
Start The New Year Working On A Path To A New Career!



Baby Kyle Is Readied For Transplant

Wednesday, Dec. 22 has been termed "Day Zero" by Cindy Fitzpatrick - the day when Baby Kyle's bone-marrow transplant is set to begin, and the family has been in South Carolina since the day after Thanksgiving while preparations have been made in anticipation of this day. One-yearold Baby Kyle and his fight against leukemia came to

light last summer as money was raised and compatible bone-marrow donors were sought to help the child and his family.

Cindy and her husband Robert have put their lives on hold for their little guy, and have planned for an eight- to 10-week hospital stay for Kyle, and four to six months near the cancer center while Kyle recovers.

Kyle's half-sister, Kimberly Fitzpatrick, has traveled south as she prepares to have her bone marrow "harvested" for Kyle. Kimberly has a four out of six antigen match, which has proven successful in other

Cindy wrote earlier this month that Kyle was undergoing a preconditioning

period before his bone marrow transplant, consisting of I.V. fluids and medications. He began radiation and chemotherapy on Dec. 13 to kill his bone marrow.

She notes that Kyle is in great spirits and, besides a little moon face from steroids, he looks great.

McTernan Sworn In As Mental Retardation Commissioner

Mary McTernan, a reading specialist at Charlestown High School for the past 12 years, was sworn in on Dec. 21 by Gov. William Weld at a State House ceremony as one of nine commissioners on the Governor's Commission on Mental Retardation.

As a commissioner, Mc-Ternan, who taught first grade at the Bunker Hill, Harvard and the old Kent schools prior to assuming her position at the high school, will have the responsibility of overseeing the care and treatment of retarded persons in state schools and group homes. She will join with her colleagues in reviewing the quality of care in all retardation programs and periodically make recommendations to the governor.

The commission was cre-

ated by Executive Order in May of 1993 to monitor the quality and effectiveness of the Commonwealth's programs for people with mental retardation. On that same day, Judge Joseph L. Tauro signed an order formally ending the court's 20year involvement in overseeing services which the state provides to its citizens with mental retardation.

McTernan has more than just a casual interest in joining this all-volunteer commission, she and her husband are the parents of a 29-year-old severely retarded daughter, Mary Elizabeth, who lived in a state institution for 18 years and is now a resident in a group

McTernan is looking forward to her involvement on the commission with great enthusiasm.





★ Neighborhood Council Meeting . . . Monthly Meeting

The monthly meeting of the council will be held at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 4 at the K. of C. Hall, 75 West School St.

Among the items on the agenda will be the election of officers for 1994.

The council meetings are open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

- ★ Bunker Hill Street . . . Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services, reports that the MBTA has promised her that the bus stop on Bunker Hill Street between Elm and Schools streets will be reinstated by the end of this week . . . we'll all wait and see!
- ★ Board Of Appeal Hearings... Two local petitions scheduled to go before the city's Board of Appeal on Dec. 14 were deferred until January.

Evers requested a deferral on the petition for a change in the status at 65-71 Main St. Included in the request was an approval of a 36-A, which is for take-out at Figs. She asked that it be put off until the abuttors had an opportunity to meet and discuss their ongoing concerns with the owners of this establishment.

The second deferral was on the petition to construct new houses at 12 and 14 Franklin St. Evers, in a letter to the board, told them that Bruce Daniel, who is the developer of the parcels, met with the abutters on Dec. 8 and presented a plan with six units, each with three bedrooms. He then agreed to four units, each with two bedrooms, and to resolve some of the neighbors' concerns. She added that the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Development Committee will review the plan before the next hearing date.

★ Elderly Housing . . . According to Evers, construction is expected to get underway on the planned elderly housing at the site of the former Municipal Building at the corner of Lexington and Bunker Hill streets by next week. She noted that the financing is in place, and they are ready to go. She added that a ground breaking is tentatively scheduled for sometime in January.

★ Sumner And Callahan Tunnels . . . In anticipation of increased numbers of travelers using the Sumner and Callahan tunnels during this year's holiday season, MassPike has revised its tunnel closing schedule.

The Callahan Tunnel will not close for construction work on the following evenings:

Christmas Weekend — Thursday, Dec. 23; Friday, Dec. 24; and Saturday, Dec. 25. New Year's Weekend — Thursday, Dec. 30; Friday, Dec. 31; and Saturday, Jan. 1.

★ Boston Water And Sewer . . . The Boston Water and Sewer Commission has announced that there will be no increase in water and sewer rates for fiscal year 1994, which commences Jan. 1.

