'Townie Santa' Looks To Community For Support Of Elderly Christmas Program

Although the weather continues to be relatively warm and the ghosts and goblins of Halloween have yet to arrive, a group of residents have been meeting and planning for a Christmas program for Charlestown's elderly.

Christmas can be a very sad and lonely time of year for the needy, elderly shut-While the rest of us may be gift giving, card writing, and simply caught up in the tinsel and glitter,

there are others for whom Christmas is just another lonely day.

In Charlestown, however, residents remember the true meaning of the Christmas season. Through "Townie Santa," elderly, needy shut-ins who may otherwise be alone or forgotten, receive a visit from "Santa," who could be anyone, but represents everyone, and lets the person know, yes, we remember you. In its 17th year, Tow-

nie Santa, through donations and an ever-growing number of volunteers, provides nearly 100 of Charlestown's elderly with a hot turkey dinner and boxes of gifts, and this year the delivery will be on Sunday, Dec. 20.

Townie Santa was born from a conversation between four Charlestown residents in November 1982, centering around the idea that something should

During the last years, I travelled a lot because in Germany it is usual to get between five and six weeks holiday a year. So I came to the United States twice and I loved it. I wanted to learn more about the country, especially the people. I wanted to see how Americans live

So I decided to come here for an internship. Gloria J. Conway, the editor of The Charlestown Patriot, gave me the chance. She is very nice and I'm more than thankful.

At first I took a fourweek course for English at The EF International Language School in Brighton. By the way, it is a very good place for foreigners to learn English. You should recommend it.

I've been here for five weeks. Every day I meet people who, when they realize that I'm a foreigner, want to talk with me. All are interested, friendly and

The first time I took the bus I didn't know how much the fare would be. I asked a young woman and she told me 60 cents. All that I had in my pocket were one-dollar bills. "Don't worry, I'll pay for you," the woman said.


Next week, I was looking for the editorial staff of The Charlestown Patriot. I walked Bunker Hill Street



"She just bruises easily." "I lost control and snapped." "She should know better than to provoke me like that."

The many excuses for domestic violence serve to divert attention from the real issue by implying that abusers are not responsible for their violence. In fact, as Batterers Intervention Specialist Lundy Bancroft explains, people who abuse their intimate partners do not lose control, but rather are quite successful at maintaining intense power and control over their partners. This intentional control on the part of the abuser is used to isolate their partner, thus limiting contact with community resources, information and support.



'Townie Santa' Looks To Community For Support Of Elderly Christmas Program

(continued from page 1) be done for the shut-ins in less than one month's time, this group expanded, money was raised, meals cooked and 48 baskets were delivered.

The four probably never anticipated that their discussion would be so contagious. Townie Santa has a unique way of drawing residents together who may not otherwise share similar interests. One reason for the attraction, states a committee member, is the simple fact, Townie Santa is a good cause.

Another reason may be that inbred Charlestown responsibility of taking care of one's own. Or, more importantly, it may be that joy one receives from giving – something too personal for words. Whatever the reason, the number of volunteers grows with each passing year.

Townie Santa welcomes back a faithful contingent each year and expands with new faces from all parts of Charlestown. Some of them deliver the boxes, others pack them and others do the work behind the scenes. Last year, there were volunteers from as young as 6 to over 75 years of age. Almost 300 people donated either time, money, gifts or services in 1997 whereas for the first year, there were about 25 volunteers.

Beginning each fall, letters are sent to merchants, businesses and organizations within and affecting Charlestown, seeking contributions to the Townie Santa fund. Canisters are also placed throughout the town for coin and bill donations. Articles begin to appear in The Charlestown Patriot inviting residents to come to organizational meetings, or to submit the names of those they feel are in need of a visit from Townie Santa, or to send in monetary donations.

All donations are publicly acknowledged in the Patriot, however, as many as 10 percent of those who contribute wish to remain anonymous, donating just for the sake of Christmas.

