### Youngsters And Parents Cautioned About Rollerblading

The snowy winter of 1993-94 brought caution to young people and their parents about "bumping." This is a practice by young people who attach themselves to the rear of vehicles and slide along as the vehicle moves forward.

This spring, with the lack of snow and the influx of rollerblades, the sport has taken on a new, but none-the-less dangerous, turn. Young people with rollerblades have been reported to be attaching themselves to the backs of vehicles and go for a ride as the vehicle pulls the skater along. Many drivers have been frightened by this practice and the initial response tends to be to slam on the brakes or speed up, both of which pose a danger.

Bill Smith, community service officer for Area A of the Boston Police Department, has issued a warning to rollerbladers on the danger of this activity and to parents, as well, to take responsibility for their youngsters in discouraging this activity.

Smith advises drivers facing the situation to slow down and pull over to the side of the roadway and slowly stop. He also tells residents to call 911 to report areas where this activity is happening.

### Bunker Hill Day Parade Committee Seeks Community Support

The Charlestown Veterans/Bunker Hill Day Commemorative Committee is making plans for the annual Bunker Hill Day Parade both to honor our patriot forefathers who fought for freedom 220 years ago on the hills of Charlestown during the Battle of Bunker Hill and also to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the World War II victory and the outstanding men and women who

served in the U.S. Armed Forces during that war, especially those from Charlestown.

The committee is seeking the financial support of the residents, merchants and local organizations for the 1995 celebration in order that the events will serve as a significant and meaningful tribute to those who not only fought and died at the Battle of Bunker Hill, but also during World War II.

The highlight of the celebration will be the Bunker Hill Day Parade, which will be held on Sunday, June 18, commencing at 12:30 p.m. from the Hayes Square area of the town. This should be one of the largest and most outstanding parades in the Greater Boston area.

As you are most likely aware, due to the fiscal constraints imposed on the city of Boston, the funds available from the city to help underwrite parades are extremely limited, and the small reserve that the committee had built up in the parade fund in prior years is now non-existent. Thus, increased financial assistance must once again be sought from the community — from you the residents, local business people and community organizations — to make this, the 220th commemoration of the Battle of Bunker Hill — a success.

The fund raising for the parade and commemorative celebration again this year is being carried out by a small but dedicated group of residents. These people

are giving many hours of their time to make this a truly memorable celebration for the community and they need the support of every resident, whether a lifelong "Townie" or a newer resident of the town.

Money must be raised in order to pay the fee or expenses for each band, drum corps, color guard or other unit that takes part in the parade. Musical units charge from \$800 to \$2,500 for their participation in the parade if they are from Massachusetts and the cost is much more for those units that are being brought in from distant states — none of them comes for free.

There are several ways that you, the resident, local business person or

★ **Where's My Refund? . . .** Wondering where your refund is? Has it been eight weeks since you filed your paper tax return, or four weeks if it was filed electronically?

If you answered "yes" to either of these questions, why not call the IRS' Tele-Tax System at 1-800-829-4477. To check the status of your refund, have a copy of the 1994 tax return available for the following information: the first social security number shown on the return, the filing status, and the exact whole dollar amount of your refund.

Then follow the recorded instructions to enter this information on your telephone's alpha-numeric keypad. The Tele-Tax System refund information is updated once a week each Friday, so it's best to wait seven days before calling back again.

Taxpayers whose returns require additional information will be sent a notice of verification which must be filled out and returned to the service center before a refund can be released. Once accurate information is received, the IRS will continue processing the return and mail the refund

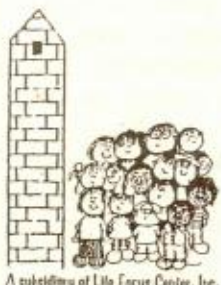

### Commonwealth's Libraries Laud Voke

Having been a long-time advocate for the Commonwealth's libraries, Rep. Richard Voke was pleased to accept the recognition of the Mass. Library Association. Voke was praised for his recent work to advance a library technology enhancement and resource sharing bill through the first stage of the legislative process.

