## Arson Squad Seeks Help On Suspicious Fires

Boston Fire Department Investigator Lt. Henry Hickey came before the Charlestown Neighborhood Council on Tuesday night seeking information and assistance in connection with suspicious fires in the Pearl and Bartlett streets area. Hickey, a member of the Arson Squad, distributed a composite sketch of a person wanted for questioning in connection with the fires. According to Hickey, three separate fires have been set over the past year in homes located near the corner of Pearl and Bartlett streets. "Each home was occupied with babies, chil-

PLEASE, PLEASE, PLEASE, take five minutes of this day to go and have your eyes checked. It doesn't hurt and it doesn't cost anything.

Two years ago I decided to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity and it actually saved my sight. I was told during this examination that my pressure was very high and it was recommended that I see my ophthalmologist as quickly as I could.

The very next day I contacted the Gundersen Eye Clinic at the University Hospital and was fortunate to have an appointment within two weeks.

After the examination, the doctor told me I had a very serious case of acute angle closure, which is glaucoma, and it could cause blindness instantly. The doctor said that if I did not receive immediate treatment (which turned out to be a laser treatment) that by the weekend I would be blind.

After many laser treatments, the doctors believe that they have that type of glaucoma under control but I also have another type that is being treated with eye drops and, hopefully, is the kind that will be slow in causing any serious problems.

I thank the Lions Club for being there, and this letter is long overdue to thank them for offering me this opportunity. I highly praise everyone connected with this organization.

PLEASE — everyone — all ages — go to the Bunker Hill Mall on May 15 and have your eyes tested. You know, there are not always warning signs. I did not have a warning! If you do not go and you have this problem it may be too late to do anything for you.

God bless the work the Lions Club members do.

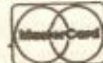
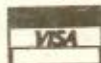

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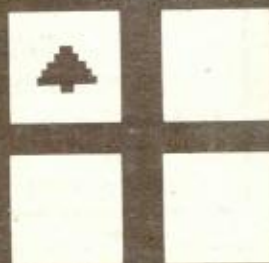

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## Flynn Meets With Community Leaders To Discuss Fiscal Situation

Boston Mayor Raymond L. Flynn, met recently with several groups of community leaders from Boston's neighborhoods at the Parkman House to discuss the current fiscal crisis at the state level and how it is affecting the residents of Boston.

"We're not asking for anything more than what we deserve," said Flynn. "Cutting local aid means cutting the basic services that the residents of Boston's neighborhoods need."

Residents from every Boston neighborhood, including Charlestown, attended the meetings. Many of them expressed support for Flynn's effort to have Boston receive its fair share of local aid. Several residents agreed to start a campaign to urge state legislators that cutting local aid means cutting services to the people of Boston.

"Boston and other cities and towns didn't create the financial situation at the state, but the state is trying to solve the problem on the backs of local residents," stated John Riordan, director of the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services. "The city has been fiscally responsible. We've made the cuts that had to be made to keep the budget balanced and, even though we've had three straight years of local aid cuts, we've managed

ed to deliver services better than ever. With this next cut, services will be hurt."

Robert J. Ciolek, acting director of Administrative Services for the city of Boston, outlined the current situation in the city, with substantial cuts in several departments that will affect services for Boston residents. Although priority areas such as police, fire, health care, youth programs and education will suffer only minimal cuts, some departments have received 30 to 40 percent cuts.

He noted that Boston has

10 percent of the state's population, but is being asked to absorb 30 percent of the proposed local aid cut. "City government has fewer employees than when Mayor Flynn took office in 1984, except for the School Department," Ciolek said. "At the same time, the state added 13,000 to the payroll."

"With 50 percent of Boston's land being tax exempt, we have limits on how much we can raise through the property tax," said Riordan. "Every day, Boston's population doubles because

of people who come here to work. So we have to provide police and fire protection, and clean up after twice as many people — without being compensated for this in local aid."

Flynn has been meeting with many different groups at the Parkman House to discuss the local aid situation and the impact it is having on city services. In addition to the community leaders, Flynn has met with the hospital administrators, business leaders and union leaders and clergy over the past few weeks.

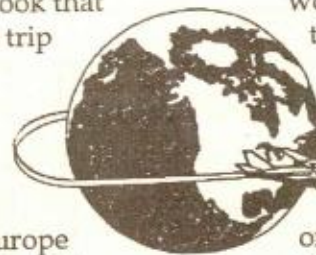

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## YMCA Gets Nod For Construction Of New Facility In The Navy Yard

After years of being absent from the Charlestown landscape, the Armed Services YMCA has been given approval by the Charlestown Neighborhood Council to proceed with its plans to build a new facility in the Charlestown Navy Yard. The unanimous vote took place at the monthly council meeting on May 7. The next step for the "Y" will be approval by the Boston Redevelopment Authority Board of Directors, expected to take place later this month.

