Central Artery Meetings Continue

Detour Roadway Plans To Be Discussed July 22nd

The temporary detour roadway that will be constructed as part of the North Area/Central Artery project will be the topic of discussion at the next community meeting to be held on Tuesday, July 22 at 7:00 p.m. in the Knights of Columbus Hall, 75 West School Street.

Engineers from the Berger-Lochner joint venture, consultants to the Massachusetts Department of Public Works, will present plans for the temporary structure, an element of the \$175-million dollar highway-tunnel project. The roadway will be built in order to detour traffic away from the area of tunnel construction and away from the approaches to the Tobin Bridge. This temporary roadway will accommo-

date northbound and southbound traffic, as well as local traffic and will take about one year to construct.

The consultants will pre-

sent the plans for the structure and will discuss with the community construction issues involved with the detour roadway.

Two Alarm Fire Damages Hathon Square Buildings

The Boston Fire Department Arson Squad is currently investigating the cause of the two alarm fire which resulted in the Fire Department's estimate of approximately \$35,000 worth of damage to a two family duplex on Hathon Square.

Seventeen area engine and ladder companies responded to the early morning fire at 5:29 a.m. on Monday, July 14th. According to Boston Fire Department Public Information Officer, William Murphy, the blaze began in the attic of 5 Hathon Square

and "shot over" to number 7. Because number 5 was vacant at the time of the fire, Murphy said the fire "was of suspicious origin.

The "all out" was sounded at 6:51 a.m., however, Murphy added, a fire detail remained at the scene until 7:51 a.m. as a precautionary measure. The detail kicks over rumble and wets down burnt items to insure that the fire does not start up again.

Murphy said he could not comment as to how the fire started, but added the department "has a good idea" as to the source.



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Scheduled Reconstruction On Mead and Ferrin Streets

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn has announced that the Boston Redevelopment Authority has approved a contract for reconstruction of two Charlestown Streets - Mead Street from Main Street to Russell Street and Ferrin Street from Bunker Hill Street to it's dead end.

Mayor Flynn said, "I'm delighted that the city is going to fulfill promises made long ago to rebuild these streets." The \$275,000 project includes street paving, concrete sidewalks and curbing, street lights, landscaping and some limited water and drainage.

Main And Warren Streets Reconstruction Update . . .

With roughly 25% of the work schedule time table past, official word from the Massachusetts Department of Public Works (DPW) public information department is that only 3% of the total work on the Main and Warren Street Reconstruction Project has been completed. In fact, the DPW field report says that no work has been done on the project since June 30th.

Janice Sargoni from the DPW said that DPW Commissioner Robert Tierney is "quite unhappy" with Baker and Company, the construction team hired by the state to do the reconstruction work. Sargoni added, "We (at the DPW) think there are some problems with Baker, and not just in Charlestown." The Stoughton based construction company currently has seven state awarded contracts, and the word is they are experiencing financial problems.

Rumors circulated last week that Baker and Company's payroll checks had bounced. While Sargoni said that she, herself, had not heard of these rumors, if they were true, the Baker and Company bonding company would have insurance to cover such an event. Edward Zeytoognian, President of Baker and Company, has not been available for comment.

David Wilson, Acting Chief Engineer of the DPW, told Zeytoognian in a letter that the department was aware that "the volume of direct payments (from subcontractors) filed against Baker are staggering," and that the Department is prepared to address these concerns.

Last week the DPW requested a detailed work schedule and status report for all state awarded projects

from Baker. However, Sargoni said that what Baker and Company submitted was "inadequate" and they have been asked to resubmit.

In Wilson's letter, Baker and Company has until Friday, July 18th to supply the DPW with their resubmitted project status and schedules.

Sargoni assured that the DPW is aware that Main Street is currently "an eyesore and an inconvenience" for Charlestown residents, and added, "We're doing everything to expedite the work there.

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



As the festive and busy summer season is underway "behind the wall," I would like to mention some happenings.

This area is served by several commercial activities including our corner store, aptly called the Commissery, on the first floor of First Avenue within Constitution Quarters.

