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



Remembering

Many of the men simply walked up the street, but others drove from their new neighborhoods, some a great distance, but all came for the same reason, to relive a few moments of their youthful years at the old Charlestown Boys Club.

The oft-told stories were told once again, but somehow they seemed even more meaningful on this night of remembering. Some spoke of scoring the winning basket against the South Boston Clubhouse, some spoke of winning the 100-yard freestyle against the Pawtucket Boys Club, and others spoke of Louie and Stan and Sully and all the other men and women whose dedicated work transformed a red brick building in Charlestown into a Boys Club.

They also came to recognize a couple of men for their contributions to the club and to the community. Bill "Speedy" Kane was the first to speak. He recalled his days at the

club, particularly the gym, when the late Fred Sullivan was physical education director and basketball coach. Bill's words came directly from the heart as he recalled the tremendous impact "Sully" had had on him and those with whom he played ball. Through these words, he made it quite clear that Coach Sullivan served as more than a coach to many of the boys, that he was, in fact, more of a father to some. As his words of thanks wound down to a conclusion, Bill summoned Fred Jr. and Danny Sullivan, to the podium to accept a plaque in honor of their father's many contributions to the old Charlestown Boys Club.

The contributions of Rudy Doenges were also recognized by those in attendance. Rudy's many years at the club led him to a lifetime of dedicated youth work. After spending many summers working with younger people at the pool at the Doherty Playground, Rudy displayed a natural ability to relate to the younger set by leading a group of preteens in the transformation of an old, weed-infested lot behind the club's High Street building into an attractive garden area.

The high esteem in which Rudy is held by members of his family became quite evident when younger brother David spoke of the impact his presence has had on his siblings

God bless, take care and Thanks for your support, Bobby Borden







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Community-Based Policing Plan Outlined For Neighborhood Council

(continued from page one) program, appoint a citywide community policing coordinator and designate a community policing supervisor in each district. She added that the roles of the community service officer and youth service officer would be redefined and the program would be constantly monitored and reviewed.

In preparing for implementation of the community policing program, a training curriculum would be developed with input from the community, focusing on such issues as problem solving and cultural appreciation. Such training would be instituted for current personnel and recruits, and recruits would be assigned to community policing to complete their academy training.

Doherty stressed the importance of community input in this proposed policing plan. She said that Area Commanders would hold district-level meetings with community leaders to seek input into the components of the program such as determining drop-in locations, storefronts and walk and talk routes. The police would provide the community monthly updates on the

program.

In implementing the program, the police administration would be looking at three aspects: storefronts, drop-in locations and the walk and talk patrol.

Doherty said they are looking to establish storefronts within existing businesses and institutions. Such facilities would include a telephone and desk donated by the business and be selected with community input. She stated that following roll call, the community service officer would report to the storefront on a specific day and time to take reports, answer questions and provide public safety information. She added that the schedule might include specific hours at more than one site in a day.

In addition to the storefront, commanders would identify multiple drop-in locations in each sector. These sites would be determined, Doherty said, with community input and would require the officers to touch base with citizens and/or groups while remaining available to answer calls. She said the plan initially calls for 200-250 sites city-

Another objective of the plan is to expand the walk and talk program. Doherty explained that this program involves a directed period of time during which the officer leaves the police vehicle and walks a predetermined route. She said that the pilot program instituted last October involves approximately 45 minutes per shift and they are looking to expand the time on the streets up to two hours per shift. Once again, community input would be solicited to identify the walking beats. In addition, plans are to include non-uniformed personnel on specific routes, primarily in business districts. She added that the goal is that 90 percent of all available officers would be out of their cars and walking in the neighborhoods daily for a speci-

fic period of time. Doherty stated that Violence Reduction Strategies would be directed at priority locations - specifically those areas with high levels of violence, homicides, firearm violations and aggravated assaults.

Doherty explained that the plan increases the deployment of resources to locations experiencing high levels of violence and allows the department to maximize current resources without affecting other neighborhoods or adversely affecting Priority One response. She stressed that the plan would not take officers from the districts.

Other violence reduction strategies would include warrant apprehension with the police following recent indictments involving violent crimes within priority locations, the developing of a most-wanted list by areas and establishing a court monitoring process to track results.

In addition, an anti-gun strategy would be developed said Doherty with two Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents committed to the police department and the AT&F Task Force. The focus will be the removal of guns from the streets. A community task force would be established to make recommendations toward this end. One suggestion relative to this goal is setting a period of gun amnesty where individuals could turn in guns without fear of prosecution.

Following the presentation, council members questioned the commissioner on policing and the plan. Tom Cunha suggested that

there are some fine police officers from Charlestown and asked whether some of these officers, who know "who's who," could work in this community. Roache said they could ask if these officers want to be involved in the community. Cunha, noting the restrictions for emergency vehicles getting into the community. asked whether a facility such as the ambulance garage at Sullivan Square could be provided for the police. Roache said that such an issue would involve capital planning.


