Residents Vote Against Syndication — Face Utility Shut-off

Residents of CharlesNewtown have put their residences in the hands of fate rather than those of developer Phillip Quinn, having defeated a proposal by the co-op's board of directors to dissolve the corporation and syndicate the waterfront property.

Out of a possible 257

votes, 115 residents voted in favor of dissolving the twelve year old co-op and syndicating the property. 60 residents voted against the measure. However, before the co-op may be dissolved, a 2/3 majority vote is required. This means the vote to dissolve needed approximately 170 residents in favor of it, according to the co-op's by-

laws.

Disappointed Board of Directors President Richard Sevier sees the co-op shutting down within months, saying that the utility companies will force a sale of the co-op.

This may or may not be true. At the time of press, the co-op was facing a possible electrical shut-off by Boston Edison who is

trying to recover \$310 thousand in arrears. According to Sevier, the board and the co-op's lawyers would fight the action in court based on financial hardships.

Boston Edison could try to attach the co-op's income, forcing the co-op to default on their mortgage and, thus, forcing HUD into the

picture. HUD has refused to help the troubled co-op out of their financial woes this time, saying that all subsidies are dried up and that their hands are tied.

HUD could insist that the property be sold or the property could wind up under court receivership, similar to what happened to Boston Housing Authority. Again, the co-op could be sold or the

receiver could try and untangle the co-op's finances and management problems.

Either arrangement means the board of directors would be rendered powerless. It is not clear whether sale of the co-op would still be under HUD regulations as was promised by Phillip Quinn.

Charlestown Resident To Be Honored At ABCD Community Awards Dinner

All of Boston will honor 16 neighborhood volunteers at the ninth annual Community Awards Dinner of Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) on October 28.

U.S. Senator John Glenn of Ohio will deliver the keynote address and assist ABCD in honoring these dedicated individuals at this special celebration, ABCD's biggest event of the year. Glenn, the first American to orbit the Earth in America's NASA space program, was elected to the U.S. Senate in 1974 and re-elected in 1980. He currently serves as a member of the Foreign Relations Committee, Governmental Affairs Committee, Special Committee on Aging, and the Senate Democratic Policy Committee.

Each year, ABCD recognizes outstanding men and women whose consistent, effective work in their neighborhoods has improved the quality of life for disadvantaged Boston residents. Each is chosen through one of ABCD's neighborhood-based agencies, including local Area Planning Action Councils (APACs), Neighborhood Service Centers (NSCs) and delegate

agencies.

Through the efforts of these volunteers, valuable community programs such as Head Start, health-care advocacy, and fuel assistance have been built and maintained.

Joseph Kent was selected as an award recipient by the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center. A retired Boston firefighter, Kent supports many Charlestown charity projects, such as sponsoring local youth athletic teams. He was instrumental in creating the "Townie Santa," a program that supplies gifts and food baskets to

Charlestown's shut-ins.

Kent is currently President of the JFK Center's Board of Directors, and previously served as its Treasurer. He is the proprietor of the Badger Coin Shop in Charlestown.

The Community Awards Dinner will take place at the Sheraton-Boston Hotel, beginning at 6:30 p.m. with a cocktail reception. The

evening includes dancing in the Sheraton's Grand Ballroom, guest speakers, and other entertainment.

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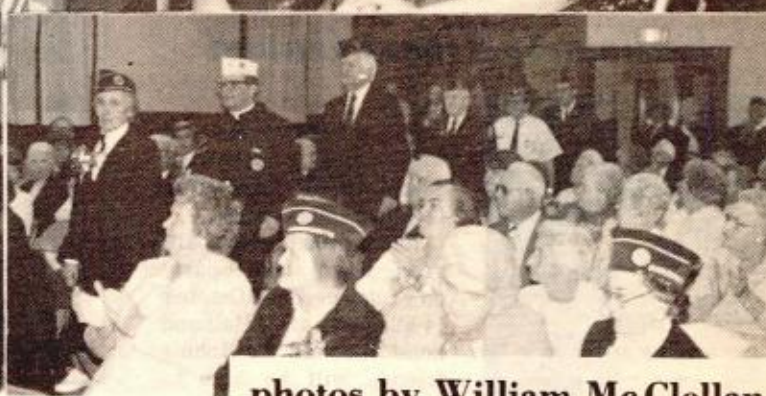

