Mayor Kevin White, in conjunction with The Charlestown Board of Trade, is pleased to announce, after many planning sessions with local merchants and Public Works Commissioner Cassazza, a plan to install approximately 52 recti linear sodium vapor lights along Maîn Street and Austin

The existing lights have proven to be unusable for this particular business area. The use of sodium vapor lighting provides 36% more illumination with a 35% savings in energy which will result in a substantial savings for the city. Along with this project we will be experimenting with some trash containers for the area which we hope to be able to expand on in the near future.

We would greatly appreciate your support in this matter by attending a lighting ceremony which will be held in Thompson Square on February 9, 1983 at 6:30 p.m. His Honor Kevin White will be present as will many city officials and Charlestown business people.

The Mayor and The Charlestown Board of Trade hopes that this improvement in lighting will act as a crime deterrent and enhance and expand the business community in this part of Charlestown. There will be a brief ceremony on Wednesday, followed by entertainment. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Devens Street. The caucus is open to all registered Democrats, persons ineligible to register and media representatives. The only persons eligible to participate in any portion of the caucus are those who are registered Democrats in the ward or town as of December 30, 1982. There will be no absentee or proxy voting.

Candidates for delegate and alternate must also be present and give his or her written consent to be nominated and that nomination must be seconded by two persons present at the local caucus.

All ballots will be written and secret. Those candidates receiving the greatest number of votes on the first ballot will be elected.

Each candidate will be allowed to make a twominute speech and to distribute on his/her behalf one sheet of paper listing qualifications and ideas.


The Urban College

Kennedy Center Hushes

Attorney General's Investigation

No mention was made of the reported on-going investigation by the Attorney General's Office into Kennedy Center business, in Monday night's continuation of last week's Board of Directors meeting.

However, Kennedy Center Director Leo Carey later said that two motions had been passed in the January 26 executive session, held by board members to discuss this investigation and other Kennedy Center business involving personnel and former employees of the Kennedy Center, when John Gardiner was executive director

According to Carey, one motion passed during the executive session prevented the board from writing a second response to the Attorney General's office, leaving the response made by former board president James Cushman, standing.

The second motion ruled not to pay former Kennedy Center Attorney John Sullivan

No further comment has been given on this investigation from the Kennedy Center or the Attorney General's office.

The investigation is a result of a petition containing 1000 signatures of Charlestown residents who requested the state to investigate the doings of the center which operates on combined private and public funding. Much of the mistrust over the center came about following the discover by board members of Gardiner having allegedly misused the center's credit cards.

dents of apparent mismanagement have been found, the most recent being the finding of checks and money orders from parents who use day care services, totaling \$2,100 in a drawer. Many of these checks and money orders were not negotiable because of the time which had lapsed between their issuance and the date found.

Another incident, discussed in this week's meeting was the expiration of a site license for the Kennedy Center Head Start program operated out of the First Baptist Church. According to Carey it was an oversight, by his predecessor, that the license was never renewed from the Office For Children (OFC) since 1979. The end result has been the loss of at least \$40 thousand in reimbursements for food purchased by the Kennedy Center for this program. Presently the center is undergoing the renewal process of this license.

In other business, the board adopted a measure which would prohibit Carey from borrowing any more money from subsidiary corporation, the Economic Development Corporation (EDC) or any other organization without first telling the board. In the past, the Kennedy Center has had to borrow funds from EDC to meet the payroll.

The board also asked Carey to discuss a full merging of the Community Center, with that organization's board of directors. Presently, the Kennedy Center manages the Community Center's funds but does so on a separate bookkeeping system rather than treating the Community Center as another program. Carey will report back to the full board on the Community Center's Board of Director's response. ***********

MORE REPREHENSIBLE NEWS FROM IRELAND ...

This year being no different from the past several, Ed "Red" Murphy of Milton undertook his usual herculean apostolate in behalf of the women prisoners of Armagh Prison, realizing thousands of dollars in contributions from his fellow members of Irish Northern Aid, Irish citizens in general, and the men of the Boston waterfront in par-

In expressing gratitude, Father Raymond Murray, Chaplain of Armagh Prison, noted that the prisoners

realize the benefits of these monies "Through their own welfare who provide them with particular needs," and we would mention that Fr. Murray looks after their families in need, funeral occasions, paroles, clothes, etc.

Fr. Murray's letter also included a circular letter he authored, which he hoped would make its way into publication "over there." Here it is, in part:

Since November 9, 1982 a serious decline in standards of behaviour has taken place on the side of the authorities in the N. Ireland Office Prisons Affairs Management. Girls entering or leaving the women's prison, Armagh, for whatever reason, admission to prison, going to and or return from remand court or for trial, visiting hospital, parole, inter-jail visits, have to undergo a completely naked visual examination of all parts of their body front and back while the prisoner stands totally naked before prison female warders. This type of degrading inhuman treatment has not been used during the fifteen years of my chaplaincy there nor in the seventeen years of my predecessor, Very Reverend James Clarke, P.P. This new procedure has been a traumatic experience for young Catholic girls and older women, married and single, all of whom were reared and educated in Catholic houses and schools where the strictest standards of modesty were impressed upon them as a matter of conscience. This has now gone on for six weeks.