Jim Conway asked Roache if hours the officer would be in the storefront could be publicized much in advance so the residents, especially the elderly, could submit complaints and reports to the officers. He added that he believed the number of complaints would increase as it is presently so difficult to get in town to Area A. Roache said that notice of the storefront hours would be given a week in advance.

Peter Looney commended Area A Community Relations Officer Joe McNulty for his work in Charlestown. Looney went on to say that he didn't want

crime statistics in the neighborhood to escalate before the force is built up locally. He pointed out that Charlestown is growing, is going to continue to grow and a police station is necessary. Roache said that no resources will leave Area A. adding that Charlestown's problems are important to the police administration. He said he would have Ellen Daley contact the city's capital planning office as to the feasibility of a police station and would keep watch on the community's growth.

Roache told the council that community-based policing would probably do more to decrease violence than any other plan. He added that the police department will never solve all the problems but they "will work twice as hard." He also stated that if residents see officers out there doing their jobs well, he would like to know.

Public Safety Committee Chairman Mel Stillman told Roache that he would like to see this policing plan presented to the residents at a community meeting. Roache said such a meeting could be arranged in the near future.



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
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★ City Square — Two pedestrians just missed injury in an early morning construction accident in City Square on Monday, Feb. 25. Several hundred pounds of rock and debris broke loose from the North Washington Street Bridge construction area and came crashing down onto the pedestrian walkway on Water Street. The 8:20 a.m. incident happened with no warning and left construction crews and pedestrians badly shaken, but uninjured.

Jonathan Yeo, an MWRA employee, had just walked across the MDC locks on his way to work in the Charlestown Navy Yard by using the sectioned-off pedestrian walkway through the construction site. He reported that as he was reaching the section of Water Street immediately after the bridge underpass, large rocks and debris "came rushing down right in the middle of the walkway." Yeo stated that another pedestrian just in front of him only missed getting the full weight of the debris on top of him by seconds.

Stephen Collins, community liaison for the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) project stated: "The capstone was dislodged by vibrations caused by construction about 60 feet away. It was an unforeseen and unfortunate accident. We're grateful that no one was hurt."

Massachusetts Department of Public Works spokesperson Jody D'Ursu stated: "We have been assured by Ed Barr, CANA coordinator, that this was a freak accident. Public safety is our top priority." She said that MDPW Chief Engineer George Turner and CANA Administrator Horace DelGrasso toured the site shortly after the incident "to ensure that nothing like this could happen again."

Collins further explained: "The capstones at the pedestrian underpass have been removed and additional precautions are being taken to prevent this from recurring." He also stated: "Sometime during the next week that entire wall will be dismantled. During construction, pedestrians will be rerouted onto the street and police officers will be on duty. The department will also be putting up additional pedestrian signs and marking the pavement to further ensure safety."

Another minor incident was reported on Wednesday, Feb. 27. Construction crews working on the opposite side of Water Street at the end of the North Washington Street Bridge inadvertently dropped debris onto the roadway, nearly missing an automobile just entering the street from the underpass. Barr stated that construction inspectors and detail police officers at the scene at the time of the incident reported that traffic had been stopped while the heavy equipment moved the concrete debris. The driver of one vehicle did not heed the orders, he said, and went ahead resulting in a portion of the debris just missing his car.

Barr added: "We are taking every precaution to ensure the safety of the public in and around the project area. That section of the bridge construction project was closed to all traffic between 9:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. on Feb. 27 while the remaining portion of the bridge was demolished."

★ H.P. Hoods — Two masked gunmen robbed the credit union at H.P. Hoods on Rutherford Avenue on Tuesday, Feb. 26, getting away with an estimated \$70,000.

Boston Police Department Community Relations Officer Joe McNulty reported that the two men entered the rear of the factory around 1:40 p.m. and told the employees, "Don't move and no one will get hurt." One of the suspects was tall with a thin build and wore a three-quarter-length black leather jacket and a gray ski mask. He brandished a large handgun, believed to be a .357 magnum. The other suspect was 5'7" tall, wearing a short tan jacket and a light gray ski mask. It was reported that he carried an automatic handgun.

McNulty stated that a third man was waiting in a light blue Buick in the parking lot. All three fled in the car onto Rutherford Avenue and drove in the direction of Somerville. The car was reported stolen and found in Somerville on Feb. 27.

The incident is being investigated by the FBI, the Boston Police Bank Squad and detectives from Area A.

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
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Educational Programs

Jeanne McCabe, a science teacher at the C.R. Edwards Middle School in Charlestown, is among 12 teachers who will receive funding for innovative energy programs in their schools through Boston Edison's Energy Project Grant Program. The program is designed to help teachers in the Edison service territory implement energy-related lessons or activities in their classroom.

McCabe received a grant to run a project that will assist in the examination of our earth, environment, and examine energy resources for today and the future. Through the project, students will be able to identify pollution and weather's role in its control, gain an understanding of what one can do to help preserve our environment, and examine energy resources that are environmentally safe.

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
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POLICE LINE
