## Appeal Board Hearing Slated For Construction Of Asphalt Plant Near City Square

Several residents alerted the Patriot just prior to press time, that a public hearing has been scheduled by the City of Boston Board of Appeal on Tuesday, May 1, 1984 at 10:30 a.m. in Room 801 at City Hall to hear testimony regarding the proposal by the Simeone Corporation to construct an asphalt batch mixing plant with accessory storage for 20,000 gallons of asphalt and 10,000 gallons of fuel oil in Charlestown.

Joseph Hanbury, Engineer for the Simeone

Corporation stated that the Simeone Corporation purchased the 2½ acre site located at 100 Front Street behind the Y.M.C.A. and under the Route 93 overpass, from the B&M Railroad.

Hanbury said that the facility would load three trucks per hour, with a potential of 20 to 40 vehicles per day. He said that the company has secured approval from the Department of Environmental Quality Engineering and has met state and federal requirements on pollution

control. He also stated that the firm has hired a traffic engineering firm to develop traffic patterns for the trucks entering and leaving the site. Hanbury said that there would be no odor from the plant. He went on to say that 10 to 12 persons would be employed at the site.

Former Charlestown Representative Jimmy Collins has been hired as a consultant by the Simeone Corporation.

Under the Housing and Community Development Act, the City of Boston is expected to receive approximately 22.7 million dollars in Community Development Block Grant funds for Fiscal Year 1985. A series of hearings will be held by the Boston City Council to obtain views and recommendations of citizens. The hearings will provide citizens the opportunity to discuss the housing and community development needs of their neighborhoods.

All hearings will be held in buildings that are accessible to handicapped people and all buildings will be open one half hour early for citizens to sign up to speak. Remarks will be limited to five minutes.

Eligible programs and activities under CDBG include: 1) commercial areas and housing rehabilitation, 2) acquisition, construction or rehabilitation of neighborhood centers, parks, streets and similar facilities, 3) demolition of dilapidated buildings, 4) modernization of publicly owned low-income housing, 5) housing code improvements and 6) neighborhood security and human services programs.

stated that the application for construction of this asphalt mixing plant was denied by the B.R.A. Board on April 17 and a letter to this effect will be presented to the Board of Appeal.

Residents expressed concern over the odors that might be emitted from the site; increased truck traffic in the already congested City Square area; and the appearance of the structure, especially in light of the proposed reconstruction of the City Square area which calls for the demolition of the

Y.M.C.A.

One resident was irate over the fact that plans for construction of the asphalt plant in Charlestown had reached the stage of a Board of Appeal Hearing without a community meeting informing the residents of the plan. She suggested that recommendations be made to the Board of Appeal that the request be denied until a community meeting is held to answer concerns of the residents.

