Development Issues Highlight Neighborhood Council Meeting

Discussions at the June meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council centered around the future development plans of various land parcels in the community. Scheduling upcoming meetings to address these development issues created havoc when the council voted to suspend all meetings during the month of August, including the regular monthly council gathering. Committee chairpersons will be forced to squeeze in their hearings in order to make a report to the council at its July 10 meeting.

Council members present included Dennis McLaughlin, chairman; Bill Galvin, vice chairman; Stephen Collins, secretary; and members Moe Gillen, Bob Scalli, Kay Whelan, Ken Stone, Jim Conway, Ellen D'Ambrosio, Jim Mansfield, Mel Stillman, Kevin Roche, Bud Coleman, Tom Cunha, Kate McDonough, and Bob Wallace.

The meeting opened with a brief slide presentation on the National Park Service's Junior Ranger Program. Under the guidance of the program's advisor, Ranger Jonathan Schafner, Junior Rangers explained the pur-

pose of the National Park Service and the goal of the Junior Ranger Program.

Schafner announced that the program, for Charlestown youngsters between the ages of 12 and 15 who volunteer their time, is a NPS pilot program at the Charlestown Navy Yard that "is here to stay." He added, "It is here to assist the community."

Development plans for the Thompson Square triangle were questioned by the Whelan family who are anticipating the dedication of the proposed park in honor of Edward "Gus" Whelan. Council member Whelan requested an update on the development plans "after many months of hearing no news on the project."

McLaughlin stated that he had heard conflicting stories ranging from difficulties with the architect to possible financial shortages.

Galvin requested that the Preservation Society, developers of the site, come before the council with a formal presentation, to which McLaughlin added "at our next meeting." The council voted to unanimously endorse this request. Efforts will be made to schedule a meeting with the Preservation Society, interested members of the council and the Whelan family prior to the July council meeting.

Public Safety Committee Mel Stillman, chairperson

Stillman reported on the committee's May 15 meeting at which representatives from the Health & Hospitals Department presented a slide show on their services and discussed the proper disposal of drug paraphernalia found in public areas.

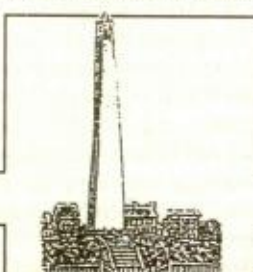

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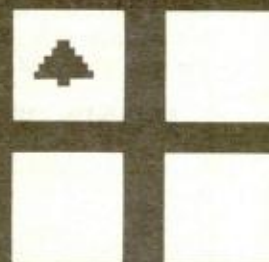

Police were called in to disburse a gathering of Charlestown High School students on Medford Street Wednesday afternoon.

The American Cancer Society's Jail & Bail fundraiser will give you a chance to send that special person to jail. Your boss, spouse, neighbor or friend will be carted off by a police officer, appear at a mock trial and jailed, all in good fun to raise money for local American Cancer Society programs.

This year's event will take place at Ironside Nautilus in the Charlestown Navy Yard between June 27 and 29. Off-duty police officers and community volunteers will be taking on the roles of arresting officers, presiding justices and bailiffs in simulated arrests that will conclude with the culprit calling his friends and associates for bail money before being set free.

The arrest will begin

with someone calling the American Cancer Society requesting that the authorities come and apprehend their culprit by pledging \$25 as an arrest fee. An off-duty police officer will come and apprehend the arrestee and whisk him off to jail. Charges will range from indecent exposure from the neck up to unfair labor practices.

At the Navy Yard Jailhouse, bail will be set and a telephone provided for the jailee to make calls to raise the needed funds to break out of the hoosegow.

Meter Committee Calls Its Work A Victory For The Community

The Parking Meter Committee of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council will continue to monitor the 84 recently installed meters in the Navy Yard and is calling the list of compromises from the city a victory. At a Monday night meeting, committee Chairperson and Navy Yard resident Ellen D'Ambrosio said she was pleased with the results of discussions with representatives of the Boston Transportation Department and the Boston Redevelopment Authority.

To date, the committee has worked with BTDA to shorten metered hours from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. to 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. and eliminate them on Saturdays and Sundays. Removing any of the parking meters would only be a short-term solution, according to Mike Collins of the BTDA. D'Ambrosio said that the committee will

research the possibility of reduced rates for residents in the public parking garage on 13th Street since the parking problems will get worse as development of the Yard continues.

The committee will also follow up on city agreements to open BRA staff parking spots on Sixth and Seventh streets before 8 a.m., after 6 p.m. and on weekends. Commercial loading zones and non-residential handicapped spaces will also be available at these times. The BRA and other spaces mean about 20 less-restricted spaces for Navy Yard residents. A loading zone for Massachusetts Water Resources Authority vans on Seventh Street is also being investigated.

