Neighbors Outraged Following Fourth Fire At Olives
by Kathy Giordano When Dan Junta stepped outside his Winthrop Street home last Saturday night, he couldn't believe what he saw. Burning embers were flying in the air, landing onto the rooftop and into the yard of the house in front of him. He knew from past experience where they were coming from and ran in that direction - Olives restaurant.
Junta entered the restaurant on Main Street and alerted a waitress of the fire. He then ran to the fire station on Winthrop Street to get help.
The Melcher family lives over Olives. On Saturday
night they put their two young children to bed and settled down for a comfortable evening. The sounds of sirens brought them to the window. It wasn't until they saw the firemen run toward their front door toting hoses that they realized they had to move fast. They wrapped their babies in blankets and ran out onto the street.
Most families practice fire drills with their children. The Melchers don' need to practice. They have lived through this before. In the past three years, four fires originating at Olives have forced the Melchers out of their home.

Problems at the wellknown eatery started as far back as February 1989. The Fire Department responded to the 67 Main St. location after a call was received to determine the origin of armine the origin of eavy, odorous smoke filling the area. The cause, according to Boston Fire Department records, was dis covered to be emanating from the wood-burning stove used to create Olives award-winning delicacies.
Four fires have resulted from the ventilation system for this wood-burning stove o date. The first fire was in December 1989. Then again in May 1991. The hird blaze happened in ront of thousands of Christmas Walk revelers on Dec. 8, 1991.
Each fire brought new inspections by the Inspectionl Services Department (ISD). Each fire resulted in a redesigned flue system to correct the problem. Each fire made the neighborhood more fearful.
The fire on Feb. 22 star ted shortly after $10 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. The dining room at Olives was full of patrons. Al though Junta notified the waitress of the danger be-

(continued from page one) fore running to the fire station, he stated that no one had left their tables by the time he returned with Engine 50 at his heels.
In the aftermath of this latest fire, the neighbors have galvanized their efforts to secure safety for themselves and their homes. Pledging to no longer endure the terror they have been forced to live with, they have bombarded city and state officials with telephone calls and office visits seeking a resolution to the situation.

On Tuesday, Feb. 24, representatives from the Boston Police Department, the Boston Fire Department, City Councillor Robert Travaglini's office and members of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council Public Safety Committee met with residents of the neighborhood most heavily impacted by Olives. Each neighbor testified to their
personal experiences on living with the ongoing problem, after which they were informed that actions to correct the fire hazard had already been put into motion.

A Fire Department spokesman stated that an abatement order had been served to Olives' owners, served to Olives owners,
Olivia and Todd English, that morning, forcing them to rectify the problems with the flue system or close the restaurant indefinitely.
Later that same day, ISD Commissioner Tom McNicholas and Inspectors Hal Abrams and Gary Moccia were joined by Public Safety Committee Chairman Mel Stillman and Charlie Mel Stillman and Charlie
Clabaugh from Travaglini's office to inspect the flue system and kitchen at Olives. McNicholas informed the Englishes that wood could no longer be used as a cooking fuel at the 67 Main St. location. An existing gas stove, he stated,

English said that he can only go on the word of the contractor performing the cleaning that the work had been completed and done properly. He stated that the wood-burning ovens would no longer be used at 67 Main St. "Hopefully, this will stop the problem," he will stop the problem," he

A resolution to the recurring fires will be discussed later this week when ISD, the BFD, Clabaugh, Stillman and the Englishes meet. According to a BFD official, at that time action needed to be taken by the
restaurant owners to eliminate the fire hazard will be outlined and must be operational before they are allowed to reopen their business. Demands for upgrading existing building and fire codes are being pursued by the neighbors. According to one resident, each time the

Charlestown residents participating in the city of Boston recycling program Boston recycling program
helped save over 600 trees helped save over 600 trees
in 1991, according to John McCarthy, the city Recycling Coordinator.
"In Charlestown alone, we've collected 35.6 tons of newspaper," said McCarthy. "That's the equivalent of 605 trees. And the recycling program is only in its infancy."
Citywide newspaper curbside recycling started last September as an expansion to the pilot program that was started in Jamaica Plain in 1990. In this program, newspaper, glass and plastic was being collected
every week. "Over 70 per cent of the material being collected was newspaper," McCarthy said.
"We found that people were very good about recycling their newspapers. We decided to expand the program to recycling newspapers at the curb citywide.
Curbside newspaper recycling is done like regular trash pick-up. Half of the city is picked up one week while the other half is picked up the next week. Recyclers have to have their papers on the curb by $6: 30$ a.m.