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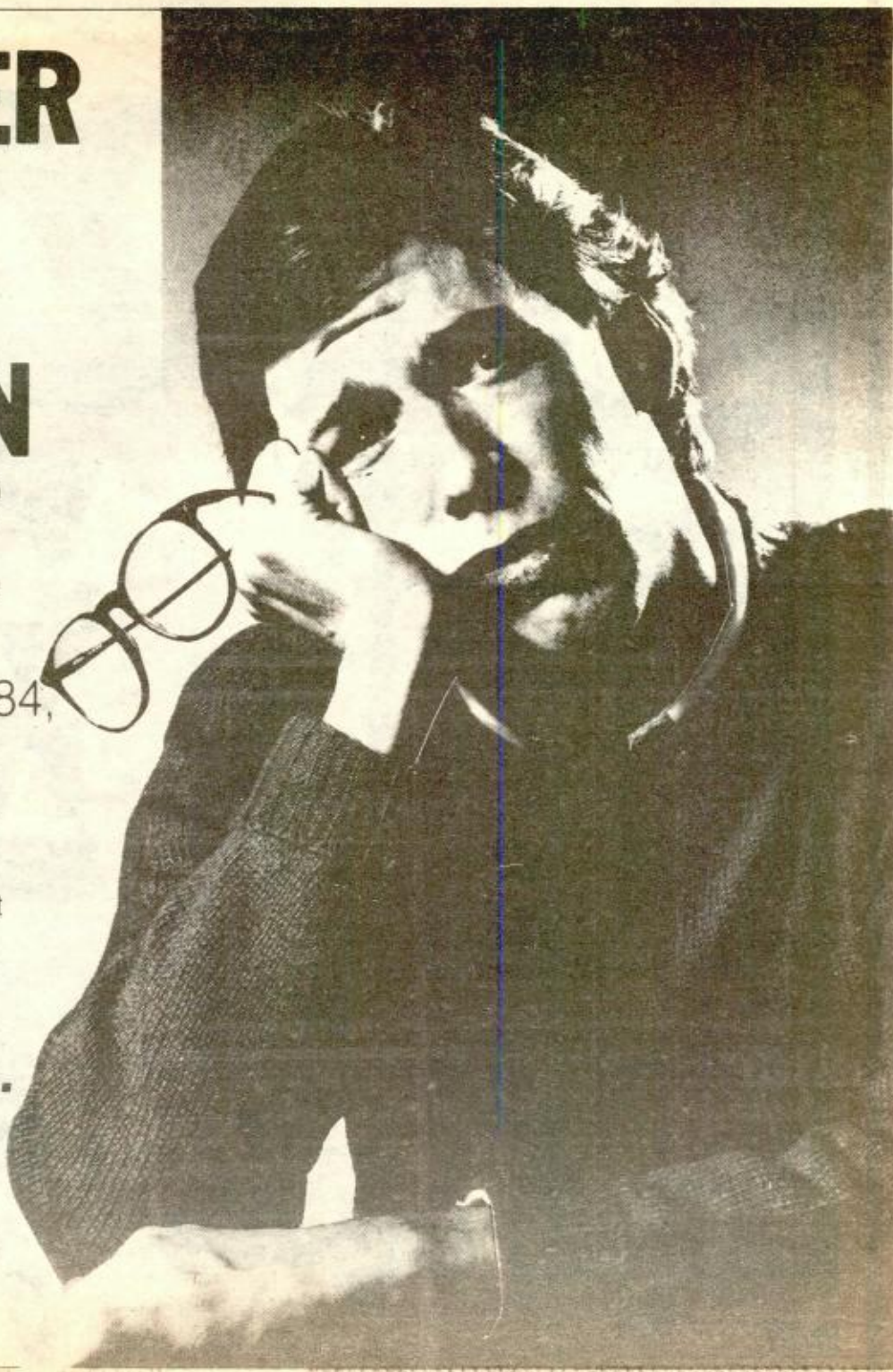

# To Clean-Up Charlestown

Names and epithets are spray painted in red across tombstones in the Bunker Hill Cemetery. Some tombstones are splattered with paint, others are broken in pieces. Remnants of beer bottles and fire crackers littered the crab grass.  
The cemetery was just one sight in Mayor Raymond L. Flynn's inaugural neighborhood clean-up campaign on Saturday, April 14.  
Two hundred volunteers signed up at 9:30 on an overcast Saturday morning

in Thompson Square where they received T-shirts bearing the legend "I Won't Stand For Any Garbage" and picked up brooms and garbage bags for the day's work. Neighborhood coordinators estimate that 500 to 600 people actually participated in the clean-up, sponsored by the Mayor's offices of Neighborhood Services, Community Participation and Business and Cultural Development.  
"It's worked out great," Joe Barnes, Deputy Com-

missioner of the Department of Parks and Recreation said, as he stood in a clique of the Mayor's neighborhood coordinators and spoke with volunteers while the work wound down. "I'm so impressed (with the clean-up)," volunteer Marie Welling told Barnes. "It's so organized. The city sent everything to help. The kids who are helping are learning to care for the city and keep it clean."  
The volunteers, from toddlers stuffing garbage bags to senior citizens

