The Mayor's Charlestown Cable Task Force's duties will include:

* Identifying the kinds of programs and services that are of special interest to Charlestown residents.

Developing several pilot program projects.

* Assisting in a public education campaign in the neighborhood on the various uses and benefits of cable, both as a medium of entertainment and as a communications system that goes far beyond televi-

* Helping the City design the Public Institutional Network, a 50 channel cable for use by the City's public and non-profit institutions.

In announcing his appointments, Mayor White said, "My staff has enthusiastically reported to me that Charlestown residents are excited about the advent of cable and have some extremely creative programming ideas. I am convinced that this Task Force will serve as a model for similar committees in other

neighborhoods across the city.

The Mayor's Charlestown Cable Task Force is the second such group established in the city. A similar group in East Boston was named by the Mayor on July 1. Other neighborhoods will be establishing cable task forces

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Flynn Calls For Shift In Budget

Charging that both the police and fire department budgets for fiscal year 1983 are "outrageously low" despite the passage of the

Tregor Bill and millions of dollars in additional new revenue sources, Boston City Councillor Raymond L. Flynn will attempt to have the Council's Committee on Government Finance cut at least \$6 million from non-essential city departments and to earmark those funds for public safety services.

"The administration's budget addresses the wrong priorities," Flynn

stated. "While there are more than 1,000 new positions created in the budget, urgent public safety needs such as the re-opening of closed police and fire stations, increased arson prevention and the rehiring of school traffic crossing guards are ignored.'

Flynn noted, "The only reason the Tregor Bill received the approval of the City Council, the state legislature and the governor was the urgent need to address Boston's public service crisis. Now that the Tregor Bill has been signed into law, the Mayor

of revenue. Advisory pan-

cannot turn his back on the public safety needs of Boston residents which are just as urgent today as they were a year ago.'

"Just for example," Flynn explained, "consider the growing incidence of arson related fires in Boston's neighborhoods. Boston firefighters now spend approximately 30% of their time fighting arson related blazes. A coordinated arson prevention effort by the city would require only a minimal financial investment by the city yet it would produce a huge savings in both monetary and human terms.'

Flynn also said that the city's Public Works Department should be "beefed up in order to begin a comprehensive street cleaning program to clean-up Boston's dirty streets which have become a national disgrace.'

"The city has apparently not learned the financial lesson of the past two years. City residents are demanding a more realistic approach to municipal spending and the City Council has an obligation to ensure that essential police, fire and public works services are given first priority in the city budget.'

TIPS FOR TEETH

"A new generation of composites" (while fillings that blend with tooth structure). "Esthetic dentistry" with minimal or no drilling of teeth.

Such confusing statements are seen and heard regularly in the medium (newspaper, T.V., radio). What does it all mean? Bonding is the technique of etching teeth, then using a luting agent to retain a laminate or veneer covering over the prepared surface. Furniture manufacturers have been veneering with laminates and luting agents for many decades. Sophisticated methods have now been developed in dentistry to shade these laminates and to seal the material to teeth with excellent bonding agents. Meticulous care must be used to avoid contamination, bubbles underneath the laminate, irritation to the gums and coloring of the veneer.

Some unfounded claims have been made. No doubt there is a place for this development; however, it is not a cure-all. Cases must be selected and prepared carefully. The surrounding tissues must be healthy and the teeth must have all infection removed. If the requirements of good dental preparation are met, bonding may be of advantage for some of the following conditions.

- 1. To cover stained or ugly colored teeth.
- 2. To build up fractured corners or parts of teeth.
- 3. To reshape after an accident.
- 4. To restore after an accident.
- 5. To close space between teeth.

The advantages over other techniques are:

- 1. Minimal or no drilling teeth.
- 2. Anesthesia is usually not required The bonding may be completed at the same visit.
- Cost is less than other methods of esthetic dental care. 5. The procedure is reversible, meaning that the bonding can be removed and done again or another

technique tried. However, careful selection of teeth to be treated and screening of the patient is most important for success. Results may be disappointing if the patient does not cooperate by using prescribed methods

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

its Division Administrator, has decided not to fund the City Square segment of the project after the expenditure of large sums of taxpayer's money spent for traffic studies, environmental impact statements, preliminary engineering, the Storrow Drive connector study and the expenditure of enormous amounts of time and energy, particularly by the North Area Task Force, composed of a group of Charlestown citizens encouraged by the Federal Highway Administration to participate in the project; and

Whereas, the decision by the Division Administrator represents a complete reversal of understandings reached during the five years of project planning; and

Whereas, the City Square segment is an intregal and necessary part of the Central Artery-North area Project, without which the entire project would be jeopardized; now

Resolved, that the Massachusetts Senate calls upon the Federal Highway Administration to overrule its Division Administrator and urges the Administration to restore funding for the City Square segment of the Central Artery-North Area Project; and be it further.

Resolved, that copies of these Resolutions be transmitted forthwith by the Clerk of the Senate to the Governor of the Commonwealth, the President of the United States of America and to the Members of Congress from Massachusetts
