

## Community Gets First Look At

 Proposed Whydah Pirate Museumby Kathy Giordano The Whydah Pirate Complex development team was received with near exuberance by the community last Monday night when members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Development Committee brought the principals involved in the proposal to a public forum. The Knights of Columbus Hall was crowded umbus Hall was crowded
with residents eager to hear the plans for a pirate ship museum that could be built in the Yard's End section of the Charlestown Navy Yard.
The presentation prepared for the community's benefit was nothing less than a sophisticated, professional rendering of a 21 st century attraction that on the outside captured the essence of the 19th century
architecture of the neighborhood it would inhabit. Through the use of a slide show presentation, project principals Roland Betts and Tom Bernstein walked the audience through the history of the pirate ship and its infamous captain and his crew. Also displayed on screen were artifacts that were discovered at the ocean's bottom from the shipwreck, proven to be that of the Whydah. Architect David Schwarz then pictorially explained how his firm, Architectural Services, P.C., devised the design for a structure to both accommodate a museum and blend with the Navy Yard setting
The proposed museum would be located on Dry Dock $5 /$ Parcel 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The site consists of $51 / 2$ acres, 150,000 square feet of which would house the facility. The primary entrance/ exit to the museum would be directly from a newly created Gate 6 at the end of the Navy Yard. Piers 10 and 11 would be included in the development package.
Schwarz stated that the dry dock would be incorporated into the design of the facility as an important link with a Yard's End Park. Pedestrian walkways and shuttle boat launch areas would highlight this main entry side of the building. Boardwalks, outdoor dining areas, waterfront stores and green, open space would surround the museum, he stated. He added that the structure, as proposed, would stand 110 feet high at (continued on page 17)

# Traffic Headaches Predicted With Arrival Of The Tall Ships 

by Kathy Giordano Sail ' 92 will bring the largest fleet of sailing ships of the 20th century into Boston Harbor on July 11. Sail '92 also promises to bring the biggest headache of the 20th century into Charlestown on July 11.
At a public meeting on June 9 , representatives from the Boston Transportation and Police Departments met with the Charlestown Neighborhood Council's Basic Services Committee at a public meeting to outline the city's plan to accommodate the millions of
restrictions refer to private,
visitors expected to view the extravaganza.
William Good, deputy commissioner of the Boston Transportation Department (BTD), stated that Sail '92 will take place from July 11 through 16 , with the heaviest concentration of visitors expected during the weekend of July 11 and 12.
Good stated that the "only way to address public safety is to restrict access to the neighborhoods being impacted (South Boston, North End, East Boston and Charlestown)." These
personal vehicles. "Our objective is to allow no more cars into a neighborhood than were there prior to 5:30 a.m.," he stated
To acheive this objective, Charlestown will be blocked off to all outside traffic, with the exception of emergency vehicles, from 5:30 a.m. to sunset on Saturday, July 11 and Sunday, July 12. Persons wishing to leave the community by car during these hours will only be allowed to exit at predetermined points along the outer perimeter of Charlestown. A pass card will be

Funds of $\$ 3.7$ million have been made available to Boston by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts to develop the city's recycling program. To receive the funds, the city must have a specific plan. At present, city officials are exploring the possibility of siting a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) in or near Boston.
The forum will address what a MRF is, why Boston needs one, financing and operating a MRF, the implications of siting such a facility in Boston and options for Boston's recycling future.

Speakers will include Charles Royer, director of the Institute of Politics of the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard. Royer is a former mayor of Seattle, Wash., a city with a successful recycling program.
Others speakers will be Adam Marks, plant manager of New England CRInc in R.I. and former head of recycling for the state of R.I.; Willa Kuh, director of the Division of Solid Waste Management, Mass. De-
group representing those Boston neighborhoods, including Charlestown, involved in recycling. The forum is open to the public, and the Charlestown Recycling Volunteers encourage you to attend.

Good reported that the Charlestown Navy Yard
will host 15 Class A and B vessels. In addition, "maxiyachts," which accompany the large ships, will be moored behind The Schrafft Center in Sullivan Square.
According to Good, shutle buses, water shuttles and charter buses will provide pedestrian transportation to the Sail '92 events.
Good admitted that the
plan is rigid, but stated, "There are not a lot of options open to us to allow for the control of traffic needed.'

* Pier 5 . . . The Raymond Group requested community support for a temporary development proposal for Pier 5 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. The request was made before a Charlestown Neighborhood Council Development Committee meeting on June 15.

