At The Science Museum

Bugs Bunny and Superman are among the animated characters shown in a film fest at Boston's Museum of Science during school vacation week

The 35-minute program also includes Gertie The Dinosaur on Tour, made in 1916-17, as well as a Czech creation. Automatic, made in 1973. The films are shown at 8 p.m. Friday and 1 and 3 p.m., December 26 through January 2. There is no charge above regular Museum admission.

In addition the Arthur D. Little Discovery Room is open on a first-come, first-serve basis Tuesday through Friday, December 27-30, from 1 to 4 p.m. The Planetarium's holiday show. The Christmas Star, is given December 26 -January 2 at 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. at a fee of 50c above Museum admission.

The animation film fest is part of the Museum's current Seeing Is Believing" program, featuring two exhibits.

One is Cartoon Creation: The Art of Animation that consists of an activity center where visitors make their own paper film strips and of a display of paintings and drawings from the Disney and other studios. More than 100 pieces of original animation artwork represent film classics.

The other exhibit is 3-D, a unique collection of photos, paintings, and technical devices developed to create threedimensional images. A slide show viewed with 3-D glasses and a 3-D video game are among its attractions.

Departing from its fall-winter schedule, the Museum is open on the Mondays after Christmas and after New Year's Day. It is also open on New Year's Day itself. The Museum closes at 2 p.m. December 24 but remains open until 5 p.m. December 31

Poinsettias -Beautiful But Beware

Mistletoe, holly berries. and the traditional poinsettia plants are as much a part of Christmas as Santa Claus and his reindeer. But for young children who may touch and taste these decorations rather than just look, the fruits and berries of the season can turn into poisons.

Robert Raffauf, professor of medicinal chemistry at Northeastern University in Boston, said that swallowing these plants can cause nausea, vomiting, and diarrhea. "Mistletoe berries, for example, contain a chemical called tyramine - normally found in the body in small amounts - which can cause abdominal pain, diarrhea, hypertension, vomiting, and even cardiovascular collapse if ingested in large enough quantities," he

Raffauf, who studies drug plants, said that as a general rule, parents should avoid tempting toddlers or even older children with plants that have either white or red berries.

But if a child has eaten

a number of these berries. the usual treatment is to administer syrup of ipecac to induce vomiting." he

Poinsettias also may be troublesome if any part of the plant is ingested. "It could cause abdominal discomfort or nausea, and the milky sap from the plant's leaves can cause skin irritations in some people." he said.

Raffauf warned that plants are not the only potential poisons of the season. "Tinsel may contain lead and tin, neither of which should be swallowed, and angel hair is spun fiber glass which can irritate skin and eyes. While not poisonous, pine needles and bay berries can cause considerable stomach problems if eaten." he said.

Of course, the incidence of poisoning from Christmas plants and decorations is rather low." Raffauf said. "But to ensure a happy holiday, it is best to keep these items out of the reach of small children







Massport Approves Foreign Trade Zone For Charlestown Warehouse



DUDDY'S TIRE WAREHOUSE, a long time Charlestown landmark, will soon be designated Boston Foreign Trade Zone No. 27. replacing the zone now operating at

Commonwealth Pier. Once approved by the Foreign Trade Zone Board, it is expected the zone will be in use by mid-spring.

By the end of the coming spring. Charlestown residents will see the relocation of Boston Foreign Trade Zone No. 27, to the long-vacated Duddy Tire Company warehouse in Charlestown

Currently located at Commonwealth Pier, the zone must be moved to make way for the planned high tech center call BOSCOM. Once moved, the zone will be under the management of McNeil & Associates, Inc., a Westwood based real estate development company. MassPort manages the current zone.

Although MassPort's board of directors approved the move last week, the Federal Foreign Trade Zone Board must also approve MassPort's application to relocate the zone.

Established in 1934, a foreign trade zone is a federally - mandated "island" where goods entering or leaving the country will be exempt from customs duties, excise taxes, import quotas and bonding costs.

(the parcel on which the zone will be located involves two large brick building separated by a court yard and a decaying pier) have been vacant a long time. We had considered housing but that was too massive a project. I think this will be a big plus for Charlestown,' said Flaherty.

