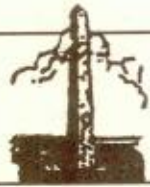

A Mother's Love – A Son's Grateful Words

Denny Borden and I go back a long way, so far back that it is rumored we watched Paul Revere's original ride together. We played on the same St. Catherine's baseball team, the same Scalli's softball team and spent many days together at the Boys Club. As adults, we still walk many similar pathways.

Barbara Borden was, perhaps, my wife's closest friend when both attended Julie Billiard High School.

Jimmy Borden, now a Boston firefighter, was, for a time, a softball teammate of mine.

Lester Borden was in one of my classes when I taught at Charlestown High School.

There are other Bordens whom I do not know as well as the aforementioned, but in my dealings with any of them, I have never heard a voice raised in anger, nor have I heard bad words spoken about others.

Those who have had an opportunity to share part of a lifetime with any of the Bordens know of what I speak, those who have not had that opportunity may be interested in what is to follow. It came addressed to my parents' home, from Athens, Alabama.

"Dear Charlie,

Please let me introduce myself as one of Denny Borden's younger brothers. I have been in the service for almost 20 years and still consider myself a "Townie." As I have traveled the world, I have always subscribed to the "Patriot." Your short stories and articles have always been interesting to me, and I would like you to consider writing a small article for someone very special to me.

My mother has always been an inspiration to my entire family, and we all feel she is quite a remarkable woman. She quietly raised our large family through more difficult times than I care to think about and has never complained about how life has treated her. She will be 84 soon, and now lives in a nursing home in Southie.

There is much to tell about her, like that fact that she came from Canada by herself as a young girl stricken with polio, and the loss of use in her left leg and arm for the last 75 or 80 years, or the fact that she is a Gold Star Mother (she lost a son in Vietnam) and had another son and grandson in Desert Storm. I could go on, but I wanted to give you a bit of an idea.

Charlie, I do not want this for myself, and none of my family knows about this letter or my idea, and it will stay that way regardless of your decision.

I asked my wife if you would think I was being too forward, and she encouraged me to write to you. Please understand that I wouldn't even want my name mentioned, or anyone else's for that matter. I just want the world to know what a wonderful woman my mother has been.

Again, I would like you to at least consider the idea.

Bobby Borden"

I apologize, Bobby, for going against your wishes and using your name, but knowing most of your family, I think it would be extremely gratifying to each of them to know you have said that which each of them has surely felt throughout their lives.

Money Matters

YOU CAN HELP A SOCIAL SECURITY RECIPIENT PAY HIS BILLS

If you have a friend or loved one who is receiving Social Security benefits, but who is no longer capable of handling his/her own financial affairs, you can apply to become his "representative payee." It will then become your responsibility to use the payments you receive on his or her behalf for his or her personal care and well-being.

To become a representative payee, you must be competent in financial matters and be sincere in your desire to help someone who is receiving Social Security or Supplemental Security Income (SSI). About 25 percent of the people who receive SSI and about 10 percent of the people who get Social Security have such payees.

As a representative payee, you will need to keep informed of the individual's needs so that you can decide how benefits can best be used for his or her personal care and well-being. This is particularly important if the beneficiary does not live with you.

You must first make sure that the beneficiary's day-to-day needs for food and shelter are met. Then, benefits may be used for the beneficiary's personal needs, such as clothing, recreation and other miscellaneous expenses. Benefits can also be used to pay for medical needs (for example: eyeglasses and hearing aids) and dental care not provided by Medicare, Medicaid or a residential institution.

Representative payees are required by law to use benefits properly. Any money left over after meeting the beneficiary's current and reasonably foreseeable needs must be saved. As a representative payee, you will be required to periodically account for the funds you have received by completing Form SSA-623, Representative Payee Report.