James English, consultant for the Raymond Group, stated that the entire proposal "is temporary in nature, available to be removed if and when a permanent development proposal for the pier comes forward."
English explained that the Raymond Group wishes to create activity in the Navy Yard and give community non-profit groups an opportunity to generate money for their programs.
The plan includes paving the pier and erecting a series of temporary tents and a food concession stand. The tents would be offered to the non-profits, English said, free of charge. The pier would also contain 80 parking spaces, open to the public at no cost, so that the area would become more accessible to visitors.
English stated that the temporary development of the pier could last for up to four years, or until a viable development plan is ready for construction.
"The Raymond Group would open the facility as soon as regulatory authorities would allow it to be constructed." He added that the pier's accessibility to the public would not be restricted, but enhanced by the proposal. A 36 -inch high chain would be installed, connecting the pier's ballards, as a visual protective barrier from the water's edge. Toilet facilities and seating would also be provided, English explained. Security personnel would patrol the pier during the evening hours to protect the contents of the concession stand and tents. These security officers would not restrict access to the pier after the vendors close for the day, he stated.
Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha announced that the Neighborhood Council will receive the Committee's report on the proposal at the July 7 monthly meeting. The Council will vote on the issue and forward the recommendation to the Boston Redevelopment Authority.

According to Cunha, the focus of this meeting will be on traffic and parking.
- The Billboard Committee, chaired by Ken Stone, will meet on Tuesday, June 23 at 7 p.m. at the Charlestown District Court, 3 City Square.
The agenda will center on the two-year renewal of the lease for the space on top the Roughan's building in City Square by Ackerley Communications for its billboard.

Residents and business persons are welcome to attend these open, public meetings.
$\star$ Charlestown Street Reconstruction Update . . . Ralph Cunningham, resident engineer with Bryant Associates, has informed the Patriot that the contractor, John Mahoney Construction Co., continued to work on Chestnut Street. The pavement was completely stripped, new gas light bases were installed and new curbs were reset and installed as needed. The roadway was graded rough and fine, making it ready for the paving on June 22 or 23. The Boston Gas Company installed the feeds to the new lights and the cable company installed new T.V. cable along the street.
The curb was installed on Adams Street and the contractor completed the new light base installations. The remaining roof drains were also hooked up by the contractor. A new concrete sidewalk was poured in front of the American Legion hall in time for the pre-parade festivities

In the same neighborhood, the contractor completed the water main installation on Putnam Street and did a good portion of the work on Ellwood Street.
Other crews continued to work on Devens Street where the stripping of the pavement was completed and the new curb installation started.
Around the corner on Old Rutherford Avenue, the contractor pretty much finished installing the new storm drains and completed a good portion of the pavement excavation. Work is scheduled to begin on Washington Street now that the parade is over.
Toward the other end of town, the contractor got underway on Russell Street where the new storm drains were installed between Mead and Oak streets. The drain work was started between Eden and Mead streets.
The construction crews made a good effort in preparation for the Bunker Hill Day Parade with clean up and paving work to facilitate the parade and other celebrations in the community.
Middlesex Paving Co. is expected to get back to work on the Mead Street Stairs (40 Flights) next week. Meetings between the engineers, the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) and the contractor are on-going regarding the re-use of the old footings that were found when excavation work began. A final decision and details on the modifications to the plans is anticipated to be released by the end of next week.
Cunningham stated that new street construction start-up dates are announced in this week's notice by the John Mahoney Construction Company. He said that the contractor will now be starting some streets as early as originally anticipated. Residents should read the notice in this week's Patriot and make note of any work that will be taking place in their neighborhood.

Peter Looney, a Charlestown resident and member of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, has been appointed by the BRA to work as the Community Liaison Officer on the Charlestown Streets Reconstruction Project which has been underway for some time now.
Looney's role is to act as the go-between or middleman between the contractor, John Mahoney Construction Company, and Bryant Associates, the engineering firm hired by the BRA to oversee the construction contract.
All calls from community residents concerning the construction project should continue to be directed to Megan Mahoney at 696-8446 for official registration by Mahoney Construction Company. Once the call is recorded, it will be forwarded to Looney for appropriate action on behalf of all Charlestown residents.