Although the commission is projecting a modest rate increase for fiscal year 1995, it hopes to replicate the rate freeze of 1994 and extend it into 1995.

★ Kennedy To Hold Town Meeting . . . Congressman Joseph P. Kennedy II will hold a Congressional Town Meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, Jan. 6 at the K. of C. Hall in Charlestown. Residents are invited to attend.

Kennedy will present a congressional update report to the citizens of Charlestown, and will also ask for comments and take questions.


'Dig It!' To Air On Wednesday





Not only has the evening become a tradition, but it has grown as well. Many of those who were children when it all began, now have children of their own, and those not yet married invite their respective beaus.

Each Christmas Eve I receive a traditional phone

call from Joe McGonagle. Joe was a kid at the Boy's Club when I worked there. I knew precious little about basketball, but in order to resurrect the one-hundred pound basketball team, I volunteered to serve as coach. Joe was a member of that team. Later he was a student in one of my classes at Charlestown High School, and still later he held the job as physical education director at the Boy's Club, a position that was mine for a couple of years prior to beginning a teaching career. My wife and I were invited to, and attended his wedding. Over the vears we became good friends, and each Christmas I look forward to his call. It is not a long call. It is just one that is made so that we both get a chance to remember.

For many years, I, too, made a call to a friend. It was to a man whose name was Bill Dugan. He was a former assistant headmaster at Charlestown High School, and although there may have been some thirty years difference in our ages, we became fast friends. Mr. Dugan retired in the mid 1970s and moved to Centerville on Cape Cod. We continued to correspond through the mail and with my annual Christmas phone call. I was invited to, and

attended the celebration of his fiftieth wedding anniversary. Each year, about two weeks prior to the phone call, I would send him a Christmas card, and he in turn would send one to me. Last year the return address on the upper left hand corner of the envelope was the same, but the handwriting was different. It belonged to Eleanor, Mr. Dugan's wife.

"Bill took sick a few months back," she wrote, "and he had to be placed in a nursing home. I am sorry to say that he is extremely ill."

Last Christmas Eve I

broke with tradition and did not make my annual call. I think, no, I know I was afraid of what message I might receive as the result of a phone call. I will not make the call again this year, for the same reason, but sometime on Christmas Eve, maybe about eight o'clock or so, I will look at the phone and remember Bill Dugan.

"The stockings were hung by the chimney with care, in hope that St. Nicholas soon would be there." It is a line from "T'was The Night Before Christmas," and it is a tradition which is part of many Christmases.

Mary, my wife, bought a red with white trimmed





stocking with Brenda's name scrolled across the top for my older daughter's first Christmas. A year later, my younger daughter, Marie, was added to the Christmas scene, and she, too, was given a stocking with her name. Although we have lived in three different homes since the stockings were first purchased, they are annually "hung by the chimney with care." They are the same two stockings which have held everything from children's crayons to women's perfumes. Because it has become tradition, the stockings will be hung again this year and all the other years that may be given to us.

Christmas dinner at my parents' house is a tradition, and the plum pudding, which is served at that table but twice a year, is also a tradition.

It is always special to have been blessed with two daughters, but it is extra special at Christmas time. I have learned with time that buying any type of wearing apparel for my wife is a complete waste of my time. Despite the many "oohs and aahs" she might express upon opening a gift, whatever I might buy finds its way to an unused

section of some dark and faraway closet. This is where the girls can be very helpful. Each year I give them money and send them on a shopping safari. They know what their mother likes, and they are a whole lot better at buying things that women will wear than I am. This Christmas tradition serves many purposes, not the least of which keeps me away from crowded shopping malls.

Opening gifts on Christmas morning is a tradition, and in each household it may be done differently. It is funny, though, how things can come full circle. Our bedrooms have always been upstairs and the Christmas tree downstairs. For many years the girls would come into our room and wake us.

Now that they have grown into young ladies, my wife and I do the waking, and they protest the early call to the tree. Midnight Mass used to be a Christmas tradition, but time and circumstances have changed that tradition to an earlier afternoon Mass.

It is next to impossible to miss "A Christmas Carol" or "It's A Wonderful Life" on television during the Christmas season, so I guess we would have to call them a tradition.

And finally, Christmas spirit is a tradition, and that spirit does exist. Think of it. Don't you speak to people in a more upbeat manner? Don't you say, "Have a great Christmas!"?, and most of all, don't you mean it? Don't you find yourself saying "hello" to complete strangers, or "good morning" to the clerk at the supermarket? Don't you find more people talking to you, and in a more upbeat manner? And doesn't all of this cease rather abruptly shortly after Christmas? It is unfortunate that this does seem to occur, but it does prove the existence of the Christmas spirit.

