## Job and Training Fair For BHA Residents

There will be a "Job and Training Fair" for Boston Housing Authority (BHA) residents on Tuesday, July

30, 1985 from 1 to 4 p.m. at the Elderly Lounge, 55 Bunker Hill Street.

Representatives from seven job training agencies will be providing information and taking applications for 13 different job skills programs. Skills areas include secretarial, medical/dental office assistant, electronics, drafting, machine office repair,

Also present will be representatives from the BHA Resident Hiring and Supportive Services Program, The Community School, and several local employers.

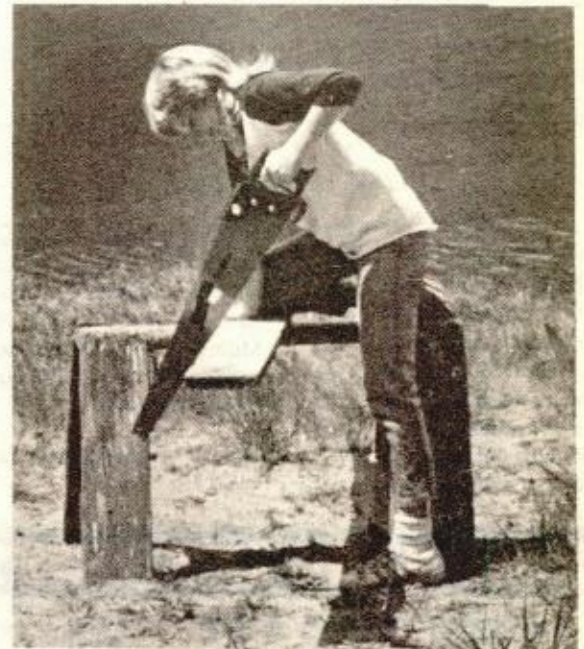

## Assistance Is Needed To Aid Charlestown Fire Victims

Assistance is needed in providing financial and service support to the residents who lost their homes and their possessions in the nine alarm fire which struck five homes on Sheafe Street on July 4th and in the six alarm fire which destroyed seven homes on Wall Street on July 13th.

In order to coordinate support services from the community to the victims of these two fires, a Charlestown Fire Fund Steering Committee has been established and this committee is meeting frequently to develop priorities and assess the immediate and long-term needs of the fire victims.

#### HOUSING

The most immediate need for the fire victims is housing. Many families are separated, with family members staying with various relatives and friends. Some are in temporary quarters and must find apartments. For homeowners, the housing would be on a temporary basis while their homes are being repaired. For tenants, housing might be permanent.

Every effort is being made to secure housing, whether it be through the Boston Housing Authority or through private individuals.

The committee is making a plea to local realtors, developers, and private homeowners to come forward with apartment units that may be available for rental to the fire victims who wish to stay in this community.

## Boston Policeman Injured In Accident In Navy Yard

Ernes Carnetti, a 30 year veteran of the Boston Police Department, is reportedly "doing fine and resting well" at the New England Medical Center after an accident Sunday night at the Charlestown Navy Yard left him temporarily paralyzed.

According to Lieutenant George Kenny, acting commander of Area A, Carnetti was on a routine patrol of the Navy Yard at 7:45 p.m. when the undercarriage of his cruiser caught a sewer cover on First Street, forcing

the vehicle to an immediate halt. Carnetti hit his head on the steering wheel, which left him with no feeling in his arms and legs and unable to radio for help.

After being unable to locate Carnetti, the dispatcher sent patrols in search of the officer, who was found around 9:00 p.m. Kenny reports that the only information available on Carnetti's condition is that feeling has returned to his hands and legs.