pushing brooms, aided by paid city workers, picked up an estimated 490 cubic yards of garbage, "according to the Department of Public Works. One volunteer estimated that there were 50 pounds of glass per square yard in the cemetery. "It's not as bad as it could be," said another volunteer, optimistically, as he held a garbage bag three quarters full with broken bottles. Two ten-year-old boys claimed to have found "a couple of knives" among the tombstones. A broken

toy gun was also dropped into a garbage bag.  
A pile of brooms stood in the lot on Union Street, next to Store 24, and the kids played ball as they waited for their "rewards" of hot dogs and ice cream sandwiches. The food seemed to be the main incentive for the kids to work. "We got free ice cream and we're going to go back for hot dogs," ten-year-old Jill Doherty gave as her reason for volunteering. Some weren't quite volunteers. "My mom told me to

(clean-up)," ten-year-old Colleen Hayes added.  
Tentatively, a volunteer clean-up may be planned on a semi-annual basis in Charlestown, according to neighborhood co-ordinator David Flanagan and Dinah Vaprin of the Mayor's press office. The next clean-up could be held in the fall, according to Vaprin. "It will be a priority, now that the streets are clean, to see that they stay that way," she said. "We're eager to see how clean we can get the city."

## "Worker Assistance Center" Established At BHCC

Bunker Hill Community College, in collaboration with local employment and training agencies, has established a "Worker Assistance Center" to serve the over 300 displaced workers from the Revere Sugar Refinery in Charlestown. The announcement was made by President Harold E. Shively. The Center officially opened on April 18.

On Saturday, April 21 Secretary of Economic Affairs, Evelyn F. Murphy and Boston Mayor Raymond Flynn jointly announced state funding of \$200,000 for this worker assistance center and training program. The layoff affects 28 Charlestown workers.

Upon learning several weeks ago of the imminent closing of the Charlestown plant, President Shively contacted Ed Bartkiewicz, president of the Revere Sugar union local. As a result of lengthy discussions, BHCC determined that it could best meet the demands of the displaced workers by offering a wide range of services which include educational and career counseling, skills and life experience assessment, diagnostic testing, ESL instruction, G.E.D. preparation and referral to their appropriate resources.

In addition, BHCC will provide up to three semesters of free tuition to displaced workers and their spouses which may be used for both day and evening programs.

The worker assistance center and training programs have been

developed through the cooperative efforts of the state, the city, United Food and Commercial Workers, Revere Sugar Corporation, and Bunker Hill and Roxbury Community colleges. The program and funding will be administered by Employment Resources, Inc. (ERI) of Cambridge and Neighborhood Development and Employment Agency (NDEA) of Boston.

Ed Bartkiewicz, president of Local P-400 of the United Food and Commercial Workers, the union representing Revere Sugar workers, has been hired as the Project Manager of the Worker Assistance Center.

Other staffing will come from the Division of Employment Security, the Boston Job Exchange, ERI and NDEA. The center will provide workers with job placement, counseling, job search workshops and training referral services.

The state's efforts in response to this closure have been coordinated by the Massachusetts Economic Readjustment Team (M.E.R.T.), an interagency plant closure response unit in the Executive Office of Economic Affairs.

## Daughters Of Isabella To Celebrate 82nd Anniversary

### A LOOK BACK

In 1902, Theodore Roosevelt was elected President of the United States after the assassination of President McKinley. At that time there were three Councils of Knights of Columbus in Charlestown, namely, Bunker Hill, Charlestown, and Federal.

James V. Doherty organized an auxiliary to Federal Council Number 244, Knights of Columbus. A group of 175 women met at Mishawum Hall on May 2, 1902. The Knights of Columbus at that time did not have an auxiliary of national status, so the organization became the first branch of the Daughters of Isabella.

They secured a Massachusetts Charter on May 25, 1902 and became known as the Daughters of Isabella Number 1. Mrs. Mary Lynch was elected President and Reverend Joseph P. Maher was appointed Chaplain.

