## Johnson Named To Harborpark Advisory Committee

Charles Johnson, a resident of Brighton Street, Charlestown and a member of the Board of Directors of the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center has been named to the Harborpark Advisory Committee by Mayor Raymond L. Flynn. He is one of the 15 members named to the committee which will work with the administration on various issues encompassing the development of Boston's "Harborpark", a comprehensive plan for economic growth and public access along Boston's Harbor.

The advisory committee consists of representatives from each of the city's five harborfront neighborhoods, as well as from government, labor, environment, and business. Mayor Flynn said in making the appointments,

"I am committed to public input in all our planning and development decisions. With the help and advice of this advisory committee, the first of its kind, we can translate what has always been a personal dream of mine into a reality - a cohesive plan that links the waterfront with the 250,000 Boston residents who live within walking distance of the harbor.

"This broadbased committee," the Mayor added, "reflects the diversity of all those people who care about and are interested the future of our waterfront. They face a great challenge. Over the next 15 months, we will be rezoning the districts that border the entire harbor. The advisory committee will be working closely with the BRA in for-

mulating zoning and design guidelines compatible with the city's plan for harbor development.

"I am confident," concluded the Mayor, "the process this advisory committee is embarking upon with the city will result in a waterfront and a harborpark that is for a city of people - people who live, work and visit here not just of tall buildings, hotels or private condominium complexes. All of us - the city, the BRA, the developers, and the residents - will be working to see that this harborpark plan benefits us all."

Other members of the committee include: **Neighborhood** - Fred Stefano, East Boston; Emily Pugliano, North End; Reverend David Murphy, South Boston; Marianne Connolly, Dorchester. **Government** - Alden Raine, Director of Governor's Office is Economic Development; James Hoyt, Secretary of Environmental Affairs; Lisa Chapnick, Commissioner of Traffic and Parking; Lorraine Downey, Chairperson of Harborpark Advisory Committee. ## Charlestown Preservation Society To Meet

The December meeting of the Charlestown Preservation Society will be held Sunday, December 2 at 7:30 p.m. at the Charlestown Community Center, 14 Green Street. There are several items on the agenda.

There will be a showing of the 15 minute videotape produced by Norita Lee at the Phipps Street Burial Ground last August. Afterwards, Jim Bradley of the Massachusetts Historic Commission and a CPS Trustee will give a brief update on current burial ground preservation efforts.

Developer Terrence Smith and architect William Lamb will make a presentation on current development plans for the Hurd House on Main Street. This 1795 structure, with

many fine Georgian and Federal features, was in perilous condition before some massive structural repairs by Historic Boston, Inc., last year. Its further development depends on the outcome of a Zoning Board of Appeals Hearing to be held on December 4. Please come to the presentation to inform yourself of the issues, to question, and to comment.

The following persons and committees will present reports: Carl and Harriet Erickson will report on the proposed designation of Sullivan Square as a Commercial Area Revitalization District (CARD); Carol Bratley and Dan Kovacic will report on Graham Gund Associates plans for the Old Charlestown High School; Andrea Garr will report on

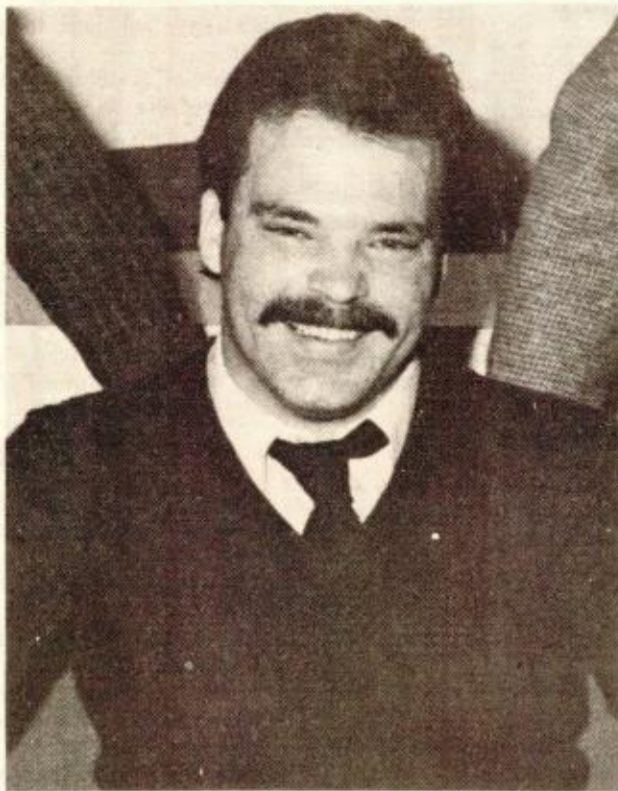

### Car Vandalism Out Of Control In Charlestown

Dear Mayor Flynn,

As a concerned citizen of Boston, there is a matter I want to bring to your attention: car vandalism in Charlestown. This problem is completely out of control.