Constitution Quarters contains approximately 380 apartment units, one of which is Apartment 4308, the residence of my mother, Elizabeth Teaffe FitzPatrick, active with the Mothers' Club at the Boys Club, and a former teacher in various elementary throughout Charlestown. She looks forward to seeing her former students and friends.

The availability of public pool swimming within the Yard was brought to my attention by "Townies" Paul Collins and Bill McCabe. Although on the water, the only swimming pool presently available is for tenants of Constitution Quarters.

Presently the law firm of Cullen & O'Connell are housed within the commercial condomimum of Shipway II. One of our "Townie" talent, part owner Timothy O'Connell, is dispensing his legal expertise from behind the wall.

At this juncture the only other commercial endeavor is Ocean Marine Services, Inc., providing marine and navigational supplies.

Entering Gate 4, you look right down the opening to Boston Harbor, a truly refreshing view.

As you turn left onto First Avenue, the recently leased Building 36 appears on the right (or in marine parlance — Starboard). The 3½ story long granite building with 62,000 square feet has two tenants, Sail Magazine and the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority — an idyllic setting for both of these organizations.

Publishing a highly circulated nautical magazine, Sail is under the helm of Bernard A. Goldhirsh, a joint owner with Jerome L. Rappaport of Incubator Associates. Occupying approximately 10,000 square feet with 50 employees, its location affords a magnificent views of the harbor and skyline.

The Massachusetts Water Resources Authority was created by a 1984 legislative act to clean up Boston Harbor and to ensure the efficient economical and self sustaining operation of Metropolitan Boston's Water and Sewerage Systems. With a potential of 200 employees occupying the 41,000 square feet, it is ideally suited for administrative headquarters.

In keeping with the memory filled past, the architecturally historical building is aptly called The Ironside.

One other tenant had been listed on the foyer directory, Tilbury Point Restaurant. At this time its status is uncertain.



It's 1803 In The Charlestown Navy Yard

The year 1803 has come alive in the Charlestown Navy Yard. The USS Constitution Museum has started a "Living History" program, and seven actors turn back the clock to become men and women of early 19th century Charlestown.

From now until August 10th, visitors to the museum and "Old Ironsides" may find themselves in conversation with Captain Preble, the captain of the USS CONSTITUTION; Samuel Morse, the 14 year old son of Charlestown's Congregational minister and an artist who was later to invent the Morse Code; plus a merchant captain, lemon seller, innkeeper's wife, school teacher, and a woman of ill repute.

According to Richard C. Wheeler, Director of the USS Constitution Museum, "Our 'Living History' program is the only one of its

kind in Boston and we are the only major historical site re-living this particular period. The year 1803 was chosen not only because it was a year when 'Old Ironsides' was in dock at Charlestown, but also because it represents an important period in this nation's history. The nation is new; it is a period of wonderful bravado — eagles appear everywhere; Thomas Jefferson is President and Aaron Burr is Vice President.''

The actors, men and women ranging in age from 19 to 37, have come from as far away as the University of Michigan to participate in this pilot program. Similar programs at Sturbridge Village and Plimoth Plantation have been enormously successful in involving tourists and school children of all ages in an historical experience. a romantic period when billowy canvas sails curled over spotlessly clean, wooden pegged decks. Sailors sat high in the riggings tying the sails, as the "Sagres" prepared to make her way into Boston Harbor, adding to the feeling of by-gone days.

The vessel's stop in Boston marks the mid-point in her training mission, which included participation in Operation Sail 1986 at the Statue of Liberty Centennial Commemoration.

Commander Mario Durao of the "Sagres" stated that the vessel has a crew comprised of 230 Portuguese and 15 Belgian naval personnel. During the three months of training, the 54 Portuguese and 13 Belgian cadets on board will perform coastal, astronomical and radar navigation, obtain knowledge of on-board departments organization and procedures and will be assigned several seamanship tasks concerning officers and rating duties as duty and watch officer assistants, helmsman, lookouts, rigging, sails work, knotting and splicing, ship's conversation, etc. Embarking on a sailing ship like "Sagres" is no doubt the best training cadets can be afforded as far as seamanship, discipline and physical fitness are concerned, which will be an important part of their preparation as future officers.

