Charlestown is allowed 13 delegates, six male and six female with one additional delegate.



Missionary Couple Works To Start New Church Congregation

This past Christmas, Charlestown residents Milton and Ginger Brasher-Cunningham called Milton's grandmother in Waco, Texas.

"Oh, how I wish you were home for Christmas," said Milton's grandmother.

Milton, reflecting later on that conversation, laughed and said, "Waco, Texas isn't our home. Charlestown, Massachusetts is our home."

Charlestown has been home to the Brasher-Cunninghams since September 1990 when the couple, both ordained ministers, moved here from Ft. Worth, Texas, to begin their work as "home missionaries" for the Baptist Church.

"Home missionaries," Milton explains, "are generally salaried through their home mission board. Our situation is a little different. Our church in Ft. Worth provided some money for three years, but we always intended to work regular jobs in addition to doing our religious work."

Milton, long familiar to residents as a manager at Blockbuster Video, now works as a permanent substitute English teacher at Charlestown High School. Ginger is house manager for Communities for People, a group home for adolescent girls in Medford.

The move to Charlestown, as the Brasher-Cunninghams tell it, came about almost miraculously.

"We had come to a conference in Boston early in 1990," Ginger recalls. "We heard Betsy Draper speak. She's the Baptist chaplain at M.I.T. Her husband David is a pastor on Beacon Hill. We had just fallen in love with Charlestown, Boston and New England. I said to Milton, 'Some day we're going to live here and we're going to be friends with the Drapers.'

Milton picks up the story. "The following Monday, back in Ft. Worth, the pastor at University Baptist Church, where I was on staff, called me into his office and said that he was going to make a proposal to the church to start new

churches throughout the United States. He'd been thinking about it, and every time he'd thought about it, what had come to his mind was that Ginger and I should be the ones to do it, and that Boston should be where we should go.

"To hear him tell it, all the color drained from my face, and I got slack-jawed. And I said: 'Have I got a story to tell you.'

When the Brasher-Cunninghams arrived in Charlestown, their first task was to conduct a survey about religion. They circulated and received back about 70 questionnaires, which asked:

- · Why do you think people don't go to church?
- · What do you think the role of the church is?
- · If you were to go to church, what would you want it to be?

"Several people," Milton recalls, "said they would like a place where worship is intentional - that is, where worship is thought out, where there's some reason for doing it, rather than just doing it by rote. It should be intellectually challenging. And it should build a sense of communi-

In the survey, people said the reasons they didn't go to church was because it was boring, because the role of

women wasn't significant, and because it wasn't applicable to daily life.

'The most consistent response we had to the role of the church," Ginger says, "was that it should be a moral educator for children.

Milton says he and Ginger always felt that their first job was to get to know Charlestown and the people who live here.

Now, Milton says, "Looking at our experience with the people in the town and what we got from the survey, we feel like what we can contribute is an invitation to faith that has some meaning and some room

for questions, and has some challenge to it."

"A place where grace can be offered," Ginger adds, "not just rules."

In that regard - grace, not just rules - the Brasher-Cunninghams tread lightly over identifying themselves as Southern Baptists - which is what their church in Ft. Worth was. Their own experience, particularly in encountering prejudice against Ginger as a female minister, has tended to distance them somewhat from the denomination. In particular, they avoid the factional fights (continued on page 13)



> According to Chief O'Hearn of the U.S. Coast Guard Marine Safety Office, the houseboat did sink to the side of the marina but did not block the entrance to other ves-

O'Hearn also stated that divers from the Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) were called to secure the ship's fuel pumps after 50 gallons of gasoline was visible in the

The one-level, all glass window houseboat had been left unattended since last summer when the owner abandoned it, stated Marina Master Doug Strauss. The responsibility of bringing the vessel out of the water is still being investigated, "but until then," he stated, "four feet of the Mandy Joe's bow can still be seen at low tide."

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

"We just say Baptist," Ginger says now. "We feel so far removed from our own denomination's fights over ridiculous things. That's one of the benefits of being in New England."

Here in Charlestown, as they work to start their own church, "We have chosen to call ourselves the Covenant Christian Fellowship of Charlestown," Milton says.

