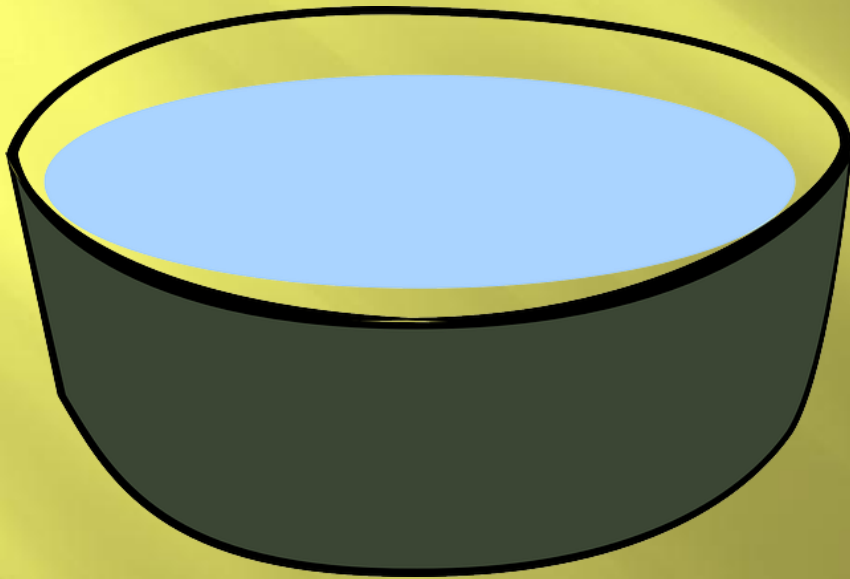

Cameron Udy's Las Vegas Summer Dog Tips



- ▣ The average temperature for Las Vegas during the summer is 100 degrees and over. Just to be clear, May is 88 degrees, after that June is 100 degrees, July is 106 degrees, August is 103.
- ▣ Simply put, Las Vegas is hot during the summer and dog lovers in the Las Vegas, NV area should follow these tips

- ▣ Tip 1: Water
Leave plenty of water in the dish. Check it often to make sure it is full, the hot temperature will naturally evaporate the water in the dish. Remember to rinse the water bowl often. If you look carefully, there are usually random particles and hair...not good for the long term health of your dog.

- ▣ Tip 2: Walks
Your walking schedule will likely change. Early in the mornings and late at night are ideal since the temperature is significantly cooler. Consider getting a leash that is night reflective or one of those collar lights to keep your dog safe.

- ❑ Tip 3: Do not leave your dog in the car. An enclosed car significantly hotter than the outdoor temperature and you dog could die in a matter of minutes in a hot car.

- Tip 4: Beware of the hot concrete.
Yes, if the temperature is hot, it is more than likely that the asphalt or sand is just as hot. Imagine working on a 100+ degrees plus surface. Yep, your feet would burn and your dog's paws are no different. If you have to walk them during the hot temperature try to make sure it is a grassy area or considers doggie shoes.

- ▣ Tip 5: Loud noises. During the summer there are plenty of fireworks. If you won't be home, make sure your dog is in a kennel or a safe area so that the loud noises from the fireworks do not scare them and as a result, your dog gets hurt.

- Tip 6: Swimming
Like a small child, do not leave pets unsupervised around a pool. Not all dogs are good swimmers and if they don't swim at all there is always the danger of them falling in and not knowing how to get out. Even if your dog does not swim...some owners, gently put them in the pool and guide them to the pool stairs so that they know where they can get out. In addition, the chlorine from the pool can easily cause them to become ill.