## Residents Outraged At Recent Attacks Look To Police For Safer Streets

by Kathy Giordano The Charlestown Neighborhood Council Public Safety Committee and the Boston Police Department Community Relations Officer held their monthly ficer held their monthly meeting primarily concentrated on recent violent incidents in the community that caused serious bodily harm to two men.
The first incident took place outside the Bunker Hill Community College train station where a man was attacked by two youths wielding golf clubs. The attack resulted in the victim having to be transported to Mass. General Hospital (MGH) for treatment of his (MGH) for treatment of his
injuries. Some 50 stitches injuries. Some 50 stitches
were needed to close the wounds on his head and upper body.
The second incident occured on Bartlett Street, adjacent to the rear of the Bunker Hill Monument. A resident of Concord Street was approaching his home when he was attacked by three teen-agers. He was knocked to the ground, kicked, beaten and, despite pleas for mercy, was stabpleas for mercy, was stab-
bed three times. He, too, bed three times. He, too,
was taken to MGH and treated for his life-threatening wounds.

Community outrage on these two unprovoked attacks filled the conversation at the meeting. Residents demanded that the names of the young men who committed the crimes be published in The Charlestown Patriot "so that all would know them for the scum they are," one resident stathey
member Jim Conway whose wife, Gloria Conway. is publisher of the way, is publisher of the policy of the paper is not to print names until the person goes to trial and gets convicted" He added, " serves no purpose to unne serves no purpose to unnecessarily place added burdens on the families of sus pects who might be innocent of the charges. It's a long standing policy - not about to be changed.
Officer Joe McNulty stated that although the names of those arrested for crimes is available to the public, if the newspaper does not care to publish them, he would give the information out upon request. He advised residents to call him at 343-4627.
Conway added: "We have to stop burying our heads in he sand. There has been a change in Charlestown. Somewhere along the line, with the cooperation of the police, the community can work toward bringing back safer streets. The Neighborhood Watch program, where neighbor looks out for neighbor, is a viable solution." He added, "We're not getting the round robin police patrolling we deserve. There has to be more done about drug and alcohol related problems. We have to catch this increase in the bud. He said to McNulty, "Get the word back to the deputies that Charlestown is not going to stand still. We demand more accountability from the police."
Council member Bill Galvin stated that he would like to know what happens to those who are arrested
or these crimes. "Do they go to court? Are they found guilty? I'd like to know if the court system is working.
Council member Jim Mansfield stated: "The police have to stop telling us hat 'this doesn't happen in Charlestown.' It does happen in Charlestown and you are giving the community a false sense of security." Moe Gillen, also a council member, stated: "I'm tired of the police saying 'We're looking at the whole picture.' We don't care about the whole picture. We want to be able to walk down our streets in safety. He continued: "The police are supported and respected in Charlestown. We'd like that sentiment reciprocated."
McNulty retorted: "We (the police) can't be every place, every second. You have to be our eyes and ears. Neighborhood Watches can be set up. We have a drug hot line. The Drug Unit is here in the community. We also have detectives here working under cover." He added: "There is no false conception on crimes. What happens is reported in the Patriot. What I'm saying is Charlestown is not as bad as other neighborhoods." He concluded: "If you see this type of activity, call. Get involved. Call 911. Let us know."

(continued from page one) its highest point and a maximum of 60 feet in height for the vast majority of the facility.
Visitation, according to Betts, is expected to peak the first year of operation at 1.5 million people, dropping to 1.2 million during the museum's second year and gradually "creeping up" to the level of 1.4 million. Admission fees were established according to similar tourist attractions in New England. Betts stated that an adult ticket for the museum would cost $\$ 15$,
children $\$ 8.50$ and groups would pay between $\$ 10$ and $\$ 11$ per person to enter. Each tour of the pirate museum would last between three and five hours, he added.
The ticket price would enable the visitor to relive the life of a pirate through visual and hands-on exhibits. The centerpiece of the museum would be an authentic replica of the Whydah ship which could be boarded and explored through the assistance of the ship's crew dressed in period costume. Other features of the pi-
rate complex would include visit to a Caribbean town and a journey to Cape Cod aboard the Whydah. This journey would include surviving the shipwreck through a motion simula through a motion simula tion and "ride film" experi ence that would end in being taken to Boston's Ad miralty Court to stand trial There, the visitor would witness and participate in a re-enactment of the pirates' trial
A "Pirates Hall of Fame" from the 1700's Golden Age of Piracy would be viewed by boat after the execution
takes place at Charlestown Ferry.
Science and cultural exhibits and a conservation lab will educate the visitor on marine archaeology and techniques used to conserve artifacts taken from the sea. artifacts taken from the sea.