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This additional exclusion is available for payments you make on another person's behalf to provide: (1) for medical care (including any payments you make for medical insurance on another person's behalf) or (2) for tuition at a qualifying educational institution. To be eligible for the exlusion, the payment must be made directly to the educational institution or medical provider rather than to the person receiving the benefit. Friends and benefactors take note: No family relationship is required for either exclusion; the exclusion is allowed regardless of the relationship between the donor and

The educational exclusion applies to tuition payments only. Any payments you make for books, supplies, dormitory fees, board or similar expenses are not excluded. Tuition payments to foreign educational institutions, however, will qualify for the exclusion.

Because your money must be paid directly to the institution, this can be a great way to reduce your estate knowing that your funds are not being frittered away. And what could be more rewarding than seeing your gift help someone with his or her educational or medical needs?

It is very important that you make the payments directly to the medical care provider or the educational institution. Payments made to an individual are ineligible for the exclusion, even if he or she passes the money on to the medical care provider or the school.

Questions & Answers On The New Charles River Crossing Design

Since the Central Artery/Tunnel Project's announcement of a new design for the Charles River Crossing, many Charlestown residents have raised questions about the new design and its effect on Charlestown. Here are some of the questions Charlestown residents have asked along with answers prepared by the staff at the Central Artery/Tunnel Project. Future issues of the Patriot will carry additional questions and answers on the new Charles River Crossing design.

1. Is the new Charles River Crossing design really the final one? We've been hearing about new designs for two

Over the past three years, nearly 80 different designs and modifications were studied to develop alternatives to Scheme Z, the previous design for the Charles River Crossing. Three alternatives to Scheme Z were presented in a document known as a Draft Environmental Impact Statement/Report filed with regulatory agencies last July. Secretary of Trans-

portation James J. Kerasiotes selected one of those designs as the projects's preferred river crossing. The new Charles River Crossing design will be presented in a Final Environmental Impact Statement/Report to be filed early next year. Once the necessary state and federal approvals are received, the project will move ahead with design and construction of the new Charles River Crossing.

2. Does the new Charles River Crossing design conform to the goals established by the Bridge Design Review Committee?

The new Charles River Crossing design is consistent with the goals of the committee, but avoids the environmental impacts and increased costs associated with tunneling under the Charles River. The new river crossing reduces the height, size and visual impact of the bridges and loop ramps of Scheme Z; allows for the development of parkland along the riverbank; eliminates double crossings of the river; and restores an on-ramp to I-93 north in the downtown/Government Center area.

3. Wouldn't a tunnel under the river, rather than a bridge, improve air quality by eliminating exhaust?

The new Charles River Crossing design will improve air quality because it will move traffic efficiently and therefore reduce the amount of exhaust expelled by idling vehicles. Putting traffic in tunnels does not in and of itself decrease emissions from vehicles or improve air quality. Vehicle exhaust in tunnels is eventually discharged to the atmosphere through ventilation buildings.

4. How will the new Charles River Crossing design effect plans for a rail link between North Station and South

The new Charles River Crossing design preserves the option to build a rail link between North Station and South Station following completion of the new underground Central Artery. The absence of a traffic tunnel under the Charles River allows for the greatest fexibility in designing the rail tunnel alignment under the river. The new design also allows for gentler grades in the rail tunnel, which improves railroad operations and safety.

The North-South rail link would allow for continuous rail service between Washington, D.C. and Portland, Maine, and would also connect the commuter rail lines serving the North Shore and South Shore. It is important that the best possible alignment for the rail link be preserved.

The Central Artery/Tunnel Project will continue to answer your questions on the Charles River Crossing in The Charlestown Patriot. If you have questions or concerns that you would like to see addressed, please call the CA/T Project's full-time representative, Stephen Collins, at 951-6100.

Voke Acts To Lower Elderly Health Insurance Costs

Claiming victory for fixed-income senior citizens throughout the state, Rep. Richard Voke says Houseadopted legislation will lower the cost of medigap insurance for a great majority of seniors who are either currently uninsured or not able to afford current health care coverage.

"Double-digit increases of the years past for health insurance coverage just cannot be allowed to continue. With many of our seniors on fixed incomes that are already stretched as far as they can go, I see our medigap insurance action as a vital move to help our seniors maintain their health care coverages," said Voke.

Central to the package were provisions to require all policies to provide a drug prescription benefit,

prohibit the underwriting of policies based on age or health status and lower the threshold at which an automatic public hearing and insurance commissioner approval must be sought for proposed rate increases of 10 percent or over..