"As we enter the age of the 'information super-highway,' the manner in which people communicate, work and learn has been and will continue to undergo dramatic changes. Advancement in telecommunications and computer technology have revolutionized the national and global economy, as well as almost every aspect of our lives," stated Voke. "These new technologies bring with them an unprece-

dent demand for information. To meet this public demand, libraries will play an ever-increasing role, not only to provide access to information, but also to present it in a rational, organized and useful form."

According to Voke, the bill would serve to position libraries to fit this new roll by implementing a strategic plan which would address the statutory, regulatory, programmatic, technological and funding issues which the library system faces as it looks to the future. Included in the plan are such provisions as an expansion of the Regional Public Library systems to include academic, school and special libraries in Mass. and the enhancement of the Mass. Library and Information Network capabilities.

The bill also contains

measures which address the inequalities in access to information that exist throughout the state. Currently, the quality and range of services can significantly vary from library to library, with poorer urban areas facing the biggest needs. The proposal recognizes this and attempts to guarantee that every resident of Mass. has a basic level of access to information.

Voke concluded by stating, "As we prepare the Commonwealth for the 21st century in terms of infrastructure such as our roads and bridges, we must also prepare our intellectual and cultural centers. Libraries must be able to provide the residents and businesses of a community with the ability to access and utilize global information resources.

Walker is a biologist who has specialized in the study of marine life. She has taught in Japan for nearly 20 years, both at the high school and university levels.

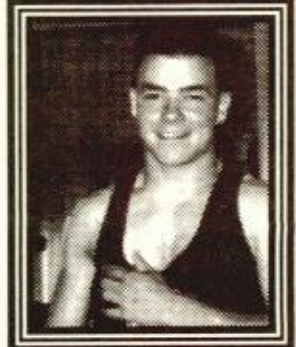

## State Treasury Seeks To Return \$80 Million In Unclaimed Property

State Treasurer Joe Malone announced that the state treasury has compiled a list of individuals and organizations who have money waiting for them under the Commonwealth's abandoned property law.

"This year over \$80 million has been turned over to my office as unclaimed property," Malone said. "I urge every citizen to check the abandoned property listing we publish because we are eager to return all of this money to its rightful owners."

Under Mass.' abandoned property law, accounts which have been inactive for more than three years

are declared abandoned and turned over to the state treasury for safekeeping. Unclaimed property consists of any financial asset that has not had any owner-generated activity for an extended period of time. This includes savings accounts, checking accounts, unpaid wages or commissions, stocks, underlying shares, uncashed dividends, customers deposits or overpayments, certificates of deposit, credit balances, refunds, money orders, paid-up life insurance policies and uncashed benefit checks.

In accordance with the Mass. Unclaimed Property Act, property becomes

"Unclaimed" when the owner does not respond to attempts by the holder of the asset for a three year period, 15 years in the case of travelers checks.

Under the law, the "Holders" (banks, insurance companies, businesses, etc.) must make a determined effort to locate the true owner. If they are unsuccessful, they are to report the names and last known address of the owners to the state treasury. The money is then deposited in the general fund. Owners can always claim their financial assets and there is no time limit on claiming the money. Own-

ers and their heirs need not pay a finder's fee to anyone to claim what is rightfully theirs. All funds accrue interest until claimed.

Anyone who sees their name of the unclaimed property list may call Malone's office at 367-0400, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., or write to : State Treasury, Unclaimed Property Division, One Ashburton Place, 12th floor, Boston, Mass. 02108. When writing or calling, respondents should give the name as it appears on the list, plus current address, address three years ago, social security number, and daytime telephone number.

If you have a teenager who works, don't forget an IRA for him or her too.

401(k) plans, offered by many employers, are a great way to save for retirement. Every dollar you contribute directly reduces your taxable income, the earnings grow tax-free, and most employers will match at least part of your savings. For 1995, you can contribute up to \$9,240. If you work for a tax-exempt organization, the plan is called a 403(b) - the features are similar except for the annual contribution limit.

SEP-IRA or Keogh plans are options to consider if you are self-employed. These plans allow you to take a tax deduction when you invest a percentage of your self-employment earnings. Keogh plans allow a higher annual deduction than a SEP-IRA (up to 25% of income versus 15%), but are slightly more complex and expensive to set up. As with the other plans, your savings grow tax-free until retirement.