"We have gotten concessions from the city, and the committee will let things go forward as they are," D'Ambrosio said.

Neighborhood Council Meeting

He stated that residents can call 725-3500 for questions and information from Health & Hospitals, but that all calls for medical emergencies should go through the 911 emergency system.

Stillman requested the council recommend and support the continuation of the ambulance service presently in operation at Sullivan Square. The service, established through mitigation with the Massachusetts Department of Public Works as part of the CANA roadway construction project, is facing serious funding problems, he reported. Stillman asked the council for assistance to maintain the 16-hour per day emergency ambulance service in the community by sending letters to appropriate legislators and the MDPW. The council voted unanimously to forward its vote of support.

Stone, who is also co-chairman of the North Area Task Force, stated that his committee would also send correspondence in support of the continuance of the needed medical coverage in Charlestown.

Parking Meter Committee
Ellen D'Ambrosio, chairperson

D'Ambrosio reported on two meetings to discuss the installation of parking meters in the Charlestown Navy Yard. She stated that a reduction of the number of meters was requested as was the establishment of additional parking spaces for Navy Yard residents.

Mansfield, Boston Transportation Department analyst, said that the depart-

ment is continuing in its efforts to make more on-street parking spaces available to residents, but stated: "Meetings on the placement of meters within the Navy Yard had taken place a few years ago and the overall parking scheme for the Navy yard, including the placement of meters, had been approved by the Neighborhood Council when they voted to endorse the Navy Yard Master Plan."

D'Ambrosio said that since the first public meeting on the matter an additional 20 parking spaces have been opened up to the residents by shortening the hours of enforcement at the meters as well as at loading zones.

She expressed her opinion that future meetings on the subject would not be necessary, but McLaughlin disagreed. He said that he felt more discussion was needed to address loading zones, double parking and other concerns expressed to him by both business persons and residents.

Mansfield told the council that the Basic Services Committee would be scheduling a meeting with the BTD on resident parking programs and that these concerns could be addressed at that meeting. At this time, no date has been set for this meeting.

Veterans' Committee
Jim Conway, chairperson

Conway reported that no committee meetings had been held on the Korean War Memorial proposed for Shipyard Park in the Charlestown Navy Yard, but that the Boston Redevelopment

Authority Board of Directors had granted approval for the Korean Veterans of Massachusetts to proceed with their plans. This vote will enable them to begin fundraising endeavors, he stated.

Conway also said that a scale model of the proposed memorial will be displayed on a float in the Bunker Hill Day Parade.

Haul Road Committee
Moe Gillen, Bob Wallace co-chairpersons

Gillen reported that no meetings had been held in the past month. He said that it was important that votes of the development committee and council include the reinforcement of the council's demand to developers of Navy Yard parcels to incorporate the haul road into their plans. "It's an integral part of the Navy Yard development," he added.

New England Aquarium Committee-of-the-Whole
Dennis McLaughlin, chairperson

McLaughlin reported that the NEA presented its development proposal to the BRA Board on May 17, at which time the Board took the proposal under advisement. He did announce that the Board voted at its May 31 meeting to give the NEA tentative designation for Parcel 5/ Dry Dock 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Election Committee
Kevin Roche, chairperson

Since Roche is up for reelection, McLaughlin requested a volunteer to organize the September election for at-large candidates. No volunteers were forthcoming at the meeting.

Development Committee
Tom Cunha, chairperson

After a few month's lull in committee meetings, Cunha reported that development plans for 23-24 Common St., Parcel R-107 — 253-261a Main St. and 3a Lawnwood Place, Building 104 and Parcels 4 and 7 in the Charlestown Navy Yard have come forward for review.

After much discussion on prioritizing the projects, Cunha announced a schedule of meetings to address The Raymond Group proposal to construct a hotel on Parcel 4 and a bio-tech/office facility on Parcel 7, both located at the Yard's End section of the Navy Yard. At the first meeting on Tuesday, June 19, The Raymond Group will make a formal presentation of its proposal to the committee and the community. A public meeting on June 26 will allow residents to comment on the proposals. A third meeting, allowing The Raymond Group to respond to the community's concerns, will be scheduled after the second meeting. No location had been set for either of these meetings at press-time.

Cunha, realizing the scheduling problem facing the council, has put on hold any discussion on Common Street and Parcel R-107 until the September council meeting.

He requested and received a vote of endorsement to ask the Board of Appeal not to approve the Common Street project, scheduled to go before them on July 10, until after the developer comes back to the council

with a presentation.

Jim Sullivan, BRA community coordinator, informed the council that the RFP for Parcel R-107 was being reviewed by the BRA legal department. "Once it is approved, we can set a meeting with the developer to discuss the project," he stated.