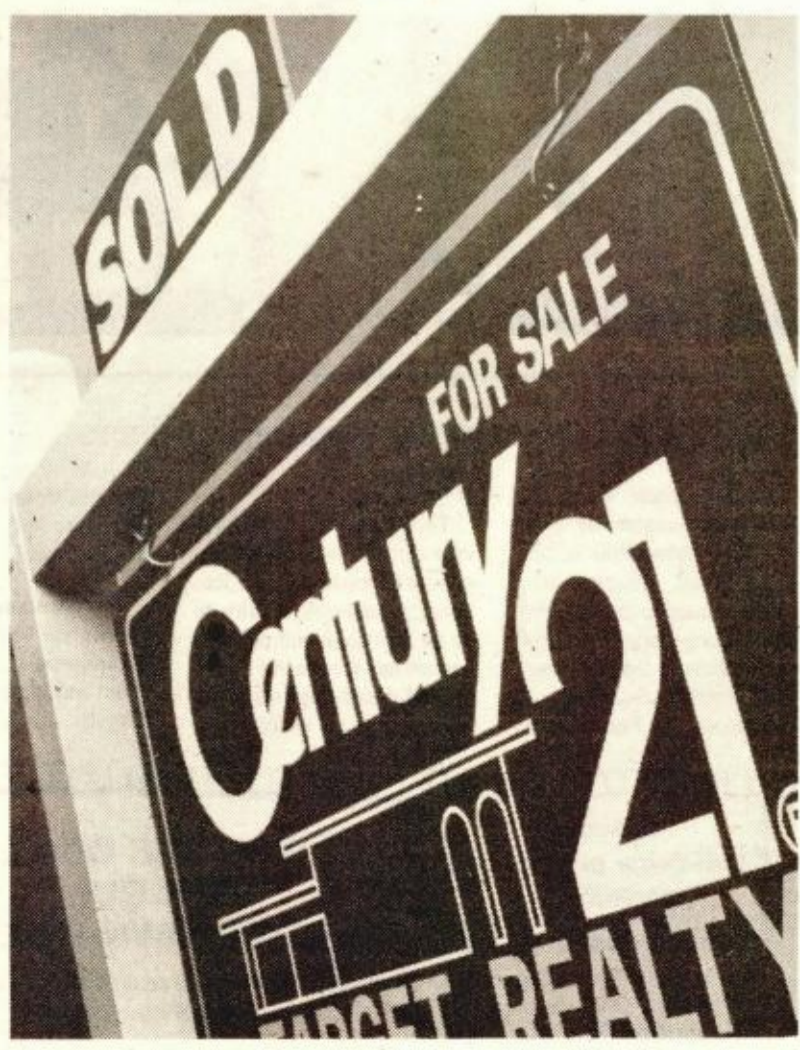

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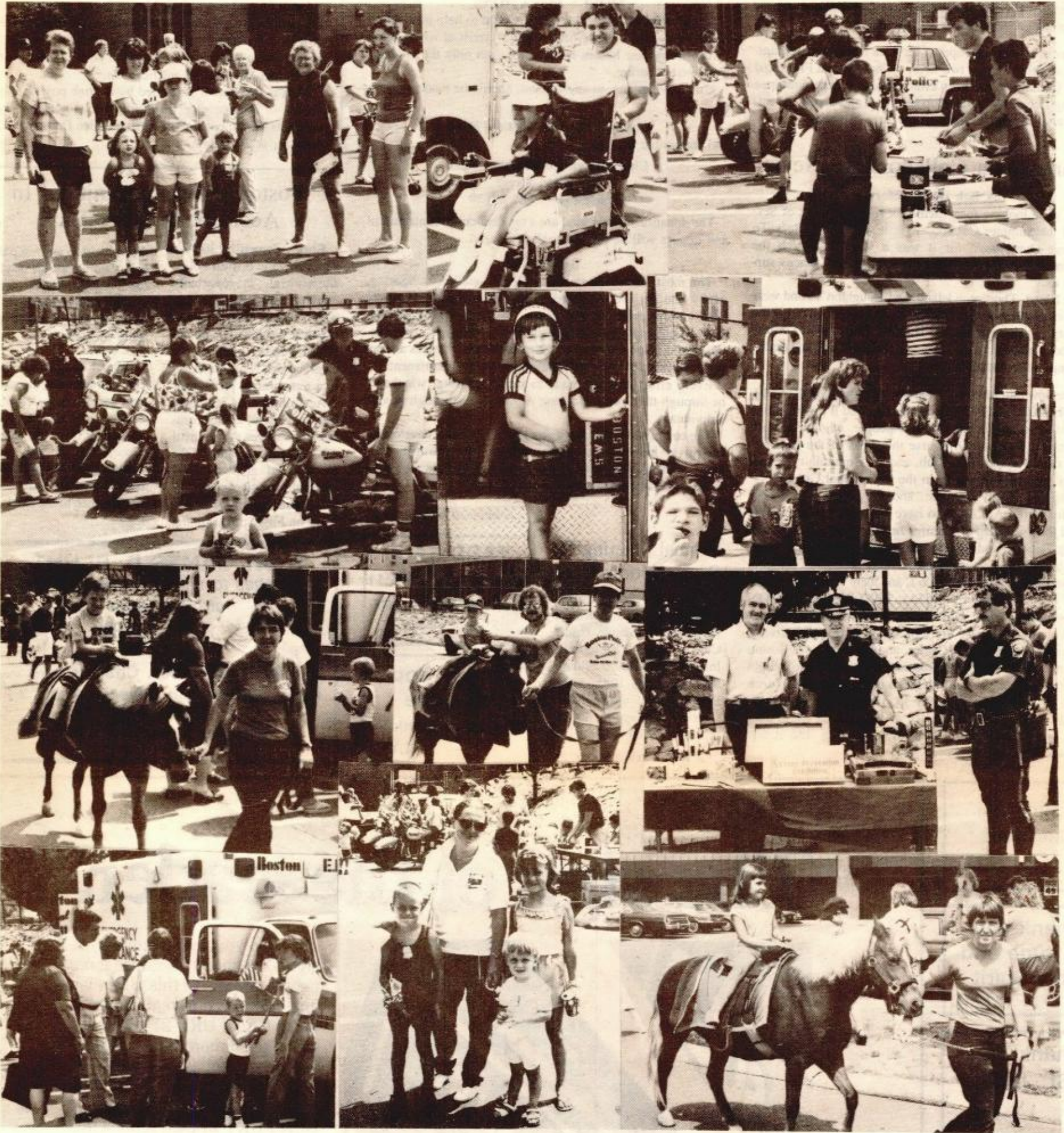

Her husband, Air Force Technical Sergeant Tom Krampota, Jr., is the son of Tom and Marie Krampota of Crosby, Texas.

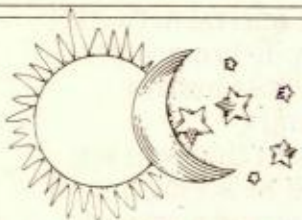

1. State Plans call for Park Street, Common Street, Adams Street and Lowney Way to become two-way streets with a yellow line down the middle of these streets and with the elimination of parking!
2. Over-building in City Square with regards to height and density.
3. New Chelsea Street, with proposed stores and office buildings, does not allow for any on-street parking.

### Mayor Must Address Public Safety Issues

To The Editor:

I am what "Townies" call a newcomer. I am not a "liberal" or a "yuppie". I am a young mother who moved to Charlestown in the hopes of establishing a home for my two children. I found what my family needed — a sense of security and permanence. Unfortunately, my sense of security has turned to one of fear.

The recent fires, which destroyed homes of more than twenty families, has opened not only my eyes, but the eyes of the entire community. These fires could have hit anyone of us. I find it hard to sleep at night knowing fire apparatus may not be able to travel my narrow street or maybe when they arrive, there will be no water in the hydrant at the corner, or not enough water pressure. I do not want the Water and Sewer Department to fix a hydrant the day after my home is destroyed. That is one day too late.

Mayor Raymond Flynn with his private meeting with a handful of residents and public safety officials is not sufficient response to a community who has had not one, but two disastrous fires within two blocks of each other.

Mayor Flynn, you have stated often in the past that there is a "new spirit in Boston" and urged us voters to "be part of it". Well, I invite you, Mr. Mayor, not to a private meeting, but to a public meeting with the entire community. Do not treat us as children by patting us on the head and sending us on our merry way. I feel your private meeting would never have been held had it not been for the editorial in *The Patriot*, which not only hit the nail on the head and called not only your bluff, but the bluff of every City Department responsible for guarding our and our children's public safety.

