#### PASE To Protest \$25 Million School Budget Cut At Rally

Parents And Students for Education (PASE) are parents and students from across the city who have been meeting to talk about next year's school budget. According to the members, the proposed cuts are alarming and they have stated that the cuts will devastate Boston's public schools.

Following the announcement by Mayor Raymond Flynn and the Boston City Council that the schools must take at \$25 million budget cut for the 1991-92 school year, PASE reported that programs such as the middle schools' targeted

reading teachers, after school sports, ROTC, school police, alternative programs such as Boston Prep and the Barron Center, computer teachers, Kindergarten 1, Early Learning centers and elementary school library aides would be eliminated with the cuts.

Charlestown parents and students are asked to join others from throughout the city for a "Rally to Save Our Schools" on Saturday, March 9. They are asked to meet at the Boston Common Bandstand (near the Park Street "T" Station) at noon for a march to City

Hall Plaza where demands for the public schools will be presented.

In addition, PASE asks parents and students to join a campaign to call and write to the Mayor and City Council and to participate in a picket line at Boston City Hall during the week of March II to protest the cuts in the school budget. They also request assistance in circulating a petition asking for education to be the #1 priority in the city.



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

#### Charlestown High School Solicits Students For 1991-92 School Year

Eigth-grade students in the city of Boston are facing some grown-up choices these days. By March 12, these 13-year-olds will have the chance to choose the high school they plan to attend for the next four years, and in doing so, they will also choose the direction their lives will take in the next four years and beyond.

Since Boston instituted a magnet school program, there are no such things as "hometown high schools" anymore. Now high schools are identified by the curriculum on which they focus - liberal arts, mathematics, computers, etc. and students choose the school which most closely matches their interests.

One high school stands out this year in its efforts to aggressively market itself to prospective students. Charlestown High School, the "Institute for the Humanities," is marshalling its efforts to attract a new and enthusiastic student body. In keeping with its humanities theme, CHS structures its college-preparatory curriculum around a humanities seminar that emphasizes cross-cultural learning. The seminar features a different theme each semester, including interactive video, critical thinking, evolution of culture and more.

CHS also offers specialized curricula including programs in theater arts, design, pre-engineering and the highly recognized Chinese and Spanish bilingual program. 

sociate Sister Ann Marie O'Malley, CSJ; and Minister of Music Stephen J. Lee.



Foley received his pilot wings in 1986 and has signed with the Navy for an additional seven years.



(continued from page one) tina Poole and 8-year-old Stefanie Hayes, the group's "mascot."

Pacheco explained how submissions of stories and artwork were being solicited from students 6 to 18.

In response to a question from a council member, Hickey related that CDI has received a \$2,000 grant from Teens As A Community Resource and \$300 from CHarlestown Against Drugs plus equipment and supply donations. He said that "Off The Corner" will be a paperback and they will use the money realized from its sale to fund a newspaper or another book.

DeRoeve asked the CNC for a letter of support for an application they have submitted for a Safe Neighborhoods Youth Fund grant. She said that grant monies would be used to buy a computer for desk-top publishing, a laser printer for camera-ready copy and for printing costs.

The CNC voted unanimously to provide a letter of support which McLaughlin said he would hand-deliver to City Hall. He and several other members complimented the teens on their presentation and project, and he urged residents, businesses and organizations to also send support letters by the March II deadline. Letters should be sent to: Safe Neighborhood Youth Fund, Boston City Hall, fifth floor, Boston, Mass. 02201.

Bill Galvin, Charlestown Business Association board member, asked the CNC to support a proposal by the local business community to have Charlestown named one of four Boston neighborhoods to receive a grant through the city's Public Facilities Department. The grant, entitled Enterprising Neighborhoods, would go to a community group which would be formed to disperse the funds in such areas as marketing strategies, design assistance and the coordinating of city services. The program would also provide entry into a business loan pool and access to top business professionals.

The CNC voted unanimously to submit a letter of support on behalf of Charlestown, and Cunha also requested support from others in the community. The decision on the four selected communities is scheduled to be made by the end of the month and so letters should be sent immediately to Lisa G. Chapnick, director; Public Facilities Department; 26 Court St., Boston, Mass. 02108.

The third presentation of the evening was made by Jack French, architect for the new Armed Services YMCA proposed for Parcel 150 in the Charlestown Navy Yard. Details will be outlined in an upcoming issue of the **Patriot** and a meeting on the proposal will be scheduled by the

Development Committee.

Public Safety Committee
Mel Stillman, chairman

Stillman reported on February's police meeting, noting two of the issues raised related to traffic. The first was on the difficulty crossing the street in the Monument area at night with the number and the speed of the cars. The second concerned dangerous traffic on Walford Way with construction workers traveling the wrong way at dangerous speeds. Police Community Service Officer Joe McNulty told the committee that he would look into these complaints.

