## Farewell, My Comrade

St. Mary's Church was packed this past Monday morning, as hundreds of friends, relatives, fellow members of the Boston Police Department and Marine Corps "buddies" from the First Marine Division Association filled the church to overflowing as they paid their final respects at the Requiem Mass for Patrolman William F. Carroll of Charlestown.

"Billy", a 17 year veteran of the Police Department, died Thursday, January 25, 1979 at Beth Israel Hospital where he was rushed that day suffering a fatal heart attack. He was only 48 years of age and till then in the prime of health.

"Billy" would have loved the send off he was given - the wonderful eulogy - the detail of 30 Police Officers, led by the Police Color Guard that marched from

the church to Thompson Square where they formed an Honor Guard for the funeral cortege to pass through. The impressive U.S. Marine Corps Firing Squad from Worcester - all in dress blues - under the command of Captain Carter Hunt, a close friend of "Billy's", who fired their final salute to their fellow Marine, as taps was sounded by the trumpeter from the Boston Police Department, at the internment ceremony at Woodlawn Cemetery. Followed by the presentation of the American Flag - which he so proudly fought under as a Marine - by Captain Hunt to "Billy's" single sister Patricia who made a home for her bachelor brother for the past several years.

He would have been pleased to note - those from many walks of

life - who attended his Requiem Mass. School chums who sat side by side with him in the public school system in Charlestown. Neighbors who grew up with him first on Pleasant Street and then later when he moved to Union Street, at the corner of Lawrence. Marine buddies - such as Gunney Sergeant Bill Hughes, Col. Dan Regan and Jim "O'Bie" O'Brien of Monument Ave., formerly of Chestnut Street, who were fellow active members of the First Marine Division Association.

Members of his family including his six sisters: Margaret McLaughlin of Dorchester,

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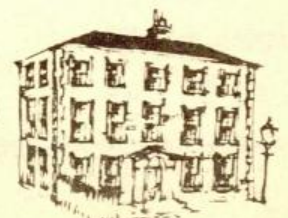

Madeline Silvestri of East Boston, Mildred Fishera of Melrose, Henrietta Murray, Helen Hoey and Patricia Carroll all of Charlestown and their families.

The Sullivan Clan - of Washington Street - several of the brothers and sisters were at the service - whose house during "Billy's" youth was called a "second home."

His fellow Police Officers - that **Thin Blue Line** - many of whom he had served with since his appointment to the department in 1961 in District 14, Allston-Brighton.

Those he met socially or

through his affiliation with Bunker Hill Council No. 62, Knights of Columbus, The Boston Police Patrolman's Association and other organizations.

Many, at the church, like this writer, possibly reflected on the many ways that "Billy" Carroll had touched their lives and brought a bit of humor, happiness, or the comradeship of sharing a libation and joining in a song - preferably Irish if not the Marine Corps Hymn.

He was known to gather with both TOWNIE friends and First Marine Division Association buddies at Sully's, at Union and Lynde Street, on a Saturday afternoon to watch the games on

T.V. or on festive occasions to join in song.

He took great pride in being a Marine, having served with distinction for 6 years, including a combat tour during the Korean Conflict. After his honorable discharge, he continued his love for the Corps through his affiliation with the First Marine Division in which he had been active for past decade.

This writer, as he reflected in the Church, recalled vividly - as if it was only yesterday rather than close to 40 years ago - when he, as a product of the Charlestown Clubhouse, Boys' Clubs of Boston as was "Billy", both spent part of a summer vacation at Camp Wing How "Billy" - long-legged "Billy" - won the road race and the coveted prize with this writer coming in second.

After a lapse of a number of years both paths crossed again in the early 1960's. Meeting "Billy" with John Dunlea and John MacDonald in an Irish organization called the Tara Club of Boston. All four were amongst those invited to a private party at 33 1/2 Beacon Street, Boston in which the great Irish writer Brendan Behan was the guest of honor.

How "Billy" and Dunlea would vie in singing Irish songs and through the Tara Club "Billy" gained friendship with Mary Tierney who originally wrote an Irish column for the Herald-

Traveler Newspaper.

