A Tunnel Into The Future

It was a one-penny gym check or a two-penny "combo" that would start our trip through the tunnel and, for a few minutes, let us travel back through that tunnel until we are able to find our yesterdays.

Maybe it was Jack, or maybe it was Harvey, or maybe it was one of their assistants who punched up that gym or "combo" check from the old brown register at the front desk, but the source of that check was not nearly as important as was where that check would take us.

It led first down a flight of stairs, and then into the locker area at the swimming pool, and eventually into the tunnel. Somehow, the trip from the pool through the darkened bowels of the windowless tunnel while we were fully clothed did not carry with it the mystery that the deepest part of our club would hold upon our return trip, a trip which nearly always found us naked.

We would run down the initial two flights, into the tunnel's depths until we reached the first of another two sets of stairs which, though separated by a hundred or so feet of twisting concrete, brought us to a door leading to the gym cage. Through the cage's steel wiring we could see a four-sided, rotating board on which numbers were clearly painted. A separate cup hook was placed immediately below each number, and an elastic-banded key dangled from each hook.

Our gym check or "combo," along with our club ticket would be handed to the attendant, perhaps Gene, who would then remove the key from the board, replace it with our ticket, and hand it to us along with a pair of blue gym shorts and a clean white towel. With the two-penny "combo' we would be allowed to use both the gym and the pool. Upon receiving the key, we would pass through a wooden, swinging door, which led to a somewhat dark and cold locker room. Huge green lockers stretched along the room's wall and through its center.

Long wooden benches, permanently affixed to the hard concrete floor, rimmed the lockers. The room where we, as new and renewing members, faced our annual physical examination, the wood working shop, the photography lab, the "little" gym, and the shower room were all entered from the locker room, but it was the trip back and forth from the gym to the swimming pool which has become so memorable to many of us.

The cold concrete pressing against our bare feet on the first leg of this round trip was greatly magnified when, upon returning to the gym, we would be wet with water from the pool. It caused us to run, and when we stop to think of it, we always ran through the tunnel, especially when wet and naked.

There is no doubt that the Charlestown Boys Club, now the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club, has become the source of many of our happiest childhood memories, but the other end of the tunnel is different now. In traveling through the tunnel of our earlier days, it truly has become a tunnel to yesterday, but come springtime, that every same tunnel will become a tunnel to tomorrow, and today's boys and girls will traverse its depths to a new place, to a place that, when years go

by, they might fondly remember as their own tunnel to yesterday.

Over the past few years, the need for rehabilitation of the Charlestown Boys & Girls Club has been well documented, and a drive to raise funds through the sale of bricks and granite pavers to assist in this rehabilitation process has proven to be highly successful. Work is currently underway to have a state-of-the-art facility available for the youngsters of this community as early as this upcoming spring, and the Club's Alumni Committee is planning an event and Open House to coincide with the completion of this project.

Last year, for the first time in several years and because of the community-wide effort to raise funds through the sale of bricks and paving blocks, the annual appeal to the club's extensive group of alumni was not made.

This year, however, with the newly rehabilitated Charlestown Boys & Girls Club on the immediate horizon, furnishings will be needed to help finalize this extensive undertaking. It is in this area that we seek your assistance.

Before w became whatever it is we have become, we were kids and while we were kids, we were members of the Charlestown Boys Club. Years have passed and things have changed, but there will always be kids, kids who need your help.





IRS TAX UPDATE

· IRS interest rates for the fourth quarter of 1998 will remain at 8% charged on tax underpayments and 7% paid on tax refunds. Underpayments by large corporations will continue to face a 10% interest charge through the final quarter of 1998.

. In preparation for the Year 2000, the IRS is changing the date field on information returns (such as forms in the 1099 series) from a two-digit field to a four-digit field. If you will have to file any of these information returns for 1998 (generally due early in 1999), your systems should be updated now to comply with the new required date format.