The "Sagres" is the third in a series of five foreign ships scheduled to be berthed at the Charlestown Navy Yard this summer. According to Bill Foley of the Boston National Historical Park, who is handling the "Visiting Ships Program," "the five vessels are only the beginning." It is his hope that the scheduled completion of renovations on Pier 2 and possible additional renovation work within the Yard, will afford the opportunity for many more foreign and American visiting ships to take advantage of the historic legacy of the Charlestown Navy Yard.

The next ship scheduled to berth at the Charlestown Yard is the Japanese Destroyer "Nagatsuki", arriving in Boston on July 25, 1986.

Currier & Ives Naval Prints At USS Constitution Museum

From now through October 15th, 77 hand-colored Currier & Ives naval prints will be on exhibit at the USS Constitution Museum, located in the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Presented by the United States Naval Academy as part of a nationwide tour, the prints represent over half of the Currier & Ives naval scenes contained in the Beverley R. Robinson Collection.

The exhibit, made up of a diverse collection of battle scenes, ship portraits, political banners and cartoons, traces the growth of the American Navy from its Revolutionary War infancy to its position in the late 19th-century as one of the most respected and powerful fleets in the world.

Clarification on Polk Street Rehab

To the Editor,

We would like to make several clarifications regarding the article titles "Renovations Underway on Polk Street Buildings" in the 7-10-86 issue of the **Patriot**.

The article cites a discrepancy between cost estimates of the Boston Housing Authority (BHA) and the Task Force for this rehabilitation project. While the article's figures are correct, the Task Force did not conduct any cost estimates and has no disagreement with the BHA regarding these figures. The figures are from the BHA's Construction Management Department.

The article also cites a disagreement regarding the sufficiency of \$8.6 million in HUD funds to complete all rehab work. Both sides agree that the project's cost is close to \$15 million. The BHA has applied to the Executive Office of Communities and Development (EOCD) for an additional \$6 million to complete this work. The Task Force has steadily lobbied for additional Polk Street funds. The Task Force informed EOCD of their strong support of the BHA proposal earlier this month, and anxiously awaits for its approval.

The Task Force is highly pleased that the rehab work is underway and moving ahead of schedule by virtue of the hard work of Don Doherty's rehab crew. As construction proceeds, the Task Force will continue to pay close attention to the progress of this work so the reopening of this desperately needed housing will not be further delayed.

The Colonel Is Coming To Charlestown

The City of Boston Board of Appeal has approved the request by the Scott's Food Services, Inc. of Wellesley for a conditional use permit to construct a 54 seat Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurant. The restaurant will be

located at the Bunker Hill Mall between Johnnie's Foodmaster Supermarket and the Pharmacity Drug Store. Also located in this area are McDonald's and Papa Gino's restaurants.

Robert Burke, Director of Operations for the Scott's Food Service, told residents at a public meeting held at the YMCA building in City Square on Wednesday, June 18th, that approximately \$250,000 in renovations will take place at the storefront. Burke promised, "We're going to make the place feel like a restaurant, rather than a typical humdrum fast food place." In fact, Burke foresees only 15% of the restaurant's total business as take

Scott's Food Service, Inc. owns and operates 24 Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurants in the Boston and Massachusetts area, and, according to Burke, plans to expand it's operations further to include an additional 25 restaurants. Burke says it is this type of expansion which is responsible for the fast advancement of their employees. Most of the restaurant managers were once hourly paid employees. Burke says it is Scott's intention to hire as many local residents as possible.

Burke says he is excited about opening a Kentucky Fried Chicken restaurant in Charlestown because he. himself, is originally from the area. "My first job was a Johnnie's when I was sixteen years old," he added.

Construction should begin within two months. Burke explained that in accordance with their lease, the restaurant must open within six months.
