## Burchill Honored By Boston Preservation Alliance

John Burchill, superintendent of the Boston $\mathrm{Na}-$ tional Historical Park, is the fifth recipient of the Boston Preservation Alliance's Codman Award for his distinguished service and commitment to the Freedom Trail and its sites, Dorchester Heights and the Boston African American National Historical Site.

The award honors John Codman, who, as a volunteer, was instrumental in establishing Beacon Hill as Boston's first landmark district in 1955.

More than 25 years ago, Burchill was breaking new ground by creating publicprivate partnerships in historic preservation whose effects are still felt today.

In 1981, as superintendent of the Lowell National Historical Park, Burchill secured funding for the Boott Mill, a classical example of adaptive reuse of an industrial structure. In 1984, Burchill became the second superintendent of the Boston National Historical Park, using his experi-

ence in Lowell to benefit critical preservation needs.
Working with the congressional delegation, and Congressman Joe Moakley in particular, he was able to bring $\$ 50$ million to Boston for rehabilitation, renovation of infrastructure and conservation of the historic
fabric of Faneuil Hall, the Old State House, Dorchester Heights, the Old Meeting House and the Boston African American National Historic Site.

Burchill successfully acquired $\$ 5$ million for the expansion of the USS Constitution Museum in the

## Scapicchio To Hold Public Hearing On Dog Waste

District One City Councillor Paul Scapicchio announced today that he will hold a public hearing to address dog curbing on Monday, July 6. The hearing will be held at 4 p.m. in the Curley Room, located on the 5th floor of Boston City Hall.
Since entering the office in January, the councillor has received numerous calls from residents who are concerned about dog waste left on streets and in public parks.
"Dog waste imposes a serious health problem for our children and our water supply," stated the councillor. According to John Aurbach of the Public Health Commission, dog waste that is left in our parks and on our streets not only looks and smells bad, it poses a health hazard to both people and pets who are exposed to the worms or worm eggs left in dog feces. Once exposed, a person can develop a fever, rash, blindness, liver damage, or in some cases, brain damage.

Although refusing to pick up after your dog is
dangerous, it is also a hazard to dispose of waste improperly. Some owners dispose of waste in the city's catch Basins. Because they are not made for this, the feces enters the water supply and the Charles River. People who swim, fish or are exposed to this water in any way risk rashes, stomach illness and other health problems.

One common myth is that feces is a good fertilizer. According to the Public Health Commission, this is completely inaccurate. The bacteria in the feces actually contaminates soil, harming trees and the city's water supply.
According to Scapicchio, while enforcement is an important ingredient in controlling irresponsible behavior, education is the most important part of this campaign. "Most people ust don't realize the senousness of the issue," stated Scapicchio.
Under the city's current ordinance, failure to pick up after your dog results in $\$ 50$ fine. Enforcement, however, is difficult due to
the fact that there are only two animal control officers for the 50,000 dogs in the city.

The councillor hopes to address this problem by hiring four new animal control officers, increasing fines and creating an active initiative to get more dogs licensed in the city. Scapicchio is working with the Menino Administration and City Council President James Kelly to help solve this problem.

When asked why he felt a public hearing was necessary, Scapicchio stated: "We need to tackle this issue in a creative way. I hope that by bringing dog owners, residents and health officials together, we can reach some common ground."

The world's oldest investment fraud may not date back to the world's first investment, but it prob ably followed close behind. Since then, scams have evolved into infinite forms, from simple chiseling (as when brokers "churn" stock sales to increase their commissions) to sophisticated confidence schemes by con artists.

Advanced fee swindles. In the most basic advanced fee swindle, the con artist sells the victim an "investment," asks for payment up front, and then disappears with the money. The payment might be characterized as processing costs, a down payment, or the entire investment. The only common thread in many schemes is that the victim ends up with less than he or she started out with.

Many swindles begin with the request for large advance fees. If youre not familiar with the person or company, don't invest until you've learned enough to be sure the offer is legitimate
Boiler Rooms. Telephone swindlers rob Ameri cans of $\$ 15$ billion each year, according to estimates by the Alliance Against Fraud in Telemarketing About two-thirds of those losses result from phony investment schemes.

These swindlers usually operate from "boiler rooms," which are rented rooms housing nothing more than portable tables, telephones, and folding chairs occupied by unscrupulous telemarketers The investments sold may be nonexistent or mere ly overvalued, but never as they are represented.

Not surprisingly, boiler room swindlers use high pressure tactics, replete with admonitions to act im mediately, before its "too late." Other features may include:

- Tactics aimed at making customers buy out of embarrassment or guilt.
- Out-of-state operators.
- A series of calls, escalating in urgency.
- Use of a courier service to pick up the payment immediately.
Obtain and review relevant documents before you agree to invest. If you still have questions, contact our office for assistance.