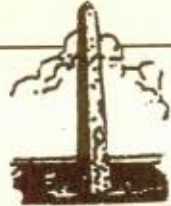

★ **Street Reconstruction Update . . .** Work on the Boston Redevelopment Authority's (BRA's) Three Streets reconstruction project is proceeding as scheduled. Currently, various construction activities are taking place on several different streets.

On Union Street, crews continue to pour concrete sidewalks and wheelchair access ramps. Tree wells are being constructed in the sidewalks for September planting of Maidenhair trees. Brick pavers will be set in the tree wells after the trees have been planted.

Installation of concrete bases for new gas street lights has been completed on Soley and Cordis streets. Crews from the Boston Gas Company are currently running gas service piping to the bases to fuel the lamps. Additional bases are now being set on Pleasant Street. A crew performing permanent sidewalk and roadway patching has started work on the area disturbed by this work.

The first of four deliveries of gas lamp posts and fixtures is scheduled to arrive at the job site during the first week of August. Installation will begin shortly thereafter on Winthrop and Tremont streets.

Preparations for the finish course of pavement are now underway on Winthrop and Tremont streets. This work includes adjusting manhole and drain covers and general clean-up of road debris. Paving is scheduled for July 27 on these two streets.

Weekday parking restrictions remain in effect as posted, on those streets where construction work is taking place. Residents are reminded that their continued cooperation in complying with these restrictions is essential and appreciated.

For questions, concerns or complaints, residents are requested **NOT** to call the **Patriot**. Instead, please call 241-9509, the telephone number given out by the contractor, or the Middlesex Corporation at 1-508-256-6534.

There have been complaints from residents to the **Patriot** office and the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services that the telephone number, 241-9509, given out by the contractor on residential problems has not been in service. According to Bill Barbado of the BRA, an answering machine will be in operation as of today, July 21. He said that calls received on that line would be directed to the proper channels, the BRA or the contractor.

