Pro-Tem Officers Of Kennedy Board Take Charge Following Mass Resignation

The Kennedy Center Board of Directors have completed a circle of events, following Monday night's special meeting at which time it became known that six board members had resigned, eliminating three board officers.

The six who resigned were Board President James Cushman, Board Secretary Joseph Owens, Board Treasurer Joseph Blaikie and board members Mary Sexton, Mary Noyes and Susan Werman-Dole. Board member Jean Babcock had also signed the joint letter of resignation, however, her appointed term as a

board member had expired in November.

In the letters given to Vice President Phil Coleman by Cushman, for delivery to the Board, it was said, "We take this action reluctantly and hope that it serves to call public attention to a situation which has made it impossible to conduct the business of the center for the past year and a half...Certain Board Members...have used the time of the board meetings to question, harass and intimidate other members as well as the former executive director and, since his resignation, crucial staff members have been fired or allowed to leave with no

apparent interest for the total welfare of the center and its programs." (See full text of letter, page 4).

"This letter is a slander to every person on this board," said Board Member Anne Considine. "This is handicapping our director who was chosen by this board. They are handicapping everyone who uses Kennedy Center services. They never should have sent copies of this letter to Permanent Charities and other funding sources. If they wanted to resign they should have done it before board members only. This

"Charlestown-To-Charlestown" Committee Established

In recent years, a small town in Ireland has become a more and more important stop on the itinerary of "Townies" visiting the "Old Sod". There are no famous landmarks responsible for drawing travelers to this town (as yet), nor do many "Townies" have family roots there. Initially, the mere fact that the town was called

Charlestown was sufficient reason to arouse the curiosity of vacationing "Townies"; but after meeting the residents of the town and sampling their warmth and hospitality, it has become a necessity to make the pilgrimage to Charlestown, County Mayo when travelling in Ireland.

Because residents of

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

The purpose of the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center is to assist the residents of Charlestown in meeting basic needs through the provision of services which help eliminate poverty and its causes by promoting self-sufficiency. To operate neighborhood services with maximum participation of residents, fostering economic independence by meeting the health, education, employment, recreation and welfare needs of the community.

The above is the statement of purpose found in the by laws of the J.F.K. Family Service Center.

Some may label this statement as idealistic with no practical substance in today's world, but the two key words — service and employment, the Center's reason for existence, are as important now as they were when the Center was founded.

Events have transpired over the past three months, which by their very nature, bode change for the Kennedy Center.

For the first time in the Center's history, a "Townie", Leo Carey, is in the top management position,

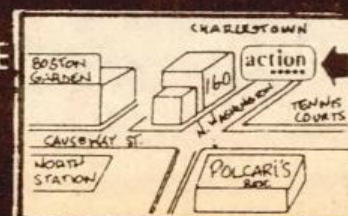

that of Executive Director. Carey, a lifelong resident of Charlestown, knows the people and the community and has worked here for over a decade. His proposal for developing fiscal accountability, management and personnel guidelines, and program criteria we see as moves in the right direction. His commitment to the statement of purpose of the Center is evidenced in his hiring of qualified Charlestown residents to fill vacancies at the Center and also in the detailed report of his first five weeks as Executive Director, presented to the Kennedy Center Board at last Monday night's meeting.

The resignation of several Board members at that meeting, following on the heels of a vigorous campaign and election of new members to the publicly-elected segment of the Board, can be seen as the potential development of a new Board of Directors, composed of people who are residents of the community and representative of the populace served by the Center. The resignation of these Board members (several of whom were life-time appointments — a category unheard of on other APAC Boards) can only augur well for the future of the Center, if the existing Board takes the time to re-structure the by-laws of the Board, revamp and re-activate Board committees which have been limited and in some cases inactive, offer a vehicle for public input, and generally support the Center in its quest to provide service and employment in Charlestown. The charges to the new Board are demanding and it will take much cooperation and compromise to turn around the direction of the Board, but it can and must be done if the Center is to survive.

Programs are continuing and changes in policy are being discussed by the Board. With the combined support of the Center and its management and staff, the Board, and the public in general, the Kennedy Center can have a bright future in the Charlestown community. Hopefully, these changes will be a "New Beginning" for the Kennedy Center in Charlestown.

Letter Of Resignation

December 13, 1982

To The Charlestown Patriot:

We, the undersigned, feel compelled to demonstrate our extreme concern for the future of the programs of the Kennedy Center by our collective resignation from the Board of Directors effective immediately.

