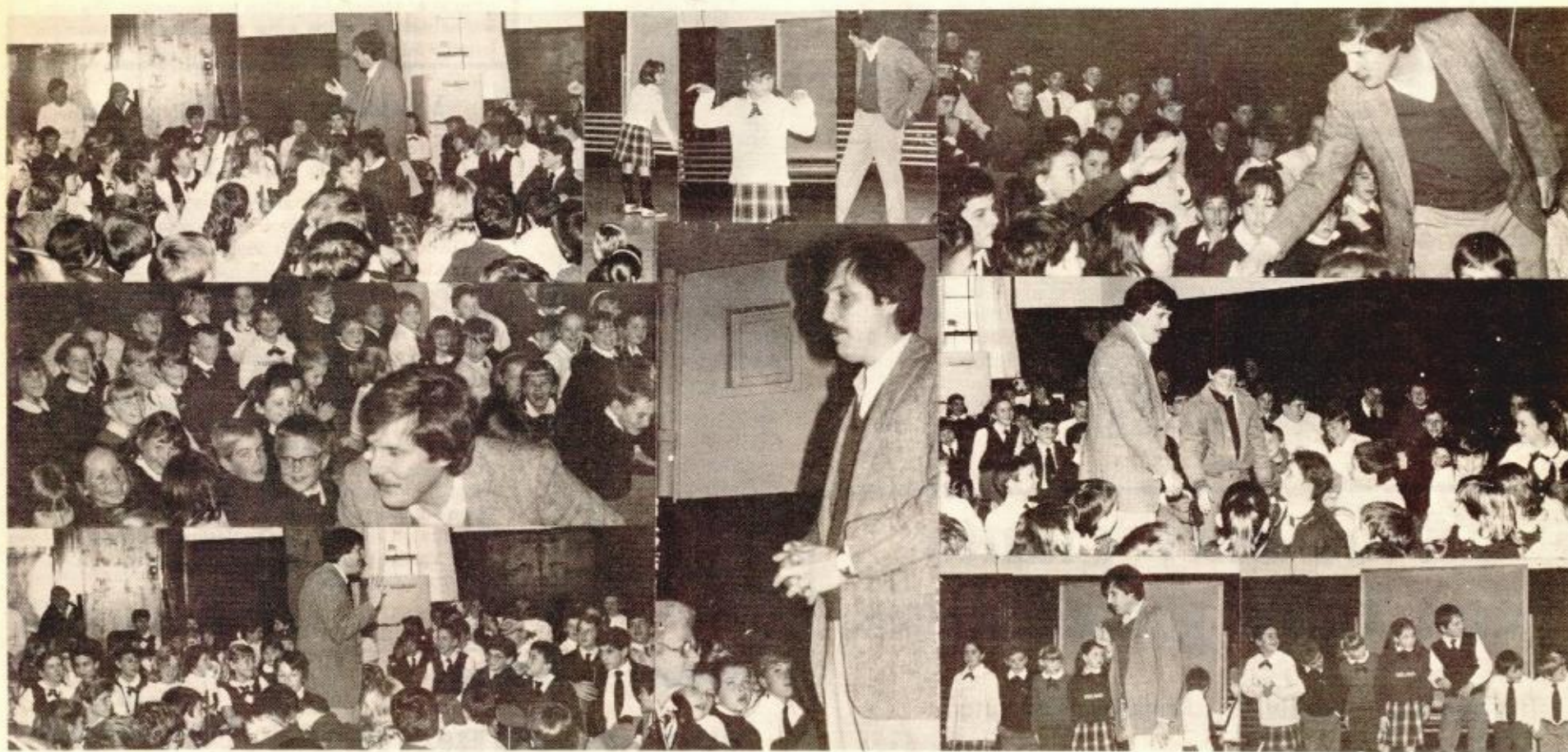

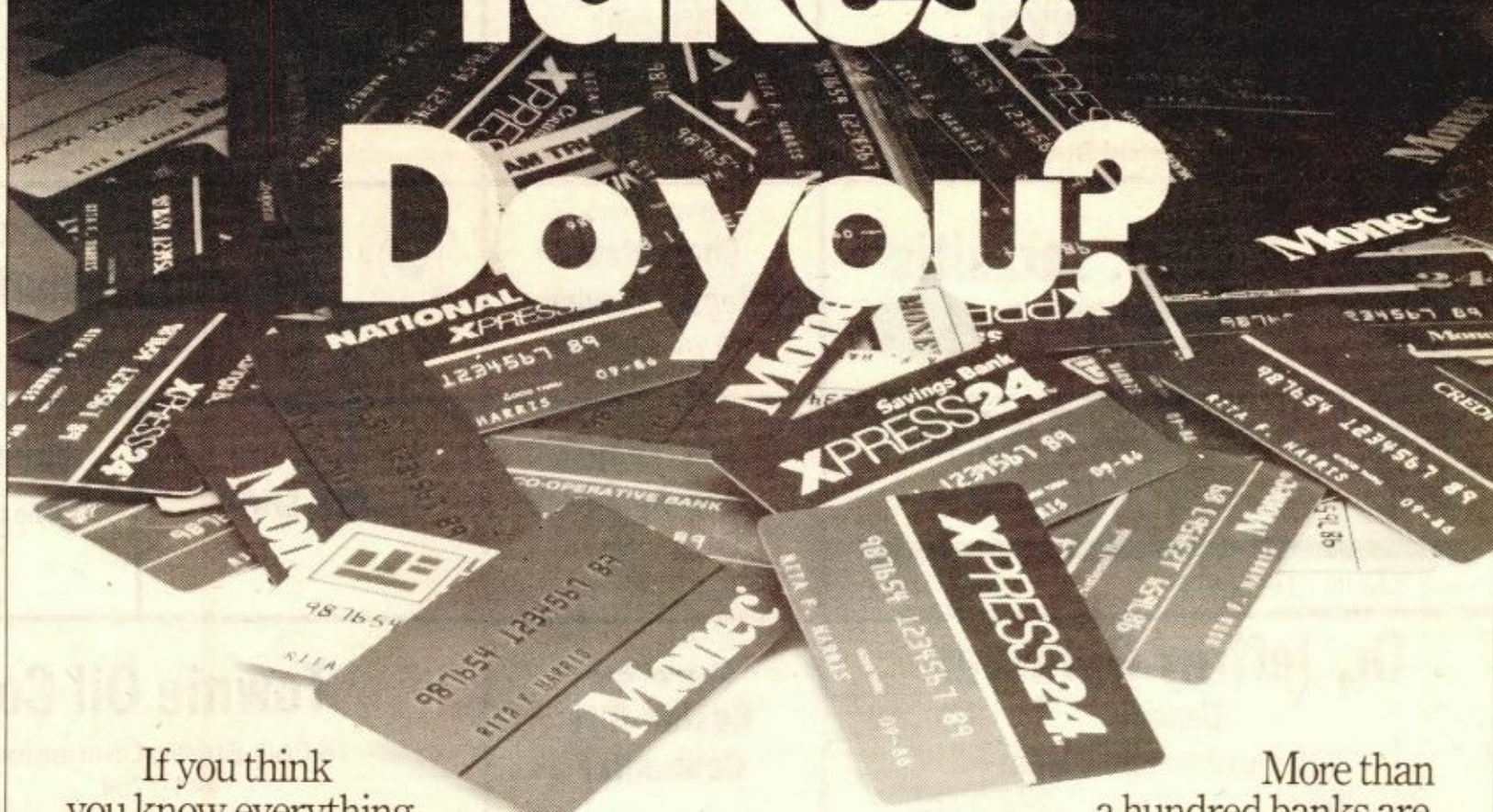

High Pharmacy "On-Line" To Better Serve Customers

Last February, High Pharmacy located on 54 High Street "went on line" becoming Charlestown's only computerized pharmacy.

While terms such as "hardware" and "software" do not readily identify themselves with the more common "take as directed" drug store lingo, the computer enables pharmacists Carmen and Richard Merlino to take advantage of modern technology to more accurately and efficiently service their customers.