"Each of these provisions are critical to bringing equity to the offering of insurance while keeping costs, down. For those of us who have advocated for affordable and comprehensive options for our seniors, the adoption of these provisions give us, and the consumers who will be the beneficiaries, much with which to be pleased," commented Voke.

The medigap initiatives must be approved by the Senate and signed into law by the governor before becoming law.

It's Time To Learn From Our Mistakes

To The Editor:

The dire warnings coming from Harvard University, former state education official Charles Glenn, and the liberal press that progress toward school desegregation is in jeopardy ignores one very important fact, the tactics used in the effort actually prevented any progress from being made.

Massport Set To Go Forward On Medford Street Buffer Zone

Charlestown Neighborhood Council c/o Mr. Maurice Gillen, chairman Mitigation Committee

Dear Moe and Neighborhood Council Members,

Massport has, for the past two years, been working with members of the Charlestown community to design a land-scaped buffer zone which will mitigate the current operational impacts of our Maritime facilities along Medford Street in Charlestown. Massport's scope and objectives for the project were defined early on in the public process. They are: develop a low maintenance landscaped area; secure our Medford Street properties; develop a landscaped area which would not preclude the development of a truck bypass road in the area; and incorporate the concerns, comments and desires of the community in the landscape design when financially feasible.

The budget for the landscaped buffer zone is \$200,000. The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA), as Massport's tenant at Revere Sugar, is financially responsible for \$30,000 of the total cost of the project. The proposed budget does not include costs associated with the project's landscape design consultant contract nor site preparation expenditures including the demolition and removal of buildings and foundations located on the "Somerville Lumber" portion of the site and the excavation of bituminous pavement from the area.

The entire budget will be used for the purchase and placement of plantings and fencing on Massport's property between what is currently known as the Domino Sugar Refinery and Terminal Street. During the design process community suggestions and requests were addressed. Massport has incorporated community preferences, suggestions and comments in the final design plan. The types of trees used in the project are varied and groups of planting have been designed in order that the buffer zone does not become visually monotonous; trees and shrubs which would collectively be attractive in all seasons have been utilized; trees and shrubs that would discourage climbing are also incorporated in the design.

Massport will produce a Final Design Plan which will be used in the formal bid process in January 1994, which will include the following requested changes to the Alternative C design plan which was most recently presented to the community on Nov. 29. Massport will change the style of the three-foot black metal frontage fence from a flat smooth top to a style that has open ended poles; the current design plan will be altered in order to develop a "high-lighted" Terminal Street planting area which will be similar in size and design to the planting area located on the right side of the main entrance.

In addition, as requested, Massport is prepared to purchase and plan the largest size vegetation possible, within budget, in order to expedite the reduction of the abutting neighbor's view of the site. The Buffer Zone planting project will commence in the spring of 1994. However, because of budget constraints, I reget to inform you that the dimension of the project site cannot be expanded. As a result of the established project dimensions, and the space needed to accommodate the aforementioned community preferred plan groupings and planting sizes, we are unable to satisfy the request that the rear, homestead style fence be jogged.

I would like to thank the Neighborhood Council representatives, Medford Street abutters, Friends of Doherty Park, Preservation Society members and community residents for participating in the Medford Street Buffer Zone meetings which were sponsored by the Neighborhood Council Mitigation Committee. The participants' landscaping expertise and knowledge of the community's desires for the site were well articulated and assisted us in creatively addressing the concerns of the community regarding this project and our facility's operations.

Massport has made a concerted effort to integrate the desires of the community in the Medford Street Buffer Zone Project, and I am pleased that we received a vote of approval from the Neighborhood Council regarding the Massport Medford Street Buffer Zone Project.

Voke Takes Final Action On Home Invaders

Rep. Richard Voke and his colleagues in the Massachusetts State Legislature have taken final action on a bill to increase the penalty for home invasion. The bill now awaits the governor's signature to become law.

"Our families deserve every protection we can afford them, especially the comfort of a safe home. By putting would-be home invaders on notice that such action will result in up to a lifetime in jail, I certainly expect this bill to have a substantially positive impact on the prevention of such crime," stressed Voke.

The bill Voke has supported establishes a mini-

mum sentence of 20 years, with a maximum of a lifetime sentence, for a person or persons who, without authority, enter or remain in the dwelling place of another while knowing that dwelling is occupied, and while armed and dangerous, use force or threaten to use force upon a person or persons in that dwelling. A further provision of the bill eliminates the possibility of the sentence being suspended or the perpetrator being placed on probation.

Once signed into law, the home invasion act goes immediately into effect. Voke anticipates the bill will be signed by Christmas.

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
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
