Boston Harborfest Celebrates The Fourth Of July



Colonial Boston lives during the 1996 Boston Harborfest! Boston's revolutionary history comes alive when visitors and Bostonians alike interact with His Majesty's Red Coats, hold their own Tea Parties, protest taxes at a Towne Meeting, march to the beat of fife and drum on the Freedom Trail and become a part of Boston's history.

Now in its 15th year, Boston Harborfest salutes the city of Boston as one of America's oldest and most famous seaports. The revolutionary Fourth of July celebration is now underway, and continues through Sunday, July 7, marking the 220th

birthday of America. Patriots young and old will relish the over 200 activities ranging from historical re-enactments, tours aboard the legendary *USS Constitution*, fireworks and the 15th annual Chowderfest.

The sky over Boston Harbor will be filled with mesmerizing sights and sounds on Wednesday, July 3 when the Fireworks SkyConcert display, custom designed for Boston Harborfest, will be paired with a radio simulcast, sponsored by MIX 98.5 FM beginning at 9:30 p.m. The Charlestown Navy Yard is an ideal spot for viewing this magnificent display.

Delight your taste buds again on Sunday, July 7, at City Hall Plaza at the 15th annual Chowderfest. Find out why New England is renowned for its clam chowder as area restaurants ladle out the finest served in Boston. Drums will be beating as you cast your ballot to determine who makes the "Best Clam Chowder in Boston."

During the celebration, activities will be featured which showcase Boston's rich heritage as one of the oldest and most famous seaports. Seventy percent of the activities will be free and 25 percent cost between \$1 and \$6.

The climax of the celebration will be the annual "Pops Goes The Fourth" concert on the Esplanade with conductor Keith Lockhart leading the holiday concert, starting at 8 p.m. at the Hatch Shell on the Esplanade. The events will conclude with a fireworks extravaganza over the Charles River.

Declare your independence and celebrate like a true patriot. Muster up family and friends and celebrate the Fourth of July in one of America's most historic cities.

Foley Named Chief Of Interpretation At Boston National Historical Park

Superintendent John Burchill has announced the appointment of Bill Foley as Chief of Interpretation at Boston National Historical Park. Prior to this appointment, Foley was Chief of Interpretation at the Charlestown Navy Yard. He will now oversee interpretive functions both at the Downtown and Charlestown Navy Yard units of the park.

Foley joined Boston

National Historical Park in March 1986 as a supervisory ranger in the Interpretive Division. From 1973 through 1985, he was a faculty member at Andover and Billerica high schools.

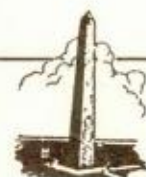
His career in education included high school teacher, program manager at the Department of Education, director of five town educational collaborative programs for eight years

and director of the United States Youth Conservation Corps for four summers at Lowell and Boston National Historical Parks.

Foley earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1973 from the University of Massachusetts and a Masters in Education and Administration from Fitchburg State College in 1977.

"Bill Foley brings a wealth of experience and expertise to the park's Chief of Interpretation position," said Burchill, Park superintendent.

Foley lives in the Charlestown Navy Yard with his wife Eleanor.

'Greetings From Planet Girl' To Open July 18 At The Charlestown Working Theater

The women of Planet Girl are on a mission: to claim their own territory in comedy, music and drama free of the constraints found in the mainstream entertainment of Earth (or at least North America).

"We hear a lot about the narrow, unrealistic and unimaginative roles in which women are portrayed in the entertainment industry, but nothing changes much. How many women were nominated for Oscars this year for playing prostitutes?" says producer/mision commander Cyndi Freeman. "Planet Girl" is a grassroots effort to broaden the perspective on who

women are and who they can be."

In the early 1990s, Freeman noticed how many of her sister actors were writing original performance material, spurred by their frustration not only with the limited parts available to them (Mom, dumb blonde, wife, dumb blonde, wife and mother), but the roles they were forced to play in order to get those parts. Why go to such great lengths in order to get work that was ultimately unfulfilling, especially when they were creating such a wealth of material?

Whether they were writing short stories, comic

monologues, songs or creating oddball characters, these women were putting their feelings into form, but lacked a way to give voice to them. Freeman decided to bring these women and their ideas to an audience.