The Brasher-Cunninghams' fledgling congregation now has nine members, including Milton and Ginger. They meet at 7:30 p.m. on Thursday nights at the Brasher-Cunningham's apartment at 42 Pleasant St., Apt. 2, for Bible study and prayer. Anybody interested may call a special telephone number for information, 241-9784.

Milton and Ginger have

found their congregation. for the most part, in the ordinary course of life in Charlestown.

"Last November," Ginger remembers, "I was doing laundry down on Main Street, and I met this really nice woman. 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

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Apply Now For ABCD's Fuel Assistance Program!

The ABCD Fuel Assistance Program began on Nov. 1. Homeowners and renters in Charlestown who may be eligible to receive assistance with their heating needs this winter are urged to apply immediately. Assistance is available and will be provided on a firstcome, first-served basis. Residents are encouraged to apply for benefits now because fuel assistance funds may not last through the winter. The period for federal fuel assistance money is now to March 31, 1992.

Because the unemployment rate in Massachusetts has tripled in the past year, many families who were previously ineligible to receive fuel assistance are now eligible, regardless of their previous year's income. If you are unemployed and your unemployment benefits have run out, you may be eligible. If your unemployment benefits will run out between now and March 31, you, too, may be eligible. Applications are available now.

If you own or rent your home and receive a heating bill, if your heat is included in your rent, or if you live in subsidized housing, you may be eligible for assistance this winter. HEALTH HAZARDS OF HEROIN

Heroin is highly addictive. Those dependent on heroin use it regularly and can't stop using it even when there are damaging physical and psychological problems. They compulsively seek out the drug, need increasing doses, and suffer painful withdrawal symp-

Symptoms and signs of heroin use include euphoria, drowsiness, constricted pupils and nausea. Withdrawal symptoms include watery eyes, runny nose, yawning, loss of appetite, tremors, panic, chills, sweating, nausea, muscle cramps and insomnia. As withdrawal progresses, blood pressure, pulse and breathing rates increase. Symptoms of overdose include shallow breathing, clammy skin, convulsions, coma

Health problems are caused by uncertain dosage levels, unsterile equipment, contaminated heroin from cutting it with other ingredients or using the drug with others, such as alcohol or cocaine. Typical problems include skin abscesses, inflammation of the veins, serum hepatitis and addiction with withdrawal symp-

Sharing unsterile needles increases the risk of HIV exposure. Heroin, and a drug-abusing lifestyle, decreases the body's ability to withstand infection.

Father Cloherty Honored For Ecumenical Service

Rev. Francis Cloherty, Parochial Vicar of St. Mary Parish, was the recipient of the Forrest L. Knapp Award from the Council of Churches at a ceremony held on Jan. 22.

Rev. Diane C. Kessler, executive director of the Massachusetts Council of Churches, an organization representing the 16 mainstream Protestant churches, stated that Father Cloherty has left an ecumenical legacy wherever he has been. This led to his recognition by the Council, only the fourth Roman Catholic to receive the annual award since it was first presented in 1977

The choice of Father Cloherty for the award came as

C.R. a result of his efforts in bringing people together and helping them realize what they have in common, despite their denominational differences. Evidence of this was a recent visit by parishioners of St. Mary to a Jewish synagogue to better understand the differences and similarities of the two faiths.

Father Cloherty, who will turn 56 this month, was ordained 30 years ago. His priesthood has been directed toward ecumenicalism by the influence of both Vatican Council II and his Irish immigrant upbringing. Among the many endeavors he has pursued toward bringing people of differing faiths together have been Bible study groups, ecumenical Good Friday Stations of the Cross and a covenant among Lutheran, Episcopal and Catholic parishes. He also initiated dialogue between Anglican-Roman Catholic parishes, creating a pulpit exchange with a number of clergy while he was stationed in Lowell.

Since his arrival at St. Mary, Father Cloherty has taken on the task of adult religious education at parish Sunday classes and has instituted a Christian Adult Organization for single men and women between the ages of 21 and 35.

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
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
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Guest Speakers Address Charlestown After Murder Program