Then this writer and "Billy's" paths again crossed a few years back at the First Marine Division Association when the meetings were held at the Club at the Marine Barracks at the Charlestown Navy Yard.

It was a pleasure for this writer to know "Billy" Carroll - not as a close personal friend - but as a fellow TOWNIE - to have the good fortune of knowing "Billy" and the opportunity of joining with him in the growing process and the camaraderie of both song and mutual love and pride in the U.S. Marine Corps.

"We salute you" Billy Carroll - "Farewell our comrade."

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## Chad Green Belongs With His Parents

When the parents of Chad Green of Scituate were ordered back to the Massachusetts Superior Court by Judge Guy Volterra, it was said that Laetrile was on trial. That obviously is the issue.

Seventeen states thus far have legalized the use of Laetrile within their boundaries—Alaska, Arizona, Delaware, Florida, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Louisiana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Oklahoma, Oregon, Texas, Maryland, Idaho and Washington...but the attempts to do it here have never succeeded.

On December 14 of last year, a five member panel of the Appellate Division of New York State Supreme Court ruled that nine year old Joey Hofbauer can continue a life saving program of metabolic treatment, including the use of Laetrile, for his cancerous Hodgkins disease. He is a patient of Dr. Michael Schachter, nutritional specialist of Nyack, N.Y. and is being treated without chemotherapy.

The Appellate Division panel upheld a June 28, 1978 ruling by Saratoga County (N.Y.) Family Court Judge Loren Brown. At that time, Judge Brown said: "This court also finds that

metabolic therapy has a place in our society; and hopefully its proponents are on the first rung of a ladder that will rid us of all forms of cancer."

Mrs. Hollis Green, the boy's grandmother, told me in an interview that metabolic treatment does indeed have a place in our society, but that few medical colleges in the United States have courses on nutrition.

She also felt that the pressure was on the media to downgrade the Green's arguments and that the opinions of Dr. Ernesto Contreras, who had practiced medicine for 38 years, was deserving of more respect. She described him as a man of kindness and understanding.

Mrs. Green said, "the government is very powerful, but Diana and Jerry, through their courage are blazing a trail—not only for the sake of their little boy, but for all the Chads of the world."

**FORCED BUSING LOSES IN CALIFORNIA SENATE**  
In California, State Senator Alan Robbins (D-Van Nuys) has thus far been tremendously

successful toward getting an anti-busing amendment on the ballot for 1980.

On January 10, 1979 the amendment was approved on a 10-1 vote by the Senate Education Committee. That was followed on January 18 by a 31 to 5 vote in the California Senate. Now the major hurdle will be to win approval of the Assembly Judiciary Committee which has rejected it since Robbin's initial try in 1977. However, there is more enthusiasm for the legislation now that city-suburban busing is on the horizon.

A report in the Los Angeles Times 1-11-79 stated that the one dissenting vote of the Senate Education Committee was cast by Senator Diane E. Watson, a black, elected to that office last November. She formerly served on the L.A. city school board, is in favor of the busing plan and was highly critical of two other blacks who appeared as witnesses on

behalf of the Robbins legislation.

"These arguments (against busing) are 100 or 200 years old...some people have forgotten so soon where they came from", she said.

One of the black witnesses was Mrs. Verdelle C. Reynolds, Superintendent of Pasadena Schools, who contended that a return to basic education in the district had done more for black children than the district's desegregation program.

She also argued against the idea that black children learn better by sitting along side whites—she called it "an insult to black parents" and asked, "what kind of an ego are we building in these little ones?"

The other black witness, according to the report, was the Rev. W.C. Jackson, a Los Angeles minister who called the city district's current busing program "devastating". "The chaos in unbelievable", he said.