High Pharmacy may be computerized, but the personalized service, which originally made the pharmacy "a neighborhood drug store", is anything but lacking.

Both Merlino's state the computer's uses are "invaluable" because not only does the computer maintain accurate records on all clients, but also alerts the pharmacists to possible sensitivities that certain medications may cause an individual.

In addition to alerting the pharmacists of possible sensitivities, the computer is able to keep a record of family as well as individual medication history. This is again, "invaluable" in the treatment of some hereditary illnesses.

"We have entered into the day of specialization," stated Carmen Merlino. "By means of the computer, I can keep records of all the medications taken by a person. I have had in-

stances where I have had to let one doctor know about another doctor's prescription which may offset the new medication prescribed."

Richard Merlino stated most people are unaware of the volume of work required in the "business" end of a pharmacy. "Most people think we just sit back here and count pills. That's simply not true," explained Merlino.

Some may fear that the service received at High Pharmacy may change as a result of the computer. Both Merlino's state that the computer is only a "mechanical aid" which will help service their customers more efficiently, but stressed that "there is no substitute for our professional responsibility."

The computer services the pharmacy in a number of ways. In addition to being a "real time saver", the computer keeps records on all prescriptions, prices, and doctors.

Carmen Merlino explained customer receipts are also stored for one year which is important for all third party billing such as insurance companies, Medicare and Medicaid. By recording this information, customers who may lose their copy of the receipt may obtain another copy in order to file for reimbursement, something they may not have been able to do in the past.

As for customer reaction to the change, Carmen

Merlino stated the feelings are mixed. The older clientele are weary of the modern advancements, while the younger customers are "enthusiastic."

As far as the Merlino's, both are extremely excited about their computer. "The computer is amazing," stated Richard Merlino. "It goes the whole nine yards."

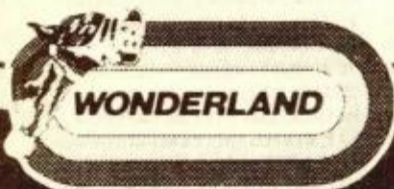

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Facts About Drugs - F.A.D.

Addiction is a word that covers all sorts of behavior based on chemical dependency. An addict is a person who has used all sorts of drugs. Even sugar can become addictive for some people. But the desire to repeat using that chemical and the inability to avoid taking the first drink, the first pill, the first bite, is the compulsive nature of the disease. Addicts generally have a drug of choice, but in absence of this specific drug, they will usually take whatever is available.

The addiction to alcohol has the problem of being fueled by a drug that is legal. You can get it anywhere if you have the money and very often when you don't have the money.

Food addiction had the added problem of being something that cannot be abstained from. You have to eat. So the addiction had to be controlled especially by the elimination of certain foods that set up the compulsive overeating.

Drug addiction, other than alcohol, had the added problem of being illegal. The very process of contacting the people who sell is an illegal act. The cost usually brings the addict to illegal acts of stealing, breaking and entering and forgeries.

All addictions have as a primary defense: denial. "I'm not that bad," "At least I don't rip off my friends," "I'm not as bad as my brother," "If I only had some money I would..." In the face of the constant losses, the addict will continue to abuse his drug of choice, blaming his troubles or lack of control on family, job, friends, sickness, full moon, Christmas Season, long dead relatives, - anything.

One of the excuses heard recently came from an active alcoholic, who also happened to have skin cancer. Excuse: "You'd drink too if you had cancer." So denial that there is a problem allows the addict to get sicker.

The first step to helping the addict is breaking down that denial in ways that he/she can hear. Therefore yelling, accusing, judging, are not effective. But you can tell the addict about the behavior that has affected you and connect it to drug use. "You threw a chair last night and I was scared. And you don't do that when you're not drinking (drugging)."

Each person, whether addict or not can be held responsible for his/her behavior. You don't have to suffer in silence.

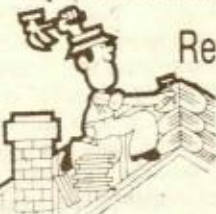
