## 75\% Voter Turnout In Charlestown

Approximately $75 \%$ of the registered voters in Ward Two. Charlestown cast their ballots in the State Election on Tuesday November 6. 1984. The Republican candidates made a credible showing in this Ward that has approx imately a $95 \%$ Democratic registration.

In the Presidential/Vice Presidential race, the Mondale/Ferraro ticket captured $55 \%$ of the vote while the Reagan/Bush team received $43 \%$
John Kerry, in his quest for the United States Senate seat vacated by Senator Paul Tsongas gleaned $59 \%$ of the Charlestown vote, with Ray Shamie taking $38 \%$

Speaker of the United States House of Representatives. Thomas P. "Tip 0 Neill. Jr. was the highes vote-getter in Charlestown taking $75 \%$ of the vote cast His opponent in this elec ion was Communist can didate Laura Ross, who picked up 488 votes in this picked upity O'Neill has served as Congressman rom this the Eighth rom this, the Eighth Ongressional District ince 1953. If, as has been reported in Boston daily newspapers. O'Neill will not seek election in 1986 this will be a most in leresting contest two years hence.
In unopposed races Governor's Councillor Joseph Langone tallied $66^{4}$ of the vote. Senator

Francis Doris, 66\%; Representative Richard A Voke. $72 \%$; and Re gister of Probate James M. Connolly, $68 \%$.

## Boston Zoning Commission Approves Zoning Amendment

## use policies are being for

 mulated.BRA Director Stephen Coyle said the interim zoning measures were needed so that the city could rezone areas bordering Boston harbor
Coyle said. "Boston's zoning code was enacted 20 years ago and does not reflect some of the
demographic and land use changes which have oc cured in the harborfront areas. Existing zoning ac lually allows zoning acwhich allows for uses which are detrimental to the environment. For instance. noxious industrial uses are currently permit ted adjacent to residential communites, such as Port Norfolk in Dorchester and

Charlestown.
Coyle said the city's recently released plan for the harbor, calls for an advisory group of Boston residents to work closely with the BRA on drafting sions for the city's provisions for the city's zoning code Coyle stressed that projects already approved will be affected by the zon-
ing change.
The amendment approved by the Zoning Commission includes the following provisions:
-For a specified period of time. not to exceed two years. No building permits will be issued for the interim zoning district without an Interim Planning Permit.
-The BRA must advise the city's Board of Appeal that a proposed use is in ac cord with the planning goals of the area.
-Specific uses, such as residential, are exempted if that use is already allowed, but certain uses which are damaging to the environment may be for bidden

He has been clean for fourteen months, one day at a time. The fact is that marijuana is so common, it is not even considered dangerous. But that is a fact that can cause an unsuspecting person to try it, use it, and not even consider himself dependent until he is a daily user
Research is underway that is asking whether marijuana may change the body's chromosomes. It may increase the risks of disease and have serious long term effects on the respiratory system. It may even be related to cancer. We do know that steady users become slower moving, slower thinking and less able to concentrate on tasks. This condition is called burnout.
Is it okay to smoke pot if you are pregnant? Definitely not. Scientists believe that marijuana, which crosses the placental barrier in the pregnant mother's womb may have a toxic effect on embryos and fetuses. This may result in a smaller baby and even more serious consequences. No street drugs are safe to take during pregnancy.
Behavior changes cause trouble within families and with friends. Dishonesty and lying to parents, teachers create guilt and distrust for the parents. Marijuana using adolescents drop out of family activities and the fighting and arguing effects everyone. Many other subtle effects are blamed on other than drug use.