Carolyn Yee Wong,

Development Analyst of MassPort said the old warehouse was chosen because of its easy access by water or over land. She did not see an immediate change in traffic patterns on Medford Street as only 17 companies presently use the foreign trade zone at Commonwealth Pier. However. Wong did see McNeil & Associates being

more aggressive in soliciting additional tenants for their foreign trade zone building. What this means in traffic flow, in the future, is unknown.

Also unknown is whether Charlestown businesses will be able to take advantage of the zone. Designed to help small businesses with their cash flow by not



History Comes To Life Through Giant Panorama

While summer may be hard for us to comprehend right now, Michael W. Domoretsky and Joseph Patti have the season firmly in mind with artistic goals set. They will be part of the Donald McKay Festival set for June and being organized by the New England Historic Seaport, located in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Artist Domoretsky and his financier/protege Patti are combining talents to produce three giant panoramas of Boston History through the ancient art of Pyroyephy or in simpler terms, the burning or scoring of a design into wood.

By June, Domoretsky will have spent nearly 10,000 hours on three panels, measuring a total 80 feet and depicting the Battle at Bunker Hill, the Boston Tea Party and Colonial Boston during the 1700s. Excited over their project, the New England Historic Seaport, has

agreed to display the young artists' murals at the Commonwealth Pier where the tall ships will be docked during the festival. New England Historic Seaport also was responsible for bringing in the majestic ships in 1976 and 1980.

A self-taught artist, Domoretsky feels honored that he will be participating in a festival designed to enrich the Boston community with historical pride. He feels there is particular significance to his artwork as it depicts history through an obsolete art. "I've spent a lot of time researching this era and realize the significant part Boston has played in shaping this country. I don't think people fully realize where we have come from. I don't think they know how bloody the Battle of Bunker Hill was.

"I think people will be glad to know that a local artist created these murals and not some outsider from

New York,' said Domoretsky, a Chelsea native.

Domoretsky hails his long-time friend Patti for making his murals possible. Patti is a custom furniture designer and owner of Patti Construction Company, located in East Boston. While helping Domoretsky finance his project. Patti has been taking advantage of Domoretsky's skills and is learning the art as the murals are completed.

Together the two hope to travel with the Spirit of Massachusetts, a Sailing School Ship being built by the New England Historic Seaport which will travel internationally on a goodwill mission to promote the Commonwealth, her businesses and institutions.

The murals are Domoretsky's largest undertaking, to date. At Salisbury Beach in Mas-







Now is the time that the last-minute shoppers among us are out looking for the "perfect gift." And perfect gifts, as any shopper knows, are difficult to come by. Finding one takes either much thought or a lot of luck.

One of my favorite perfect-gift stories is about a carpenter who didn't have much money...but did have many children. He solved his problem by constructing toys (with scraps of wood he had salvaged from past jobs) for each of his children. This carpenter made such toys as doll houses and cradles for his daughters, and forts and sleds for his sons.

Thanks to all of the thought and hard work, he produced quite a collection of perfect gifts—at least a half dozen, if I recall correctly.

That's an old story that dates back to the hard times of the Great Depression. But perfect-gift stories come in countless forms...and one of dramatic scope unfolded last

This was the story announcing that the newly-organized

National Arts Stabilization Fund had selected cultural institutions in Greater Boston as the first to benefit from the fund. Eligible cultural organizations will be able to compete for a share of \$6 million to strengthen themselves financially. For example, an institution chosen to receive a grant might use the money to eliminate deficits, establish a cash reserve, and ward off fiscal crunches.

In short, some of our fine cultural institutions will be put in a stronger position to enrich our community. That is a gift to all of us.

But like the children of the carpenter in the brief anecdote above, all of the institutions who receive grants will be deserving. That is part of this program—to reward merit. So whatever is granted will be earned.

Still, in looking at this from a Christmas aspect, we are talking about an excellent example of a perfect gift. It was well thought out. Organized by the Ford Foundation, the fund was carefully formulated to increase the financial strength of arts organizations.

