreter she told the graduates, "Listen to your hearts, and we will watch you soar."

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






water of 18 cities and towns onto the outgoing tides of Boston Harbor. This procedure of dumping waste into Boston Harbor continued for over 114 years. Now servicing 60 communities, the sewer system has clearly caused a major ecological problem to the deteriorating Boston Harbor.

"Servicing 2.5 million people daily, the Boston Harbor has all but been destroyed. The sewer system had become aged and unmaintained. It had fallen far below current federal standards for clean water, and drastic action needed to be taken. In 1985, a federal court ordered the cleanup of the devastated Boston Harbor, and the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) was formed to do the job. The MW-RA then devised a complex plan to revitalize the Harbor, called the Boston Harbor Project.

"The Boston Harbor Project encompasses dual policies of arresting sludge (solid waste) dumping into the Harbor and the relocating of effluent (aqueous product left after sludge is removed) discharge. In 1991, the sludge dumping was discontinued and it is now taken to a plant at the Fore River Shipyard in Quincy where it is turned into dry pellets and used as a fertilizer.

"Now being built is a massive tunnel, 25 feet in diameter and nine miles long, that will carry effluent out to Massachusetts Bay where it will be screened and widely dispersed to be

naturally processed by the Atlantic Ocean. The longterm aspect of the project is the construction of a secondary treatment plant which. scheduled to be completed by 1999, will more thoroughly filter effluent before discharge.

"The Boston Harbor Project is absolutely necessary in terms of the welfare of the environment. The contamination of the Harbor has eliminated nearly all of the marine life of what was once a fertile fishing ground. By cleaning the Harbor, marine industry will flourish again which would boost the economy on both a national and an economic level.

"This same reason applies to the shellfish beds which were covered by a thick coat of black mud, and any shellfish removed from the Harbor must be purified. But because of discontinued sludge dumping, the tides will erode the caked bottom and replenish it with bealthy sand. Beaches, which have become unappealing and preferably unswimmable (many have already been closed), will also benefit from the natural sand and the cleanliness of the water. Tourism will experience a boost in areas such as Harbor cruises of Boston's outskirts and marine life study expeditions.

"The Boston Harbor Project success will achieve an economic and an ecological victory by restoring what was once the best sewer system in America and by cleaning one of the dirtiest harbors in America."

John Kelly And The Battle Of Bunker Hill Road Race

To marathon racing fans worldwide, the name Johnny Kelley and the Boston Marathon are totally synonymous. The legendary Johnny Kelley competed in Boston until he was well into his eighties. It was another John Kelly, however. who helped get the annual Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race off the launching pad. It was not Johnny Kelley, the Elder, nor was it Johnny Kelley, the Younger. It was Johnny Kelly, the Townie, and this is his story as best as he could remember it.

Exactly twenty-five years ago this month, the Charlestown Boys Club, still twelve years away from merging with the Girls Club, presented its very first Bunker Hill Day Road Race. Road racing was in its infancy back then, but those with greater vision than most of us saw its burgeoning popularity on a nearby horizon and, through the Boys Club, a road race was offered to help kick off the Bunker Hill Day festivities.

Originally, the concept was to involve local Boys Club members in a wholesome activity on parade day. However, the growing popularity of the sport created ever increasing fields of runners, and this year's Battle of Bunker Hill 8K Road Race, as it came to be called, will play host to an expected six hundred or more competitors.

Back in 1968 though, the field numbered less than one hundred, and among them was John Kelly, the Townie. John was a sophomore at Christopher Columbus High School and an important part of that school's track and crosscountry teams. The high school season had recently ended, but the thought of the first Boys Club Road Race kept John's interest focused on running. Although he had been competing for Columbus for two years, he had never performed before as many people as he would on this day. It was important to him to do well, and he worked hard to reach his

Race day finally arrived,

"It had to be one hundred degrees," he recalled recently. "It was so hot, the pavement actually burned the bottom of my feet. I

really don't think anybody was especially looking forward to running in that kind of weather, but neither did they want to back out. I think the race was three and one half miles then, and I can remember the course very well. However, when I do stop to think about it, my feet start burning all over again.

"We started in front of what was then the Girls Club on High Street and turned down Green to Main. We turned right on Main to Sullivan Square and crossed to Medford Street. By this time the field was beginning to spread out a bit and I was with a group of about fifteen runners and near the lead at this point. As we moved along Medford Street, the lead pack began to thin out even more and, although the heat was intense, the adrenaline and friendly voices along the way kept me going.

By the time we reached the end of Medford Street, just before turning down Chelsea, I think I was the only local kid still near the lead. At this point, there were still five or six of us in contention. I took a couple of quick looks back over my shoulder, and I knew the heat was going to prevent anybody from making a move on us.