Several years later, the three councils of the Knights of Columbus consolidated and became known as Bunker Hill Council Number 62, Knights of Columbus.

During the term of office of Judge William Day as Grand Knight, the Daughters of Isabella Number 1 was officially accepted by Bunker Hill Council to be affiliated with them.

Many members of Bunker Hill Council are Honorary Members of the Daughters of Isabella and have joined with the Daughters over the years on occasions such as banquets, Christmas parties, minstrel shows and communion breakfasts.

## Fran Fratalia: Working And Studying

For the past four years Fran Fratalia of Charlestown has been a fulltime student at Harvard, an active participant in extracurricular activities, including student government, intramurals, drama, and social service — and has worked at least 15 hours a week in the Harvard Housing Office as a work/study student.

"She's been excellent," says Housing Office Manager Lorraine Wilson. "She performs with the kind of dedication and willingness to learn and completes projects the way a fulltime employee should. She always has a good sense of humor and a nice manner. The stress level can be high in this office. It's good to have someone so steady."

Fratalia first learned of the Harvard Housing Office while still in high school when she worked as a secretary and researcher for the Charlestown law firm that handles legal work for the Housing Office.

"I didn't know Lorraine personally," says Fratalia. "I had just met her through the office. Then when I came to college, Lorraine talked to my employer and said, 'Would you mind if I stole Fran away?' I started working here in October 1980 and I've been here ever since."

The major part of Fratalia's job is research, which at various times takes her through virtually every department in Harvard Real Estate, Inc., including property management, accounting, construction contracts, and leasing. The research may be to help a tenant resolve a problem. "For example," says Fratalia, "if a tenant feels he's been billed too much on his term bill, I will go through the accounting department to

find out what happened."

She also does the research necessary in preparing accurate petitions to the Rent Control Board for rent increases to pay for capital improvements.

Besides learning about the technical aspects of building rehabilitation, Fratalia notes that she has learned "a lot about real estate and liabilities."

"I know a lot more about my rights as a tenant," she says, "and I also know a landlord's point of view. I understand that a landlord has the right to replace things that have reached the end of their useful lives, such as hot water heaters, and to replace windows and roofs to improve energy efficiency. As a tenant I may not dispute a rent increase for these types of things because I know the process behind them."

During the busy rental seasons in the Housing Office, Fratalia also spends time at the counter and on the telephone helping tenants. "It's been a very, very good experience," she emphasizes. "I've learned to speak to people tactfully yet be assertive."

Reflecting on her years as a work/study student, Fratalia notes that "it takes someone who is very flexible in his own schedule to be a good work/study person."

Fratalia is no stranger to work and a busy schedule. While in high school she not only worked all four years but also attended night school to learn Italian. At Harvard she has pursued her interest in languages with a double concentration in Italian and Latin.

Clearly one of the highlights of Fratalia's time at Harvard has been her participation at Winthrop House where she has lived the past three

years. She has worked with the drama society putting on plays and talent shows, including this year's musical "How To Succeed in Business," and with the film society, the blood drive, and the House Committee of which she was vice-president last year. She also participates in intramural soccer and basketball and coed football and volleyball.

"We have a very good House spirit in Winthrop House," she smiles proudly.

As if working, studying, and house activities were not enough, Fratalia still finds time for community service. This year she organized a haunted house for the Tobin School community. As a sophomore, she was a Big Sister in the Athletic Department's program. "My little sister was a sixth grader from the Cambridge schools. I met with her at least once

a week to do things, to be available when she wanted to talk on the phone, to be a sister since she didn't have one," says Fratalia. "It was being a companion and helping when there was need."

Despite all her activities Fratalia is very pleased with how well she has done in school. Like all colleges seniors, she is starting to look ahead to what is next. She would like to use her language skills, perhaps teaching or working for a company that has operations in Italy.

