★ Tobin Bridge To Be Closed On July 14... Massport has announced that the upper level of the Tobin Bridge (south-bound) will be temporarily closed on Sunday, July 14 from 6 a.m. to 2 p.m. for cross girder repairs. There will be no access to the upper deck traveling into Boston for that eight-hour period.

All vehicles will be diverted to the primary detour, Route 1A South, to the Sumner Tunnel, into the city. The secondary detour is Route 60 in Revere to Route 99, bringing traffic into Charlestown. Signs will be posted diverting all traffic to the proper routes.

In addition to the upper deck closure, the lower deck will be restricted to two lanes of traffic to accommodate the work crews. Following the completion of the repairs, the entire bridge will be open for travelers.

Residents Await R-87 Title Search Findings

Community design discussions around the coming redevelopment of the vacant lot bordered by Prospect and Tremont streets and Lowney Way continued at a June 27 public meeting between the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Development Committee, abutters and representatives of Boston's Public Facilities Department.

A Thursday, July 25 followup meeting has been scheduled. At this point,

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the parcel's exact property lines are being documented through a title search, in order to draft the Request for Proposals to develop a mix of affordable and market-rate single- to two-family homes for first-time homebuyers on the 63,000square-foot lot.

Known as Parcel R-87, the land has been the topic of heated development discussions in the neighborhood for almost 10 years. (continued on page 9) Clougherty Pool Closed For Glass Removal

Boston Community
Centers has closed the
Cloughtery Pool at the
Doherty Playground on
Bunker Hill Street this
week, at least until July 13,
to drain the pool and remove glass shards discovered to be embedded in the
paint along the bottom, according to BCC Deputy
Director Charles Clabaugh.

A Charlestown girl suf-

fered a severe cut on July 6 while swimming. Further investigation found a dozen areas around the pool where glass was dangerously hidden beneath the paint's surface.

"We don't know how this happened," Clabaugh said. "The broken glass is being chipped out and vacuumed, and the surface will be hosed down, swabbed and inspected before the pool can be reopened. We hope it will be this Saturday."

In the meantime, the Charlestown Community Center's Medford Street pool has extended its hours through tomorrow, July 12, to accommodate residents. Hours of operation at 255 Medford St. are: 1 to 4 p.m. - Open Swim; 4:30 to 6 p.m.- Adult Lap; and 6 to 8 p.m. - Open Swim.







The meetings will focus on the specific projects proposed for that geographic area. The Draft Environmental Impact Report will be released to the public in mid-October 1996; additional public meetings will be held during the public comment period in the fall.

★ Boston Redevelopment Authority Board Action . . . On June 27, The Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) Board of Directors recommended approval for the development Authority (BRA)

opment of 16 condominium and townhouse units at 10 Thompson Square and at 131-141 Main St. in Charlestown by Tashmoo Realty Trust. The development will be reviewed at the July 16 Board of Appeal meeting.

The developer has proposed to construct five triplex residential units above Charlestown Liquors at 10 Thompson Square, and 10 additional three- to four-story structures with an attached underground parking garage on the vacant lot at 131-141 Main St. The Main Street units will include nine single-family townhouses and one two-family townhouse. The development cost is estimated at \$3.5 million. The architects for the development is Charlestown-based J.W. French Associates. The units will be designed in traditional red brick with gable roofs. Construction is scheduled to begin in the fall of 1996, with completion expected by the summer of 1997.

Also on June 27, the BRA Board of Directors voted to approve the tentative designation of Ergo Science Inc. as the redeveloper of Parcel 39A in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Ergo Science, already located within the Navy Yard, plans to develop the currently unpaved parking lot into a 70,000-square-foot medical research facility with concurrent commercial/office space. The development will allow Ergo Science to double the size of its research facilities and office space, and is expected to bring in nearly 160 new jobs. Ergo Science is presently developing novel treatments for metabolic and immune system disorders. Immediate plans are underway to begin site preparation work, with construction to begin no later than December 1997.

★ Mystic River Dredging . . . The Boston Conservation Commission will hold a public hearing in Room 801 of Boston City Hall at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 17. The School On The Hill

She stands tall atop Bunker Hill, her proud and hallowed walls skirted by metal structure, a structure whose intentions are noble indeed, but carrying with them reasons far different from those which we came to know her. The web of gray-silver bars are there to lift her face, to make her more beautiful for those who will soon come to call her home, but to me and to many others, there can be no amount of alteration great enough to change what St. Francis de Sales School has come to mean to me.