We take this action reluctantly and hope that it serves to call public attention to a situation which has made it impossible to conduct the business of the center for the past year and a half.

Certain Board Members who have come on the board in the past two years have shown no interest in the programs and services offered by the center. They have, instead, used the time of the board meetings to question, harass and intimidate other members as well as the former Executive Director and, since his resignation, crucial staff members have been fired or allowed to leave with no apparent interest for the total welfare of the center and its programs.

We were proud to have served on the board at a time when new programs were added such as the Detox Center, the expansion of the Headstart and Day Care Services, the creation of the E.D.C. which built the Mary Colbert apartments and which saved the Old Charlestown Savings Bank from the wreckers ball and many more productive services.

We were proud that in all of the years that we served on

the board, the accounts and records of the center were always above suspicion, numerous audits were conducted with no questioned costs; payrolls were never missed, bills were paid in a timely fashion and we ended this fiscal year (Aug. 31, 1982) with a potential surplus of \$165,000.00.

We feel that this is a record of which we can be proud and we do not intend to have our good names associated with a board that is now controlled by people who have no interest other than to destroy the center.

In conclusion, we would also appeal to the sources of funding of the Kennedy Center, such agencies as Action for Boston Community Development and The United Way, as well as agencies of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts responsible for the funding and monitoring of Kennedy Center programs to be aware of the chaos which has enveloped the Kennedy Center due to the inefficient and gregarious nature of certain Board Members. Obviously, the future of the Kennedy Center is in doubt given the demonstrated lack of concern by certain Board Members. We deeply regret this dire situation for the needy and deserving residents of Charlestown.

**Views On
Dental Health**

SILVER AMALGAM FILLING

If dental decay has not done major damage to a tooth, it can normally be salvaged by one of the most common of dental restorations - the filling.

Essentially: (1) Decay must be completely removed, and the tooth prepared to receive the filling; (2) a soundly engineered pattern must be cut in the tooth to hold the filling strongly; and (3) the filling is then carefully placed in the tooth.

Many materials have been used to make fillings, but silver amalgam is probably the most common. Properly used, a very good material it is. Silver amalgam is formed by mixing a powder of silver (about 70%), tin, copper and zinc with pure mercury. The mercury dissolves the metallic powder, thus forming the solution. (An amalgam is, in fact, a solution of a metal in mercury.)

The filling is made while the mix is still in a plastic state and easily manipulated. It is carved and shaped as it is beginning to set. Patients are usually cautioned not to expose a new amalgam filling to strong biting pressures for four hours, until it develops its initial hardness. Full hardness will be complete in 24 hours.

Pro-Tem Officers Of Kennedy Board Take Charge Following Mass Resignation

is a disgrace."

Board member Bobby Wallace took issue with the letter's statement regarding the resignation or firing of crucial staff members. "I think it's a shame that these people, without attending one board meeting since the new director was hired, have accused him of doing something wrong. They didn't even give him a chance to explain why he did what he did."

Recently fired were Business Manager Blaine Stone and Consultant John P. Sullivan. Director of Early Childhood Programs Steve Shuman has resigned his position to pursue other professional goals.

According to Kennedy Center Director Leo Carey, Sullivan had been paid in excess of \$32 thousand at approximately \$400 per day over a year's time.

In November 6 meeting with Sullivan, Carey stated that he requested all records in Sullivan's possession, which Sullivan denied saying they were his work product. Later Carey found out that Sullivan had no legal grounds to hold the records. Carey said the Center later received some of the records requested but Carey said he was not confident that the Center was in possession of all their records.

Carey also said that Sullivan told him to ignore a harsh letter from the Internal Revenue Service should the Center receive one. According to Carey, this letter could concern certain forms which the Center has apparently not filed with the IRS and which could jeopardize their tax status to receive donations.

"I said, time out. I don't think it would be good for me to continue dealing with this man," said

Carey to the board.

On the firing of Stone, Carey said Stone resigned November 5, three days after he was seen leaving the Center with an armload of records. "Mr. Stone was told not to take any records without telling me first and signing out for them. I also told him that he was to inform me of any correspondence with outside agencies and to update me on the fiscal records of the Kennedy Center," said Carey.