There are some very serious public safety concerns here in Charlestown which need to be addressed. Let's not wait for another disaster. The next one could be fatal.

### Is It "Politics As Usual" In City Hall?

Dear Mrs. Conway,

I am writing to you in response to an article in the July 18th issue of the *Patriot* from the office of Mayor Raymond Flynn entitled "Mayor Holds Meeting To Discuss Public Safety."

I am outraged that the Mayor would hold such a meeting in "response to concerns over the delivery of public safety services," in the privacy of his office, with a select group of Charlestown residents.

Although I have no qualms with the residents in attendance, I feel that they do not represent a fair cross section of the people of Charlestown. I, myself, a lifelong resident of Charlestown, am appalled that the Mayor would pull such antics in an almost carry-over from the previous administration's "politics as usual" attitude.

I have questions and concerns regarding the public safety of my community that I would like to have had the opportunity to address to the City officials in attendance:

1) How do I know if the hydrant at the corner will be working properly if the need should arise? The hydrant on Cook Street was not functioning for quite a while — where do the priorities lie with the Water and Sewer Commission? What could be of greater priority than to fix a faulty hydrant? The day after a major fire is not the time for them to get their act together and repair a faulty hydrant!

2) Who's responsibility is it in the Fire Department to know the whereabouts of all hydrants in a given area and whether they are in working order? Where does the buck stop at a fire — who's responsibility was it on Sheafe Street when the ladder was removed, stranding three fire fighters on a burning roof with no water and no exit? Those men are my neighbors and I feel they risk too much just fighting a fire, without having to worry about such incompetence causing more of a risk to their lives. Also, a mutual aid system does Charlestown no good at 5:00 p.m. on a Friday afternoon when City Square, Rutherford Avenue, and Sullivan Square are bottlenecks and the hydrant on the corner does not work. We need more protection here now!

3) Where were the police while the fire was totally engulfing five homes on Sheafe Street and fire fighters had to struggle through spectators and "sparkies" to get to the scene? Why was there no crowd control in the area?

4) Parking conditions in Charlestown are extremely tight at the present time and will only get worse with the planned developments and condo conversions. When a one family house is converted into four condos, where do you put those cars? A resident parking program will help, but who will enforce it? The one started in the early 70's flopped because there was no enforcement.

Mrs. Conway, I feel that these are valid concerns and ones that I would like to hear answered. I am concerned that a member of your staff was not included among the "invited guests" who attended this meeting, because then we, the residents, could have had a better insight into what happened at that meeting.

**The Mayor should hold a public meeting in Charlestown to discuss Charlestown's public problems.**

The public and businesses should be wary of fast-buck promoters attempting to peddle everything from commemorative coins to key chains and claiming that a portion of the proceeds raised by purchasing these items will go toward restoring the Statue of Liberty. The U.S. Department of the Interior has authorized the Statue of Liberty/Ellis Island Foundation as the ONLY organization entitled to raise funds and to make arrangements with private businesses for fund-raising activities.

Next time someone tries to sell you something and wraps themselves in the American Flag, apple pie and the Statue of Liberty, call the Better Business Bureau to see if the Lady getting the help is really the Statue of Liberty.

## Emergency Response By Police Topic Of City Council Hearing

"I'm sick of the city acting from crisis to crisis," stated City Councillor Maura Hennigan at the Boston City Council Committee on Public Safety Hearing on Tuesday, July 22, 1985. The hearing sought to answer questions surrounding why two calls placed to the 911 police emergency number were left unanswered.

During the early hours of Sunday morning, July 14, 1985, a South Boston man witnessed the brutal rape and beating of a woman near Boston Avenue. After placing two calls to 911, the man flagged down a police cruiser, which happened to drive by. This incident has caused many to question the efficiency of the 911 system, as well as adequate police response time.