Mask Making Workshop Scheduled

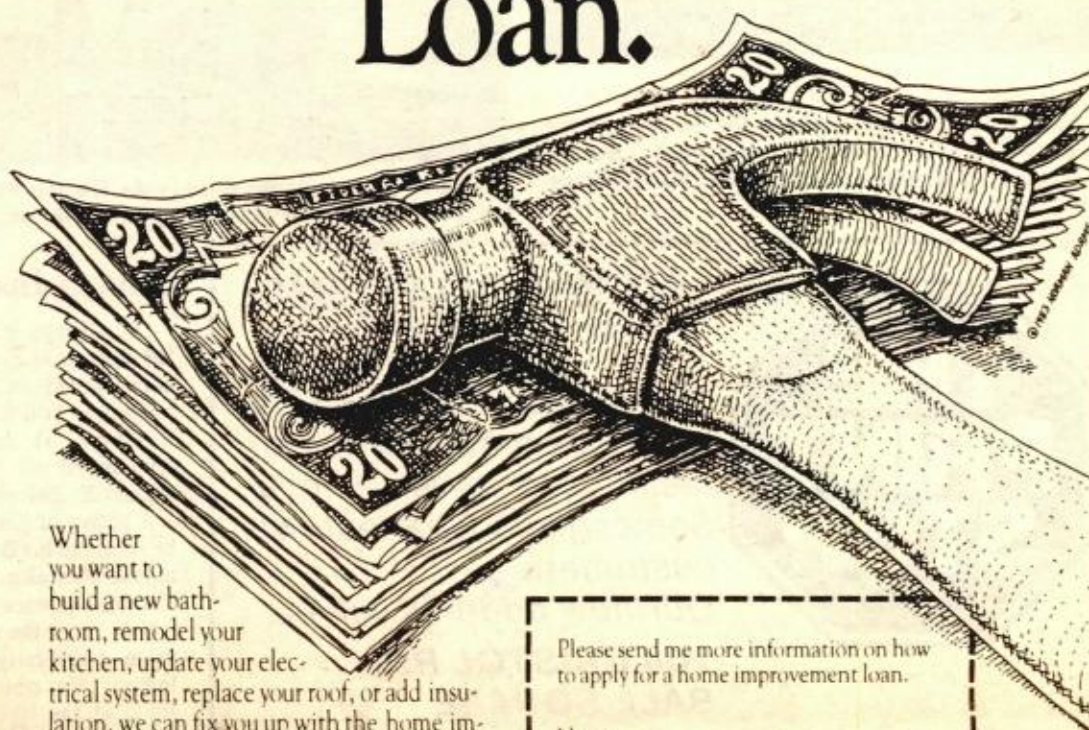
In preparation for Halloween, the Charlestown Branch Library Children's Room will hold two special sessions on maskmaking for children, ages 6 and up.

Jack "The Barber"— Jack "The Man"

The year was 1949. The country was just recovering from the effects of World War II, and was on the threshold of Korea. It was a time when a dollar could buy a quart of milk, a loaf of bread, the daily newspaper, and still yield enough change to buy a couple of dime beers at the neighborhood tavern.

In Charlestown, delightful aromas of freshly baked bread floated on breezes from the Bond Bread plant and settled pleasantly on Bunker Hill. The "Hippie" and Hollywood Theaters provided a good deal of local entertainment, television had not yet reached many homes, and the "Alibi" was doing its utmost to maintain its infamous notoriety.

It was a time when the local barber shop served more than its obvious purpose. It was a place for men to gather and swap tales. It was a place where domestic and world problems were discussed and solved.

242 Bunker Hill Street was Jerry Santoro's Barber Shop. It was just such a place. Jerry, a short, stocky, affable gentleman had been plying his trade in the town since 1919. For thirty years he had honed his straight edged razor on the black leather strap which dangled from the arm of his barber's chair, and created mounds of lather from a single shaving mug and brush.

Jerry was a master of his art, but by 1949 the men were back from the war, and on Saturdays large groups lined the shop's perimeter awaiting their turn. It was evident, even to him, that an assistant was needed.

In April of 1949, a young and rather reluctant son-in-law came to the shop to be a barber. Certainly, it had not been a lifelong ambition, and more certainly, it would be but temporary. To Jack Luiselli, the new barber, cutting hair and shaving stubbled chins would be but a stepping stone toward something more attractive, perhaps a position with the old Boston Elevated would be a more appropriate future goal.

Something happened, though, during those first few months at the barber shop, and the attraction which brought Jack to the shop each day was not cutting hair, it was the people.

Not long after his coming to the shop to assist Jerry, a new and younger clientele began to frequent the place. They were "Fish" Russell, Paul "Hutza" Lillis, Joe Ray, Bobby Moore, and Louie Campagna, among others. They were the "Bearcats", they played football, and they were in need of a coach.

Although nobody at the shop that day would realize it, the agreement reached between a young barber and the group of "Bearcats" that Saturday in 1949 was the beginning of a legacy, a legacy which would, as of today, reach into five different decades and touch three separate generations.

For three years, the "Bearcats" played with a certain degree of success while Jack familiarized himself with the finer points of coaching. By the time 1953 rolled around, he had all but abandoned any thoughts of joining the Boston Elevated. His infatuation with Charlestown and its people had become a true love affair. Business at the shop had increased to the point where he felt he could make a decent living while doing something he now knew he wanted to do, coach young football players.

In 1953 Jack took over the reins of the old Russell A.C., a team which had the dubious distinction of going 0-9 the previous season. He began by changing the name to the Mystic A.C. and adding a few new players. The results were instant and startling. For two seasons, 1953 and 1954, the team did not lose a single ballgame.