historic aspects of a slave ship, one of which was the Whydah before it was captured by pirates.
Barrett replied: "A number of people came to us regarding the issue of slavery. There will be a group working with the development team and the BRA on this subject including scholars and historians. The rest of the project, we hope, will be endorsed by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council and the community."
Peter Steele, curator for the Boston National Historical Park, informed the committee that the Park Service has a role in the restoration of the historic aspect of the Charlestown Navy Yard. He stated that a representative from the Park Service's Philadelphia office would arrive in Boston next week to review the Whydah Pirate Complex proposal.
He stated: "We feel that it should relate to the Navy Yard interpretively. Relate to the history of building naval warships and naval ships of the 19th century. We do have a problem with it. Does it relate to the history of the Navy Yard?"'
Steele also expressed concern with traffic, parking and pedestrian access to
the Navy Yard, stating "This proposal is different from the New England Aquarium."
Ivy St. John added to Steele's statement on the importance of "scholarship" and relating to the Navy Yard trades. She said: "You have to draw a link." She asked that discussions on landscaping and how it would work with the harborwalk, traffic, parking, height and density, and how people would get in and out of the Navy Yard be included on the agenda for the next meeting. "We need to have a sense of how it would be done," she stated. Bill Lamb requested that the developer bring back to the community a model of the facility and sketches that would show what the structure would look like from eye level.
Cunha announced that the next public meeting on the Whydah Pirate Complex proposal would take place on Monday, June 22 at 7 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall. Included on the agenda for this, the second meeting, would be traffic and parking issues. The developer, if prepared at that time, will also answer other concerns raised at the June 15 meeting.

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## Memories Of Bunker Hill Day

Once again another Bunker Hill Day holiday weekend has passed. When I think of this holiday, I think of younger days when my parents would take the family to watch the parade from our annual vantage point in City Square across from Station 15. The bands, clowns, pols and marching units would wind their way through Charlestown streets until they hit City Square.
My mother is a true Townie, and every year she would make it a point to return to visit childhood friends who remained. My father is dead now and my mother is over at Youville Hospital unable to watch the parade. For years they enjoyed watching the parade, cheering on the bands as they passed them by. But those days are gone. Events I thought would never change, have changed. As the Bible says, there's a season for everything under the sun, but some things will last forever as long as we have memories.
My funniest remembrance was watching my mother chase after her elderly father through the crowd lining the sidewalks of City Square. The more I watch my mother now, the more I see Grandpa. Both of them lived in Charlestown for most of their lives. My grandfather, Jimmy Harrington, left County Cork (Bear Island) in 1907 and either lived or worked in Charlestown until 1947. Each of them were definitely CharLEStown (as my grandfather pronouced it) Irish.
My best Bunker Hill Day parade was 1981 when I marched with the Peoples Firehouse No. 2 Committee shortly after the Engine 50 apparatus was reactivated by the city of Boston following the successful month-long takeover of the firehouse on Winthrop Street. 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The Charlestown law firm of McCullough, Stievater \& Polvere celebrated its 20th anniversary this week. In June of 1972 the firm opened its doors at the historic Round Corner building on Main Street, the same week as its neighbor, The Warren Tavern.

The developer had been in the process of doing the rehabilitation of the several landmark buildings making up the Thompson Triangle. He needed commercial tenants for the first floor of the brick buildings on Main Street. At that time, John McCullough was working at the Kennedy Center and was forming a law partnership. The idea of being in the newly restored building was exciting to him and his partners, Bill Stievater and Dan Polvere.
The catch was that the tenants had to do their own internal rehabilitation. Dan, Bill and John undertook this task with gusto, including
personally sandblasting the interior brick walls (exposed brick was popular then), The interior of the office has been reconfigured several times since. There was also no air conditioning in those early years, in a space that had virtually no windows which could be opend.

Another early memory was the El, which ran for four more years along Main Street. Each time it went by the building shook and telephone calls had to be interrupted.
The firm began with the name partners and Mary Cole, a Charlestown girl, as office manager. Cole left in 1978 to pursue her career in Washington, D.C. but returned in 1989 to be the firm's administrator.

The early goal of the partners, who came from different backgrounds, was to have a neighborhood law practice while developing

some special areas of expertise. The first few years were difficult (there was a recession then, too), but slowly the firm began to add attorneys and better technology and take more space in the building. In 1985, a northern office was set up in Westford.
Currently the firm has nine attorneys along with paralegals and staff, in various areas of law practice, including real estate and estate planning and civil and criminal litigation.
Managing partner Dan Polvere observes: "We