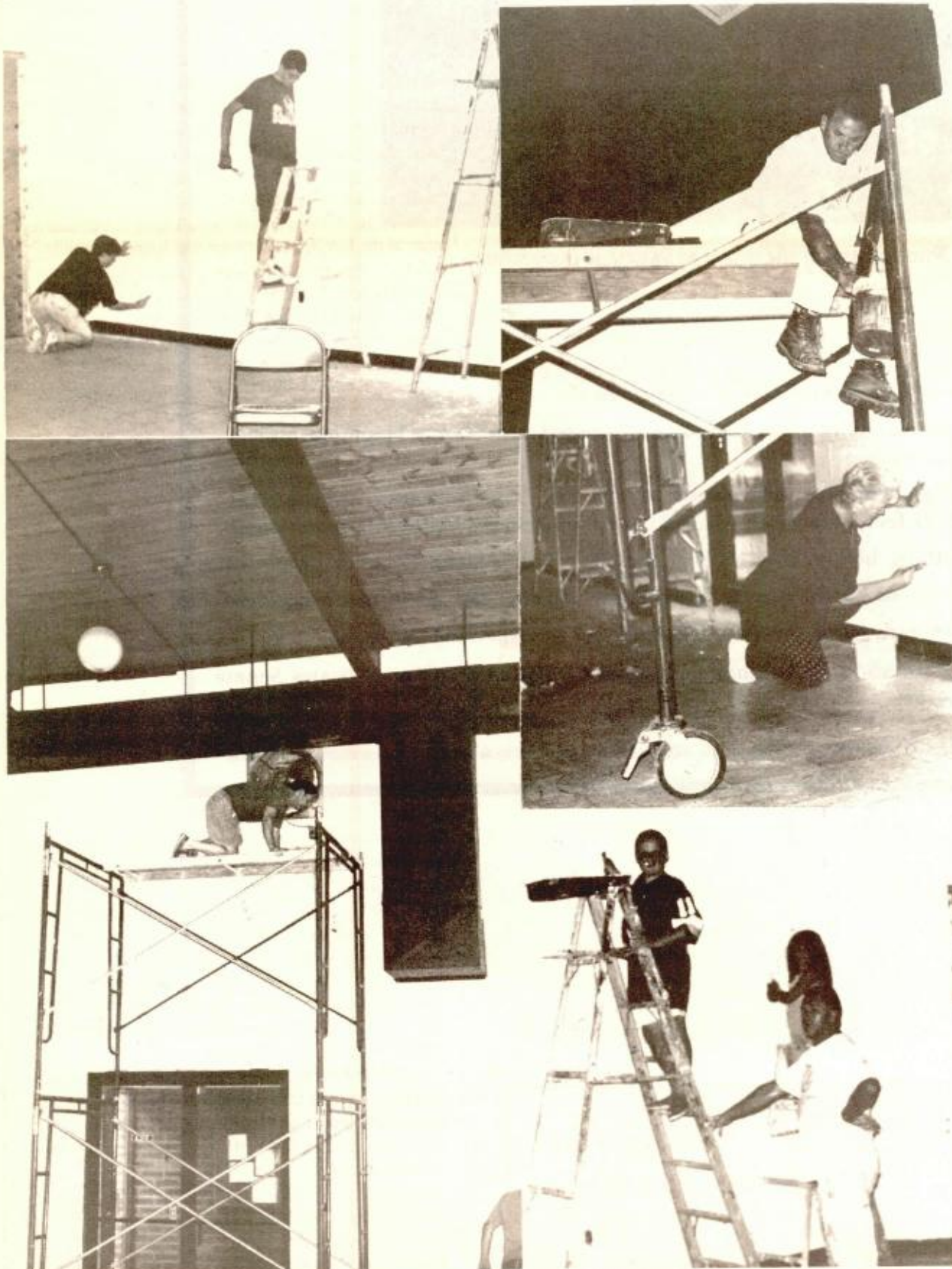

Thunderfest To Go To Quincy

Boston International Sports Promotion Inc. has sent communication to District One City Councillor Diane J. Modica stating that they have decided not to pursue the Charlestown Navy Yard as their staging area for the Boston International Thunderfest.

Several months ago, the Thunderfest promoters contacted Modica's office to ask for her help in identifying and arranging a meeting with the appropriate neighborhood representatives. A public meeting was subsequently held by Modica, in conjunction with the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, on June 8 to get input from the community. Those present at the meeting raised concerns about public safety and traffic, and the Thunderfest organizers promised that these concerns would be addressed.

As of July 15, Modica's office and community lead-

ers had not received any substantial answers to their concerns. The promoters of the event failed to gain the support and confidence of many Charlestown residents, members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, the Navy Yard Neighborhood Association and Modica.

"Despite the ample time and assistance given by my staff and neighborhood leaders, the Thunderfest promoters did not acquire the necessary permits, nor did they produce any traffic or safety plans for the community to review," Modica stated.

The Menino Administration was informed that the community and Modica would not support the event because they did not believe that the promoters could organize the event and address the community concerns given the time constraints.

Peter Looney, chairman

of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, commented, "The concerns of the Charlestown community could not be addressed satisfactorily with the necessary due process. I would like to thank Councillor Modica for staying on top of the issue and keeping the concerns of the Charlestown community as her top priority."

Susan Holaday, co-chairperson of the Navy Yard Neighborhood Association, stated, "We cooperated in every way possible, but on the basis of what was presented, we did not feel we had enough information to lend our support."

Thunderfest promoters are seeking to host their event in Quincy Bay. They have the Coast Guard approval to stage the event in Boston's outer harbor, but the racers will not be docking in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

"The people of Charlestown have a right to feel secure that an event of this magnitude would not unreasonably disrupt the neighborhood," Modica commented, "however, those assurances were not forthcoming. While Thunderfest sounded like an exciting event, the community interests would not be well-served to stage such an event under the circumstances," concluded Modica.