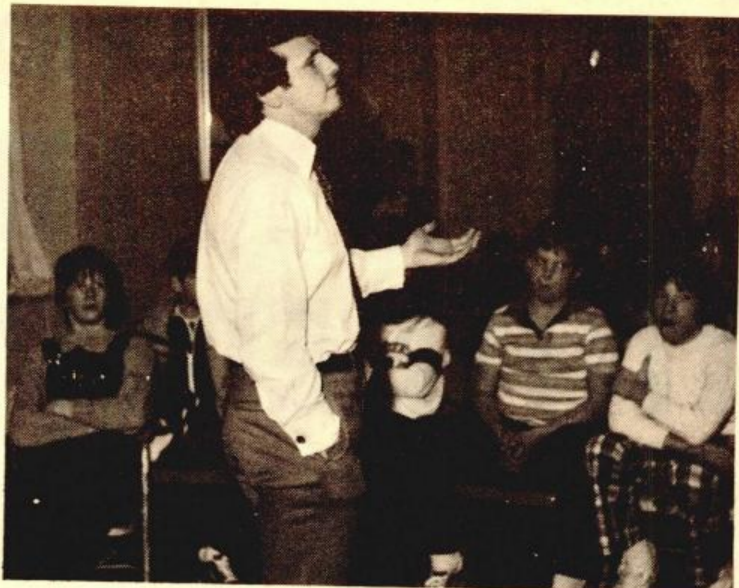

# Sweeney Named To Special Commission

Mayor Kevin H. White announced today the appointment of Edward Sweeney, of Charlestown, Chairman of the Bunker Hill Task Force to "The Special Commission on the Housing Authority". The commission will study public housing in Boston. The formation of the commission marks the commencement of a major effort to determine the effects of court intervention in public housing, a priority area named by the Mayor in his "State of the City" address.

The nine member commission, chaired by housing developer Arnold Soloway, will conduct broad public debate on the effects of court intervention on public housing tenants and neighborhoods. It will also address the

problems of management, funding and accountability for public housing conditions. The commission will report its finding to the Mayor on May 1.

"On naming this commission of experts we will get the answers we need to act on one of Boston's most distressing problems - public housing," Mayor White said. "Sweeney's involvement with the Bunker Hill Tenant Task Force will assure that the needs of Boston's public housing tenants will be recognized and addressed by the Commission."

Boston Housing Authority operations have been under court supervision since a court appointed master was assigned to the BHA in 1975 as a result of a class action suit filed by BHA tenants.

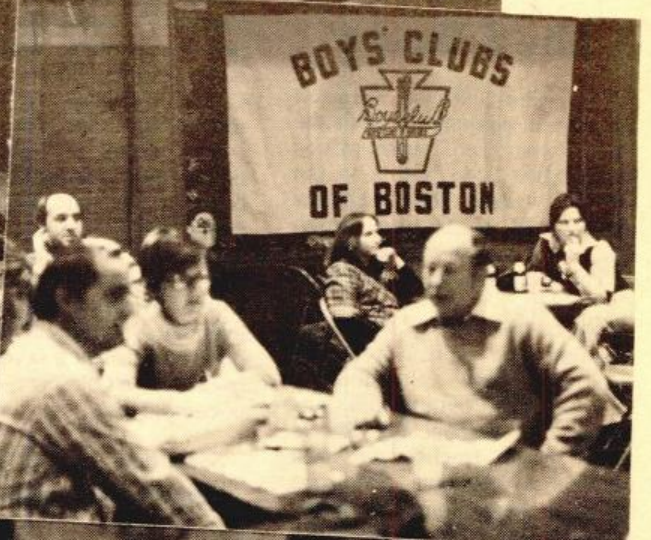

## Ordinances and Statutes of the City of Boston

### Chapter 11, Ordinance 14, Sec: 291 Dog Fouling

No person owning, keeping or harboring a dog shall permit it to foul on any sidewalk of any street in the City.

### Chapter 11, Ordinance 14, Section 257: Keeping of Cows

No person shall keep or allow to keep in any building of which he may be the owner or occupant within the city limits more than one cow for each three thousand square feet, except in accordance with a permit from the board of health.

### Chapter 11, Ordinance 14, Section 300: Removal of Snow and Ice

No owner or tenant of an estate abutting on a sidewalk shall place or suffer to remain for more than three hours between sunrise and sunset, any snow upon such sidewalk unless such ice is made even and covered with sand, sawdust, or ashes, to prevent slipping.