In 1992, Freeman and artistic director Eileen Sullivan produced the first sold-out weekend of "Women on the Edge."

This year, "Greetings from Planet Girl" gathers a crew of bold gals, Cyndi Freeman, Mary Waggoner-Moritz, Julie Waggoner, Tess Rafferty, Margaret Ann Brady, Lucy Holsteadt and Dorothy Dwyer, to bring Boston audiences

a refreshing change from the tired old screaming victims, scheming vixens and vapid nymphs crowding movie and TV screens. "Greetings from Planet Girl" is an out-of-this-world celebration of the different women we are!

"Greetings from Planet Girl" will be performed at the Charlestown Working Theater, 442 Bunker Hill St., on July 18, 19, 20 and 25, 26, 27; Thursdays and Fridays at 8 p.m.; and Saturdays at 7 and 10 p.m. General admission is \$12 and \$10 for students and seniors.

Boston National Historical Park, Charlestown Navy Yard To Host Major July 4th Event

On Thursday, July 4, beginning at 9 a.m., a major event celebrating our nation's birthday and honoring the men and women who fought for freedom will occur at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Two historic ships, USS **Cassin Young** and USS **Salem**, will escort USS **Constitution** on her annual July 4 turnaround cruise which will include a special salute to our nation's World War II veterans. The best viewing area for observing the historic rendezvous is Castle Island in

South Boston.

USS **Cassin Young** will depart from Pier 1 at the Charlestown Navy Yard at 9:30 a.m. with over 400 people onboard. USS **Constitution** will depart from Pier 1 at 10 a.m. USS **Salem** will depart from Quincy and rendezvous with USS **Cassin Young** at Castle Island where they will render a salute to the USS **Constitution**. At noon there will be a special 21-gun salute from USS **Constitution** in honor of Independence Day.

USS **Constitution** was

launched on Oct. 21, 1797 and is the oldest commissioned warship afloat in the world. USS **Cassin Young** is typical of the many Fletcher-class destroyers constructed at the Charlestown Navy Yard during World War II. She served with distinction in the Pacific during World War II. USS **Salem** was built in Quincy and commissioned in 1949. She served as flagship of the U.S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean for most of her career.

"It is fitting to celebrate

our nation's birthday with a salute to World War II veterans by USS **Constitution** at Boston National Historical Park," said John Burchill, superintendent, Boston National Historical Park. "Boston National Historical Park protects, preserves and interprets the historic foundations of our nation's heritage," said Burchill.

Visitors may contact the Charlestown Navy Yard Visitor Center for more information at 242-5601. The Visitor Center is open daily from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

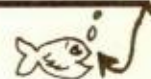

She has recently undergone major restoration and as she approaches her 200th anniversary in 1997, it is hoped that she will sail out into the harbor under her own power during this celebration. 12,000 New England Aquarium Animals Call Charlestown Resident 'Doc'

Dr. Howard Krum has water on his mind. Not only does he care for all the animals at the New England Aquarium, but he lives on a boat in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Krum began this "Water World" lifestyle three years ago when he became the first full-time veterinarian in the history of the New England Aquarium. Besides stepping into the role of doctor to some 12,000 animals, including sharks, snakes, turtles, penguins, seals and ducks, he was simultaneously asked to create the aquarium's veterinary department. The veterinary care department is now bustling, with a staff consisting of Dr. Krum, two senior biologists, a water quality technician, a veterinary intern and an office assistant.

Krum begins his day by motoring to the aquarium in his boat, arriving in time to lead his staff in a quick department meeting on topics that range from discussing reported sightings of a recently released harbor porpoise to devising a treatment plan for a sick fish, to monitoring the eating habits of the wood ducks in the aquarium's ponds exhibit. In addition to all the animal care issues, they also address administrative items and plan for long-term research projects.

After the meeting,

Krum and his staff immediately begin working on their assigned duties. A major part of the day is spent on rounds, which are generally made with a senior biologist. The aquarium contains eight galleries, and the veterinary care department observes the inhabitants of each gallery at least once a week.