The Bricklayers and Laborers Non-Profit Housing Corp.'s plan to redevelop Building 104 into 24 affordable housing units will be the topic of a meeting in late July, according to Cunha. McLaughlin stated that he and other council members have concerns on the Building 104 proposal and would like to see the Brick-

layers' plans before it comes before the council for a vote.

The need for a Community Liaison with the CANA project was the first issue that came forward when the floor was opened to residential concerns. Linda Smith stated problems she had encountered, both as a resident and in her position with The Raymond Group. She said that the lack of proper road markings in the City Square area almost resulted in two accidents involving her car. She also reported that repeated requests for more signs directing visitors into the Navy Yard has met with

and served on the staff of the school's literary magazine, the "Botolphian." He also was involved in the peace and justice project and the drama society.

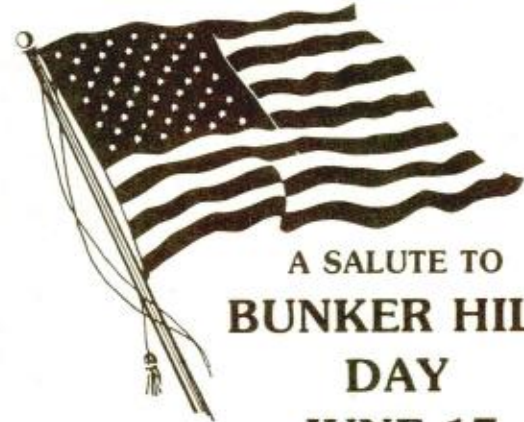

no results. Other residents
vented their frustrations and

concerns relative to the CA-
NA project and the council
voted to petition the MD-

PW to replace a communi-
ty person as liaison on the
CANA project.

Stone, on hearing of
Smith's difficulties and the
other complaints, notified
the CANA field office on
Wednesday to make them
aware of the situation. He
reported that Ed Barr, CA-
NA coordinator, was not
aware of the problems, but
would see that proper road
markings and street signs
would be placed in the area.

Judy Evers, community
liaison with the Mayor's Of-
fice of Neighborhood Ser-
vices, brought to the coun-
cil's attention complaints
she received on the removal
of the spray bar in the
Training Field. After dis-
cussing the need for such a
recreational outlet for the
youngsters of the communi-
ty, the council unanimously
endorsed the replace-
ment of that spray bar and
the placement of similar
devices elsewhere in Char-
lestown.

Coleman brought up an
issue that has created an
uproar in the Lawrence/
Seminary streets area. He
stated that residents are out-
raged with the BRA on its
reluctance to live up to its
promises to take overhead
wires off poles and place
them underground as part

of the upcoming street re-
construction project. These
promises, Coleman stated,
were made years ago and
properly recorded, but at a
recent meeting "an assistant
director of the BRA stated
'I wasn't there when these
promises were made.' Pro-
mises don't mean a thing to
them."

McLaughlin said that he
would contact the Depart-
ment of Public Works to
allow him to attend a June
6 meeting in City Hall with
the BRA and utilities com-
panies, set up to address the
problem.

Further meetings on the
problem will be taking
place in the Lawrence/Sem-
inary streets area. The re-
sults of these meetings and
the June 6 City Hall hear-
ing will be reported as the
story develops.

The council meeting,
which lasted three and a
half hours, was absent of
turmoil so frequently seen
at recent committee meet-
ings. Good humor and co-
operative moods persisted
through to the end. It will
be interesting to watch for
understandable mood changes
as the upcoming heavy-
issued development propo-
sals come before the com-
munity.

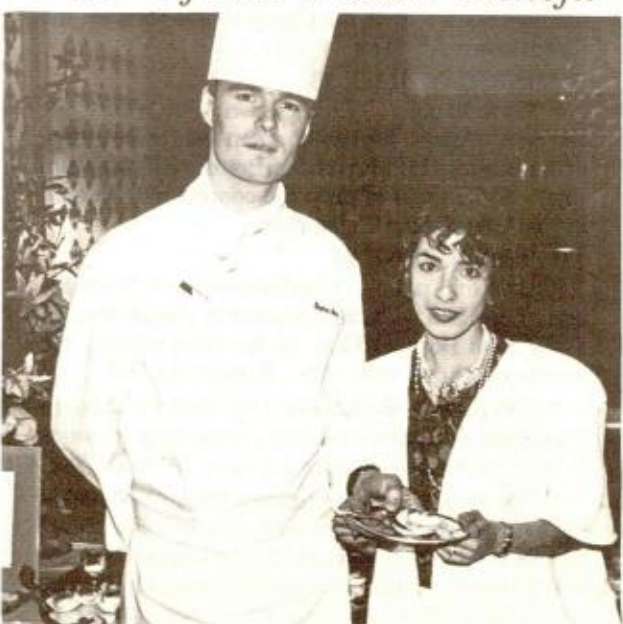

Volunteers Needed For Bunker Hill Road Race

When the Charlestown Boys Club initiated its annual road race in the late 1960s few, if any, who either organized or participated in the inaugural event could possibly envision the success the event would enjoy over the ensuing years.