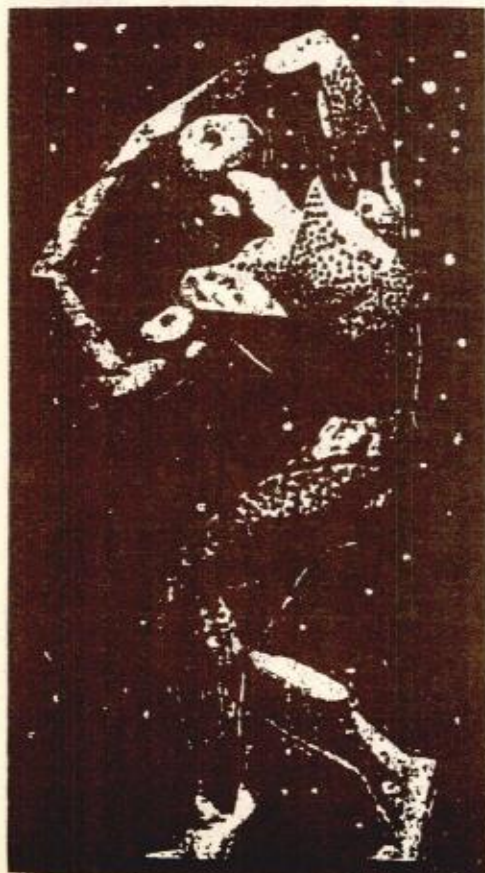

Rep. Richard Voke and Sen. Thomas Birmingham announced that the 3 percent Cost Of Living Adjustment (COLA) for retired state, county and municipal employees has made it through the deliberation process and will be included as part of the state's fiscal year '95 budget.

"This move provides thousands of retirees and

their families with a much needed and greatly deserved increase in their pensions to help keep up with the pace of inflation. Given the ever increasing costs of health care and other essentials, it is only right that we grant this adjustment to pensioners who have given so much to our community and state," noted Birmingham.

While budget funds

continue to be tight, Voke, who as Majority Leader of the House helps direct policy, and Birmingham, who authors the Senate budget as Chairman of the Committee on Ways and Means, said they made it a priority to secure a COLA and not to see the budget balanced at the expense of the people who helped bring Massachusetts to where it is today.

"I was very glad to be a part of the efforts to help those individuals who protected our streets, paved our roads and taught our kids. Pleased to be in the corner of our retirees, I will continue to advocate for them and to further other causes which assist seniors throughout the state maintain a quality standard of living," continued Voke.

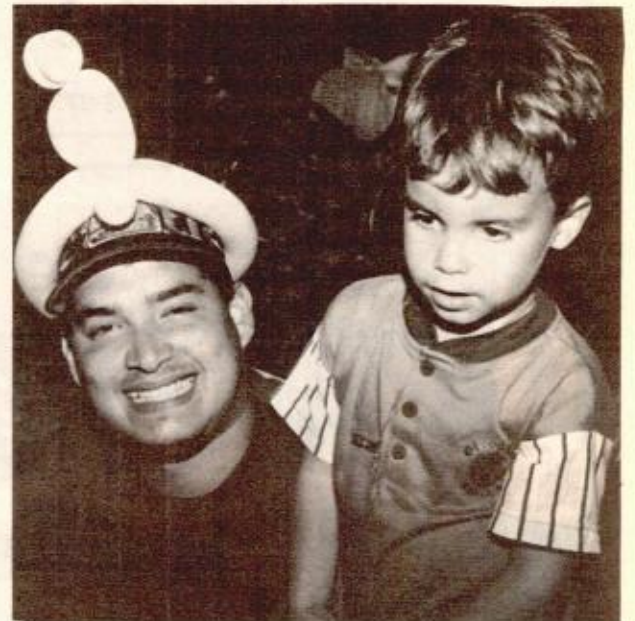