While Police Commissioner Francis Roache defended the 911 system, stating the July 14th incident was a command error, city councillors were not satisfied that the 911 operators were without fault.

City Councillor Albert O'Neil, who chairs the Committee on Public Safety, asked Roache if the dispatcher aired the call. Roache answered no. O'Neil added that it was his belief that the 911 operators were not as efficient as Roache reports. According to O'Neil, on one of his surprise visits to the 911 operators, he discovered the operators reading and not performing their assigned duties. After listening to a tape recording of the two calls placed by the witness, Councillor Jim Kelly whose district includes South Boston, agreed with O'Neil. "I disagree with your statement that the system works," Kelly told Roache, adding, "Clearly the 911 problems

are only one part of the problem. Something has to be done about the lack of police power." Kelly reported the city needs 500 additional police officers "and that's added to today's compliment of men."

Roache defended the 911 system. "I have an obligation to tell the truth," stated Roache. "911 handles over one million calls a year. The staff is outstanding. The (police) personnel should have been there." Roache has publicly reprimanded Deputy Superintendent Daniel Flynn of Area C, who was on vacation at the time, for the insufficient staffing in the area, stating, "It's time that Area Commanders realize they have a tremendous responsibility."

Councillors Charles Yancy and Michael McCormack posed the question, why was a "highly respected" commanding officer being reprimanded. "I don't think we can point the finger at Flynn," said McCormack. Roache disagreed, stating, all area commanders will be held accountable for their area stations. According to Roache, in each station for all shifts, there is a "batting order" and it is the responsibility of the area supervisor to make sure all positions are filled.

"I am angry and very upset," stated Roache, adding, "the human element is present in every situation, and it disturbs me greatly that there was a breakdown (in the system)."

Another concern raised at the hearing addressed the lack of adequate police response time. The two calls which were placed at 1:46 a.m. and 2:00 a.m. were unanswered, but the witness was able to flag a passing cruiser at 2:12 a.m., 26

minutes after the first call was made.

According to Hennigan, the nationwide average police response time is five minutes, while the Boston average is eight minutes, with parts of Mattapan, West Roxbury and Jamaica Plain having an average closer to ten minutes. Yancy noted in New York City, the response time is three minutes.

Roache rebuked these figures, commenting that it was unfair to compare Boston to other cities because "every city is different." According to the commissioner, Boston was not laid out or planned as many cities were. "The police are doing their very best to get to these places. The reality is that moving around this city is very difficult," stated Roache, who promised to investigate each and every complaint regarding response time if need be. According to Roache, often times a victim's anxiety changes their perception of time, and having been the victim of crime himself, Roache said he was aware of how it felt to wait for the police.

As for comparing Boston to New York City, Roache stated this was unfair, since New York has between

25,000 and 35,000 police officers, whereas Boston only has 1700.

Roache reaffirmed his belief in the 911 system, but added that as in any system there is room for improvement. In fact, Roache stated, eleven days after assuming office, he began work "to professionalize 911" by establishing an enhanced system, which would allow a caller to simply pick up the phone, dial 911, and without speaking, the operator would be able to identify the location of the caller. This enhanced system is, however, \$2 million and two years away.

In the meantime, the councillors stated, there was a need for better training of the 911 operators. O'Neil outlined what he considered two major problems with the systems, namely, the language barrier and the lack of sufficient knowledge of Boston streets by the operators.

Presently, the operators are civilian employees who receive on the job training.

Lieutenant Robert Dunford, who trains the 911 operators explained, since the pay scale for the operators does not compete with the pay offered to bilinguals by other employers, it was difficult to hire many individuals versed in both English and Spanish or French or Chinese. While there are bilingual operators, Dunford stated he would like to see

more bilinguals.

The hearing ended with several councillors calling for financial pressures to be placed on the Mayor to hire 500 additional police officers by delaying passage of the Fiscal '86 Budget. O'Neil stated he would like to see less civilian aids on the Boston Police Department staff and more police on the streets.

**HAYFEVER**

Numerous non-prescription "allergy pills" are available and are very effective in controlling symptoms. One must be careful not to take them if you have one of the conditions listed on the package. Also, many people will become sleepy after taking antihistamines, so avoid tasks requiring concentration or coordination until you see how you react.