After spending six weeks in Italy last summer with relatives, she is very excited about returning there sometime as well as finding a work environment in which she can use her Italian.

When asked if being in the work world as well as the academic world has been a good experience, Fratalia replies with a strong "Definitely. A lot of people come out of college and they haven't had a lot

of experience working. I've worked all four years in college as well as in high school, not only for financial reasons but also because it is such a great learning experience. I don't know what it would be like not working for a semester."

Fratalia clearly will be missed at the Housing Office, but it is evident that wherever she goes she will be successful.

### ASSUMABLE MORTGAGE IMPACT

Although the Supreme Court ruled that Federally chartered S&Ls may refuse to allow assumptions of their home mortgages, the decision will have limited impact.

The impact of the decision is limited to those states which have laws banning or limiting the enforcement of due-on-sale clauses. It is also limited by the fact that, even in those states, many mortgages are held by state and federal lenders other than the federal savings and loan associations. Only about half of the nation's 4,000 saving and loan associations are federally chartered and fewer than one third of the states had such legislation in effect.

Even though federally chartered S&Ls in many states were already able to enforce due-on-sale, many have opted for a blended rate (higher than the original but lower than the current market rate). The assumable loan is not dead. Though there will be effects, they are not surmountable.

## Facts About Drugs - F.A.D.

What in the world are quaaludes? Are they still around? To answer the second question first: Yes. Quaaludes (methaqualone) are a chemical drug which is a "non-barbital - sedative hypnotic." In other words, it produces an extreme muscular relaxation. There is a loss of all motivation and coordination somewhat like a drunken state. Quaaludes appear in white tablet form bearing the word lemmmon and the number 712 or 714 on them. Mequin, another tablet form, is marked LMN300. In the past, methaqualone had a medical use as a daytime sedative or a sleeping pill. Its prescribed use is not common any more, for it can produce physical as well as psychological dependency. Slang names include: ludes, soaps, soapers, sopes, 714's, love drug, wallbangers, lemons.

Quaaludes are basically a central nervous system depressant. When taken, it slows down the activity of the CNS (heartbeat, breathing, brain activity). Drowsiness comes on about 10 to 20 minutes after it is taken. The body becomes uncoordinated and walking and talking are difficult. It is obvious that driving a car after use is extremely dangerous. The frequent user will need to increase the amount of the drug to achieve the desired effects. Withdrawal symptoms include: headaches, fatigue, dizziness, nausea, skin problems and "cold turkey" symptoms such as cramps, seizures and vomiting. It is difficult to pin down a specific lethal dosage of the drug especially when it is combined with alcohol. Symptoms of methaqualone overdose may include: delirium, coma, restlessness, convulsions, and vomiting. If you suspect an overdose, keep the person awake by having him talk, walk, or move and get medical help.

### THERE WILL ALWAYS BE AN ... IRELAND

Membership in the Irish American Unity Conference keeps us cognizant of current legislation pertaining to the Irish question which will, hopefully, facilitate Irish national and economic development leading to its political unification, and the right to determine their own national destiny, such as:

The BIAGGI BILL (which would authorize U.S. Foreign Aid to Ireland once the British leave, and the country is reunited);

The GILMAN BILL (which calls on the U.S. to cut off all military aid to England which may be used for the oppression of Catholics in Northern Ireland), and

The OTTINGER BILL (which, similarly, calls on the U.S. to ban American companies in Northern Ireland from discriminating against Catholics).

Contact with Mass. Congressman Brian Donnelly's office elicited information that "the Biaggi bill, H.R. 74, and the Ottinger bill, H.R. 3465, have been referred to the House Foreign Affairs Committee, however, no action has been taken on them as of this writing. House Joint Resolution 548, filed by Congressman Gilman last session, has not been introduced in this Congress."

