RULE 11 PLEA AGREEMENT

Pursuant to Rule 11 of the Federal Rules of Criminal Procedure, defendant GASPER FIORE and the government agree as follows:

1. Guilty Plea

A. Count of Conviction

The defendant will enter a plea of guilty to Count Eleven of the Sixth Superseding Indictment, which charges him with Conspiracy to Commit Federal Program Bribery, in violation of 18 U.S.C. §§ 371 and 666(a).

B. Elements of Offense

The following are the elements of the crime of Conspiracy to Commit Federal Program Bribery:

- 1. Defendant agreed with at least one other person to commit the crime of federal program bribery;
- 2. Defendant joined the conspiracy knowing of its object and intending to help accomplish the object; and
- 3. A member of the conspiracy committed at least one overt act in furtherance of the conspiracy.
- 4. The following are the elements of the crime of federal program bribery:
 - a) Defendant corruptly gave, offered or agreed to give something of value to an agent of a local government;
 - b) Defendant did so with the intent to influence or reward the governmental agent in connection with a business, transaction or series of transactions with that local government;
 - c) The business, transaction or series of transactions involved something of value of \$5,000 or more; and
 - d) The local government received \$10,000 or more in federal assistance in a one-year period before or after the time of the offense.

C. Factual Basis for Guilty Plea

The following facts are a sufficient and accurate basis for defendant's guilty plea:

On March 17, 2016, in the Eastern District of Michigan, Charles B. Rizzo introduced the defendant to Dean Reynolds, an elected Clinton Township trustee. Unbeknownst to the defendant, Rizzo was working on behalf of the FBI. With Rizzo acting as an intermediary, the defendant entered into an understanding with Reynolds that Reynolds would use his position as trustee of Clinton Township to put the

township towing contract out for a bid by the defendant in exchange for money from the defendant. On March 18, 2016, the defendant gave \$4,000 in cash to Rizzo so that Rizzo could give it to Reynolds. On May 6, 2016, the defendant gave \$3,000 in cash to Rizzo so that Rizzo could give it to Reynolds.

The Clinton Township contract at issue was worth in excess of \$5,000. Clinton Township received in excess of \$10,000 in federal aid in calendar year 2016.

2. Sentencing Guidelines

A. Standard of Proof

The Court will find sentencing factors by a preponderance of the evidence.

B. Agreed Guideline Range

There are no sentencing guideline disputes. Except as provided below, the parties recommend that the defendant's guideline range is **18-24 months**, as set forth on the attached worksheets. If the Court finds:

- 1. That defendant's criminal history category is higher than reflected on the attached worksheets, or
- that the offense level should be higher because, after pleading guilty,
 defendant made any false statement to or withheld information from
 his probation officer; otherwise demonstrated a lack of acceptance of
 responsibility for his offense; or obstructed justice or committed any
 crime,

and if any such finding results in a guideline range higher than 18-24 months, the higher guideline range becomes the agreed range. The Court is not bound by this recommendation concerning the guideline range, and the defendant understands that he will have no right to withdraw his guilty plea if the Court does not follow this recommendation. However, if the Court finds that defendant is a career offender, an armed career criminal, or a repeat and dangerous sex offender as defined under the sentencing guidelines or other federal law, and that finding is not already reflected in the attached worksheets, this paragraph does not authorize a corresponding increase in the agreed range.

Neither party may take a position concerning the applicable guidelines that is different than any position of that party as reflected in the attached worksheets, except as necessary to the Court's determination regarding subsections 1) and 2), above.

3. Sentence

The Court will impose a sentence pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3553, and in doing so must consider the sentencing guideline range.

A. Imprisonment

Pursuant to Rule 11(c)(1)(B), the government makes a non-binding recommendation that the sentence of imprisonment be no higher than the mid-point of the guideline range, that is, 21 months.

B. Supervised Release

A term of supervised release follows the term of imprisonment. The Court must impose a term of supervised release, which in this case is up to three years. The agreement concerning imprisonment described above in Paragraph 2B does not apply to any term of imprisonment that results from any later revocation of supervised release.

C. Special Assessment

The defendant will pay a special assessment of \$100 at the time of sentencing.

D. Fine

The parties agree that the fine will be no more than the maximum amount of \$250,000.

E. Restitution

The Court shall order restitution to every identifiable victim of the defendant's offense.

4. Use of Withdrawn Guilty Plea

If the Court allows the defendant to withdraw his guilty plea for a "fair and just reason" pursuant to Fed. R. Crim. P. 11(d)(2)(B), the defendant waives his rights under Fed. R. Evid. 410, and the government may use his guilty plea, any statement made under oath at the change-of-plea hearing, and the factual basis statement in this plea agreement, against him in any proceeding.

5. Other Charges

If the Court accepts this agreement, the government will dismiss Counts 12, 14 and 24 of the Sixth Superseding Indictment as against the defendant and not bring any additional charges in connection with the government's current investigation of the defendant.

6. Each Party's Right to Withdraw from this Agreement

The recommendations in Paragraph 3 are not binding on the Court. The defendant has no right to withdraw his guilty plea and the parties have no right to withdraw from this agreement if the Court decides not to follow them.

7. Appeal Waiver

The defendant waives any right he may have to appeal his conviction on any grounds. If the defendant's sentence of imprisonment does not exceed 24 months, the defendant also waives any right he may have to appeal his sentence on any grounds. If the defendant's sentence of imprisonment is at least 18 months, the government waives any right it may have to appeal the defendant's sentence.

This waiver does not bar filing a claim of ineffective assistance of counsel in court.

8. Consequences of Withdrawal of Guilty Plea or Vacation of Conviction

If defendant is allowed to withdraw his guilty plea or if any conviction entered pursuant to this agreement is vacated, the Court shall, on the government's request,

reinstate any charges that were dismissed as part of this agreement. If additional charges are filed against defendant within six months after the date the order vacating defendant's conviction or allowing him to withdraw his guilty plea becomes final, which charges relate directly or indirectly to the conduct underlying the guilty plea or to any conduct reflected in the attached worksheets, defendant waives his right to challenge the additional charges on the ground that they were not filed in a timely manner, including any claim that they were filed after the limitations period expired.

9. Parties to Plea Agreement

Unless otherwise indicated, this agreement does not bind any government agency except the United States Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of Michigan.

10. Scope of Plea Agreement

This agreement, which includes all documents that it explicitly incorporates, is the complete agreement between the parties. This agreement supersedes all other promises, representations, understandings and agreements between the parties concerning the subject matter of this plea agreement that were made at any time before the guilty plea is entered in court. Thus, no oral or written promises made by the government to defendant or to the attorney for the defendant at any time before defendant pleads guilty are binding except to the extent they have been explicitly incorporated into this agreement.

Notwithstanding the previous paragraph, if defendant has entered into a proffer agreement in writing or a cooperation agreement in writing with the government, this plea agreement does not supersede or abrogate the terms of any such prior written agreement.

This agreement also does not prevent any civil or administrative actions against defendant, or any forfeiture claim against any property, by the United States or any other party.

11. Acceptance of Agreement by Defendant

This plea offer expires unless it has been received, fully signed, in the Office of the United States Attorney by 5:00 P.M. on December 18, 2017. The government reserves the right to modify or revoke this offer at any time before defendant pleads guilty.