$\star$ Quick Action Saves Life - When a Winchester man collapsed while shopping at the Bunker Hill Mall on Feb. 26, the immediate response by two passersby turned out to be the difference between life and death.
Tonia Medina, an occupational therapist with the Visiting Nurse Association of Boston, just happened to be walking through the Mall after making visits in Charlestown when the incident occurred. Bill Kirk of Adams Street had stopped to do some shopping. He, too, was in the right place at the right time.
When Medina and Kirk noticed the man falling, they rushed to his aid and started to administer CPR. As a result of their efforts, the victim was stabilized by the time the ambulance arrived.
The victim, identified as W. Gagan, was rushed to Mass. General Hospital where he was reported to be in stable condition at press time.

* \$150 Grand Up For Grabs - The Charlestown Neighborhood Council Community Benefits Committee met for the first time on Feb. 19 to set down ground rules for the distribution of $\$ 150,000$ to community organizations.
The financial windfall comes from the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA) under a Memorandum of Understanding with Charlestown as the result of mitigation proceedings between the MWRA, the city of Boston, the Neighborhood Council and residents who attended council Mitigation Committee meetings. The money would be distributed in a sum of $\$ 50,000$ a year for the next three years.
The Community Benefits Committee will establish a process which organizations will follow to apply for the funds. It will recommend to the MWRA who will receive the money and determine what percentage of the funds will be awarded to each applicant. The MWRA would then make the final decision and distribute the checks.
Committee Chairperson Nancy Keyes invited input from the community in setting up criteria for the application process. Attending the meeting were representatives from a number of Charlestown sports, cultural and service organizations. No requests for financial support from organizations were allowed at the meeting.
Keyes stated that the committee will report its discussions to the Neighborhood Council at its March 3 monthly meeting. The council will then review the suggestions for the criteria, she said, and will send the committee back to the community to fine-tune the process.

According to Keyes, after another public meeting to set down guidelines and criteria for the awarding of funds, a workshop will be held to help organizations better understand the process.
Committee members present at the meeting were Co-Chair Bill Galvin, Mel Stillman, Jeanne Davis, Moe Gillen, Tom Pitts and Kevin Roche.
Meeting dates will be announced in the Patriot as soon as they are set.

## Voke Gets Commitment From MDC

 On Gilmore Bridge SafetyContinuing his efforts to improve pedestrian safety on the Gilmore Bridge, Rep. Richard Voke has successfully secured a commitment from the Metropolitan District Commission (MDC) for immediate action. At a meeting this past Monday morning on the Gilmore Bridge, Voke was informed that the MDC will extend curbside barriers along the entire length of its Gilmore Bridge roadway.
"I am pleased the MDC has heeded my advice by committing to install guardrails along their Gilmore Bridge property. The addition of these guardrails will certainly provide the increased protection I have sought for pedestrians who walk over that bridge," noted Voke.

This past November, a ruck jumped the Gilmore Bridge sidewalk and struck a Charlestown woman Since then, Voke has been in contact with state and city officials, seeking to ensure the public is better protected by bringing the needed safety improvements to the bridge.
"As we were standing on the unprotected portion of the Gilmore Bridge sidewalk in Cambridge, the dangers to pedestrians com-
ing from Charlestown were painfully clear. Cars are traveling at a high rate of speed, often screeching to a stop for the red light ahead. Without the addition of guardrails, accidents like the one that recently occurred could happen more frequently. With time of the essence, the MDC's response to my inquiries will be swift," Voke stated.

Although pleased with the commitment to add guardrails, Voke says he
will continue to focus on the length of the bridge, seeking other ways to improve public safety. "During my meetings with the MDC, ideas came up relative to the state and city working together to improve conditions on the non-MDC portion of the roadway. For example, the city has been contacted about the possibility of installing pedestrian crossing ights at the intersection of the bridge with Rutherford Avenue. In addition to this,