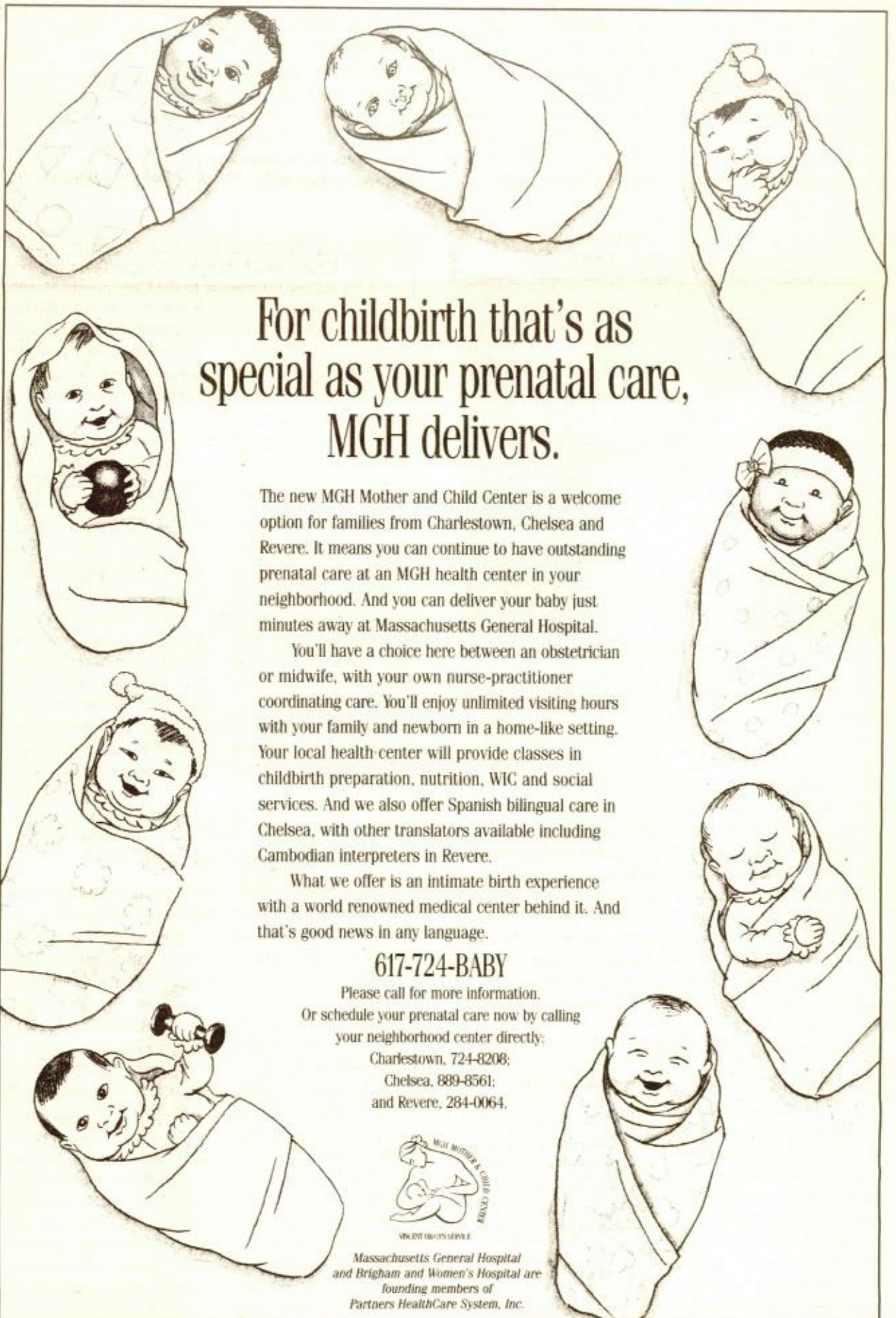

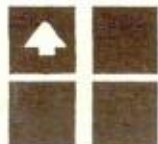
