The site, known as Perkins Place, is a 14-bed residential and transitional facility for mentally ill adults, many of whom fixed incomes. His wish is were formerly homeless. The residence provides a therapeutic, stable, longterm living arrangement for these adults, who are, as of yet, unable to live independently in the com-

This is the fifth Christmas for Perkins Place, whose staff provides assistance in arranging medical appointments, chores, accessing support services and social activities, hygiene and grooming, along with meal preparation.

Program coordinator Dan Reis is asking the residents, businesses and organizations of Charlestown to help the staff of Perkins Place to bring a little holiday cheer to these resi-

dents. He explains that the residents are learning to adjust to living in the community with their handicap, and they are living on to provide them with gifts to make this holiday sea son a happy one.

As to suggested gifts to the residents of Perkins Place, Reis suggests such items as winter and summer clothing, socks, shirts, jeans, and personal hygiene items for the men. The women would welcome jerseys, sweaters, knee-high stockings, knee socks, make up and any little personal items.

You may call Reis at 242-6018 and arrangements will be made for pick up.

Police Community Relations -**Public Safety Meeting**

The monthly meeting of the Police Community Relations-CNC Public Safety Committee will meet at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 10 at a location to be announced.

The CNC meetings are open to the public, and all are welcome to attend.

* Tobin Bridge Traffic Advisory . . . The Massachusetts Port Authority Tobin Bridge Everett Avenue on-ramp will be closed for three weeks for routine repairs from now through Wednesday, Dec. 21 at 3:30 p.m., weather permitting.

All vehicles will be detoured to the Carter Street on-ramp for the duration of the repair work. Sufficient signs will be posted diverting all traffic to the proper on-ramp, ensuring the safety of all commuters and pedestrians. If the weather does not cooperate, the duration of the project will be extended.

* CNC Public Safety/Police Community Relations Meeting . . . A sparsely attended Public Safety Committee meeting was held on Dec. 13 at Bishop Lawton Hall at St. Francis de Sales Church. This was an opportunity for members of the CNC and residents to meet the new Community Service Officer at Area A of the Boston Police Department, Officer Bill Smith.

Committee Vice Chairperson Edna Kelly chaired the meeting, also attended by CNC members John Dillon and Gregg Nolan, and Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services.

One of the complaints discussed was

the number of cars parked illegally around the rotary at Sullivan Square. These cars block the vision of the drivers in the rotary preventing them from seeing moving vehicles coming from Everett on Alford Street. At the conclusion of the meeting, Smith drove Dillon to the rotary to review the situation.

The recurring problem of noisy young people in the Eden Street Park and at Dunstable Street and Tibbetts Town Way was noted. The complaint was on the noise, particularly after midnight on Fridays and Saturdays, the drug dealing and the racing of stolen cars.

Smith stated that in reporting drug deals to the police, residents should give as many details as possible, such as the color of the person's clothing. He added that it is not necessary for residents to give their name in making such reports.

Speeding cars, especially in the Thompson Square area, was a problem given to the officer. Specifies included the large number of cars that go through the stop sign at Austin and Main streets, those that travel the wrong way on the one-way roadway in front of the liquor store at Thompson Square and the problems pedestrians have in crossing Main and Warren streets.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday, Jan. 10 at a location to be announced.

* Post Offices Add Hours For The Holiday . . . The Charlestown Post Office will extend its hours this Saturday, Dec. 17, to assist customers with their holiday mailing needs. The local facility will remain open until 5 p.m. on Saturday.

Also, customers can visit Boston's two 24-hour facilities - the Fort Point Station on Dorchester Avenue near South Station or the Airport Mail Center at Logan Air-

Postal officials advise persons to make sure their parcel contents are well cushioned, to avoid over wrapping, to make sure the package is sealed properly and to avoid address smudges.

* New Chelsea Street Opens . . . Engineer Bill Rogers told the Patriot this week that one lane in each direction on Chelsea Street will service the Moran Terminal and the Charlestown Navy Yard for the balance of the winter. He said that Constitution Road will be closed up to the trolley turnaround at Gate 1 in order to allow the East side of Chelsea Street to be

completed, estimated to be in May, when the Jersey barriers will be removed.

In addition to the work on Chelsea Street, there will be landscaping done between Chelsea Street and Lowney Way, to re-establish the Freedom Trail connecting the Charlestown Navy Yard and the Bunker Hill Monument.

He said that by the end of the week, an opening would be made in the barriers to allow people to use the bus stop at Gate 4.

Organizations Voted Into Membership In CNC – Preparations Made To Start The New Year

The monthly meeting of the Charlestown Neighborhood Council (CNC) was held on Dec. 6 at the K. of C. Hall. Members present were Chairman Peter Looney, Tom Cunha, Marty O'Brien, Ken Stone, Kathleen Bryson, Jeanne Davis, Gregg Nolan, Jim Conway, Bill Galvin, Kate McDonough, Bill McCabe and Edna Kelly.

Looney opened the floor to residents, acknowledging a Chestnut Street resident who was concerned about the building of a motel on one of the empty City Square parcels. Cunha explained that meetings on the zoning of City Square had been going on for two years as this land will be available on completion of the CANA project and would be put out for bid by the Mass. Highway Department through the state's Department of Capital Planning and Operations.

He said that through the public meeting process, two scenarios for each of the five CANA parcels in City Square were developed by a marketing group to offer guidelines to the CNC's Zoning Committee. Cunha went on to say that there will be at least two committee meetings before the zoning is brought to the full CNC for a vote.