From September of 1945 until June of 1954, most all of my hours were spent at my home on Elm Street, at the Boys Club, and at St. Francis de Sales School. On Elm Street and from my parents, I learned to treat people as I would have them treat me, and I learned right from wrong. At the Boys Club, I learned valuable recreational and social skills and at St. Francis de Sales, I learned whatever traveled from the pages of textbooks through the lips of the good nuns of St. Dominic.

In my English classes I was introduced to nouns, to verbs, to adjectives, to adverbs, to prepositions, to articles, to conjunctions, and to the oh so many other parts of speech. I learned what they were and why they were. I learned to diagram sentences, to conjugate verbs, when and where to punctuate and to capitalize, and how to spell (though some may question the accuracy of that statement).

I found a lifelong friend in poetry at St. Francis de Sales School, and many of the lines of the great writers still ring with instant familiarity from within the walls of my memories.

During arithmetic time I learned to add, to subtract, to multiply, and to divide. I learned how to apply these basic arithmetical processes to decimals, to fractions, and to percents. I learned of square roots and of ratio and proportion.

When the maps were pulled down in window-shade fashion from above the chalk boards, I knew it was time to travel across this great country of ours and to learn where each state was located and what its capital city was. I sailed all of the immense oceans so that I might reach the far off continents to meet the people and to learn of their customs.

When the history books were opened, I sailed with Columbus, I witnessed the signing of the Declaration of Independence, I met Ben Franklin, Thomas Jefferson and George Washington. I watched as Alexander Hamilton and Aaron Burr dueled. I heard Patrick Henry as he spoke his famous "Give me liberty or give me death," and John Paul Jones tell the enemy "I have not yet begun to fight." I watched the patriots at the Battle of Bunker Hill follow Colonel William Prescott's command as they waited "until they could see the whites of their eyes."

I struggled with the Palmer Method of penmanship, making rather imperfect circles and not very straight lines with a dip pen, and I anxiously awaited Friday afternoons when we were given time to draw. I wondered, for many years, how a pitch pipe was supposed to improve my singing while in music class. At St. Francis de Sales, I learned enough to one day become not the one who WAS taught, but the one who taught.

I think now, how enjoyable the time was we spent rehearsing for the annual St. Patrick's Day Play, and how the hordes of proud parents filled the school hall each year to watch their sons and daughters present the finished product.

And I remember the lunch hours of spring when the boys of Sister Ulicia's eighth grade class would do battle with their counterparts from Sister Evelyn Catherine's class in a spirited game of baseball at the "Park" across the street from the school. Although the nuns did not participate directly in the game, they were as much a part of it as any third baseman might have been. Looking back, I know now they felt a definite sense of pride in victory, for it was a time for them to display qualities they somehow kept hidden while inside the walls of St. Francis de Sales School.

Appreciation for the nuns was not something that was part of my days at St. Francis de Sales School, for they were there when I arrived and they were there when I departed. There were no lay teachers, only two nuns for each grade. I, as most of my classmates, took them for granted. It was only after graduating from the school in June of 1954 and witnessing the

learning experience through a different set of eyes that I began to appreciate what they were able to do and, I might add, do quite well.

These mysterious women, hidden beneath habits of black and white, who gave
so much, were compensated only with the
knowledge that they were helping others.
Because they were responsible for shaping
the minds of youngsters in all areas of
academia, they were masters of religion, of
the language, of mathematics, of science,
of geography, and of history. To add to
their talents, they introduced us to music
and art appreciation.

Yes, the nuns ruled the classrooms of St. Francis de Sales School and we, the students, were their subjects. Whatever the future may hold for the red-brick building sitting atop Bunker Hill, those of us who were once part of its illustrious history will pass and look at it not for what it has become, but remember it always as what it was, our school.



Even though my departure was not going to be until Aug. 1, the announcement had to be made in April so that the Archdiocese could go through the process of selecting a new pastor. The months have passed quickly and now I write to thank you for all you have meant to me during my years at St. Catherine's.