While performing his rounds, Krum consults with the appropriate aquarist or trainer of each exhibit, who Krum likens to owners bringing their pets to the veterinarian. "The aquarists and marine mammal trainers know all the behavior patterns of their animals. They really understand their personalities and that information is absolutely crucial for me when making any sort of diagnosis," Krum says. In turn, the aquarists and marine mammal trainers appreciate being involved in any process concerning their animals, and credit Krum for understanding the importance of their input.

The veterinary care department also works with the animal rescue team to rehabilitate animals brought to the aquarium. Spring and summer are seal pup seasons, and dozens of orphaned pups found on beaches from Maine to Cape Cod are brought to the aquarium throughout this time. Krum oversees the rehabil-

itation of these seals and monitors the release of healthy pups at the end of the summer.

In the fall and winter months, the rescue and rehabilitation team works with sea turtles or larger marine mammals. The rehabilitation program is extremely labor intensive and the aquarium relies on volunteers to augment the staff. Krum is always amazed by the dedication and perseverance shown by aquarium volunteers and believes that humans feel a strong affinity to marine life.

Krum himself felt this affinity at an early age. While growing up in Pennsylvania, he was tremendously curious about animals that live in fresh water. As he cultivated this interest, his focus switched to marine animals. This interest led him to Virginia Wesleyan College where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Biology. He received his Master of Science from Southern Illinois University and his doctorate from the University of Pennsylvania School of Veterinary Medicine.

He has authored numerous articles and publications on a variety of aquatic animal issues, and performed his veterinary internship at the National Aquarium in Baltimore. Today, he is one of a hand-

ful of in-house aquarium veterinarians and performs his job with an intensity driven by his continued fascination with the underwater world.

Under Krum's guid-

ance, the veterinary care department is compiling a comprehensive database to document the care of aquarium animals. This precious information is then shared with animal care

teams around the world, making the New England Aquarium one of the leaders in animal care research and documentation.

According to Aquarium President Dr. Jerry Schubel, "Howard Krum is an extremely dedicated and intense person devoted to the well-being of each one of our animals. His entire team should be commended for their breakthrough research, which is helping to improve the quality care of all aquatic animals."

For his part, Howard Krum is doing exactly what he has always wanted. "I could never be bored with my job at the aquarium. There's such a wide spectrum of work to be done, and new challenges continually arise. I might be exhausted by the end of the day, but I always leave work with a tremendous feeling of accomplishment, and a little bit of excitement for what tomorrow will bring."

YOU CAN HELP A SOCIAL SECURITY RECIPIENT PAY HIS BILLS

If you have a friend or loved one who is receiving Social Security benefits, but who is no longer capable of handling his/her own financial affairs, you can apply to become his "representative payee." It will then become your responsibility to use the payments you receive on his or her behalf for his or her personal care and well-being.

To become a representative payee, you must be competent in financial matters and be sincere in your desire to help someone who is receiving Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI). About 25 percent of the people who receive SSI and about 10 percent of the people who get Social Security have such payees.

As a representative payee, you will need to keep informed of the individual's needs so that you can decide how benefits can best be used for his or her personal care and well-being. This is particularly important if the beneficiary does not live with you.

You must first make sure that the beneficiary's day-to-day needs for food and shelter are met. Then, benefits may be used for the beneficiary's personal needs, such as clothing, recreation and other miscellaneous expenses. Benefits can also be used to pay for medical needs (for example: eyeglasses and hearing aids) and dental care not provided by Medicare, Medicaid or a residential institution.

Representative payees are required by law to use benefits properly. Any money left over after meeting the beneficiary's current and reasonably foreseeable needs must be saved. As a representative payee, you will be required to periodically account for the funds you have received by completing Form SSA-623, Representative Payee Report.

To find out more about volunteering to become a representative payee, call the Social Security toll-free number 1-800-772-1213 and ask for Publication No. 05-10076, "A Guide for Representative Payees."

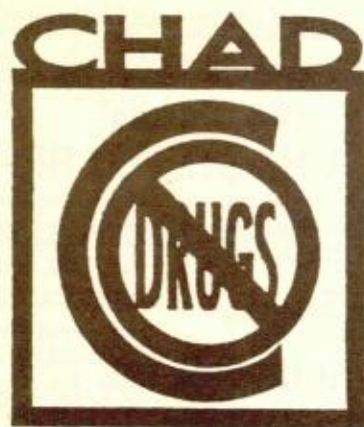