Looney recognized John O'Brien who was present representing the Boston Redevelopment Authority (BRA). Cunha told O'Brien that at the start of the community's zoning process, there were five BRA representatives advocating for the community and doing any necessary paperwork. He went on to say that since

no one on the zoning committee is an expert in this field, the former BRA Director Paul Barrett had promised this assistance. O'Brien said this will be discussed with the BRA Zoning Department and the support people will be available.

O'Brien said that some of the requests by the CNC will have to be reviewed, such as the release of the RFP on Parcel R-87 on Tremont Street requested by the CNC over a year ago and the CNC's opposition to the proposed roadway through the Paul Revere Park adjacent to City Square. Looney noted that the CNC has had no communication with the BRA for a long time, adding that it must be reinstated.

Charlestown resident and architect Jack French reported to the CNC that his firm had signed a purchase and sale agreement with the Archdiocese of Boston to buy the former St. Francis de Sales Elementary School on the top of Bunker Hill Street. He told the council that the property was being bought "at full market rate" through Hunneman and went to the "highest bidder."

French stated that his firm had been doing a market analysis for the past six weeks. He said that plans are to demolish the building, citing structural problems and hazardous waste in the existing building. They are developing plans to construct 24 three- and fourbedroom houses each with a yard, a garage and some additional on-site parking. He said the housing would be "market-rate brick structures with period design," with prices starting at \$180,000.

French told the council that they would be working with the parish to develop a suitable remembrance for the alumni of the school.

Looney spoke of the problems residents of Russell Street have had with erosion of the back hill. French said that they will work to stabilize that land and there will be no construction on the slope.

Looney told French that the plans for housing on the site would go before the Development Committee and the residents would be given two-weeks notice in the Patriot.

Kelly reported on last month's Public Safety Committee meeting and the promotion of former Community Service Officer Joe McNulty to detective and his replacement in the area by Officer Bill

Looney spoke of the recent meeting of the Area A Advisory Board with Commissioner Paul Evans where the board's concerns were discussed. He told the council that 11 new police officers were slated to be assigned to Area A-1 in January and, in addition, there would be one more car on weekends and a motorcycle patrolman in the Charlestown Navy Yard. He stated it was federal money that was going to pay for the additional police in Charlestown. He noted that the local members of the board continue to push for a substation.

Looney encouraged anyone with a problem to attend the monthly meeting with the police, noting that residents will get action if they come out in large numbers.

Kelly mentioned the sweeps by police seeking students in Charlestown High School who are roaming the town instead of being in classes. Looney said that this action came out of a group of school, public safety, elected officials and residents who meet at the high school every two weeks. He stated that this has resulted in the best relationship between the school and the community in 20

Galvin reported on a recent meeting relative to parking problems in the City Square area. He said there are three major problems, and they are 1) commuters, 2) Boston Garden events and 3) parking for businesses.

The conclusion of the meeting was that parking being limited to two hours for non-residents between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. in the City Square area; the traffic directions of the streets be kept as they currently are; there not be parking meters; designated parking be approved for the Life Focus Center and the Charlestown District Court; and that parking be allowed on Main Street between Henley Street and City Square, and on Constitution Road. Galvin stated that there would be a follow-up meeting with the Boston Transportation Department on these issues.

Stone asked that the CNC send a letter in opposition to the haul road that might be built through the middle of Paul Revere Park adjacent to City Square. He stressed the importance of this as a Department of Environmen



vation Society 8 and the Charlestown Historical Society 5.

The Charlestown Business Association and the Charlestown District Court received the eighth and ninth place votes and were not elected to membership.

McCabe said that he would be sending a letter to each of the seven organizations asking them to name a representative to sit on the council. The

members will be officially seated at the January meeting of the CNC.

Galvin told the CNC that with the opening of the new CAN A tunnels a problem has arisen with the generation of increased noise. Stone said that the CANA engineers are trying to arrive at a solution. Galvin stated that the CNC should keep on top of this problem, add-

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





If you would like to reduce your income taxes, consider making a donation of appreciated property to your favorite charity. If your goal is to reduce your 1994 taxes, you need to make this donation before the end of December.

Thanks to the 1993 Tax Act, you may donate appreciated property to a charity without having to worry about the alternative minimum tax (AMT). The AMT is a separate tax calculation that causes many taxpayers to lose part of the benefit of their charitable deductions. Historically, the appreciation associated with donated property was subject to the AMT. Under the 1993 act, such appreciation in your charitable donations is no longer subject to the AMT.

Why should you donate property rather than cash? Donating appreciated property like stocks enables you to escape capital gains tax. This loophole can provide you with savings of up to 28% of the appreciation built into your investment portfolio. For example, let's say you own stock worth \$10,000 that originally cost you \$4,000. If you sell this stock and donate the \$10,000 of proceeds to charity, you must pay capital gains tax on the difference between your cost and the selling price of the stock. In this case, the gain subject to tax would be \$6,000. The tax on this gain could total

If instead, you donate your stock directly to a charity, you permanently avoid paying tax on your \$6,000 of gain. Yet, the law still entitles you to deduct the entire \$10,000 as a charitable contribu-

Contributing appreciated property is a triplewin situation. You are no longer subject to the penalty of the AMT, you avoid paying capital gains tax, and a charitable organization receives a valuable contribution.
