The activities and entertainment of the Christmas Walk will get underway at 2 p.m. Musical groups will perform at the Harvard Mall, the Veterans Park and in Thompson Square, as well as at various other locations in the area of the

walk, highlighted by the arrival of Santa Claus with gifts for the children and the illumination of the community Christmas tree at Austin and Main streets at 5:30 p.m. by Mayor Raymond L. Flynn.





City Council To Hold Hearing On Scheme Z In Charlestown

An Evening Of Unusual Events At Monthly Council Meeting

The monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council on Dec. 4 opened on an unusual note. An open-floor public discussion on the council's selection of seven community-based organizations to hold a seat on the council for the next two years was allowed. This exception to the common rules of council order did not perhaps set a precedent but did, however, allow additional discussion on testimony already heard at a committee meeting - a point of contention for most council members.

Representatives from the Charlestown Business Association (CBA) petitioned the council to reconsider a vote taken at last week's Organizational Selection Committee meeting that resulted in the exclusion of the Association from holding a council seat. CBA President Annette Tecce stated that she was speaking on behalf of "more than 100 businesses in Charlestown" and "we would like the Neighborhood Council to vote down the committee finding and recommend us for the council."

The request included, according to a statement read by Tecce, "These seven organizations (selected by the committee) all have a real presence in Charlestown and over the years have helped Charlestown to become a better community. However," it concluded, "when one weighs the relative benefits to the Charlestown community derived from these organizations, one must conclude that the Charlestown Business Association will offer more to the community by way of its combined resources, know-

The elected members of the council, seven by precincts and seven at-large, were appointed at the November meeting to a committee to recommend organizations to fill the remaining seven council seats. Nine of the 14 eligible members attended the Organizational Selection Committee meeting, voting on eight applications. The CBA only received four votes, thus its efforts to be recommended failed.

After an hour-long discussion, which at times became emotional and heated, the entire council, currently seated organization representatives included, voted 12 to 6 to uphold the vote by the committee.

After the vote, Tecce expressed her "total amazement" on the omission of (continued on page 17)



Open House For Charlestown Residents On CA/T Environmental Report

Representatives from the Central Artery/Tunnel project will hold an open house for the Charlestown community on Wednesday, Dec. 12 from 3 to 8 p.m. at the Bunker Hill Museum, 43 Monument Square (use Monument Avenue entrance).

An exhibit on the project's recently released environmental report will be on display and project staff will answer questions in such areas as traffic, air quality, noise, design and mitigation.

The comprehensive 5.500-page Final Supplemental Environmental Impact Report (F/SEIR) issued in mid-November addresses some 500 comments on a draft CA/T environmental report released last May. According to the Massachusetts Department of Public Works, these comments from Charlestown and residents of other areas, organizations, environmental groups and government agencies have helped the MDPW improve project design for the Charles River Crossing with a much-expanded mitigation program, create a new fill disposal plan and provide a detailed description of its in-depth mitigation plan for minimizing disruption during construction.

This report and open house are some of the final steps in the CA/T project environmental approval process which paves the way for the start of construction in the spring of

These organizations will take their seats at the monthly council meeting in January.

★ Knights of Columbus — The parking lot behind the K. of C. Hall on West School Street has been the scene of a construction project the past few weeks. Residents have been inquiring as to what the "big dig" is all about.

According to K. of C. member Tom Cunha, the New England Telephone Co. is in the process of updating the telephone system in the area and was in need of a permanent site to construct a small building to house its equipment and telephone lines. The parking lot behind the K. of C. building was the perfect spot and a portion of it has been leased to the telephone company.

★ Charlestown Navy Yard — The Boston Zoning Commission failed to approve a master zoning plan for the Charlestown Navy Yard. Following a marathon public hearing of over four hours on Dec. 3, the plan received five favorable votes and two in opposition. Seven votes in the affirmative are required for approval.

Proponents of the zoning plan, which was approved by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council last winter by a 20 to 1 vote, testified at the hearing as to the benefits the zoning changes would provide relative to the proposed New England Aquarium and research facilities planned for the Yard.

Opponents objected based on issues such as historic preservation, traffic, density, height and open space. A Boston Redevelopment Authority spokesperson said that opponents, for the most part, asked for a delay in approving the plan and just one resident recorded himself in outright opposition.

Paul Barrett, director of harbor planning for the BRA, stated that commission members have been provided with the materials they requested at the hearing, including the transportation plan. He said the public record is closed as was declared by the commission chairman at the end of the hearing. He has been advised that the commission will reconvene within two weeks to act on the zoning plan. The meeting will be open to the public, but no public testimony will be allowed.



A CBA member asked the council if an organization failed to attend meetings would there be an opportunity for CBA to fill that vacancy. Chairman Dennis McLaughlin stated, "That possibility is a very distinct possibility," and he said he would personally try to see that that happened.

Each of the seven selected organizations will now have to inform the council as to whom they want seated as its representative at the January meeting. The election of officers for 1991 will also be held at this meeting.

Council members present at Tuesday night's meeting were: Chairman McLaughlin, Vice Chairman Bill Galvin, Ed O'Connell, Bob Scalli, Ed Callahan, Tom Cunha, Kate McDonough, Jim Conway, Jim Mansfield, Nancy Keyes, Mel Stillman, Peter Looney, Dan Kovacevic, Marty O'Brien, Bob Wallace, Kevin Roche, Moe Gillen, Ken Stone and Matt O'Neil.

The council meeting got underway with a call for committee reports. Since very few committees have met during the past month, discussions were brief, another unusual occurrence at council meetings.

Development Committee Chairman Cunha informed the council that he is currently gathering information on Parcel R-107 (Main Street and Lawnwood Place) and the MBTA's pro-

posal to construct a parking facility in Sullivan Square. He was requested to also update the council on the status of other development proposals, such as Parcels R-87 (Tremont and Prospect streets), P-2 (Bunker Hill and Main streets) and any other outstanding development business.

McLaughlin requested that Cunha and Boston Redevelopment Authority Charlestown Coordinator Jim Sullivan bring an update on all projects to the council at the January meet-

The Haul Road Committee, co-chaired by Gillen and Wallace, had no meetings this past month, but according to Gillen "the BRA Board of Directors voted to request the state to fund the Haul Road, allow development to go forward and get back to the community with design issues."

Mitigation Committee Chairman Galvin stated that he had tried unsuccessfully to get Massport to attend public community meetings to discuss the purchase of the former Somerville Lumber building on Medford Street and subsequent lease of the property to Baystate Express.

Galvin told the council that he understood that "on Nov. 23 papers were passed and Baystate signed a lease." This, he stated, was against the process set down between Massport and the community allowing community input before such transactions took place. Issues important to the community, he said,

such as non-union jobs, traffic, removal of asbestos and an influx of rodents have not been allowed to be addressed.

Galvin stated that he has invited Massport to attend a Dec. 10 meeting to address these and other concerns. This meeting will be held at Charlestown High School starting at 7 p.m.

The Community Appreciation Awards Committee will close its membership at its next scheduled meeting, according to Chairman Cunha. The committee will begin to define the categories for eligible award recipients, he said, and the confusion that would occur by accepting new members after these discussions begin would delay the process. The meeting will be announced as soon as a location has been confirmed.

The New England Aquarium of a Whole Committee Chairman McLaughlin reported that he had been notified that there will be an upcoming meeting to define community benefits and educational possibilities as a result of the aquarium coming to Charlestown. He stated that Bunker Hill Community College President Piedad Robertson will put together a meeting on educational benefits realized by