The former YMCA building in City Square was demolished to make room for the Central Artery/North Area (CANA) roadway reconstruction project. Many artifacts from the old structure were preserved and will be included in the new building to be located on Second Avenue and Ninth Street.

Development Committee Chairman Tom Cunha requested the council vote on the proposal after a Committee-of-the-Whole meeting on Monday night saw no outstanding objections

from the community. Cunha's motion requested approval of the Armed Services "Y" as presented to the Development Committee with several provisions: the parking requirements are to be reviewed after one year of the "Y's" operation; a signed contract between the owner/operator of Building 199 (the garage) and the "Y" must be in effect before an occupancy permit is given and the contract will be in accordance with decision by the city's Board of Appeal as to the number of parking spaces required for the facility; and the mitigation agreement, the same one that was presented to the Development Committee on May 6, be signed and be brought before the Development Committee for review before the "Y" occupies the facility.

The 12 members of the Neighborhood Council present voted in favor of the motion and agreed to send the YMCA's proposal to the BRA Board for its approval.

The sparse turnout by council members at the monthly meeting resulted in Cunha requesting that a letter be sent to all members informing them of their

responsibilities to the council and to their constituents. These responsibilities, he stated, can't be met if one does not attend regularly scheduled meetings. He also pointed out that some council members leave at an appointed time each month, long before the proceedings are over. Council Chairman Dennis McLaughlin agreed that a letter would be sent before next month's meeting.

Council members who were present included McLaughlin, Cunha, Vice Chairman Peter Looney, Marty O'Brien Sr., Bob Scalli, Moe Gillen, Kate McDonough, Mel Stillman, Marilyn Darling, Ellen D'Ambrosio, Bud Coleman and Bob Wallace. Kay Whelan was ill and Jim Conway is a patient at Mass. General Hospital.

An update on development issues in the Charlestown Navy Yard was provided by Paul Barrett, assistant director of Harbor Planning and Development for the BRA. He stated that Buildings 79 and 96, located inside Gate 5, are now under construction and should be finished by mid-July.

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# Charlestown Families Remember Loved Ones At State House Ceremony And Balloon Launch



PINK AND BLUE BALLOONS decorated the fence of the State House on a recent Saturday noon, but it was not a festive occasion. Each balloon carried the name of a young person — a murder victim — written by a family member or a friend as Parents of Murdered Children marked National Victim's Rights Day.

Rev. Marlene Campbell led the gathering

in the ceremony of prayer and music, telling those present that "prayer does change things." The participants sought comfort from each other for their very personal pain as friends greeted each other with hugs and strangers were welcomed into their midst in the same manner. Following an awards ceremony at which POMC honored several persons for their assistance, former Charles-

town resident Sandy King, who had lost a second son in a murder in April of this year, took the microphone and told the gathering that "murder is everywhere in Boston, but in one little square mile of the city — Charlestown — there are so many names that no one wants to acknowledge." She read a list of the names of murder victims in this town that she had compiled and added, with tears streaming down her face, "Please don't forget these people, their families never will." Many family members and friends of Charlestown victims were present for the ceremony including three mothers — Sandy King, Mrs. Hughes and Florence Ahearn.

Boston Police Department records list 29 murders in Charlestown in the past 10 years with arrests made or warrants issued in 12 of the cases. The Charlestown murder victims are: 1981 — Mary Burhoe, John Durkin, Christopher Tracy, Herbert Stone . . . 1982 — Wilfred Collins, James Kiely . . . 1983 — Carol Wells, William Byrnes . . . 1984 — Leonard Ames, Judy Lawrence,

John Murphy . . . 1985 — Robert Barrett, Francis McGrath, Kenneth Dennehy, Joel Durham . . . 1986 — John Ahearn, Carol Mahan, Arthur Godfrey, Chris King . . . 1987 — Kevin Martell . . . 1988 — Robert McGrath, Stephen McGonagle, Robert Livingston, Richard Evers . . . 1989 — Connie Liu, Maurine B. Szmielewicz . . . 1990 — Martin Kane, Patricia Dodd . . . 1991 — John "Jay" King.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, the balloons were removed from the fences and distributed among the gathering. They were then released and were carried up over the State House by the warm spring breezes. Participants, with arms joined and tears falling, watched the mass of pink and blue drift out of sight.

The members of POMC returned to the steps of the State House that night for a candlelight vigil.

This is only one program sponsored by POMC. The support group meets the first and third Friday of each month at 7 p.m. in the Piemonte Room at Boston City Hall.