Representative Donnelly also expressed concern over the U.S. Air Force's awarding of a 150 million dollar contract (for 18 aircraft) to Short Brothers, Limited of Belfast, Northern Ireland, and expressed his strong conviction that no government contracts should be given to foreign firms that discriminate in employment practices on the basis of religion. He also provided a copy of a letter in this regard from the Hon. Mario Biaggi, Chairman, Ad Hoc Congress-

sional Committee for Irish Affairs, to Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger, to which U.S. Senator Alfonse M. D'Amato of New York, himself and 31 other House colleagues are signatory.

For those still unfamiliar with "The Weinberger letter," it urges that the following steps be taken - either at the time of the formal execution of the contract, or in a supplemental statement to the contract:

"1) Request in writing a formal statement from Shorts that they will comply with all provisions of the Fair Employment Act relating to recruitment and hiring under the EDSA contract;

2) Develop a monitoring procedure to ensure that Shorts does comply; and

3) Provide Congress with annual reports on this contract especially with respect to activities related to recruitment and hiring with funds from this contract."

Other members of the Mass. Congressional Delegation signatory to that letter were (in order of appearance thereon) Nicholas Mavroules, Joe Moakley and Edward Boland. Noticeably absent are the signatures of two Mass. congressmen (purportedly Irish!) who aspire to the U.S. Senate, plus five others. Ask them about that. Ask them where they stand and intend to vote on the bills and resolution mentioned, and you might also ask that they furnish you a copy of Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger's reply to the afore-mentioned letter.

We shall update, as available. In the meantime, feel free to offer your comments to this newspaper or column. Good, bad or indifferent - we will print!

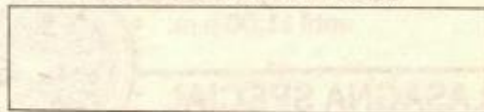

## Pre-Register For ABCD's Surplus Food Distribution

Action for Boston Community Development (ABCD) and its neighborhood network of Area Plannings Action Councils (APACs) and Neighborhood Service Centers (NSCs), asks those Boston residents who have not already done so to pre-register in their local neighborhoods for the Surplus Food Program's next federally-funded distribution of free dairy and food supplies. ABCD, through its neighborhood offices, will again distribute the dairy and food products to eligible Boston residents only during the first two weeks in June.

At the pre-registration, ABCD will issue an eligibility card to households that qualify by income. This card will provide proof of eligibility for all distributions during the following year. Anyone who already has an eligibility card from ABCD does not need to register again.

Charlestown residents can pre-register at the John F. Kennedy Family Service Center, 27 Winthrop Street, Charlestown (241-8866), Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., starting the week of May 7 and continuing through May 31.

Eligibility for the program is determined by income. You must first prove that you are a Boston resident (for example, by showing a driver's license or a bill with your name and address on it).

Next, you must bring proof that your household's total gross income falls within current poverty guidelines. Income from all members of the household 18 years and older, can be verified by a W-2 form, a paycheck stub, or a copy of a paycheck.

You are automatically eligible by income if you participate in one of the following programs: Welfare; Medicaid; Veteran's Benefits; Fuel Assistance; Supplemental Security Income (SSI); Head Start; Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC); Food Stamps; Women, Infants and Children (WIC); subsidized general housing; unemployment; or General Relief. You can prove that you are in one of these programs by bringing items such as a Welfare or Medicaid card, rent stub from BHA housing, a signed letter from the Head Start Program, Fuel Assistance papers, and so on.

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## Watch Out For Deals That Sound Too Good To Be True

"You can enjoy the convenience of mail-order shopping without running the risk of being taken by swindlers, if you follow these words of advice," stated Postmaster Philip L. Sullivan of Boston. The cardinal rule, he says, is: "If a deal sounds too good to be true, it probably is."

- Beware of exaggerated claims or unusually low prices.
- Don't be rushed. Avoid offers that claim to be your "last chance" to get a bargain.
- Keep a copy of the advertisement from which you ordered.

- Never send cash. Use a check, money order or credit card because, if necessary, these can be traced.

- Keep a record of the date of your order and the number of your check when it is returned to you.

