Vernon Street resident told representatives of the Simeone Corporation at a public forum Tuesday night at Bunker Hill Community College. in reference to the company's proposed bituminous concrete plant at a 2.5 acre 100 Front Street site.

Over 250 residents of the Charlestown community attended this Simeone Corporation sponsored public forum. The residents expressed anger and the general consensus of the audience was opposition to this plan presented by the company representatives. Approximately 30 residents

Parrino was reported missing in action and two years later the War Department declared the 65 men and officers on the Grayling, killed in action.

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





undetectable from a natural tooth. Dr. Richard Woolfe, a member of the faculty at Harvard University School of Dental Medicine has developed the system at Dental Associates. He says that the results are most gratifying and is anticipating a great demand for the new, advanced technology.

The innovation is called Dacrown (Day-Crown) at Dental Associates and Cerestore Crown by Johnson-Johnson Dental Products Company.

Dr. Ralph B. Sozio, Co-director of the Prosthetic Division of the Forsyth Research Institute and on the staff at Harvard School of Dental Medicine, initially raised the idea of using advanced ceramic technology for dental application and has been heavily involved in the development of the Cerestore Crown.

Drs. Ralph Sozio and Edwin J. Riley, Directors of the Prosthetic Division of the Forsyth Research Institute and on staff at Harvard School of Dental Medicine worked cooperatively on the development of the crown.

"All-metal restorations are more durable," Dr. Riley said. "However, we have found that most people do not like to have metal showing any place in their mouths." Further, he explained, metal conducts heat and cold which can cause discomfort when eating or drinking. Metal also blocks the diagnostic x-rays used to detect underlying decay.

"Porcelain fused to metal can chip or shear off." Dr. Sozio said. "And in some cases a 'metal collar' can be seen through the translucent porcelain, especially around the base of the crown as gums recede."

Its all-ceramic-core and advanced fabrication make it possible for a Dacrown to provide a new standard in precise fit and to have a very life-like appearance closely mimicking a natural tooth. plant had reached the stage of a Board of Appeals hearing with a prior community meeting informing the residents of the plan.

Joe Hanbury. Engineer for the Simeone Corporation, explained that the proposed plant is a batch mixer which manufactures bituminous concrete by a process of heating and drying sand and stone combined with a liquid asphalt. The plant would house aggregrate storage and fuel on the 2.5 acre site behind the YMCA on Front Street.

In addition to the proposed tower and dryer, there will be a rotary kiln and a 8 foot diameter drum.

According to a Department of Environmental Quality Engineering (DEQE) letter dated February 2. 1984, the production aggregate will be delivered in trucks daily and transferred into five bins each having an approximate 1,000 ton storage space

Stanley Siegel. of Diversified Engineering Services, who prepared the traffic analysis for the Simeone Corporation. stated that he foresaw no significant impact from traffic generated by the plant as the residential community. despite problems caused by the closure of the Expressway ramps in the morning commute.

Despite efforts by Hanbury, assuring the gathering that the plant was to be in accordance with D.E.Q.E. standards, many residents did not feel that this was enough.

Warren Street resident, Ken Stone, stated that "the Sand and Gravel Company located adjacent to this site, was in state and federal compliance, but not as far as the neighbors are concerned."

State Representative Richard Voke stated that he, in conjunction with Senator Fran Doris, has submitted legislation relative to the early land taking by the state, of this Front Street property. This site is slated to be utilized as part of the ramp system for the proposed North Area roadway construction.

Voke continued. "No one can argue in any manner, shape, or form that an



asphalt plant is a plus for Charlestown - that it is a development we should welcome into our community."

One resident addressed the Simeone representatives asking if they would feel as strongly opposed as the Charlestown residents do, if a "plant like this came into your neighborhood. I just wish you would find somewhere else to go."

City Councillor Michael McCormack pledged support against such a proposal stating. "I don't have an asphalt plant next to my house in Brighton. And no one is proposing one next to my house in Brighton, and they damn well better not be proposing an asphalt plant next to my house in Brighton. I wouldn't put up with it and I don't think that you should."

A letter by John W Oliver, Supervisor of the Central Artery Project. was read before the forum by Senator Fran Doris, requesting immediate acquisition of the land parcel in question by the State Department of Public Works stating reasons of 'cost to the Commonwealth and to its taxpavers" in addition to the "adverse impact to all in the community" if the asphalt plant was permitted to be built on this site. Senator Doris added that

Senator Doris added that the Department of Public Works agreed with the supervisor's recommendation.

Representative Voke also agreed, stating that

since the land was to be taken by eminent domain in a year and a half, this fact "should make any responsible person oppose the project of even building a convent on that site"

Voke added that the Metropolitian District Commission, in writing, opposed the project, citing "adverse impact" on MDC plans for the immediate area.

Mr. James Rowan. representative of the Speaker of the House. "Tip" O'Neill's office, stated that he was "very much opposed" because the Simeone Corporation's Asphalt Plant is "the wrong plant at the wrong time in the wrong part of town." He assured the Simeone representatives that "we shall, gentlemen, defeat you in City Hall."