Stillman told of two meetings last week on the new community policing program, one at the J.F. Kennedy Library and the second at the Parkman House. He spoke of the walk and talk aspect of the plan where police would spend a portion of their shift walking a specified beat and talking to residents and business persons. Loonev added that police visibility was the bottom line. Coleman noted that walking and talking was not a new concept to the Boston Police as it had started in 1965 and in 1979 there were 79 walking beats.

#### Basic Services Committee Peter Looney, chairman

Looney announced two upcoming events. The first is the CHarlestown Against Drugs "Fact Not Fiction" Day for teen-agers on May 5 at St. Catherine Hall. He said there would be speakers and workshops geared to the 13 to 16 age group.

He also related that the Charlestown Adolescent Task Force is planning a family picnic for May 19, possibly at the high school field. Looney said tentative plans call for an Ecumenical Service at the field, followed by games and entertainment.

#### Appreciation Committee Tom Cunha, chairman

Cunha reported that the committee has selected the seven award recipients to be honored at the March 30 banquet. Tickets, priced at \$15 each, are available from Moe Gillen, Bob Wallace or Kathy Giordano. Mc-Laughlin commended the committee and its chairman on the selection process.

#### Bylaw Committee Jim Conway, chairman

Conway stated that eight CNC members were present at the Feb. 21 meeting. He said the committee would meet on March 7 and begin the process of going through the bylaws section by section.

He also stated that although the public was welcome, the committee had voted that only the council members present on March 7 would be eligible to vote on the bylaws.

#### Development Committee Tom Cunha, chairman

According to Cunha, the Request For Proposals on Parcel R-107 at the corner of Main Street and Lawnwood Place would be advertised by the end of this month. He said that a consultant for the Boston Redevelopment Authority has viewed the building and is compiling figures so a statement regarding the condition of the building could be included in the RFP as was requested by the committee.

O'Brien said that he has yet to get an answer from the city's Inspectional Services Department on the safety of the building, adding that he will make another contact with them.

Kovacevic said that the BRA should be "called to task for failing to fulfill its fiduciary responsibility." He said the securing of the building only involved the sealing of two skylights — a \$250 job 30 years ago that could have save \$50,000 to \$200,000 in damage to the structure. He said that every effort should be made to save the building.

Coleman stated that last October a motion was made to send a letter to the city's Inspectional Services Department on this and other boarded-up buildings on Main Street. He said that no follow-up has been done and Main Street is "getting worse every week."

Cunha said that he would send a letter to Tom McNicholas, head of ISD, asking that he come before the council with information on these buildings.

#### North Area Task Force Marilyn Darling

Although Darling had no report, Wallace asked that information be provided on how many Charlestown residents were employed on the CANA project. He said he felt Charlestown residents were not getting the employment opportunities they should on the project.

Coleman expressed concern that the jersey barriers had been removed at the point where traffic from City Square turns onto Park Street. He noted that a driver unable to stop at that junction might find himself 90 feet below in the tunnel.

Darling and NATF members said they would obtain information on these issues.

#### Open Discussion

McLaughlin called on Dorothy Connolly Steele, Charlestown liaison for Massport. She said that Massport has been wanting to get the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority out to a meeting to get the mitigation package together on the Revere Sugar site. She stated that although the two agencies have discussed details and use of the site, Massport has been holding off the signing of the lease until the mitigation could be approved.

Steele said that the approval of mitigation measures is still in the lease but thought action should be taken on it soon. She added that court action has been mentioned by MWRA to get on with the lease.

Mansfield, putting on his Boston Transportation Department hat, said that BTD has not signed off on the mitigation. He added that MWRA attorneys have contacted the BTD on taking them to court on the signing of the agreement.

McLaughlin asked Steele whether the use of the site as a personnel transfer had any affect on the harbor clean up. Steele said "no," but it did involve MWRA commitments to major impact communities such as Winthrop for alternative transportation means.

He added that even with the onsite parking, cars will park on the already crowded side streets so they can get out easily. Conway stated that Charlestown has been a conduit for

traffic for years and with the impact from CANA and the upcoming Central Artery project, the community has more than its share of traffic.

Coleman said that the MWRA has dealt only with political bodies in the other cities and unless the city pushes, Charlestown will get nothing. He added that the MWRA has won 100 percent of its court cases.



(continued from page 15) CNC does. He added, "Where does it say we have to use that site for a personnel transfer?"

Cunha stated that he knows the Charlestown site is important to the MWRA as they have already signed with a private bus company for the use of 11 coaches during rush hour. He added that the area residents will be heavily impacted as there is now a problem with traffic in the afternoons at The Schrafft Center. He recommended that our Boston City Councillor and the At-Large Councillors be invited to a meeting on this

Stillman stated that the CNC has already taken a position that the personnel transfer site is not wanted and that vote should stand.

Kovacevic related that the MWRA is not in the planning stage but in the implementation stage. He said that the longer the CNC waits or appears to cause delay, the less the community will get from it, adding that the community is not going to be able to change