- If you have doubts about a company, check with the Postal Inspection Service, the Better Business Bureau or a local consumer protection agency to see if there are any complaints on record against the company. It is best to do this before ordering.

"Mail-order shopping can be a real convenience for busy people and can offer discerning shoppers a chance to get

goods only available through the mail," Sullivan said. "The Postal Service wants to help our customers get our best. I urge mail-order shoppers to remember these few words of advice, then sit back, relax and go shopping without leaving the comfort of home."

## LCDC To Host Meeting On Development Disorders

On Saturday, April 28th, the Language and Cognitive Development Center (LCDC) will present an informal meeting for concerned parents who want to learn more about childhood development and developmental disorders and the Center's early intervention treatment program. The conference will be held at the Center, 11 Wyman Street, Jamaica Plain.

On April 14, 1984 at 5:50 a.m., Officers responded to Medford Street where they met a man who stated that an unknown white male entered his vehicle on the passenger side, pulled a gun and demanded his money. The victim then gave up all of his money, whereupon the suspect shot at and broke the victim's driver side window. After the victim exited the vehicle and fled, the suspect drove the car away and abandoned it on Old Landing Way.

On April 16, 1984, at 1:30 a.m., Officers received a call to respond to 105 Walford Way. Upon arrival, the Officers met with the victim, who stated that after having an argument with the suspect, a 21-year-old male, and refusing him admittance to her apartment, the suspect climbed through one of the windows and entered the apartment. The suspect was arrested for trespassing, while he was trying to leave the apartment. He was then transported to Area A, booked and advised of his rights.

On April 16, 1984, at 6:30 a.m., Officer Foilb was stopped by a victim who stated that he received a call on his taxi to go to 10 McNulty Court and pick up a fare. Upon arriving, a suspect jumped into the taxi, pulled out a gun and demanded the victim's money. After giving him all his money, the suspect fled towards Walford Way. A description of the suspect was given out over the radio and a search of the area was made by Officers Foilb, Applegate,

O'Sullivan and Cofield. During the search, the Officers noticed the suspect on the roof of 98 Walford Way. The Officers then ran up to the roof and upon exiting onto the roof, they sighted the suspect at the O'Reilly Way end of the roof.

A short chase was given, whereupon the suspect was apprehended and brought back to the scene of the crime where he was positively identified by the victim. The suspect was then placed under arrest for Armed Robbery, transported to Area A, advised of rights and booked.

A search was made of the area where the suspect fled and the weapon and some articles of clothing were found behind a roof door.

On April 18, 1984 at 4:15 p.m., Officer O'Toole observed an orange Dodge Colt being operated with an expired registration. The Officer followed the vehicle and when on Alford Street, the vehicle came to a stop and four males ran for it. Officer O'Toole then pursued the youths and apprehended a 14-year-old male, with the help of Officer Ward of the MBTA Police. The youth was arrested, transported to Area A, advised of rights and booked for Larceny of a Motor Vehicle. It was later learned that the motor vehicle was reported stolen in Lynn on the day before, April 17, 1984.

On April 20, 1984 at 1:51 a.m., Officers received a call to go to the Rutherford Ave. tunnel for a motor vehicle accident. Upon arrival, the Officers found a 1976 Ford Pick-Up Truck with its front end on top of the hood and right side of an Olds Station Wagon. Two passengers of the Olds Station

Wagon were immediately transported to the Mass. General Hospital where they were both pronounced dead. There were no passengers of the pick-up truck at the scene of the crime. Witnesses gave a description of two white males who were in the truck and fled the scene, and it was given out over the police radio. A short time later, the suspects were apprehended in front of H. P. Hoods Co. on Rutherford Avenue and brought back to the scene of the crime and identified by witnesses. Both suspects were then transported to Area A, advised of their rights and booked for Vehicular Homicide.

The next community service meeting will be held on Tuesday, May 8, 1984 at 7:00 p.m. at the Kent Community School, 50 Bunker Hill Street.