If these simple measures do not control the problem, then you should consult a physician. Skin tests can be done and the existence of an allergy can be determined within an hour. Also, several new treatments are available. Newly released prescription antihistamines will control most symptoms but cause no sleepiness at all. Also, anti-inflammatory nasal sprays can be given which will eliminate the inflammation and symptoms caused by the allergy. These sprays are very safe and should not be confused with the decongestant sprays you can buy "over-the-counter" without a prescription. Sprays can cause severe problems if used for more than several days and can lead to addiction, so they are not recommended for allergy problems.

If all the latest medications fail to adequately control the allergies, then the old stand-by, allergy injections, should be considered. These are very effective, extremely safe and have given relief to millions of allergy sufferers.

With all the treatments available there is no need to suffer with allergies in the 1980's.

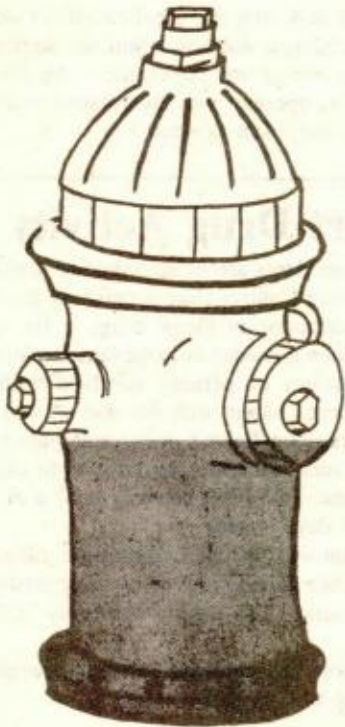

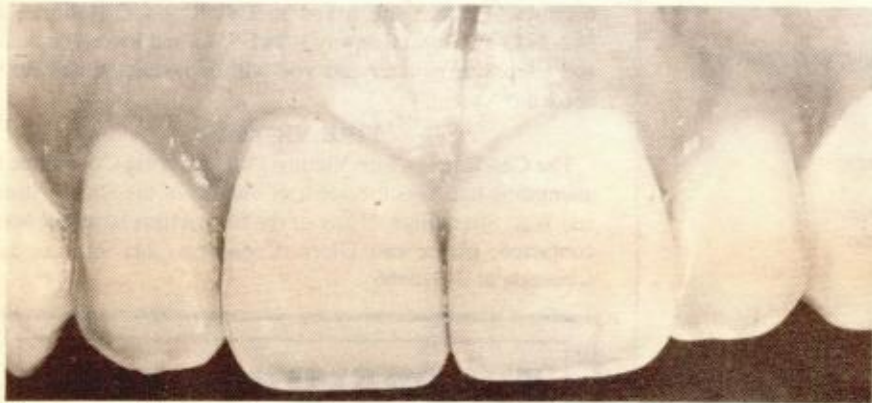

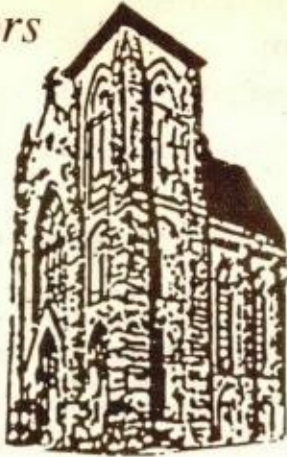
## Saint Mary's Memorial Doors

## HUD Approves Funds To Help Repair Boston Housing Units

John C. Mongan, Regional Administrator-Regional Housing Commissioner for the Boston Regional Office of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announced the preliminary approval of \$25 million in federal funds to the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) to "help repair some of its boarded up and vacant units."

Mongan said the BHA has received preliminary approval to use \$14 million of the \$25 million to fix-up units of boarded up housing at the Charlestown Housing Project and the Mission Hill Project in Roxbury.

"This preliminary approval means that the BHA must submit to HUD a plan to fix-up the 324 units of boarded up vacant housing within the next 18 to 24 months," he said.