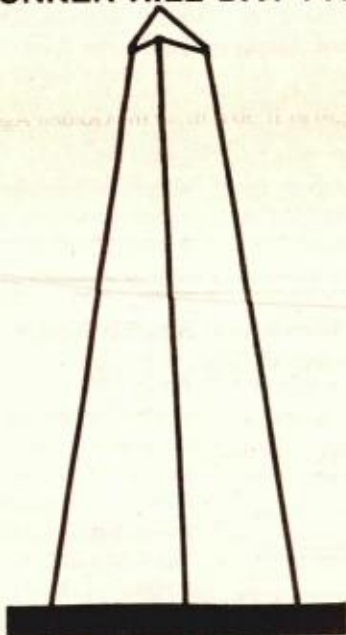
Thursday night would be the fantastic finale of the season and there were some surprises.

## YMCA Gets Nod For Construction Of New Facility In The Navy Yard

Diatrim, a medical research firm associated with Mass. General Hospital, will occupy 30,000 square feet of space in both buildings and is expected to be in full operation by Labor Day.

The RFP (request for proposals) for Building P,

located inside Gate 5, has been advertised, Barrett said, and are due back on May 10. There is approximately 4,000 to 5,000 square feet of "traditional office space" available, he stated, at that location.

Barrett updated the council on the Navy Yard Master

Plan, approved by the body last year. He stated that the Notice of Project Change had been approved by the Commonwealth. The 106 Review Process has reached a consensus on building heights in the Navy Yard "with hopes of having a signed agreement within

two weeks," he added. The Draft Supplemental Environmental Impact Report will be filed in two weeks, he said.

Barrett requested that a Development Committee meeting be scheduled to discuss these and other issues with the community. Cunha stated that a meeting would take place before June 1. (No date had been set at press time.)

Wallace reported on a meeting he chaired concerning the Boston Housing Authority's vacant lot located on Hunter Street between Bunker Hill and Moulton streets. He said that the lot had been littered with construction debris by Perini, contractor for the CANA project who had leased the property from the BHA. He stated: "The lot has been cleaned and now we are asking for an agreement between the Neighborhood Council and the BHA to keep the area clean and have involvement with any future plans for the site." Wallace added: "We would like to see definite plans for this lot established between the BHA and possibly the Parks Department to make sure it maintains a clean, safe area, not the eyesore it had become."

Massport Liaison Dorothy Steele reported that

Massport has agreed to construct a skateboard ramp for the Boys & Girls Club, after repeated requests from Looney for their assistance in establishing such a recreational site within the community. She stated that the project should be completed before July 1.

Steele also announced that the Tobin Bridge de-leading project that has been taking place outside the Headstart school on Moulton Street is almost complete. The beautification project on Vine, Decatur and Chelsea streets is also completed, she said.

The residential soil de-leading project is set to begin May 8 Steele said. This will involve 17 Charlestown properties located adjacent to the Tobin Bridge.

Steele informed the council that Judy Evers, community liaison from the Mayors Office of Neighborhood Services, requested that additional lighting be placed under the Tobin Bridge outside Gate 4 of the Charlestown Navy Yard. This area, according to Evers, is heavily traveled by passengers from public transportation, tourists following the Freedom Trail and residents living in or near the Navy Yard. Steele stated that although this section of land had been taken by the Massachusetts Department of Public Works from Massport for the duration of the CANA project, Massport did establish temporary lighting to alleviate the problem. She noted that Massport would install permanent lighting within one month.

Sidebars . . . Chairman McLaughlin reappointed Cunha as chairman of the

Community Appreciation Awards Committee "in appreciation for a job well done" on this year's first annual awards presentations . . .

Stillman announced that the Boston Police will be cracking down on public drinking. Those arrested, regardless of age, will be brought to Area A police station, booked and retained until fines are paid (by parents if a minor is involved) and cases will go before Judge Peter Agnes at the Charlestown District Court the next court day. Problem areas such as the playing field at Charlestown High School, the Bunker Hill Cemetery, Doherty Playground and the Eden Street Park are among the target areas being closely watched for drinking . . . red on Bartlett Street on March 18, 1991," he said.

Hickey continued: "Each fire occurred during the night while residents were at home. The arsonist has taken much preparation and each is so well thought out

that we believe that some kind of motive is involved." He stated that gasoline is believed to have been used to accelerate each blaze. Close to one-half million dollars is estimated to have been lost on the properties as a result of these blazes.

There have been no injuries to the occupants, although some residents barely made it to safety as fire engulfed their homes."

Hickey requested that any person with information on the fires or possibly knowing the identity of the person being sought for questioning about the suspicious blazes should call him or Detective Robert MacAleese at 725-3324. A \$5,000 reward is offered by the Arson Watch Reward Program which is sponsored by the Casualty-Property Insurance Companies of Massachusetts. Confidentiality is guaranteed by both the Arson Squad and the Reward

Program.
