Celebrate HarborPark Day On Sept. 18

The 10th annual Harborpark Day celebration, sponsored by the Boston Redevelopment Authority will be held on Sunday, Sept. 18, from noon to 6 p.m. at Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Mayor Thomas Menino said, "Harborpark Day is our way to welcome residents as well as visitors to our historic waterfront to show them what the waterfront contributes to our city. We look forward once again to making this a day for family entertainment."

As in past years, the Harborpark Day celebration will be held in conjunction with the annual "Chowda" fest, sponsored by Horizons For Youth, a non-profit organization

that provides outdoor education, counseling and camping programs for inner city children in need. Fifteen Boston area restaurants, including the Charlestown 99 Restaurant & Pub, will prepare over 100 gallons of clam chowder to compete for the 1994 "Chowda Champ" title as chowder afficionados travel from booth to booth tasting the various offerings and voting for their favorite chowder.

The admission fee for visitors is \$6 for adults and \$3 for senior citizens and children under 12. All proceeds will be used to support Horizons For Youth.

The Harborpark Day celebration also offers many children's activities including Disney characters, face painting, sea-of-balls, moonwalks, an old fashioned carousel and barnyard animals, as well as continuous "live music."

A harbor flotilla consisting of a water and siren display will feature fire and police vessels representing the Boston Fire Department, Boston Harbor Patrol, Massport Fire Department and the Mass. State Police.

Local Charlestown vendors will be available to sell food and specialty items. Vendors interested in participating should contact Arthur Reilly at 722-4333, ext. 4316 for details.

Water shuttle service will be provided by the MBTA and Boston Harbor Cruises from 11:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. between Long Wharf and Navy Yard Pier 4 with boats departing every 15 minutes.

All Harborpark Day activities and events, with the exception of the "Chowda''fest, are free.





Monuments in Charlestown Are Cleaned And Waxed

Massachusetts SOS! (Save Outdoor Sculpture) is a collaborative effort among statewide and municipal preservation and art organizations to inventory over 1500 pieces of sculpture throughout Mass. The principal sponsors are the National Memorial Trust, the Strauss Center for Conservation at the Harvard University Art Museums and the Mass. Historical Commission.

It is designed to establish a thorough information base and to focus attention on preservation of outdoor sculpture. Funding for Save Outdoor Sculpture! is provided by The Pew Charitable Trusts, The Getty Grant Program and the Henry Luce Foundation. Massachusetts SOS! is funded in part by a grant from the Mass. Cultural Council and 21 local arts councils.

The monument to William Prescott, on the grounds of the Bunker Hill Monument was commissioned by the Bunker Hill Monument Association in 1881 to commemorate Prescott's involvement in the Battle of Bunker Hill, that took place on Breed's Hill in



June of 1775. The artist was William Wetmore Story (1819-1895).

The monument is part of the Boston National Historical Park and its maintenance is the responsibility of the National Park Service (NPS).

The clean-up crew included Phillip Hunt and Laura King, a Park Ranger, who used Orvus detergent and water to wash the bronze figure, and then applied "Butcher's Bowling Alley Wax" as a protective coating.

They worked under the supervision of Brooke Childry, a museum technician with the National Park Service, who received her training in the maintenance of outdoor sculpture from Jean Louis Lechevre, sculpture conservator at the Museum of Fine Arts, Department of Objects Conservation and Scientific Research.

The cleaning and waxing helps to prevent weathering which creates the green corrosive coloring on bronze. Spending one day a year on preventive maintenance saves thousands of dollars in repair work that results from neglect.

The Prescott monument had last been treated about 10 years ago by Jean Louis Lechevre and has been maintained by the NPS annually over the past six years. The NPA staff also cleaned the marble statue to Joseph Warren Park inside the Park Service buildings, and the carved stone blocks and bronze plaques nearby.

The National Memorial Trust is available to assist communities in strategic planning and fund raising for the repair and future maintenance of outdoor sculpture. With the help of local volunteers, including Gerry Shea of Charlestown, National Monument Trust is completing an inventory of all outdoor sculpture in Mass.

Preparations for paving have been completed this week on Monument Square and Pleasant Street. The old pavement surface has been ground, swept and patched and the manhole covers and catch basins have been adjusted to meet the grade of the new pavement surface. Weather permitting, the finish pavement is scheduled for Friday, Sept. 16.

Installation of precast bases for new gas street lights is currently proceeding on Monument Avenue. Boston Gas Company crews are installing service piping to the bases to feed the lamps that will be set at a later date. Crews will shortly begin patching the trenches in the street and sidewalk that result from this work.

Final clean-up and completion of Winthrop, Tremont and Union streets continues. Included is the installation of new street names signs and miscellaneous traffic control signs. Crosswalks will be placed at the street corners to connect the newly constructed sidewalk wheelchair ramps. Tree plantings are now scheduled on Union and Tremont streets for the last week of this month.