In 1982, the Townie Santa fund was approximately \$1,000. In 1997, this figure rose to almost \$10,000. However, this does not truly reflect the total in donations received, since no value is placed on the gift donations. All the money received, with the exception of postage costs, goes directly to the packages.

"People wonder how much we give out in these boxes," related a committee member. "Well, just ask anyone who had to deliver one of them to a person living on a third floor, and they'll tell you how heavy these boxes are."

Those who are consid-

ered eligible are persons over 60 years of age who are shut-in with limited finances and family contact.

The selection of the names of recipients for a Christmas package is not an enviable or easy task. There is a screening committee who researches the names that are submitted and determines who will receive a basket. And despite the screening committee doing an excellent job, there is always someone else who also deserves a basket.

"You never get everyone," said a committee member, "You often hear later that we missed someone, but that's through no fault of the screening committee. This is why we ask the cooperation of agencies and residents in submitting names – and we are asking that the names be submitted by Monday, Nov. 16 to allow us an opportunity to finalize the list of recipients before it gets too close to the day of delivery."

An important fact to remember is that the idea behind Townie Santa is to bring some Christmas cheer to the elderly shutin. A committee member concluded, "These boxes do more than supply a person some much needed household and personal items—they tell the shut-in that we, the community, haven't forgotten them."






Attention all Boston Water and Sewer Commission Customers

The Central A: tery/Tunnel Project has closed the bridge located on Summer Street between the South Boston Haul Road and D Street to make way for construction of the Massachusetts Turnpike (I-90) extension through this area. The bridge will be dismantled and another built in its place. However, construction is estimated to last two years.

As a result, vehicular and pedestrian traffic traveling up Summer Street from the South Station area towards the Boston Water and Sewer Commission (BWSC) will be redirected, increasing travel distance from South Station to BWSC.

New directions to the Boston Water and Sewer Commission's 425 Summer Street facility are as follows:

Vehicular: Vehicles traveling up Summer Street from the South Station area will be diverted off Summer Street to Congress Street before-the closed bridge (bearing to the left). Drivers will travel along



Congress Street, past the World Trade Center to D Street. Drivers will take a right onto D Street and then a left to reconnect with Summer Street. BWSC is located on the corner of D and Summer Streets at number 425.

Pedestrians Pedestrians walking from South Station may travel the same route as vehicles, remaining to the right hand side of the new road configuration. A wide, well-lit sidewalk will be installed for the safety of all pedestrians.

FREE FLU SHOTS

The "flu" season will soon be here and it is important to get vaccinated with the flu shot in the early fall in order to prevent catching the flu once the yearly epidemic begins.

This year, the health center plans to set aside several periods of time during which you will be able to get your free flu shot. If you are over 65 and/or have a chronic medical problem, you should consider getting a flu shot.

Influenza, or flu, is a disease caused by a virus that leads to the sudden onset of fever (usually at least 101 degrees), sore throat, cough, runny nose, tiredness and aches and pains. These symptoms last for several days.

Everyone feels sick with influenza, but some people, especially older people, go on to get pneumonia and become seriously ill. In addition, people with chronic illnesses, such as diabetes, heart disease or emphysema, may find that these diseases get out of control when they have the flu. The result is that as many as 10,000. Americans die each year during the flu epidemic. To try to prevent serious illness, hospitalization and death, the Center for Disease Control recommends that anyone with heart or lung disease receive a flu shot. Ninety percent of the deaths caused by the complications of influenza are in people 65 or older.

The flu vaccine enables your body to make protective antibodies against the type of influenza virus, and a new vaccine is made each year because different strains of the virus spread each flu season. Therefore, it is necessary to receive a yearly flu shot.

The vaccines used in the past few years have been associated with only a few reactions. The most common reaction, which affects less than a third of people vaccinated, is soreness and redness of the arm at the site of the shot. Occasionally, people will develop mild flu-like symptoms for one or two days, starting within hours of getting the shot. This happens mainly in people who have never had influenza. Most people who get sick a day or two after getting a shot, have gotten an unrelated illness, not something caused by the vaccine. Very rarely, people have an allergic reaction to the shot. Thus, anyone with a history of allergies to eggs, which are used in the preparation of the vaccine, should not get the flu shot.