In 1955, the Mystic A.C., combined forces with a few other local clubs, and the Charlestown Town Team, as it was known under Jack "The Barber" Luiselli, was born. During the 1955 and 1956 seasons, the "Townies" were victorious in all but one game, a 2-0 loss to the West Roxbury Merchants in 1955, a loss which delayed the team's climb to the top rung of Park League competition by one year. To prove they belonged with the best, the "Townies" compiled a perfect 1956 season, going undefeated, untied, and unscored upon. From 1953 through 1956, Jack's teams had amassed an amazing record of thirty one wins and one loss.

It was now time to step to the top, to move in with the iron. Jack and his "Townies" had opened the door to the Senior Park League for themselves by their outstanding play in the organizations lower divisions, but now they would be tested by the lines of the powerful Chippewas of South Boston and Tornadoes of East Boston.

Under Jack's leadership, the "Townies" proved they could play at the top by compiling a 5-3 record in their first year in the Senior Park League. In 1958 the record improved to 6-2, and in 1959 they finished a 7-1 season by capturing the first of four consecutive Park League Championships.

During those four championship seasons, the team's overall record was 28-1-4, but its proudest statistic was that not a single touchdown was scored on the ground against the defense.

When he felt his time to step down was at hand, Jack did so, but proudly. Packed neatly into his dossier of accomplishments was an enviable fifteen year record of seventy-two wins, nine losses, and four ties.

Strangely, the "Barber's" fondest memory of his years as a coach was not in capturing one of his four championships, but in a regular season encounter. It was the first time one of his teams defeated the Chippewas. He remembers the crowd. "There were thousands of crazy, screaming people. It seems impossible, now, that a Park League game could generate such excitement. Jimmy Duffy was jumping up and down on the sidelines. He worked

the crowd into a frenzy." He remembers the three key plays. "They were moving on us when 'Cuie' O'Donnell jarred the ball loose with a bone crushing tackle. We had to kick against a forty mile an hour wind from deep in our own territory. John Lillis got off a sixty yarder. And, of course the couchdown - Harry Festa to Jimmy Bradley, Harry went back, threw it as far as he could. Jimmy beat his man deep but tripped over a pitching mound at the end of the field. It should have been leveled for the football season, but it wasn't. He stumbled, regained his balance, caught the ball, and went in for the game's only score. It was 6-0.

"Huck Finnegan of the old Boston American was covering the game and he was with me when we reached the locker room. It was bedlam. The boys picked me up on their shoulders and carried me around. It was the only time in seventy-nine victories they ever did that. When they



finally put me down, the emotion of the days events caught up to them. They cried. I cried with them."

Fifteen years of coaching makes for fifteen years of memories, some bitter, but most sweet. "About memorable players? There were some damn good ball players, some better than others, but ask me about memorable players, and all I'll ever tell you is any young man who ever wore the uniform of a team I coached is memorable to me."

Jack "The Barber" Luiselli's accomplishments on the gridiron were numerous. Time and space will not allow all of those important details to be listed. Time and space must be allowed, however, to speak not of the coach, but of the man, for those of us who have had the good fortune of knowing him since that April of 1949, he is first a man, and then a coach.

"Has Charlestown changed since I first came here thirty-four years ago? Of course it has. Nothing remains the same

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after thirty-four years, but let me tell you this, and I say it with true sincerity, the young people who I deal with in my shop today treat me with the same respect the young people of thirty-four years ago did. Let me tell you something about the youngsters of today. When I was growing up, Exceptional Children, retarded we called them, rarely left their homes, and when they did, you crossed the street to avoid them. Today, Exceptional Children are more visible, and do you see how these kids are treated by this generation of youngsters, the same ones we are sometimes so quick to criticize? They put their arms around them, they talk to them, they take them places, they help them, they go to school and study so they can come back and work with them, teach them.

"Yeah, Charlestown has changed over the past thirty-five years. Some of the changes have been for the good, others for the bad, but believe me, it's the same everywhere. There is nobody anywhere, though, who can tell me the good in Charlestown doesn't outweigh the bad."

To further enhance the image of Jack "The Man", one need only ask him why he has been so successful in Charlestown, a community in which he does not, nor ever has, resided. It would be easy and understandable for him to cite his own dedication and hard work. True to form, however, he credits not himself, but his lovely wife, Chris.

"Hell, if she doesn't deserve a medal, nobody does. She sat home many nights alone while I attended games and practices and never once complained. She could have, you know, she had every reason to, but she didn't. Any credit for any degree of success I may have attained in the community has to go to her."

There is something Jack said to me recently which left a great impression.

"Over the years in Charlestown," he said, "I have made a living, but more than that, I have made friends."

Put a friend in your corner, and it will not crack. Put two friends in your corner, and it will not fall. Put several friends in your corner, and it will stand forever.

Jack "The Barber", Jack "The Man", you have a horde of Friends. Your corner will stand forever — and one more day.

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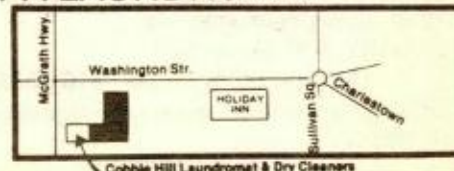

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