"By the time we had turned on to Vine Street and circled the old softball field onto Lowney Way, I was praying for the end. I was so hot, so tired, that I briefly considered quitting, but by the time we reached the Training Field and headed for the High Street side of the Monument, there were only three of us left at the front. Any thought I had of quitting were replaced with an overwhelming urge to win. I had been in dozens of races in high school before this, but even today I cannot think of a time in my life when I wanted so badly to win.

"There were no hills left in the few hundred yards that remained on High Street, and what had been a three and one half mile race was now down to a sprint. The three of us were running neck and neck, and unbelievably, faster than at any other time during the

"I can remember thinking that I was going to win



it all. I even began to visualize what it was going to be like crossing the finish line in first place. Maybe I lost my concentration for a minute or two, I don't know, but one of the other two runners began to inch ahead a bit, and as hard as I tried, I just couldn't make up the ground I was slowly losing to my rival.

"When I reached the finish line, I had spent every bit of energy. The exhilaration I thought I would feel at the end of the race was replaced with exhaustion, and just around the corner on Elm Street, I collapsed. I had been so focused on those last couple of hundred yards, that I did not know if I finished second or third. I did know, though, that I was the first Townie to finish and I received The Charlestown Patriot Trophy for being the first in that category.

"After I got out of the heat and took some fluids, I started to feel better, and the realization of what I had done lifted my spirits. You know, when I was laying on the ground on Elm Street, I was making these little promises to myself about never, ever running again. When I started to feel better though, not only did I want to run again, but I wanted to run the Boston Marathon. How's that for going from one extreme to the other?

"That desire to run Boston stayed in my mind for a long time, but after four years of high school track, I guess I sort of got burnt out. Every once in a while, most often when I would see somebody out on a jog, I would begin to think about the marathon and the old dream would come alive once again.

"And finally it happened. It took twenty-five years, but this past April, at the age of forty-one, I realized that old dream of mine. I started and finished Boston. You know it is funny, but when I made the final turn

to the finish line at the mar-

athon, that feeling, the one

I had twenty-five years earlier at the old Boys Club Road Race, came back. I was behind the leaders, far behind, but you know something, Charlie? Just like twenty-five years ago, I knew I was a winner."

John Kelly, the Townie, was the first Charlestown resident to finish in the very first Boys Club Road Race of twenty-five years ago, and he will run again this year. He was a boy then, and he is a man now, but it is the same heart that powers him. What he accomplished on that blistering hot June day in 1968 has created a vivid memory for him and for many others,

yours truly included.

As a member of the Boys Club staff, I had been assigned to the finish line, and I was there when John completed the race. I witnessed, first hand, his determination as he raced along High Street through the heat. I saw him collapse, exhausted, and I saw his initial look of disappointment turn quickly to pride as he began to realize that, because he had given all he had, and quite likely even more, he was, indeed, a winner.

Although twenty-five years have now passed, it is impossible for me to meet John Kelly, the Townie, and not remember that day.

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

Health Education Series HIV/Aids

Randall S. Stafford, MC, PhD and Lyn S. Lindpaintner, MD

HIV (Human Immunodeficiency Virus) is the virus that causes AIDS (Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome). The number of AIDS cases in Boston continues to increase. HIV infection mostly is transmitted through unprotected sex and the sharing of needles. It also can be passed from mother to baby or through blood transfusions (usually before 1985).

Being infected with HIV does not necessarily mean that a person has AIDS. AIDS occurs several years after the initial infection with HIV when the body's immune system is weakened. This makes a person more susceptible to other infections. Although some groups are at higher risk for HIV infection, no one is immune to this virus. Now more than ever, the AIDS epidemic is affecting heterosexual men and women who have no other risk factors. While this is a complicated topic, everyone needs to learn about HIV and AIDS.

A special educational symposium on HIV and AIDS will be held at the Bunker Hill Health Center on Thursday, June 17 from 7 to 8 p.m. Among the topics to be covered in detail are the following: What is the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV)? What are the risk factors for HIV? How can you get tested for HIV? What happens when people are infected with HIV? What can be done if someone is infected? Speakers for the series will be Drs. Randall S. Stafford and Lyn S. Lindpaintner.

In addition to these topics, there will be time for any other questions that you may have about HIV and

Randall Stafford, MD, PhD, is in the Adult Medicine Department at the Health Center. Before coming to Massachusetts General Hospital, Stafford conducted research on HIV for the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta. He is co-author of a paper on HIV testing published in the New England Journal of Med-

Lyn Lindpaintner, MD, has been in the Adult Medicine Department at the Bunker Hill Health Center for nearly three years. This is the first in a series of health education programs that Dr. Lindpaintner is organizing at the Health Center.
