

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



The project's objective was to clean up the neighborhoods impacted directly by the Tobin Bridge operations. 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

'Charlestown In The 19th Century' At The Charlestown Branch Library

Being a major port on the East Coast and home to the Boston Navy Yard were important elements in the development of Charlestown in the 1800's. seven decades.



MAKING LIFETIME GIFTS COULD REDUCE YOUR TAXES

If you want certain individuals to receive property from your estate, there may be an advantage to making those gifts while you are still alive. Assuming you have adequate financial security for the remainder of your lifetime, consider these advantages of making lifetime gifts:

 The tax law permits a married individual to make gifts of any amount to a spouse without incurring any gift tax.

 Any post-gift appreciation in the asset is not subject to estate tax in the donor's estate. Any property that is appreciating rapidly is a good candidate for lifetime gifting.

To individuals other than your spouse, you can transfer \$10,000 per year, per recipient, without incurring any gift tax. Such transfers not only reduce your estate, but if the property is incomeproducing, the future income is taxed to the gift recipient. If your spouse joins in the giving, you can transfer \$20,000 annually to each recipient.

Currently, estates of up to \$600,000 pay no federal estate taxes. If your total estate is less than \$600,000, there is one good reason for keeping the assets in your estate. Most property which passes through an estate gets what is known as a "stepup" in basis. If you have property which you acquired for \$10,000, but which now has a fair market value of \$100,000, the \$90,000 of built-in gain would go untaxed if the asset passes through your estate. If you give the property during your lifetime, the recipient is considered to have a \$10,000 cost in the property and would pay income tax on the \$90,000 if he sells the property.

If the property passes through the estate, the tax law sets the cost basis at the fair market value in the estate, in this case \$100,000. If the recipient of that property sells it for \$100,000 after receiving it from the estate, there would be no income tax due on the sale.

In the evening, a North End-style dinner accompanied the terrific view of the USS Constitution at the Hull Room in Build-





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Warning Notices Issued To Downtown Drivers

Since Friday, Boston's team of 100 Parking Enforcement Officers have left 5,000 courtesy tags on the windshield of cars parked downtown.

The tags warn drivers that, as of Tuesday, Sept. 9, parking regulations on heavily traveled downtown streets will be strictly enforced in an effort to ease traffic congestion and safety problems stemming from the increasing number of construction projects in the city.

In addition to courtesy tags, the notification process also includes letters which have been sent to residents and merchants in downtown neighborhoods and 10,000 flyers that will be distributed throughout the target area beginning today.

Boston Mayor Thomas M. Menino said, "Everything possible is being done to warn drivers that as of Tuesday, Sept. 9 those who do not voluntarily comply with downtown

parking regulations should expect to be ticketed or towed. We are optimistic that the widespread and diverse notification process used will ensure that voluntarily compliance will enforcement outweigh measures."

The first components of the plan is stepped-up rush hour enforcement on selected streets. The following eight major arterials will be targeted during the morning rush hour:

- · Cambridge Street
- · Clarendon Street
- · Congress Street · Devonshire Street
- · High Street · Kneeland Street
- North Washington Street
- · Tremont Street

Seven downtown thoroughfares will be targeted during the afternoon rush hour:

- · Berkeley Street
- · Cambridge Street
- · Clarendon Street
- · Congress Street
- · Essex Street

· North Washington Street

· Tremont Street

The second component of the initiative involves a Enforcement Strike Force performing concentrated mid-day enforcement in downtown problem areas. The areas are:

- Government Center and Downtown Crossing -Cambridge, Clinton, Congress, North, State, Tremont and Union streets and the Downtown Crossing area
- Central Artery/Tunnel Project Work Areas - Atlantic Avenue, India Street, Leather District, Surface Artery
- · Back Bay Boylston and Newbury streets
- · Commonwealth Avenue Corridor - Commonwealth, Huntington and Massachusetts avenues, and Dartmouth Street

One problem area each day will be targeted on a random basis. Regulations that will be strictly en-

forced include the following: Double Parking - \$40 fine, Fire Hydrant - \$50 fine, Crosswalks - \$40 fine, No Parking Within 20 Feet of an Intersection - \$40 fine, Handicap Ramps -\$50 fine, Loading Zones -\$25 fine.

Transportation Commissioner Jack Magee said, "Due to the combination of heavy traffic and expanded construction activity, increased and strict enforcement is necessary to maintain access into and around the downtown for both the general public and emergency vehicles. I strongly encourage Boston drivers to heed all posted parking regulations throughout the city to avoid the frustration and expense involved in have your car ticketed and towed."

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
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
