Chapter 1

Digging Deeper: Matthew 5:1-12

When many read the word blessed, they think happy. But there is a deeper meaning when we look closer. Blessedness is a deep, abiding joy that comes when we live in harmony with God. In Greek the word "blessed" is markarios, and it means "fortunate, to be envied, one upon whom God has extended His favor and His benefits." What a beautiful thought, to be brought in favor with God. The beatitudes bring us closer to Christ as we recognize the need of Him in our lives and helps us grow as God's children in His Kingdom.

Matthew 5:3- Blessed in the poor in spirit, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

The word poor tends to point to those who have very little physically and are dependent on others for their well-being. Many put poor and poverty together, so they look at this verse as those people. But studying more closely Jesus says the poor in spirit. Our spirit is what is inside of us. It's not just a poverty thing but a heart matter.

When Jesus is saying the poor in spirit, He is referring to those who recognize the need of God for their well-being. They are humbled knowing what this world offers will not contribute to their life in Heaven. They recognize the sin and corruption in their hearts and cannot please God on their own. They know they need help from Jesus.

The poor in spirit are not arrogant, not self-righteous and know they cannot be sufficient on their own. They have rid themselves of selfishness, pride and self-reliance and live in humility and complete dependence on God, His mercy, and His grace.

Their blessing is the Kingdom of Heaven. Not the physically poor or province-stricken people, but those who are "spiritually poor" and have humbled themselves and become dependent on God. This message is a call of repentance, acknowledging that they bring

Moments of Prayer

There is so much that could be said about prayer in the Bible that there has been many books, blogs, stories, short stories, and more written about it. Prayer is important to Jesus, and it is essential in our lives and walk with Him. In this chapter we will try to cover a lot of things about prayer without making it, its own book. I encourage my readers to take some time for yourself during your personal studies, open the scriptures and see what more you can learn on prayer.

Chapter 6- Growing in God's Character- A Golden Life

Matthew 5-7 opens with the Sermon on the Mount as a gateway to how Jesus walked and talked over the next few years of His ministry. These chapters are instructions from Jesus as how all people, not just Christians, should live. As a Christian we should especially be aware of our actions and words as we are representing Christ who lives in us. As we learn from Jesus and put to practice these practical principles our character is growing to be more like Jesus in preparing our hearts to live in His righteous Kingdom. We will be jumping through several verses, many that are the same in all the gospels and hopefully learn some new things or refresh ourselves on things we know.

In this chapter we will be studying closer the Golden Rule, the Greatest Commandment, helping others, and judging which all can be shown through our actions. Let's begin with a simple parable found in Matthew 7:16-19, Matthew 12:33-35, and Luke 6:43-45.

Our Words and Actions

We all understand how fruit grows on trees and plants produce vegetables and so did those who heard Jesus speak. Jesus begins by saying, "Grapes don't come from thornbushes and figs don't come from thorny weeds. Good fruit comes from good trees and bad trees produce bad fruit. A good tree cannot make bad fruit and a bad tree cannot make good fruit." The gospel of Luke adds that, "Each tree is known by its own fruit." If you want a banana you don't go to an orange tree and if you want grapes you don't pick at a strawberry patch.

Jesus is explaining that in our lives, every word and every action is a fruit from our hearts. Sinners sin because that's what's in their hearts. Thieves steal, liars lie, cheaters cheat, bullies bully, because their hearts are producing the sinful fruit from an evil heart. "Bad hearts produce bad fruit, and you will know them by their fruits," Jesus spoke clearly.

It's Golden for a Reason

Whether a Christian or not we all can quote this verse even if we don't realize it's in the Bible. We use it to teach children as a way of life and as an adult we use it as a guide for our actions. Matthew 7:12 and Luke 6:31, "Do to others what you want them to do to you."

First, notice it doesn't say do to others what they do to you (that's revenge). It says treat them <u>how you</u> want to be treated. In other words, even if they treat you poorly, you love (respect) them because you want to be loved. We treat them good because all men are worthy of love in God's eyes. All were created in God's image-Genesis 1:27, Jesus willingly died on the cross for each person-John 3:16. Everyone is worth the same before God and we all have an opportunity to receive salvation if we choose.

The "golden rule" is not just in terms of love it's showing respect to others because we want to be respected. You don't have to agree with their choices or lifestyle, but you can show respect to them as a child of God. We can show respect by putting others first-Philippians 2:3-4, put their well-being into perspective. We just learned about the willingness to forgive- Matthew 6:14, don't keep score, always forgive. Strive to love and peace- Romans 12:17-18, this is shown in patience and tolerance for each other- Ephesians 4:2.

Chapter 7- All that Glitters is Not Gold

What is the difference between what we store up on earth and what we store up in Heaven?

In the stories of Sherlock Holmes there's a story about how Sherlock was able to sneak into the home of Irene Adler and steal an incriminating picture of her and the king that posed a risk of scandal. how was he able to do this? Well, he told Watson to throw a smoke bomb through a window prompting the warning call of "fire". Irene exposes the hidden place of the picture since she runs to the exact room where the picture is hidden. When Watson asked Sherlock how he knew that would work, Sherlock replies, "When a woman thinks that her house is on fire, her instinct is to rush to the thing she values most."

Be honest, if your house was on fire or you knew a tornado was going to hit it, what would you grab before running to safety?

Digging Deeper- Matthew 6:19-24, Luke 12:32-34

Matthew 6:25-34, Luke 12:22-31