I have made it a priority in my life to know the people with whom I am privileged to serve. One of the greatest gifts I can share with a community is the ability to appreciate, encourage, nurture, affirm and thank its people.

I will be at home with my parents from Aug. 1 to 15 and depart in my 1987 Monte Carlo SS for the west coast on Aug. 15. I am taking an entire month to get to my destination and will have the privilege of being in many of our historic cities across the country.

This is an opportunity of a lifetime for me and while I am young enough, healthy and energetic, why not take advantage of it? I will see parts of this country that I have only dreamed about. I will begin classes at Menlo Park, (30 miles south of San Francisco) on Sept. 18, and continue until Dec. 16. I will then get back in my car and head home to be back in Boston by Christmas. Shortly after I arrive home, I hope to receive another assignment in the Archdiocese of Boston. From Sept. 18 to Dec. 16, my address will be: Vatican II Institute, c/o St. Patrick's Seminary, 320 Middlefield Road, Menlo Park, Calif. 94025.

Residents Await R-87 Title Search Findings

One of only a scant number of city-owned sites open for development, R-87's future hinges on a balance of an attractive site for proposers and abutters' participation in and agreement on design guidelines.

The parcel has suffered a history of false starts and unaccepted proposal requests for housing and development. Originally slated for sale and development by the Boston Redevelopment Authority, Parcel R-87 will now go back out to bid through PFD.

"We have to find a level of confidence in each other," PFD Associate Director for Housing Tom O'Malley told residents gathered at the American Legion Hall. "We don't want to so narrowly define this parcel so that no developer wants to come through the door."

No definite guidelines have been established for the parcel, although residents have cited several concerns they want addressed in the final RFP.

Among the issues consistently noted to be addressed in the RFP are: maintaining open space at the site of the former school on Prospect Street; two-carper-unit off-street parking; reopening Edgeworth Street for parking and access; and developing a reasonable number of homes, which discussions have mentioned anywhere between eight and 14 units.

The meeting with O'Malley and PFD project managers and architects would only go so far that night, however. True legal ownership and property lines have to be agreed on. Possible typographical and map color-coding errors over the years have created questions of whether pieces of the lot belong to various agencies, such as the BRA, the Boston Housing Authority and Massport.

O'Malley, in the meantime has requested a title search for the parcel. which, if not complete, by the July meeting will move an RFP's public release still further behind.

"I am extremely frustrated that we can't answer questions asked of us weeks ago," O'Malley said.

Most residents, such as Betty Golden of Tremont Street and Sally Woods of Prospect Street, seem to have gotten used to the history of waiting. They, and others, said they were feeling pushed by PFD and requested holding off on releasing an RFP until after the summer.

Committee member Jim Conway noted that any recommendations on an RFP would not be heard by the full council until its Sept. 10 meeting.

"We want to take advantage of this market period and give the developer
an opportunity to sell by
next season," O'Malley
said. "I fail to see how this
(process) is being railroaded. Nothing is being proposed that you haven't

YOUR OLD TAX RETURN, ONE MORE TIME

Out of sight, out of mind. When it comes to old tax returns, that's an approach many people like to follow. But before you completely forget about your old tax forms, you may wish to consider filing an amended return.

If you made a mistake on a prior-year tax return, an amended return is the way to set things right. Arithmetic errors, missing information, and oversights are all fairly common, and generally there's no reason to fear filing an amended return - whether you owe money to the IRS or vice versa.

Certain special situations can also trigger amended returns. For example, if you suffer a casualty loss in a presidentially-declared disaster, you may deduct the loss on your tax return for the year of the disaster, or you may amend the prioryear return and deduct the loss in that year. The best strategy depends on your tax bracket for both years, plus other factors such as the amount of your loss and whether it occurred early or late in the year.

An amended return can help ease the sting of certain businesses and worthless security losses. You also may benefit from an amended return if there's a retroactive change in the tax law as a result of new legislation or a favorable court ruling. Note that an amended return is generally required if you previously deferred gain on the sale of your home, but failed to purchase a replacement home within two years.

As a general rule, you may file an amended return up to three years after filing your original return, although other time limits may apply. The rules can be tricky, so be sure to give us a call if you'd like assistance or more information.

As our local gridiron heroes anxiously await their first test on Saturday, they are hoping to muster up fan support for the 1996 season.