I am a professional, working in Boston and living in Charlestown. On March 31 of this year, my roommate and I had a party. Four of our friends' cars were vandalized: windows smashed and stereos stolen. This incident has prevented us from having another party. On November 18, we had friends over for dinner. I called the Government Center Police and requested patrol coverage. Whether or not this occurred, I do not know. I do know that three cars had tires slashed. There is no purpose to this: it is malicious vandalism.

Looking for help, I called the following people/places on November 20, 1984: Boston Police, Deputy Joseph Saia, Officer McKenna, City Hall Services, Frank Shea and your office. The responses I got were as follows: "That's the chance you take living in Charlestown," from the Boston Police; no answer at Deputy Saia's office; I was disconnected three times in a row at the office of Constituent Affairs before I was told Carmen Pola answer three times at Frank Shea's office; Officer McKenna at the Boston Police Station said call City Hall - "politics." In a word, **FRUSTRATING!**

I will not accept vandalism as a condition to living in Charlestown. I am a good citizen and am willing to do my share to help the community. Boston is a great city; Charlestown, in particular, is a good community. Let's do something to correct this situation. Let's make Charlestown the great place it can and should be.

Thank you for your time and attention. I am awaiting a response.

Thank you for showing the residents of Bunker Hill Street in Charlestown the beauty and importance of community cooperation!

Your office, in its infinite wisdom, scheduled the months of November and December for repairing our water main, without notifying residents of your project. We continued to ponder how the "temporary" above ground civil defense piping and rubber hoses would withstand subfreezing temperatures. So, this week, as the water to our homes

froze, bursting the temporary piping and leaving many homes without water, neighbor helped to devise impromptu solutions to get our services flowing once again.

We are all grateful that the city is improving a most vital infrastructure before an obvious catastrophe occurred. However, may I suggest that in the future, above ground water projects be planned during warmer months, and that the courtesy of notifying residents of our work be extended?