Another positive factor about the National Arts Stabilization Fund is that it is a cooperative effort that involves local corporations. Some of Boston's leading business institutions have contributed up to \$75,000 to this fund.

And it was backed by local and state government to make this another fine example of the growing public-private partnership.

It is expected that from 10 to 15 cultural organizations in this area will receive grants, which will be spread over the next five years

Nationally, the fund hopes to raise \$33 million to 1987 with other cities' cultural institutions being targeted for grants in the years ahead. I am proud that Boston was the first chosen, because it reflects the interest and effort of a great many people in the metropolitan area in keeping the arts a vital part of our lives.

Much credit for the Boston area's selection should go to the Greater Boston Arts Fund, Inc., the local partner of the national fund, and to the Massachusetts Council on the Arts and Humanities, the Permanent Charity Fund, and to corporations of the area, all of whom worked together to establish the local fund.

A great deal of thought and effort has gone into the Fund, both nationally and locally. The grant to the cultural in-

You're trying out for size...



Steering Clear Of Winter Emergencies

New England is notorious for its rapidly changing weather, especially in winter. A driver may start out on a clear and bright day and end up in the midst of a snow or ice storm.

For that reason, AAA Massachusetts recommends that you carry the following items in your car:

- Windshield scraper with long handle and brush for easy snow removal.
 - · Can of windshield de-icing spray.
- Extra windshield washer fluid (antifreeze type).
- Old cardboard milk carton or plastic bottle of sand or kitty gravel.
- · Small snow shovel.
- · Trac-Treds wire mesh strips for "getting unstuck."
- · Wire drying spray for moisture problems

- Flares for protection remain good indefinitely if protective coating is not penetrated.
- Old blanket or coat for extra warmth if you're stuck, for protection if you have to get out in rain or snow, to put on the ground if you have to change a tire, or to put under the wheels if you need extra traction.

Of course, no one can ever be fully prepared for a storm emergency, but there are some additional things that can help you out - boots and heavy socks, a first aid kit and some of those high energy foods that hikers use.


'Rats' To Debut December 27th



Fuel Assistance Program At Kennedy Center

ABCD's Fuel Assistance Program is working to keep families warm this winter - whether they heat their homes with gas, oil, electricity, wood or other forms of heating.

Low-income residents of Charlestown may be eligible for help in paying this winter's heating bills through the Fuel Assistance Program, operated by Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD). The staff there encourages people to apply now for fuel assistance payments.

Workers at the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center, located at 27 Winthrop Street(phone 241-8866) have been helping neighborhood people fill out applications to determine if they are eligible for fuel assistance. The office is open Monday - Friday, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., and evenings by appointment only.

Applicants have until April 30, 1984 to apply for fuel assistance. Constance Carey, ABCD Energy Director, advises all prospective applicants to provide the following information, in order to qualify for this year's program and receive assistance as soon as possible:

1) Proof of all sources of income for at least the 90-day period preceding the application for all household members aged 18 years and older. (Include letters from appropriate schools or colleges if household members are full-time students):

 A copy of the most recent bill for the primary source of heat. (If the heat has been shut off prior to application, a copy of the final bill will suffice);

3) Either a current mortgage statement (if home is owned), or a current rent receipt (if applicants rents their home or apartment).

In some cases, applicants whose heat is included in their rent can receive assistance. They should provide at least 90 days worth of rent receipts or a letter from the landlord stating the monthly rent for the apartment, and a statement indicating the amount of arrearages, if applicable.

In order to receive assistance under the Low Income



Since no application can be processed without all this information, applicants are urged to bring these records with them when they apply. Anyone with questions or problems concerning their applications should contact the Kennedy Center at 241-8866 or the ABCD central office. 178 Tremont Street. Boston at 357-6012

The state's Executive Office of Communities and Development has designated ABCD as the administering agency for the 1983-84 Low Income Energy Assistance Program for eligible residents. During the past seven years, the program has provided fuel assistance paymen's on behalf of tens of thousands of families.