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EDWARDS MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

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'Edward Everett' The Other Speaker At Gettysburg' At The Charlestown Branch Library

Acclaimed Dorchester actor and historian, Jim Cooke, will present his portrayal of Edward Everett, illustrious 19th century statesman, famed orator and former Charlestown resident, on Thursday evening, Oct. 22, at the Charlestown Branch Library, 179 Main St. The library is wheelchair accessible.

Edward Everett was born in Dorchester in 1794, the son of a clergyman. A man of many parts, Everett had a distinguished academic record as student and professor at Harvard College before launching his public career as U.S. Congressman from the Middlesex District which included Charlestown.

Other offices followed, including Governor of Massachusetts, Ambassador to Great Britain, U.S. Secretary of State, President of Harvard College, U.S. Senator and Vice Presidential candidate.

Edward Everett lived in Charlestown from 1830 to 1837 while Congressman and, later, Governor. His house at 16 Harvard St. still stands, a designated Boston Landmark. He was active in civic affairs: a speaker in the town's Lyceum lecture series, organizer of a charitable relief effort, and instigator of a fund drive among Harvard alumni that resulted in the John Harvard memorial in the Phipps Street Burying Ground.

Renowned for his oratory, Edward Everett was asked, in 1863, to be the dedication speaker at the Gettysburg national cemetery. His two-hour speech was enthusiastically received by the crowd who were then stunned by the briefness of President Abraham Lincoln's three minute address which followed. History was the final arbiter of which was the more memorable (and memorizable).

Jim Cooke is a noted performer of solo historic roles whose repertoire also includes Daniel Webster and Calvin Coolidge. The program, sponsored by The Friends of the Charlestown Branch Library, will begin at 7.30 p.m. and be followed by a reception.

Massachusetts residents can receive help in paying for their telephone service under two federal low-income assistance programs administered by Bell Atlantic. The two programs are called Bell Atlantic LifeLine Telephone Assistance and Link-Up America.

Under the Bell Atlantic LifeLine program, eligible residential customers receive a monthly discount of \$13.00 on their telephone bill. Only one telephone line per household is eligible.

The Link-Up America program provides for a 50 percent (up to \$18.54) reduction in the normal installation charges for local telephone service.

These programs are available to participants in any one of the following:

Transitional Assistance to Families with Dependent Children Emergency Aid to the Elderly, Disabled and Children Supplemental Security Income MassHealth (Medicaid) Food Stamp Benefits Fuel Assistance

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BACK-TO-SCHOOL TAX PLANNING

With the kids back in school, parents and students can do some tax planning to reduce their 1998 tax bill.

Students or parents of students in their first two years of college can claim a HOPE tax credit of up to \$1,500 for 1998. The credit is equal to 100% of the first \$1,000 of tuition and fees and 50% of the next \$1,000. The credit is phased out for single taxpayers with adjusted gross income (AGI) between \$40,000 and \$50,000 and for married taxpayers filing a joint return with AGI between \$80,000 and \$100,000.

The lifetime learning tax credit can be used for tuition and fees paid after June 30, 1998. The maximum credit is equal to 20% of the first \$5,000 of tuition and fees, or \$1,000. The AGI limits are the same as those for the HOPE credit, but the lifetime learning credit is limited to one credit per tax return. In other words, parents with more than one child in college are still limited to one lifetime learning credit. Unlike the HOPE credit, the lifetime learning credit is available beyond the second year of college, including graduate school and certain job-related classes.

Starting this year, individuals can take a tax deduction for up to \$1,000 of interest paid on student loans. This deduction is an "above-the-line" deduction, which means it is allowed whether or not you itemize deductions on your tax return.

These tax breaks come with a number of qualifications and limitations, and using any of them may have other tax or financial consequences. It is advisable to get details on all available options in order to determine the best strategy in your situation
