75% Voter Turnout In Charlestown

Approximately 75% of the registered voters in Ward Two, Charlestown cast their ballots in the State Election on Tuesday. November 6, 1984. The Republican candidates made a credible showing in this Ward that has approximately a 95% Democratic

In the Presidential/Vice Presidential race, the Mondale/Ferraro ticket captured 55% of the vote. while the Reagan/Bush team received 43%

John Kerry, in his quest for the United States Senate seat vacated by Senator Paul Tsongas. gleaned 59% of the Charlestown vote, with Ray Shamie taking 38%.

Speaker of the United States House of Representatives. Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill. Jr. was the highest vote-getter in Charlestown. taking 75% of the vote cast. His opponent in this election was Communist candidate Laura Ross, who picked up 488 votes in this community. O'Neill has served as Congressman from this, the Eighth Congressional District. since 1953. If, as has been reported in Boston daily newspapers. O'Neill will not seek election in 1986. this will be a most interesting contest two years

In unopposed races, Governor's Councillor Joseph Langone tallied 66% of the vote: Senator

Francis Doris, 66%; Representative Richard A. Voke, 72%; and Register of Probate James M. Connolly, 68%.

Only 48% of the voters cast a Yes-No ballet on the non-binding referendum question on withdrawal of the troops and military advisors, and military aid to Central America. 





Boston Zoning Commission Approves Zoning Amendment

The first step in implementation of Boston's Harborpark plan took place Monday when the Boston Zoning Commission approved a zoning amendment which allows the Boston Redevelopment Authority to establish interim planning districts.

The provision, allowed for the first time in Boston, authorized the city's Board of Appeal (on advice of BRA) to issue interim planning permits while an area is being rezoned. The technique ensures that orderly growth and change can take place in a district while new zoning and land

BRA Director Stephen Covle said the interim zoning measures were needed so that the city could rezone areas bordering Boston harbor.

Coyle said, "Boston's zoning code was enacted 20 years ago and does not reflect some of the

demographic and land use changes which have occured in the harborfront areas. Existing zoning actually allows for uses which are detrimental to the environment. For instance, noxious industrial uses are currently permitted adjacent to residential communites, such as Port Norfolk in Dorchester and

Charlestown."

Coyle said the city's recently released plan for the harbor, calls for an advisory group of Boston residents to work closely with the BRA on drafting new and updating provisions for the city's zoning

Coyle stressed that projects already approved will be affected by the zoning change.

The amendment approved by the Zoning Commission includes the following provisions:

·For a specified period of time, not to exceed two years. No building permits will be issued for the interim zoning district without an Interim Planning Permit.

 The BRA must advise the city's Board of Appeal that a proposed use is in accord with the planning goals of the area.

*Specific uses, such as residential, are exempted if that use is already allowed, but certain uses which are damaging to the environment may be for-
