



Thursday, March 10 through Sunday, March 13, "Union Maids," an engrossing and moving documentary of the birth and building of industrial unionism in the 1930's, 48 minutes.

Thursday, March 17 through Sunday, March 20, "Eight Minutes to Midnight: A Portrait of Dr. Helen Caldicott," a compelling portrait of the Boston pediatrician, who is a major voice in the anti-nuclear movement, 60 minutes.

CAN'T BEAT A SEP FOR SIMPLICITY

Simplified employee pension plans - SEPs - are similar to Individual Retirement Accounts, but they permit employer contributions much larger than the \$2,000 limit on IRAs. Beginning in 1994, an employer can set aside as much as \$22,500 annually per participant (prior to 1994, the maximum was \$30,000) - including themselves - for retirement purposes. But the word just isn't getting out on SEPs. Although Congress authorized SEPs in 1978 expressly for small businesses, less than 10 percent of all small companies have adopted one.

If you don't like red tape, you'll love a SEP. To set up a SEP, all an employer must do is fill out IRS Form 5305-SEP. The form has just six blank spaces. No other reports or documents are required.

Each employee must establish an IRA at a local financial institution, but employers can set up an account for them. To discourage discrimination, any employee who is over age 21, has worked for the company a minimum of three years, and has earned a least \$300 (subject to inflationary adjustments; for 1993 it's \$385), must participate.

Once each year, the employer decides what percent of payroll - up to 15 percent - to place into each individual's SEP account. Although the same percentage must be used for everyone, the employer can change the percentage from year to year, even skipping years. When the first SEP deposit is made, the employer must mail each worker a copy of Form 5305-SEP, along with a statement of the contributions made. That's the only requirement. Talk about simplicity. The employer doesn't even have to send a copy to the IRS.

SEPs can also be used by self-employed individuals or independent contractors. Since you get to decide how much to contribute each year, SEPs can be an excellent way to stash away funds for retirement if your income has a tendency to fluctuate from year to year.

NOMINATIONS SOUGHT FOR FOURTH ANNUAL COMMUNITY AWARDS RECIPIENTS

The Charlestown Community Appreciation Awards Committee, sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, will hold its fourth annual Community Appreciation Awards Banquet on Saturday, April 23 at the Knights of Columbus hall. After a very successful event last year, the committee is hoping that the community will once again respond to a call for nominations in the seven award categories.

The purpose of the awards ceremony is to recognize those who have helped enrich the quality of life in Charlestown, but have done so in such an unassuming manner that their deeds have gone unheralded and, in most cases, unknown to the general population. Seven award categories have been established to encompass all aspects of the community. Residents, non-residents, businesspersons and employees are urged to take the time to nominate a person, business or organization deserving of recognition.

Persons, businesses and organizations that have previously received recognition for their deeds and members of the committee and the Neighborhood Council are not eligible to receive an award.

Award recipients will be chosen by the committee from nominations received from the community. Persons who sent nominations in the past are requested to resubmit their choices for these awards. If potential recipients would be eligible for consideration in more than one category, submit an entry for each award. The number of entries received does not make that candidate more eligible for consideration. Rather, the quality and description of the good deeds performed, enhances chances of being selected.

AWARD CATEGORIES

• Youth - A Charlestown resident who is 18 years of age or younger as of Jan. 1, 1994 whose deeds have gone unheralded.

• Elderly - A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older by Jan. 1, 1994 whose deeds have gone unheralded.

· Organization - An incorporated non-profit, Charlestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.

 Business — A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown community.

• Public Servant - A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)

 New Resident — A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life. Unsung Hero — A Charlestown resident whose deed/ deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown. ****