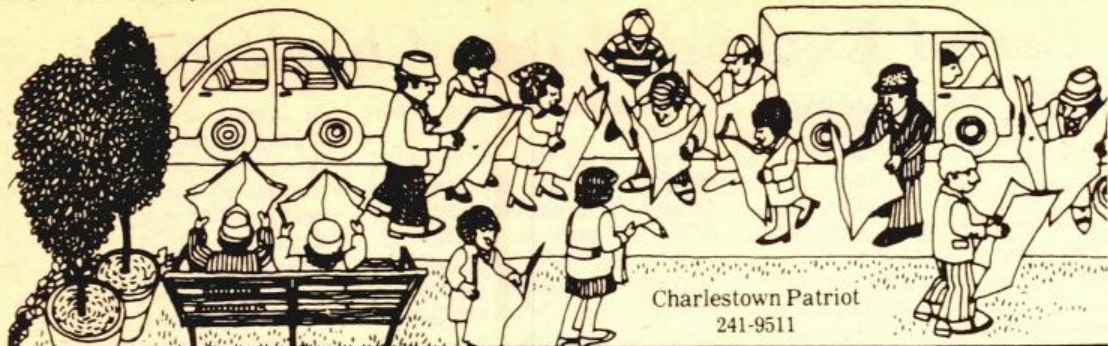

**Visiting Aides Available To Elderly**

The Visiting Aides Program, administered by the Mayor's Commission on Affairs of the Elderly, provides companionship and health monitoring to isolated elder Bostonians. "The Program is unique in placing primary emphasis on services to the many seniors who are homebound and cut off from their communities," says Mayor Kevin H. White. "Visiting Aides provide the link necessary to bridge the gap of isolation. In many cases, the Program means the difference between life at home and life in an institution."

The Program employs 75 Visiting Aides between the ages of 55 and 85 who serve 13 Sponsor Agencies throughout Boston's 18 neighborhoods. Visiting Aides are trained in areas relevant to their job responsibilities and in issues of particular interest to elders. Each aide carries an ongoing caseload of 10 to 15 clients and meets with them weekly in clients' homes. In addition to providing friendly visits on a one-to-one basis and health monitoring, aides offer information, referral, follow-up services when necessary, and escort services to medical appointments and shopping trips. Visiting Aides also provide clients with emotional support during periods of stress and supportive counseling during periods of transition.

"We are very proud of the outstanding services, often unseen but of vital importance to Boston's isolated elderly, provided by the Visiting Aides and Sponsor Agencies," says Elderly Commissioner Elaine Guiney.

**Mounted Patrol Expanded Into Charlestown**

Mayor Kevin H. White today announced the expansion of the Boston Police Department's innovative Mounted Patrol program into Charlestown.

Mounted police beats will patrol Main Street in Charlestown from City Square to Eden Street both day and night. Presently they patrol 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. to 1:00 a.m. The patrol also tends The Edwards Middle School crossing daily at 1:50 p.m.

That announcement came at the graduation of 18 more officers from the BPD's intensive ten-week Mounted Patrol Hor-

semanship Training Program.

Mayor White said, "When we started the horse patrols out in Dorchester this summer, we were frankly experimenting. We had a good program, but we weren't sure how the neighborhoods would respond to the idea of mounted police. The response has been tremendous, and we have now placed mounted officers in nearly every section of the city."

Mayor White added, "This program has proven to be an effective method for bringing police services closer to the neighborhood people, while also

providing a commanding police presence."

The training that the mounted patrol officers receive is designed to train both horse and officer to work as a single effective police unit. That rigorous instruction includes control of animal under street conditions, care of animal and horsemanship, and two weeks of field training where trainees respond to neighborhood calls.

Police Commissioner Joseph

M. Jordan said, "These officers represent the cream of the crop, their training and personality characteristics make them the best possible police officers for this type of duty. They are superb officers, and it shows in the way they perform their duties."

The Mounted Patrol Unit is composed of volunteers from the police department ranks ranging from probationary recruits fresh from the police academy to 25 year veterans of the force.

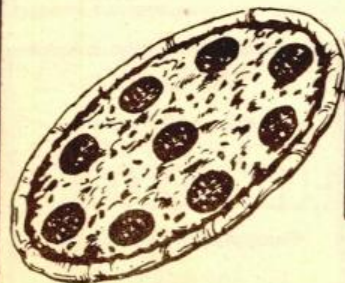
