The Charlestown Community Appreciation Awards Committee, sponsored by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council, will hold its fourth annual Community Apprecia tion Awards Banquet on Saturday, April 23 at the Knight of Columbus hall. After a very successful event last year, the committee is hoping that the community will once again respond to a call for nominations in the seven award categories.

The purpose of the awards ceremony is to recognize those who have helped enrich the quality of life in Charlestown, but have done so in such an unassuming manner that their deeds have gone unheralded and, in most cases unknown to the general population. Seven award categories have been established to encompass all aspects of the community. Persons, businesses and organizations that have previously received recognition for their deeds and members of the committee and the Neighborhood Council are not eligible to receive an award.
Award recipients will be chosen by the committee from nominations received from the community. Persons who sent nominations in the past are requested to resubmit their choices for these awards. If potential recipients would be eligible for consideration in more than one category, submit an entry for each award. The number of entries received does not make that candidate more eligible for consideration. Rather, the quality and description of the good deeds performed, enhances chances of being selected.

## AWARD CATEGORIES

- Youth - A Charlestown resident who is 18 years of age or younger as of Jan. 1, 1994 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Elderly - A Charlestown resident who is 55 years of age or older by Jan. 1, 1994 whose deeds have gone unheralded.
- Organization - An incorporated non-profit, Char-lestown-based group that primarily serves Charlestown and whose goals are geared toward the betterment of the community.
- Business - A Charlestown-based business that supports and enhances the quality of life in the Charlestown community.
- Public Servant - A person who performs service within his/her job capacity, but goes beyond that job description in service to the betterment of the Charlestown community. (Example: an employee of the federal, state, county, city or an authority/government agency or community agency who may or may not be a resident of Charlestown.)
- New Resident - A person who has taken up residency in Charlestown within the last 10 years and whose deeds have contributed to the quality of Charlestown life. - Unsung Hero - A Charlestown resident whose deed/ deeds were performed within the community and have gone publicly unhonored. These deeds cannot be performed as part of his/her job performance. There is no age restriction for this recipient. The deed/deeds would result in the enhancement of the quality of life in Charlestown.

DONT FORGET TO DEDUCT SPECIAL WORK CLOTHING AND PROTECTIVE WEAR
You may be able to deduct the cost and upkeep of uniforms and special work clothing, including any laundering and cleaning expenses, if the clothing is required as a condition of your employment and is not suitable for everyday use outside the job.
Since delivery workers, firefighters, health care workers, law enforcement officers, letter carriers, professional athletes, and transportation workers (air, rail, bus, etc.) are generally required to wear uniforms on the job, they can usually qualify for the federal deduction. Musicians and entertainers are also typically able to deduct the cost and upkeep of theatrical clothing and accessories - as long as the clothing is not suitable for ordinary wear.
Armed forces reservists may deduct the unreimbursed cost of their uniforms if military regulations restrict them from wearing them except while on duty as a reservist. You must, however, reduce the cost by any nontaxable allowance you receive for these expenses.

- If you are required to wear protective clothing in your work, such as safety shoes or boots, safery glasses, hard hats or work gloves, you can write off the cost of these items, too. If you earn your living as a carpenter, cement worker, chemical worker, electrician, lineman, machinist, oil field worker, pipe fitter, steamfitter, or truck driver, for example, you probably have protective gear costs you can deduct.
You must itemize your deductions in order to deduct the unreimbursed cost and maintenance of your uniforms or protective clothing. Unfortunately, however, the amount deductible is limited to your total miscellaneous deductions that exceed $2 \%$ of adjusted gross income. Because of the $2 \%$ threshold, it may be wise to try to lump most of your work clothing purchases and other unreimbursed employee expenses into every other year in order to maximize your deduction.

If you don't receive any of these benefits, call the Surplus Food Hotline at 357-6000, ext. 239 to find out if you are eligible to receive surplus food.