"I and my fellow priests consider this inhuman and degrading treatment contrary to Article 3 of the European Convention on Human Rights. As a priest I consider it to be contrary to the Sixth and Ninth commandments, a serious invasion of a woman's privacy and treating of the person as an object.

"No valid reason for this continuing disgraceful procedure has been brought forward by the Secretary of State, Mr. James Prior, or the Minister responsible for prisons in the







ANTI-BRACE FOOD



True, orthodontist are only human and this can happen - but most of the time, braces that come loose in treatment are not due to this factor, but rather to the type of food the patient eats (or tried to pulverize).

Hard foods, like hard candies, French bread crusts, hard vegetables, ice cubes, etc. can all fracture the cement that holds the brace to the tooth thereby causing a loose brace. Sticky foods, like chewy candies can do the same thing. Special attention has to be paid to the kind of food eaten in order to preserve the braces and the teeth that the braces are hooked onto.

Dear Gloria:

The article published in your January 27, 1983 edition concerned with the Kennedy Center Board Meeting of January 24. 1983 requires clarification. Your article stated that \$28,000 was found in a desk at the Kennedy Center. I assume that this was a typographical error. The amount stated was \$2,800. In reviewing the incident I found the actual amount to be \$2,100. The amount found is not as relevant as the impression left by the article that there was nefarious intent or gross malfeasance on the part of any person involved with the checks. The response I gave to a Board member's inquiry on the matter was intended to demonstrate a lack of cash controls by the Kennedy Center administration.

The fault in fact lies with the fiscal administrator who did not discover that \$2100 in income was unaccounted for rather than a staff member who unintentionally misfiled the checks.

We have initiated controls on income that will eliminate the possibility of cash being overlooked. Cash income will be tracked from billing through deposit on a monthly basis. Let me assure you that payments made to the Kennedy Center will be processed in a timely manner.

Students of the second year business program at Bunker Hill Community College will prepare, free of charge, income tax returns for senior citizens and low-income people at the college and at many suburban locations again this year. They have completed a training program conducted by the college in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service and Massachusetts Revenue Department.

Professor Edward L. Kerr, chairman of the Business Administration Dept., is the coordinator of the program.

The campus center, which will be located in B-135, will be in operation Mondays, 10-11, 12-2; Tuesdays, 8-9, 11-5; Wednes-

days, 1-4; Thursdays, 10-3.
Persons may call 241-8600, ext. 561 to make an appointment for the campus center or any suburban location or may walk in at any time during the hours of operation.

They are asked to bring with them their W-2 forms from employers, 1099 forms for interest and dividends, tax forms mailed by the Federal and State revenue agencies and copies of last year's returns.

Officially known as VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance), the program provides an excellent opportunity for concerned individuals and groups to assist taxpayers who have fairly simple filing requirements.

These taxpayers, who are generally the poor, the elderly or persons with language problems, often have to pay for professional assistance although they can least afford it.

BHCC students are responsible for a sizeable percentage of the returns prepared annually under the program in the Boston area.



Boston Globe Jazz Festival Will Appeal To Everyone



The final figures for the calendar year of 1982 have been put together. For Charlestown, the part one crimes are down 5.7%. Also, Charlestown had the fewest part one crimes in the city. East Boston had the second fewest which were more than twice Charlestown. So it was a good year in this respect for your area of the city. I will continue to patrol Charlestown as I did in 1982. 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Financial Aid Is Still Available For College Students

Now is the time to apply for federal and state loans and grants for higher education. Those needing financial help in pursuing a degree - high school seniors, students presently in college, and older adults - should not delay in sending in their applications for the new academic year beginning in September 1983.

'The good news is that aid is still available," according to John C. Hoy, President of the New England Board of Higher Education.

Students must complete the application forms for 1983-1984 quickly and accurately. Two months behind schedule, the U.S. Department of Education just released the federal forms. Because of this delay, parents and students are faced with added pressure to send in the completed forms

The confusion will probably be most acute among students whose parents did not attend college. "We urge community leaders to give special encouragement and assistance to first-generation college students," Hoy requested. "It would be tragic for this most vulnerable group to give up because of misinformation or lack of moral support.

The following are the programs most relied on by college students:

·Federal Pell Grants are available to students whose families earn less than \$26,000 a year. The grants (named for their founder, Rhode Island's Senator Claiborne Pell)

can range up to \$1800 a year. •Guaranteed Student Loans (obtained from banks and insured by the federal government) are automatically available to a student whose family income is below \$30,000. The interest rate is 9%. Undergraduates can borrow as much as \$2500 a year and graduate and professional students \$5000 a year For those with family incomes

above \$30,000, financial need must be demonstrated. Fac-

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
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