On November 4, Stone took the day off and on the 5th he returned with his resignation, effective November 15. Carey said he wrote Stone asking that they meet and discuss the Center's finances before he left. On November 9th, Carey wrote Stone a second time warning that his employment would be terminated on the 12th if he did not respond, which became the case.

"In viewing his personnel folder it came to my attention that he had worked at the Center for approximately seven months," said Carey. "He had been given a raise on April 23. He asked for a tuition reimbursement in lieu of a promised wage increment. The promised wage

increment was \$500 and his tuition reimbursement amounted to approximately \$1700. It was granted and paid. On August 30, 1982 he was granted a \$4500 increment signed by John Gardiner. According to the Kennedy Center and this board, wage increases are to be granted only once a year. Therefore I sent a bill to him for \$987 which was his portion of the wage increment which he received from the time it was granted to the time he resigned. I haven't seen any of it yet," stated Carey.

In addition, Carey went on to inform the board that there is no tuition reimbursement program at the Kennedy Center.

"I wanted this clearly out in the open as to why I took action against John Sullivan and Blaine Stone," said Carey.

Regarding the letter of resignation from the six board members it was voted by the board to accept the resignations, but not on the grounds given. "I do not accept their reasons," said board member Joe Foley. The vote was unanimous.

It was then agreed that board members who last held the vacated executive

offices prior to the last election of officers would take over their respective office until new officer elections were held in January. Vice President Phil Coleman was moved up to President Pro-tem, Joe Foley became Secretary Pro-tem and Joe Kent became Treasurer Pro-tem.

With Kent's return to the treasurer's position, the Kennedy Center Board completed a full circle of events as it was Kent who first opened an investigation into the alleged mis-

pending by then Executive Director John Gardiner. Kent's pursuance into this matter was partly responsible for his defeat as Treasurer in last January's elections.

Carey offered board members a look at the September general accounting records for the Kennedy Center. In his report Carey said, "We are presently involved in a review of the entire financial operation of the Kennedy Center. The intent of the review is to determine and implement an ef-

ficient, effective financial operation that can readily provide information on income, expenditures and liabilities. An outline of the financial system as it exists now and proposed changes should be available for your review in January. The cash position of the Kennedy Center is difficult to ascertain due to the practice of payment advances for contractors and undefined liabilities that seem to crop up out of nowhere. The accounts

payable and receivable are unplanned, resulting in constant cash flow problems."

Giving an example of hidden liabilities within the Kennedy Center's finances, Carey told board members of \$7 thousand given to the Kennedy Center by ABCD which was to be given to the Department of Social Services (DSS). Unable to document that the \$7 thousand had been given to DSS, the center had to come up with the \$7 thousand cash.

"There was \$7 thousand dollars given to the Kennedy Center in 1981 on behalf of ABCD to be given to the Department of Social Services. I don't know why they went that circuitous route but I know that ABCD called us on it and in fact had the back-up documents, so we had to come up with \$7 thousand dollars in cash. Now \$7

thousand in cash in a \$1.5 million dollar budget may not sound like much but when you are in a position where you have to meet a payroll, it puts you in a real tenuous position. It creates a real cash flow problem" stated Carey.

Other problems Carey pointed out concerned administrative procedures. "Priorities each program sets for itself do not relate to other programs or the Kennedy Center itself. There is a clear absence of administrative systems or procedures, i.e. job descriptions, program organizational breakdowns, program descriptions, evaluation procedures, timekeeping procedures, planning procedures, etc. Each section acts as an agency unto itself rather than a department of the Kennedy Center."

In closing his report Carey welcomed any suggestions from the board and said "All transactions

are open and above board."

In other business:

—The expired board seats of Jean Babcock and Gus Charbonnier as well as the board seat recently declined by Francine Gannon were filled by Edna, Kelly, William McCabe and James "Shorty" Con-

nolly.

—Sal Giarratani was granted a seat on the board in a 7 to 5 decision, based on four write-in votes he received in Precinct 1 during the October elections.

—Considerable discussion was given to creating a by-laws committee to change and update the

Kennedy Center By-laws. Board members will be given a proposal drawn up by Coleman and will discuss the proposal at the next board meeting.

—The board agreed that a full Board/EDC meeting should be scheduled after the holidays to discuss financial standing of that

corporation.

—Board member Moe Gillen tendered his resignation from the board effective December 31, 1982, citing conflict of interest as the reason since his future son-in-law is an employee of the Kennedy Center.