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

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Residents Express Concern Over Massport Activities In Charlestown

On Friday, December 16, 1983, a group of concerned citizens from the Charlestown community attended the Massport Authority Board of Directors meeting held at 99 High Street in Boston. At this meeting, each member of the Massport Board of Directors was presented with a prepared questionnaire on important issues relative to Massport and its future plans for its maritime properties in Charlestown; the impact of these plans as they concern Charlestown, its residents, and the impact upon Charlestown as a community.

AND RESIDENCE OF THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY

Those in attendance from Charlestown included John Kelly. Ed Johnson, Leo Carey, Dan McGoff, and Kevin Gallagher. John Kelly presented copies of the questions to the Board and asked for the Board Members to respond at their earliest convenience.

Following this presentation, Massport promised to meet with the concerned citizens on these questions after the holidays at the Massport offices in Boston and to follow up with a meeting in the Charlestown community.

The following are the statements and questions presented to the Massport Board:

1) Dangerous truck and other vehicular traffic in and out of Moran Docks, Schiavone's Junk Yard, and Mystic Pier poses a serious threat to the safety of all community residents who use the Charlestown High and the Community

What does Massport intend to do, if anything to rectify this problem and decrease the potential danger to community residents?

2) For eight hours or more, five days per week, 52 weeks per year. Massport, through its operations at the Mystic Bridge, Schiavone's Junk Yard, Moran Docks, and Mystic Pier. contributes to a very serious air pollution problem via the particulate matter which floats in the air in the form of

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dust clouds, created by the metal dust particulates disbursed from the operations at Schiavone's Junk Yard, and the diesel exhaust from the many trucks using the container terminal at Moran and the Mystic Pier. These clouds float over our high school athletic fields and facilities and neighboring houses, posing a serious health hazard to community residents, not to mention the people who work daily

What, if anything does Massport intend to do about alleviating this situation and helping to clean up our air, and also our homes which are dirtied by these floating "dust

3) Now that Massport has made many alterations in its flight plans to placate the residents of East Boston, what does Massport intend to do, if anything, to alleviate the increasing "noise pollution" created by the increase in the number of flights which depart Logan and come into Logan over Charlestown as a result of the new flight plans?

4) What type of emergency plan, if any, does Massport have to insure the safety of residents of Charlestown against potential hazards which may arise from an accident involving dangerous and or poisonous chemical cargo which is being transported through the Charlestown community enroute to its point of delivery?

5) There is a story circulating through the Charlestown community that Massport intends to terminate its operations at the Moran Docks and Mystic Pier in the not too dis-

Is this true?

If so, when will these operations be terminated?

What will happen to the people who are employed at these facilities'

What does Massport intend to do with these facilities once they are closed?

Will they be turned into more pieces of "real estate" like many of the other waterfront facilities such as the Boston Fish Pier, Commonwealth Pier, Hoosac Pier, and East Boston Pier 1? Is condominium development in the plans?

What is Massport's short range plans for its waterfront facilities in Charlestown in the next five years?

What is Massport's long range plans for its waterfront facilities in Charlestown?

Is Massport interested in the growth of shipping in the Port of Boston and managing a working and thriving seaport or are its priorities geared more towards the development of real estate and the business of becoming professional landlords under the cloak of "property management and development"?

6) What, if any, are Massport's plans for increasing the number of Administrative and Union Positions of Charlestown residents who are employed by Massport?

Does Massport intend to improve its impact on the Charlestown community? We the residents of Charlestown understand that we are an "impacted area", but must that impact be so negative? What does Massport intend to do to make its impact upon the Charlestown community a more positive one the immediate future, and also in years to come? We choose to live here and intend to continue to do so. What about Massport?



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

WHY IS SNACKING BAD FOR THE TEETH?

Two factors determine the harmful effect of snacking: the amount of sugar in the snack and the number of times you snack.

We all know candy, cookies and cake are high in sugar, but many foods and snacks contain "hidden" sugar. You must read package labels carefully to see if there is sugar as an ingredient.

The more often teeth are exposed to sugar, the higher the chance for decay. If sweets are consumed, it would be better as part of a meal or at least limited to as few separate times as possible. In either case, try to brush or rinse within 20 minutes after eating any sugar - containing foods.

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

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
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