· Various tax numbers are adjusted for inflation each year. One of those numbers is the threshold at which you are responsible for payroll taxes on wages paid to household help. The 1997 threshold had been \$1,000; that threshold increases to \$1,100 for 1998. Also changed for 1998: This year any payroll taxes due on household help must be prepaid through quarterly tax estimates or increased withholding. Last year, you were allowed to pay any 1997 "nanny taxes" in April 1998 when you filed your 1997 tax return. This year you may be subject to penalties if you have not prepaid the required amount.

. The IRS has announced an increase in the threshold at which small businesses are required to make payroll tax deposits. The previous threshold had been \$500. This threshold is increased to \$1,000, effective for quarterly returns for periods beginning July 1, 1998, and for annual returns for periods beginning Jan. 1, 1999. Employers whose payroll taxes fall below the \$1,000 threshold for a return period will not have to make monthly tax deposits. They will be permitted to send payment with the return filed for that





Paul Revere Park Soon To Be Completed



Reconstruction has been under way on Paul Revere Park North for many months. The park is located on the south side of the Charlestown Bridge near the Charlestown (Gridley) locks, and will be owned by the Metropolitan District Commission (MDC). The \$5.6 million park will be 90 percent completed by the end of November 1998. When completed, it will be more than three acres.

The new elegant Paul Revere Park, with its elaborate stone walls, will have a wonderful children's play area (shown in photograph above), interpretive exhibits at the dam, a fishing pier, and reconstructed fish ladders.

There will also be a large assortment of plantings throughout the park (shown in the photograph below). Some of the plantings will include: 32 shade trees, seven pine trees, 61 flowering trees, approximately 2000 shrubs, and hundreds of perennials, bulbs, vines, and ornamental grasses.

There is also news on the CA/T construction. If you walk down to the dam you will notice that the first piece of roadway support steel over the Charles River is now in place. That particular piece is part of the new Storrow Drive connection to I-93 which will include roads and a new bridge.

Where are the parents of the teens who are coming home high on alcohol or drugs?

The questions are endless. Yet, they are being asked daily in our community. What has happened to the "good old days" when parental responsibility was a sacred trust ... when parents knew just where their children were, whom they were with and what they were doing . . . when respect and obedience were not only obligatory to your parents but to all in lawful authority - the clergy, the policeman, the teacher, etc.

Is this all "old hat" now? Is it too much to ask some of our local parents to inculcate in their offspring good manners, obedience and respect for law and order?

Don't these parents care what their children are doing - what sort of lives they are living?

This is by no means a condemnation of all the teenagers in out town or of all the parents. Charlestown is justly proud of the

vast majority of her teens and has countless wonderful parents who give a fine

Yet, there is an alarming rise in alleged juvenile criminal incidents and seemingly complete disregard of parental responsibility by many in our town. Parents must take responsibility - they must let their children know the basic difference between right and wrong - teach them respect for private property - not to drink until they are of age and then drink responsibly - to obey the laws of the land, respect their elders and those in authority.

Is this too much to ask of some of our parents? Are they even aware of what is going on right under their noses and speaking of noses, can't they smell the liquor off their youngster's breath OR DO THEY EVEN CARE?

Let this be a wake-up call to irresponsible parents before tragedy happens in your very household!

GENERAL SPECIFICATIONS

This property is a first class, free standing office building located within the Boston Redevelopment Authority's urban redevelopment area known as the Charlestown Navy Yard. The 30-acre redevelopment area is a mixed-use redevelopment encompassing residential, commercial and business uses including offices, retail, institutional, marina and other water-related and water dependent activities involved within Harborpark District, Charlestown Navy Yard. Business uses include office, research centers, local retail, general retail, restaurants, educational, hotels, as well as recreational facilities and uses commensurate with a waterfront and harbor access.

The building is 100% leased and has been since 1986, and is a "turn of the century administration building," converted to first class office space in 1985. There is a 65 year ground lease from the Boston Redevelopment Authority which commenced on October 28, 1985. Land area for this ground lease accompanying the building is 13,403 square feet. The property is currently leased to three tenants. Due to its unique design, the property lends itself to either a single occupant or multi-tenant occupancies.