"This means that 324 Boston families, some of whom have been waiting for public housing for a long as eight years, will soon have a safe and decent apartment to live in. To these families, 18 to 24 months is a short while," he added.

As of May 1985, the BHA had 10,839 families on its waiting list in need of public housing/rental housing, of these families more than

8,000 had children.

Mongan said HUD envisions the BHA will repair 177 units at the Charlestown Project. The Charlestown Project was built in 1940, has 1149 units, of which 877 are currently occupied. The others are boarded up.

According to HUD and BHA records, the Boston Housing Authority has more than 3,000 public housing units boarded up and in need of extensive repairs. The HUD funds will be used to return more than 10 percent of these units to the BHA for use by low and moderate-income families, Mongan said.

Mongan said the HUD funds for the BHA are made available from HUD Comprehensive Assistance Improvement Program (CIAP), which provides federal aid to public housing agencies to finance capital improvements in public housing projects.

Under the program, HUD finances capital improvements as well as major repair, management improvements, and planning costs in public housing agency-owned, low-income housing projects to up-grade living conditions, correct physical deficiencies, and achieve operating efficiency and economy. The improvements are financed over a

20-year period, during which the agency or authority must operate the modernized projects in accordance with HUD requirements.

Over the past four years, while the BHA was under federal receivership, HUD provided more than \$70 million in CIAP funds. However, those funds were used to finance emergency repairs and other work at all the BHA projects.

"This will be the first time in a number of years that the BHA will be required to do comprehensive work on just two projects. The tenants will be able to see where the funds are going, and residents in need of housing will see 324 units become available," Mongan said.

The BHA, which is one of the oldest public housing authorities in the nation, is the largest in New England and has traditionally received a large amount of CIAP funding. However, this is the first time the authority has been approved for \$11 million for regular CIAP work and \$14 million specifically targeted to repair vacant and boarded-up units.

Mongan said HUD has estimated that the BHA's plan to use the \$14 million will provide 63 three-bedroom units, 72 two-bedroom units, and 42 one-bedroom units at Charlestown.

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### Next Central Artery Community Meeting Announced For July 30

Two meetings concerning the North Area/Central Artery Project will be held in the upcoming weeks. On July 30, 1985, a North Area Community Meeting will take place at 7:00 p.m. at the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street. This meeting is open to everyone, and members of the consultant team and representatives from the state will be present to discuss issues of urban design and streetscape.

Six different areas for new development, totalling 25½ acres next to City Square, will be available as a result of this highway construction project. The preliminary plans submitted in 1982 show offices, residences, re-

tail shops, recreation, a hotel, and parking. The height of the buildings in this area could be as high as 60 feet. The buildings projected in 1982 totalled over 560,000 square feet.

In addition, the total number of jobs created by development on the parcels was projected to be over 1,500. At recent community meetings, the Task Force has spoken out clearly for these jobs to be available to Charlestown residents. At the July 30th meeting, new options for development on the parcels will be presented for discussion by the community.

On Thursday, August 1, at 4:30 p.m., an interagency workshop is scheduled. Project engineers, architects, administrators, and representatives from city and state

agencies will attend, along with representatives from the community and the North Area Task Force to continue work on issues of urban design.

The North Area/Central Artery Project consists of a number of highway improvements and major roadway reconstruction in the North Area of the Central Artery. Funded by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works and the Federal Highway Administration, the project began in 1978, when the expressway/tunnel configuration now being designed was developed. Seventeen surface street/expressway ramp alternatives were presented to the community advisory group by the design team, now headed by Berger-Lochner, a joint venture.

The proposals include demolition of the overhead ramps in City Square and replacing them with tunnels and loop ramps west of Rutherford Avenue; new surface streets; and new parcels for development in the City

Square area.

The community and the North Area Task Force played an important part in the early stages of the project. Evaluation criteria used by the Mass. DPW were based in part on community

input, and when the final alternative was chosen, the community groups gave their support to the plan. Community participation is continuing in earnest as the project gets closer to actual construction.