In the beginning, a good number of the 100 or so runners came directly from the club's membership rolls, but as word began to spread, the Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race, as it has come to be known, gained in popularity throughout the running community of Greater Boston.

The increased interest in the event can be traced to several factors including the challenging hills of Charlestown and the many sites bearing historic significance which the runners pass along the way.

Each year the number of runners accepting the challenge of the Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race has increased significantly. This year nearly 1,000 participants are expected to weave their way through the eight-kilometer course. The large number of entrants is due in large part to The Athletic Congress designating the race as the New England 8K Grand Prix Championship.

The Grand Prix circuit is extremely popular within the racing community, and given the fact that this year's race has been deemed the most important 8K event on the New England road-racing schedule has added greatly to its appeal. The organizers of the Battle of Bunker Hill Road Race anticipate the largest field of runners in the event's 22-year history.

The championship 8K, starting at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, June 17, is not the only race being conducted by the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club on that day. One hour earlier, at 8:30, a two-mile novice race will take place. Both events will start in front of The Raymond Group offices in Building 149 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The 8K course will start at Building 149, continue on Chelsea Street to a short section of Vine, turning on to Hunter, down Bunker Hill, up Lowney Way, along Common as it passes the Training Field to Warren, continuing along Warren until it reaches Main at Thompson Square. The race will continue along Main before turning up and over Bunker Hill until once again reaching Lowney Way. At the top of Lowney Way, the course will turn right on to Adams Street until it picks up High, traveling by the Bunker Hill Monument until turning left down Green Street to Main. The course will once again follow Main, but upon reaching the Sullivan Square area will pick up Medford Street and stretch along that street's entire length until reaching the finish line at Building 149.

It goes without saying that the two road races need the assistance of volunteers in order to present a safe and successful competition. With the expected large field of runners, more volunteers than ever before will be required. The Charlestown Boys & Girls Club is seeking help from anybody who might be interested in giving an hour or two of time on the morning of June 17. Volunteers need

not be knowledgeable in road-racing rules. Some of the duties they might be expected to perform would include holding directional arrows, calling out split times to the runners at each mile mark, manning water stops, assisting in the registration of runners, etc.

Anyone interested in volunteering should contact clubhouse director, Jerry Steimel at 242-1775 as soon as possible. It is helpful if volunteers are assigned to specific tasks before race day.

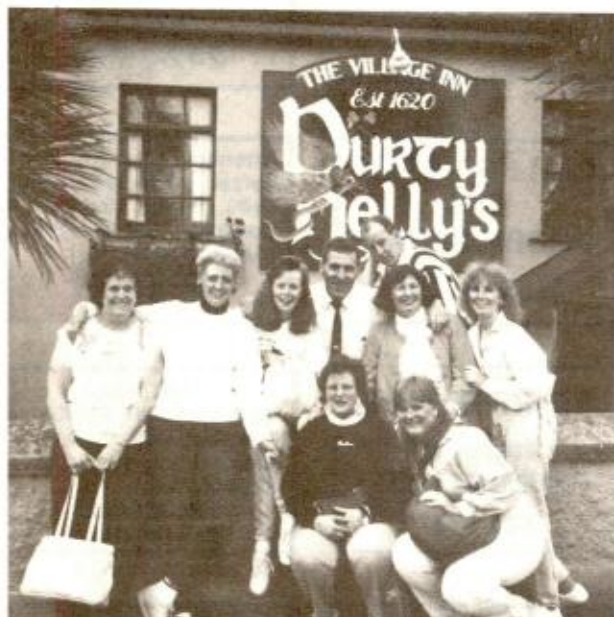

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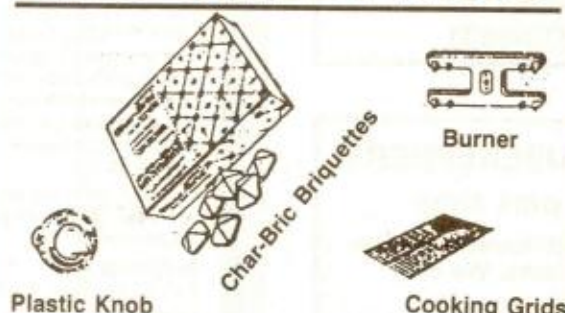