Upcoming work on the project includes preparation for and placement of a new pavement surface on Monument Avenue and the installation of additional gas light poles and fixtures on various other streets.

Residents are reminded that weekday parking restrictions remain in effect as posted on those streets where construction work is taking place. Continued cooperation in complying with these restrictions is appreciated.

BREAKEVEN ANALYSIS -AN IMPORTANT BUSINESS TOOL

Breakeven analysis can mean the difference between making money in your business or going broke. Breakeven is defined as the sales volume at which your revenue exactly covers the costs of running the business. When you are at breakeven, you are neither making money nor losing money.

Breakeven works like this. Let's say that the only items your business sells are widgets. You buy them for \$2 each and sell them for \$3. Your total operating expenses are \$50 per day. What is the daily sales volume at which you neither make nor lose any money (your breakeven point)?

Sales (50 widgets) \$150
Cost of Goods Sold (variable costs) 100
Gross Profit \$50
Less: Operating Expenses (fixed costs)
Net Profit 50

Your breakeven point is 50 widgets or \$150 in sales.

Breakeven can be computed with a simple formula. First, compute your gross profit percentage (gross profit divided by sales). In our example, gross profit percentage is 33.3% (\$50 + \$150). Then divide your fixed costs by your gross profit percentage to arrive at breakeven. In our example, that's \$50 divided by 33.3% or \$150, which is the breakeven point in our example.

Our example is oversimplified to illustrate our point, but the breakeven formula can be used in any business. It is necessary to properly identify "variable costs" (those that vary directly with sales volume) and "fixed costs" (those which do not vary with sales volume) to accurately compute your breakeven point.

If your business is losing money, knowing your breakeven point will tell you how much sales must increase to eliminate the losses. If you are making money, the analysis will help you increase profitability. 

men of this organization recognize your outstanding qualifications and dedication to the working men and women of Mass."

Kelly Gay also received the endorsement of the International Brotherhood of Police Officers. Raymond McGrath, legislative agent, declared, "Your support of those who are called upon to protect and serve is appreciated. We really appreciate when elected officials such as yourself stand with us when it counts, with a vote to enable us to get our job done in a safe, professional manner."



Once-In-A-Lifetime Housing Exclusion

Taxpayers 55-years-old or older may be entitled to special tax treatment when it comes to the sale of their principal residence. "Those that meet the necessary age, ownership, and use tests can exclude up to \$125,000 of any gain on the sale of their principal residence," said Francine Crowley, Boston IRS district director.

The residence in this case may be a house, a condominium, a cooperative, a houseboat or a mobile home.

In general terms, the requirements necessary before the gain can be excluded are:

1. the property owner is

55-years-old or older on the date of sale;

- during the five-year period prior to the date of the sale, the property owner owned and lived in his or her principal residence for at least three years, and;
- 3. the property owner, or his or her spouse, has never excluded gain on the sale of a home after July 26, 1978.

Specific qualifiers apply to all of these requirements. More detailed information is available in the IRS Publication 523, "Selling Your Home." To obtain this publication, free of charge, call 1-800-829-

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

Baril And Bunker Hill Health Center Teams To 'Make Strides Against Breast Cancer'

More than 10,000 people from around the state will gather in Boston to Make Strides Against Breast Cancer on Sunday, Sept. 25. The walkers are expected to raise \$1 million to fight breast cancer at the American Cancer Society's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer five-mile walk.

Part of that money will be raised by Christine Baril of Charlestown, an employee of Computer Associates in Dedham, who is heading up a group at work in honor of her mother, who died of breast cancer last year.

The walk will start and end at the Hatch Shell on the Charles River Esplanade. Registration begins at 10 a.m. along with a breast cancer information fair, exhibits and demonstrations. Walkers will get underway at 11 a.m.

"The tragedy is that today everyone knows someone who has been touched by breast cancer," said Mary E. Costanza M.D., chairperson of the American Cancer Society's Breast Cancer Task Force. "Making Strides Against Breast Cancer gives everyone - young, old, men as well as women - an opportunity to raise money to fight this disease. Best of all, it's a walk that is easy and fun to participate in."

Costanza noted that every dollar raised by the walk will support local American Cancer Society programs of breast cancer research and education, outreach programs to bring free mammograms to low income and uninsured women, patient advocacy and the society's toll-free telephone information service.

Dozens of local groups from around the state, including this area, are scheduled to participate in the event including schools, companies, churches, hospitals and other organizations. Several groups will be participating in honor of breast cancer survivors such as the team from the MGH Bunker Hill Health

Center. Last year the team was comprised of 50 staff members and community residents, with 242 sponsors. They raised \$2,600 for the cause last year, and this year hope to double it. To join or sponsor the Health Center team, contact Karen Murphy-Lind, R.N. at 242-5704.

This year, approximately 5,000 Mass. women will learn that they have breast cancer and 1,300 will die from the disease, according to the American Cancer Society. 