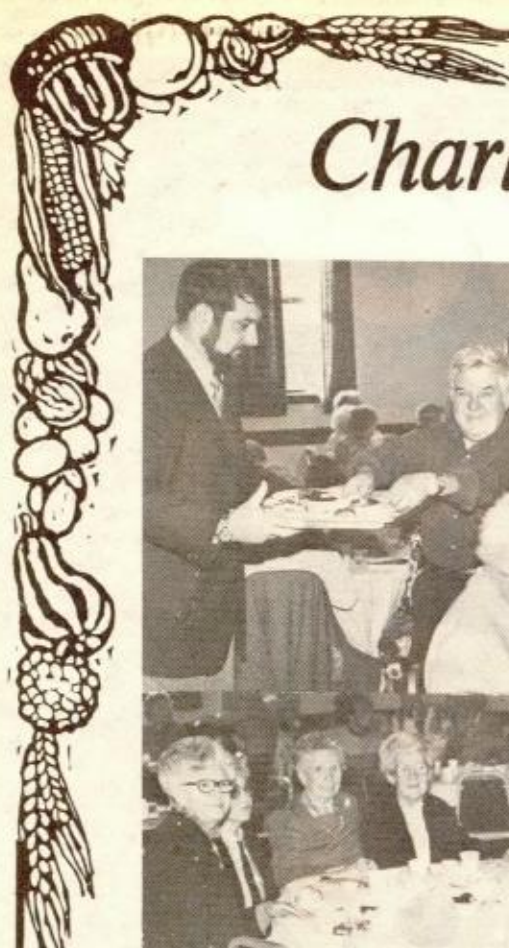

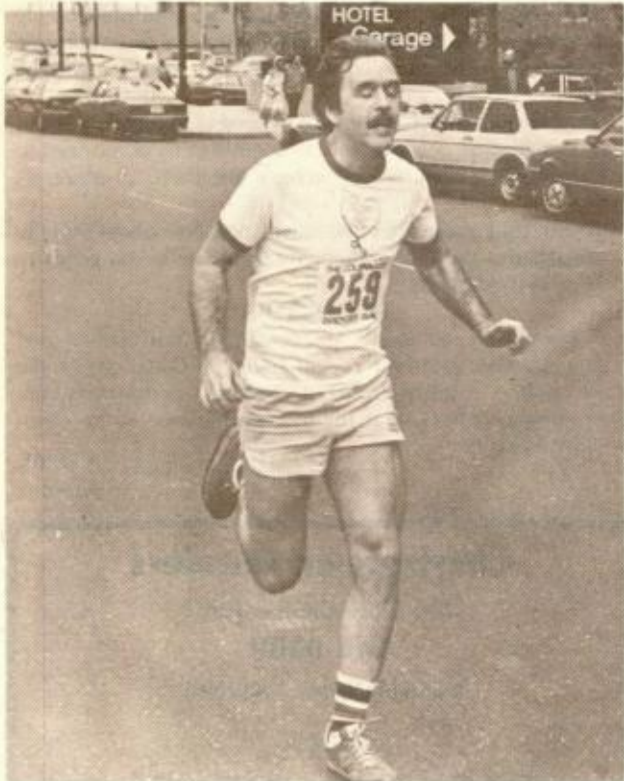

# Preliminary Summary Of Proposals For Charlestown Navy Yard Development

In response to the Design and Development Guidelines prepared by the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA) staff for the Charlestown Navy Yard Buildings 75, 105, 106, 114, 226 and Parcels 6 and 7, six proposals were submitted on Friday, October 19, 1984. A preliminary summary of the proposals is enclosed. As an update, the Authority is providing you with the following information.

The New England Design Center Associates Limited Partnership has withdrawn its proposals from consideration. This action leaves five submissions: two for Building 266, two for Building 75 and 106, and one for Buildings 266, 114 and other small buildings not in the Guidelines. Therefore, the Authority will only review and consider for designation the present submissions for Buildings 266, 75, 106 and 114. Building 105 and Parcel 7, and possibly the other small buildings, will be included in new Guidelines which will be prepared and distributed at a future date, as yet un-scheduled.

Copies of the proposals are available for the community to view at the Navy Yard and at the Authority outside of Room 930, 9th Floor, City Hall. The Authority will be holding a meeting to seek the Charlestown community's comments on the proposals. The Patriot will be contacted as soon as the meeting has been scheduled.

### Voke Explains "Lemon Aid Law"

In an attempt to increase public awareness Representative Voke has issued a statement concerning that so-called Lemon Aid Law.

Representative Voke explained that the Lemon Aid Law (M.G.L., Chapter 90, Section 7N) is a law designed for the protection of used car purchasers. The law allows the purchaser of a used car to void or cancel a motor vehicle contract of sale if the vehicle fails to pass the inspection sticker test within seven days from the date of sale and the estimated cost of emissions or safety-related defects exceed ten percent of the purchase price.

Representative Voke reminded consumers that an inspection sticker previously affixed to the windshield of a second-hand motor vehicle is not transferable under the buyer's registration plates. Therefore, it is the consumers responsibility as the buyer of a used car to submit it for inspection within seven days of the date of sale.

Once the vehicle has been submitted for an inspection and has been issued a rejection sticker the consumer must follow the steps outlined below or he/she may not be allowed a refund under this law.

1) The consumer must

notify the seller of his/her intention to void the contract under this statute (M.G.L., Chapter 90, Sec. 7N). Do this by certified mail - return - receipt requested - second by regular mail. Also enclose a copy of 2 and 3 below.

2) The purchaser must provide the seller with a written statement signed by an authorized agent of the inspection station stating the reasons why the motor vehicle failed to pass the safety or combined safety and emissions inspection test.

3) The purchaser must give the seller an estimate of the costs of the necessary emissions of safety repairs, showing that those costs exceed ten percent of the purchase price.

4) The purchaser must deliver the motor vehicle to the seller. It is advisable to take a witness with you and copies of 1, 2 and 3. If the seller refuses to accept the CAR, go to a NOTARY and sign a statement with

your witness that you delivered the car to the seller on that date but the seller refused to accept the car. Even if you have to tow the car, you must deliver the car to the seller. Don't let the seller discourage you from delivering the vehicle. It is to the seller's advantage if you fail to deliver the vehicle because you won't get a refund.

Lastly, Representative Voke reminded used car

purchasers that they have seven days from the date of sale to get their car inspected. But once you have it inspected and rejected,

you have to complete the above process within 10 days from the date of sale to take advantage of the so-called "Lemon Aid Law."

### Cleaning And Relining Of Water Pipes In Final Stage

The cleaning and relining of the existing water system on Bunker Hill Street, which began over one month ago, is expected to be completed either at the end of this week or next, stated John P. Sullivan, Director of Engineering, Boston Water and Sewer Commission.

The project, which called for the use of a temporary surface bypass lines while the existing water lines was being cleaned and lined, met area concern after residents questioned the safety of the pipe some of which contained extensive rust.

The piping utilized for

the bypass line had been previously used, however, the original usage was not determined. According to Sullivan, the bypass line has been chlorinated and tested for safety prior to its use on Bunker Hill Street.

Presently, the original water piping is being cleaned and relined and new hydrants are being secured. Sullivan stated that the main water line will be activated once the water is tested for purity and safety. No water will enter the residences through the newly reconstructed pipeline until the water is tested, assured Sullivan.