For those seeking additional information about the asphalt plant, the Simeone Corporation is sponsoring a tour to their Holliston plant on Tuesday. May 29, 1984. 



Proposal To Save Boston City Hospital Indigent Services

Representative Richard Voke Charlestown Representative and Chairman of the Legislature's Health Care Committee, is pleased to announce that he has filed legislation to enable the Boston City Hospital to continue to provide medical services to the needy uninsured residents of Boston. The local legislator. perceiving a crisis situation developing. has gone to the aid of the city's renowned public hospital

In making this announcement, Representative Voke revealed that under current law a limit on the amount of money an insurance company can reimburse hospitals for the type of care Boston City Hospital delivers is scheduled to take place in September of this year. In working together with the staff and administrators of Boston City Hospital. Representative Voke has drafted legislation which would enable the hospital to maintain their present level of the so-called free care services to the residents of Boston. Representative Voke

stated that he is committed to the survival and future viability of Boston City Hospital and that it was his belief that the revenue reduction which, without the passage of the proposed legislation, would take place in September, would seriously jeopardize the hospital's ability to provide quality care to the city's indigent. Under the bill Boston City Hospital would be provided with over a million dollars more in additional revenue

Voke made the following statement. "The Boston City Hospital is a unique institution: for many, it has become the hospital of last resort. It is a public institution, with problems and complications which differ markedly from her pretigious. private neighbors. While the ranks of the working poor and the uninsured keep increasing the demands on the Boston City Hospital have become greater than ever. In contrast to her neighbors, her percentage of bad debt and delivery of free care is ever increasing while her counterparts receive less."







Launches Voter Registration Drive

Mayor Raymond L. Flynn has announced an aggressive campaign to register new voters in Boston.

The City's Election Department, under Commissioner James Killilea, will set up voter registration sites in every neighborhood of the city at the local fire stations for the next ten Saturdays between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

In addition, there is also an ongoing registration effort at every high school, both public and private, in Boston. The Election Department is also in the process of contacting all colleges, universities, and nursing homes for registration sites and days.

Mayor Flynn noted. "For the first time. the City is aggressively pushing voter registration in the neighborhoods of Boston. We are going to reach out to the people in the neighborhoods and get them to help us find sites and locations. Although the preliminary for the senate election is four months away and the presidential election is six, we are starting early so that we can cover every part of the city and any request.

To request a voter registration site, the election law provides that when ten registered voters petition the City's Election Department (anv document signed in writing with names and addresses of the ten requesting the site will be accepted) the City will fulfill that request. Any individual physically disabled can call or write the Election Department and a registrar will come out and register that person to vote.

Registration requests should be directed to: The Boston Election Department, 2nd Floor, City Hall, 1 City Hall Plaza, Boston, MA 02201, telephone 725-4635 or 725-4636.

To register, you must be 18 years of age and a citizen of the United States. Any form of identification with name and address will be taken as proof of residence, such as a letter, driver's license, electric bill, etc. There are no tests. Unless you move from your current address you need never register again.





its residents to be sometimes vocal, but always reasonable and fair. Within the past month several incidents have occurred which should be brought to the attention of your readers, and particularly the residents of the Monument Square neighborhood.

I represent Bonni Widdoes who has been a resident of Charlestown for approximately twelve years. She purchased and is in the process of rehabilitating No. 4 Monument Square into six residential units. She applied for and received a building permit from the City of Boston Building Department.

I was contacted by Bonni for the first time approximately five months ago. In conjunction with her architect they presented a proposal to construct, in a courtyard fashion, well landscaped, three single family wood framed town houses on the vacant land beside and to the rear of No. 4 Monument Square. Papers were filed with the Board of Appeal, abutting neighbors were personally contacted and the initial hearing held in April. Without getting into the details of the hearing and two subsequent neighborhood meetings, we have been attempting to make some compromises with the neighborhood in an effort to receive the Board's approval. This letter is not an effort to seek the Patriot's support or in fact the support of anyone. I am, however, deeply concerned and disturbed by what has occurred since the matter first came before the Board.

Shortly after the hearing, the following incidents have occurred at the site:

1. Two large windows in the building at No. 4 Monument Square were smashed:

2. Approximately \$3,000.00 worth of construction tools were stolen from the building:

3. A neighbor parked her car in the vehicular passageway leading to my client's property to obstruct entry by the construction workers:

4. Framing lumber was stolen from the site:

5. Roofing nails were sprayed over the passageway causing flat tires to the trucks and automobiles of the workers entering my client's property.

These incidents are undoubtedly the work of some immature individual. They are most disturbing and inconsistent with any previous involvement I have had in Charlestown. I felt it important enough to write this letter so that the community will be informed as to what is happening, and more particularly the Monument Square neighborhood with whom we were working to reach a solution. We may be successful or unsuccessful before the Board, but this type of activity should not be tolerated.


Report Drug Activity
